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TWO STORIES AND A GOOD QUESTION

I would like to tell you a story; two stories. And then I would like to ask a question.

There is in Washington a large apartment building. I suspect it is about 40 years old and was designed, quite obviously, for what we have been taught to think of as upper-middle-class people. Indeed, that is the sort who occupied it until the neighborhood began to change.

Now it is — as is nearly all of Washington — occupied by Negroes and what once was a showpiece is now — as is nearly all of Washington — a slum of the worst sort. Graffiti covers the walls, that and debris of one sort or another; on the walls and in the corners. Stair newels have been ripped out; garbage is everywhere; the stalled elevator is a mocking memory of the past; light sockets hang empty; the utilities work sometime and heat is a sometime thing.

As you may imagine, the present owner of this property is an harassed individual. Negro organizations have raked him over the coals demanding the building codes be strictly enforced.

Who is to blame, the tenants or the landlord, I don't know. He says it is pointless to try to improve the situation. He has tried, he says, and his improvements are undone almost as rapidly as they are installed.

And that is where that rests at this writing.

Now, then.

The area just east of the Capitol, there in Washington, is known, prosaically enough, as Capitol East. It is a residential area that consists of Federal-period town houses, as charming an architectural concept as this nation has developed. Once upon a time, Capitol East was lived in by the same sort of people who, initially, occupied the apartment building I write of.

But that, as I say, was once upon a time; many years ago.

Negroes moved in and it became a slum — a terrible place, filthy and crime ridden. All that was left of its charm was the houses. They remained, shabby but still graceful, high-ceilinged, large-roomed, commodious, their

bricks warm with age. And there came a time when the young "intellectuals" — upper-echelon bureaucrats — thought how nice it would be to move into these bargain-priced houses, refurbish them and, in the doing, give meaning to their uplift preachings, those of racial integration and the brotherhood of man.

They did just that, and brought the civilized habits with them. Soon, the ring of the hammer and the zig-zig-zag of the saw were heard again on Capitol Hill. And from the shabby pile, flowers sprang.

It could be done, you see. Or could it?

In time, the White invaders grew tired of the habits of their "deprived" neighbors. They began to insist that the building and sanitation codes be enforced.

And what came of that particular shoe on that particular foot?

The Negroes formed a resistance movement, is what came of it. The area has been circled with leaflets, meetings have been held, and demands have been made that, no, the "undisciplined" should not be called upon to improve their homes, their way of living. How unfair can you get, trying to make Negroes live like White people?

And that is where that rests. And my question?

How long, Oh, Lord, how long?

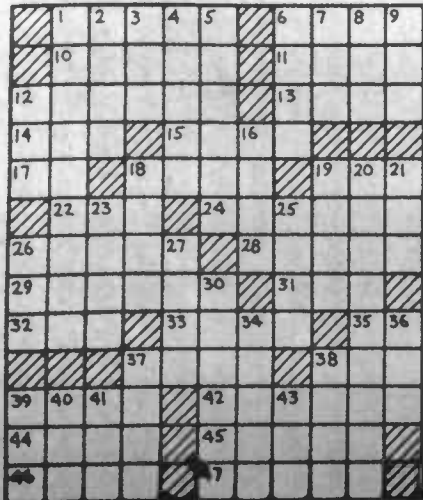

THE LESSON OF BRITAIN

The international financial shock waves caused by the devaluation of the British pound are continuing to be felt around the world. The socialist government of Great Britain, by its irresponsible management of the affairs of the British people, has struck a severe blow at all the capitalist nations.

This is the second time that a Labor government in Britain has devalued the pound. "The Daily Telegraph" in London rightly has described devaluation as an act "that involves the abandonment of those who have entrusted this country with the keeping of their money." Work and sacrifice mean nothing if a government destroys the value of a nation's money. By a single financial maneuver, the socialists in power in Britain have wiped out 14.3% of the worth of all securities and savings held by the British.

This devaluation has been long in coming. It is the fruit of the mindless welfare state that doesn't understand anything about the management of money or how wealth is created. In his blustering speech about the devaluation, Prime Minister Harold Wilson of Britain talked about the evil of "self-seeking" people. Yet "self-seeking" is just what Britain needs and what the socialists won't permit. The profit system is self seeking, and it is what leads to wealth for a nation.

Mr. Wilson, like socialists in America, is bent on taking away the personal incentives that lead to the creation of wealth for an entire country. Indeed the socialist government is riddled with hatred for free enterprise. Only days before devaluation was sprung on the British people, Miss Barbara Castle, the Minister of Transport, proposed heavy new taxes on the privately-owned trucking industry. The revenue from these taxes is to go to help support the state-owned railways that continually lose money. This in a nutshell, is why Britain is in trouble.

