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GOLDWATER ON WALLACE

It is pretty well known, I take it, that Barry Goldwater is no mental giant. That's all right; few of us are.

But it is another thing to flout one's ignorance; that is unforgivable.

And that is precisely what the erstwhile Republican nominee did in a recent newspaper column. I say he did it in ignorance; ignorance is the kindly word.

His piece, ostensibly, dealt with George Wallace but, in actuality, it was an appeal to vote Republican — good, bad, or indifferent — vote Republican.

"Wallace cannot by any stretch of the facts I've been able to put together," Goldwater wrote, "draw enough votes to throw the election into the House of Representatives." What votes Wallace will get would otherwise go to the Republicans, therefore, Goldwater's reasoning ran, all a Wallace candidacy can accomplish is the denial of the election to the Republicans and the re-election of Lyndon Johnson.

That argument is so fallacious as to be ludicrous.

Here, let me do what Goldwater failed to do, incorporate facts, "stretched" or otherwise. Let me, by example, demonstrate the shallowness of his thesis.

Just 20 years ago, in 1948, Strom Thurmond and another Wallace (Henry, The Red), ran as Third and Fourth party candidates. In that election, a switch from Truman to Dewey of 17,865 popular votes (of 3,808,403) cast in California, and a switch of 7,107 popular votes (of 2,898,475) cast in Ohio, would have denied the Electoral-College majority to Harry Truman, and the election would have gone in to the House.

That is, less than a quarter of one per cent of the vote in Ohio, and one half of one per cent in California would have done it in 1948. The razor thinness of the vote in those two States alone spelled the difference.

A person wonders if, "by any stretch of the facts," Barry Goldwater doubts that more people, today, are prepared to vote for George Wallace than voted for Thurmond. Or, "by any stretch of the facts," that more people, today, are prepared to vote for Senator Eugene McCarthy — or

some other person of the New Left, Bobby Kennedy, say — than voted for the red-led Henry A. Wallace.

If so, let me give him another fact: Strom Thurmond got but two per cent of the popular vote. At that, he garnered 39 Electoral-College votes. Henry Wallace polled about the same percentage of the vote but received no Electoral-College votes.

Now, then: Last May, the Gallup poll credited George Wallace with about 15 per cent of the popular vote, nationwide. Gallup said, in a three-horse race, Wallace would sweep the South. The South, it should be remembered, carries about 110 of the 270 Electoral-College votes needed to elect. And while I have seen no reading on the popularity of the New Left, I would hazard it is quite strong, what with anti-Vietnam feeling rampant and rising.

So, under the circumstances, how can Wallace — seven times stronger than Thurmond in 1948 — do other than throw the election into the House. "By any stretch of the facts", that is the minimum probability and to deny it reflects political ignorance.

Moreover, the Republican party, it should come to understand, is no longer the "other" party in a two-party system. It is but a diminishing Third, after the Democrats, and after the Independents. Gallup, again, is my authority. He says, 42 per cent of the voters think of themselves as Democrats; 31 per cent as Independents; and but 27 per cent as Republican. That set of figures, it seems to me, should devalue Republican ego by, let us say, 14.3 per cent.

Barry Goldwater won the admiration and support of millions of Americans, not as a Republican, but as a man of principle. Yet, here he is, through ignorance or otherwise, selling "Republicanism" — good, bad, or indifferent.

I would suggest there are many of his admirers who would think better of him if he got away from that sort of politician-itis, stopped seeking to dissuade people from supporting a candidate whose stand offers a choice, not an echo.

THE QUALITY OF AMERICA

When the "Census Clock" reached a count of 200 million in recent days, Americans understandably took pride in the growth, size and wealth of their nation. In population and territory, the United States exceeds the wildest dreams of any of its Founding Fathers.

But there is a danger in a people thinking about their country simply in quantitative terms. It is marvelous, of course that this once almost empty continent has become the home for so many people. Nowhere else on earth are there so many material rewards and so many opportunities for personal development.