In reviewing the tragic situation in which Britons find themselves under Wilsonian socialism, Americans should not imagine that Britain is the only free-world nation in financial trouble. Britain is simply an especially horrid example of the evils of socialism. The United States, unfortunately, is not too far behind.

The Johnson Great Society engages in the same general type of activity that has caused Britain to devalue the pound sterling. Incentives to investment have been reduced as a result of ever-mounting federal taxation of personal and corporate income. Big Labor has been encouraged by the political powers-that-be in Washington to ride high in the saddle. The emphasis on handouts instead of self-reliance is as characteristic of Washington as it is of London.

Like Prime Minister Wilson, President Lyndon B. Johnson has declined to tell the American people the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth concerning the nation's financial condition. More and more

ernment that conceals this truth from the people is committing a breach of trust.

The U. S. is like Britain in that it always is borrowing instead of following the pay-as-you-go principle enunciated by the late Sen. Harry F. Byrd, America's great modern fiscal statesman. Borrowing, however, doesn't solve any nation's problems—Britain or the USA; it simply delays a little bit the dreadful day of reckoning. When the time comes that a country can't borrow any more, or when borrowing can be accomplished only on disadvantageous terms, the result is a drop in the standard of living.

It will be meaningless if Americans simply express shock at Mr. Wilson's devaluation of the pound and fail to draw a les-

son from the British tragedy—the lesson that the same medicine must be applied to America as Britain needs.

For both countries, the essential requirement is a cutback in all public spending in non-productive areas such as welfare. The emphasis of both governments must be on the fostering of production and sales, not on giveaways to politically demanding minorities, including organized reliefers.

The heads of governments who get their people deep into debt are betraying the people. They are allowing their nations to decline. One day the fall will come, if the spending is not arrested.

This is the truth that needs telling as the British mess gets attention in the press.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER

Q: Dr. Garrett, why is a student often too tired to study but has plenty of energy for some other activity, like a game of tennis, say?

A: This is because fatigue is not a matter of becoming exhausted, like air escaping from a tire. Fatigue is most often psychological; we are not tired of a specific task. In laboratory tests I have found that a boy who can no longer lift a weight, one who is apparently "exhausted", can lift a lighter weight easily. He is fatigued toward a task, not generally.

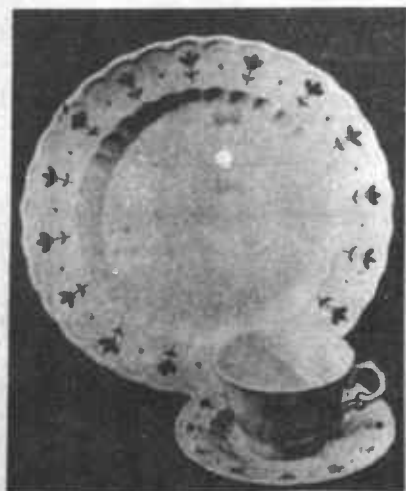

Farmers of Tishomingo county are reminded that applications for the transfer of cotton allotments for the 1968 crop must be filed no later than January 2, 1968.

The notices of 1968 Cotton Allotments and Yields have been mailed to county farmers. All cotton farmers are now ready to make their production plans for this season.

Cotton farmers should remember that they voted, in a Special Referendum, in May, of 1967, not to approve the transfer of cotton acreage outside of Tishomingo County.

The transfer of allotments from one farm to another within the county, by Sale or Lease, can be done. However, it will be necessary for both farmers involved in the transfer to get this transfer signed in the ASCS Office before the January deadline.

There are a number of Tishomingo County farmers who have allotments of 10.1 to possibly 14.0 acres that want to lease back to 10.0 acres in order to be eligible for the Small Farm Payment.

If you fall in this range, be sure you see about this before the deadline date.

Remember, a farmer cannot transfer cotton acreage from one farm to another if he has an interest in both farms.

Again, remember the January 2nd deadline. It applies to all transfers of 1968 cotton allotments for Tishomingo County farms whether by sale or lease.

Ballots to vote on marketing quotas have been mailed to all cotton growers in Tishomingo County. You have instructions with this ballot telling you how to prepare your ballot and mail it back to the ASCS Office. If you have not mailed in this ballot, do so immediately. If this ballot is received in the ASCS Office by December 8, 1967, it will not be counted.

If farmers vote No on this ballot, they are saying they do not want any Price Support guarantee, or no cotton payments. If you vote Yes, farmers will be guaranteed Price Support and Cotton Payments.