Nevertheless, Americans have to be concerned about the qualitative aspects of the republic in the final third of the 20th century. They owe a duty to their forebears and to their descendants to ask about the quality of patriotism and the strength of constitutional government in this land. The American heritage—the heritage of individual this land. The American heritage is not simply one of living space and material wealth. It is a spiritual heritage—the heritage of individual freedom. And to many thoughtful citizens there seems reason to be troubled about the state of this heritage in our times.

Certainly, patriotism is alive; it is vividly alive in the young Americans who fight so bravely in Vietnam, even when the political leadership at home is grossly inadequate in spelling out the reasons for the conflict. But some of our institutions and part of our way of life are in difficulty these days.

The Founding Fathers created this republic as a bulwark against all forms of tyranny. In their time, they saw the tyrant at work through the agency of the British Crown. But threats to liberty also have their contemporary manifestations.

Today, for example, we have the evil of Big Government—a mammoth bureaucracy that inhibits the individual's exercise of personal freedom and eats his substance through oppressive taxation designed to reward one segment of the population by robbing another.

The Founding Fathers could not have envisioned the emergence of Big Unionism—a virtual state within a state that often operates as though it were not answerable to the law or to the legitimate demands of the public. Today, American freedom is restricted by the bold maneuvers of Big Unionism, which—like some robber barons of old—attempts to stop transportation of people and goods.

Americans have not thought deeply enough about how their rights have been eroded in the last 30-odd years by the government that is supposed to protect them.

In the early days of this country, the right to work was unimpairable. A man could take any job for which he was qualified. He did not have to seek the permission of any organization or group. Today we find a vastly different situation. In less than half the states is the right to work guaranteed by law. In the other states, a citizen is not wholly free to get a job. The

union power structure in effect "owns" the jobs in many industries and lines of business. An employer is not free to select his employees; he must adhere to conditions laid down by the union bosses. This situation is one of the biggest threats to freedom in America today.

The United States also has within its midst a small minority that seeks to promote a new kind of revolution that has nothing

to do with the conservative American Revolution of 1776. This minority is bent on shattering the social order of the United States by campaigns of lawlessness, by riots in the cities, by sit-ins on the campuses, and by bully-boy tactics of intimidation against officials of the law and the government.

As Americans take pride in their nation on reaching a population of 200 million, they must remember that the worth of a country's heritage always has to be proved by the actions of the living. This nation cannot live off the brave deeds of men in earlier times. Citizens of today have to stand up and be counted against the forces of bureaucracy, labor totalitarianism and anarchism that would wreck the experiment in freedom by action from within the republic. If citizens of today uphold the qualitative aspects of the national life they need have no fear about the material success or security of the country.

How About a Television Diet?
There can't be many adult Americans who haven't heard of the TV dinner, that combination platter you can hold in your lap as you sit slumped in an easy chair watching the screen.

But television "diet" — What can that mean?

Well, the phrase appears to be new, and the idea behind it hasn't become exactly a craze in American life. Still, I cherish hopes that both will eventually become part of our way of life. We'll all be better for it.

A television diet is a well-balanced schedule of intellectual fare. Instead of taking pot luck with what's offered by the networks, or sticking with one type of program, you make out a schedule of areas to which you ought to be exposed. And you make a point of exposing yourself to them on a regular basis throughout the week.

It's what you might call a menu with sufficient appetizers and entrees to keep the mind in good working order.

Such a weekly diet might look something like this, allowing for just one program an evening. Monday — classical theater. Tuesday — political documentary. Wednesday — light comedy. Thursday — whodunit. Friday — sports. Saturday — travel. Sunday — symphonic music.

If you're a TV bug, you'll obviously watch a lot more every evening. However, the point is that you can put some cultural stiffening into your viewing — broaden your horizons and cultivate new interests — by making sure that you have some of this variety.

It may take discipline, just as an ordinary diet does. The beneficial results may not be observable at once. In time, though, you'll realize that you're interested in things you never considered before you tuned in more widely, perhaps modern art or the physics of the atomic nucleus.

Besides, you'll be more in tune with what's going on in the world if you occasionally switch from that old movie to a discussion of the international situation. You'll find your friends paying more attention

when you venture about the Commons. Chinese Communism. A television diet to be a good screen. How about it?

What to Expect of your School

Our previous article ended by stating that it would be continued. We were considering some misconceptions that people have when it comes to evaluating the schools. We want to point out several more and then deal with some specific things to look for in your schools.

"If my child's school is accredited, it is an excellent school." We should be vitally interested in having an accredited school, but that does not always mean that it is an excellent school. In the first place, we need to understand the purpose of accrediting groups in giving school ratings. This is not done in order to compare one school with others. The ratings are intended to show whether schools measure up to certain minimum standards and to encourage schools to evaluate themselves. A school could live up to a minimum accreditation standards and still fall short of excellence.

Often a parent relies upon what he hears from a child for his information about the school. Sometimes a child might make a statement that will shake your faith in his teachers or the school. This is often a personal criticism of an individual teacher. It could be some statement concerning teaching techniques with which you are unfamiliar. The best course of action is to ignore an isolated gripe about a particular teacher and thus avoid making a big production of a situation that means very little. If his complaints continue, then you ought to discuss the matter with the teacher and the principal. But, this should be done as one seeking information rather than that of an airer of hostile feelings. We will find the facts behind a complaint by approaching the situation with an open mind.

Some parents become indignant when the child reports that a movie was shown in class or the period was spent in talking. They don't stop to find out that the movie was an educational film related to a topic or unit that the class has been studying. They don't know that the "talking all afternoon" was an hour-long discussion in democracy, history, citizenship, good

health practices, or some other related subject.

Oftentimes, we hear the following statement, "I believe it because I heard it on very good authority." Talk about the schools never stops. "The 8th grade made a trip to the state capitol and hear they went wild. I think trips like that are a waste of money anyway." "Is it true . . . ?" "I think it is awful that . . ."

Some of the talk may be true but most of it is distorted because it is third or fourth-hand instead of first hand information. Some of it is overdramatized in order to make a good story. Yet many people believe it, verbatim. Upon hearing talk of this sort, you should ask the question, "Who told you that?" "Have you asked the school what happened?"

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

"May we assume that you are free of this misconceptions that we have been discussing. Yet, you wonder whether the school is doing all it should be doing for your child. Is he reading as well as he should? Is the school helping him to become a useful and responsible citizen? Is he developing a sense of good values and the proper attitudes? What type of preparation does my child need in this highly technical age?"

Maybe your desire to appraise the schools was created because of the failing marks of your child or his lack of interest in school or even his antagonism toward it. Any one of these could indicate serious lack in school staff, curriculum, equipment, or general atmosphere. But, it could indicate something about your child. Perhaps he has poor vision or hearing, or low physical energy. There could be an emotional block or it could be just a phase in his development. If any of these conditions exists, both you and the school should be aware of it. The school will notify you if at any time a condition like this is discovered. On the other hand, if you know it and the school doesn't, then you have failed to do your part in main-

taining 2-way communication.

Your child's failure or his negative attitude may also relate to the home situation. Is he being pressured excessively to get good marks when, perhaps, his abilities may not be academic but musical, mechanical, artistic, athletic, or social? A visit to your child's classroom is the best way to examine and appraise him and also the school. By making advanced arrangements with his teachers, I would suggest staying through a whole period rather than a short session. These are the things you should look for during your visit and they have been suggested by the National Educational Association in their pamphlet entitled, "How Good Is Your Child's School?" I am using it here because it is the simplest and most concise listing that I have found in literature dealing with education.

1. Are the pupils active and involved? Quiet, orderly classroom may be pleasant and relaxing for visitors, but it is not necessarily a place where maximum learning is taking place. A room in which youngsters are moving about, working together on projects, questioning the teachers, showing signs of interest and enthusiasm may be a setting for many constructive kinds of student growth.

2. Do the teachers do most of the talking while the children listen, or do they stimulate them to do much of the talking and the thinking?

3. Do the pupils seem to like their teachers and feel relaxed with them or do they stimulate them to do much of the talking with them or do they appear withdrawn, afraid to give wrong answers?

4. Is the entire class working on the same assignment or are some of the class working in groups or independently? Grouping is one method by which teachers give specialized attention to students' varying needs.

5. Do the teachers have access to and use some of the new technological tools now available to educators? Overhead projectors, audio and video tape recorders, films and television are now being used to bring the whole world into the classroom, to help the student check up on his learning, and to give the teacher's time in which they can work with individual students.

6. Do the teachers encourage individual thinking or do they

demand the exact answer they have in mind? Students who lack the ability to remember and feed back facts, a limited and often overrated skill, may have original approaches to problems that should be encouraged, not squelched.

7. Do the teachers respect and nurture many kinds of skills? Youngsters who are not quick to hold up their hands when fact questions are asked may excel in creative writing, art

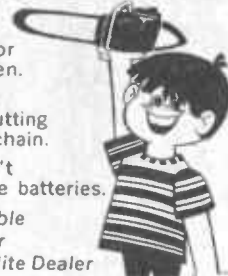

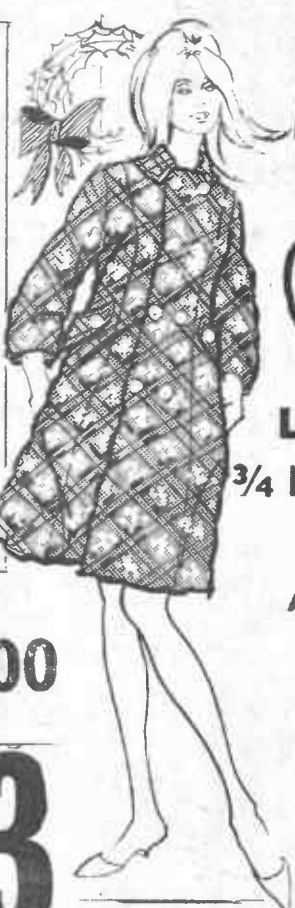

County Supervisor, M. Hays Woods, of the Farmers Home Administration, announces that Tishomingo County has been designated for emergency credit in 1968.

This makes emergency credit available to farmers who suffered damage to crops as a result of adverse weather conditions in 1967 and who need such credit to resume normal farming operations.

Farmers Home Administration may advance funds for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, insecticides, farm supplies, repair of equipment, and other essential farm operating expenses. Funds may be advanced for payment of not more than one year's interest that is due or about to become due on debts secured by liens of other creditors on livestock, farm equipment and farm real estate. Funds may also be advanced for payment of depre-

ciation for one year not to exceed 15 percent of the market value on essential farm equipment under prior lien to other creditors, or 15 percent of the amount owed to such creditors, whichever is less. The interest rate is 3 percent.

The repayment schedule depends upon the purposes for which funds were advanced and the applicant's estimated income. Loans to produce crops are to be repaid when the crops will normally be sold.

Loans are secured by a first lien on crops financed, by the best obtainable lien on livestock and equipment, and by real estate liens when necessary for adequate security.

Applications may be made at the County FHA Office located next door to the Post Office in Iuka.

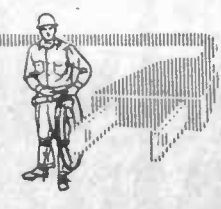

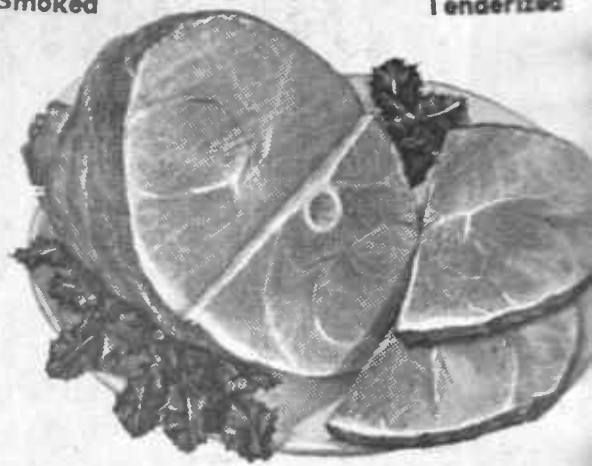
