rush of taxpayers trying to meet
the February 1 deadline.

Fireworks Law Enforcement Is Stressed

Tishomingo County Sheriff
James H. Bishop states that the
Mississippi Fireworks law will
be strictly enforced in Tishom-
ingo county.

Sheriff Bishop says that only
those fireworks bearing the
wording "I.C.C. Class C" may
be legally sold in the state. He
further stated that possession of
"cherry bombs", "silver salu-
tes", "aerial bombs" not la-
beled "I.C.C. Class C" is a vio-
lation of the law.

Violators of the Fireworks
Law are guilty of a felony pun-
ishable by a maximum fine of
\$1,000 and or imprisonment for
up to one year.

He further stated that anyone
selling illegal fireworks is held
responsible for all injuries and
property damage by the use of
the illegal fireworks.

Parents are urged to be cau-
tious with fireworks purchased
for and used by their children
to avoid possible permanent in-
juries.

PEOPLE WARNED SHOOTING OF FIREWORKS WITHIN CITY LIMITS

A warning is issued by the
Mayor of the City of Iuka ag-
ainst the shooting of fireworks
within the city limits.

"An ordinance of our City
states that shooting of fire-

crackers or other such devices
on the streets is prohibited,"
Mayor George Cutshall states.

"Also," he says, "throwing
of fireworks from moving cars,
trucks or other vehicles within
the city is against the law."

The mayor states that anyone
violating this ordinance will be
charged with a misdemeanor and
shall be fined accordingly.

"If you must shoot fire-
crackers," he said, "shoot them
at your home or get out in an
open field where you won't hurt
anyone."

THE XMAS SPIRIT:
PUBLISHER PRAISED

Never before in all the days of my life have I felt the urge to write a piece in praise of a newspaper publisher. Publishers and writers, you should know, are natural enemies.

But the urge is on me, now, now that Christmas is here. So, if he will forgive me, I would like to write of Bill Loeb.

Give me Bill Loeb and a cockle shell and I will sail the broad Atlantic; me, Chicken Little.

Give me Bill Loeb to talk to and you can have Demosthenes, rocks and all.

Give me Bill Loeb in a rage and I wouldn't swap the sight for two-on-the-aisle at Minsky's.

Give me Bill Loeb in a charitable mood, and you can have Daddy Warbucks.

Give me Bill Loeb on the arm of his wife and I will give you a prideful man.

Give me Bill Loeb as an advocate and you can have Daniel Webster.

Give me Bill Loeb on patriotism and I will show you a reborn Patrick Henry.

Who is Bill Loeb?

Every imp in the nether place knows Bill Loeb; Bill Loeb publishes the Manchester (N.H.) Union Leader. "There Is Nothing So Powerful As Truth" — and if ever a newspaper was the product of its owner, it is this one. It isn't likely there ever was a question put but that the Union Leader had an unequivocal opinion as to its virtue or villainy. That's Bill Loeb, square on all four corners.

And he's something to see. Bill Loeb looks like nothing so much as a Junker in mufti, as virile as a bull and, in public, as stiff as a horn. His hair must be cut by that nameless tonsorial artist who says howdy to Marine Corps recruits. His eye is a gimlet, and his nose a Romanesque beak. It all surmounts a bow tie (circa 1940).

There he will sit, at one banquet or another, as though in a corset, with absolutely no talent for small talk, polite enough, to be sure, but don't ask Bill Loeb how's the weather. Do so and he will bore at you as though you were a lazar.

"I hadn't thought about it".

But speak to him of anything with meaning and you will get your answer in a ready stream of logic, as straight and as simple as

a ruler, calm as the doldrums. Then ask of something near his heart, of someone whom he thinks has been wronged. Then watch that gimlet catch fire. Bill Loeb has a contempt that approaches hatred — one deeper than any I have ever seen in a man — for one who would work an injustice on another. And since he can't bear to be found out as the softy he is, in answer he won't speak of the wronged person, or only in passing. Rather, he will hammer the daylight out of the one who committed the sin. If you would hear invective, hear Bill Loeb.

I may be wrong but I believe, until Bill Loeb got hoist on the petard of injustice, himself, his employees on the Union Leader, job for job, were the highest paid staffers in America. Certainly among the highest. They rooked Bill Loeb, is what his enemies did — it was a matter of vengeance — and with that rooking went the fabulous year-end bonuses it was his delight to give his people.

That was in my mind — the man's generosity — when I thought to pen this piece. And I know it must be in his mind, too, at this time of year, hurting his heart.

But the rooking Bill Loeb took, like the man he is, was taken in silence. Not many know the whole of that story — but it is another story, with no place here.

This might be said: The Christmas bonuses will come again, if Bill Loeb lives. And it is more likely an oak will fall than he.

Bill Loeb has a conceit. He thinks he knows all there is to know about automobiles.

Well, it is a small conceit; we all have them — I know all about women.

What is no conceit is my knowledge of Bill Loeb; I know this man. And knowing him, writing of him from a thousand miles, warms my Christmas. I have never known another like him — I doubt I will.

PROTECTING THE DOLLAR

In arguing for a tax increase, the Johnson administration in recent weeks has taken the position that it's needed as a signal to the world that the United States will fight inflation and will not go the way of Great Britain, which has devalued its money.

Certainly the U. S. should be signaling to other responsible countries that the dollar will be maintained at its present level. More importantly, people at home need to be reassured on this point. The U. S. government has a solemn duty to uphold the worth of the currency and not to destroy the value of savings and other financial holdings.

But what is the best way to signal this intention to people at home and abroad? Is a tax increase the best way? Thoughtful citizens may properly deny that a tax increase, without corresponding cuts in public spending, is an adequate signal.

The dollar is threatened for one reason, namely, because the U. S. government for a long period of years has been lending or giving away more money than it earns in revenue. It has been pumping money into wasteful projects overseas and at home. It has been estimated, for example, that over \$100 billion has been spent on foreign aid since the end of World War II. The Johnson administration, while allegedly concerned about the balance of payments, is continuing to support this kind of aid on a tremendous scale. India, for instance, is virtually fed by the United States, which sends vast quantities of wheat to that country.

Yet this spending on free food to India has not done anything fundamental to help the Indians save themselves. The Indians, caught up in a tragic mess of curious religion and equally curious economics, have wasted what has been loaned or given by the United States. India's problems become more acute every month.

At the same time, the leaders of the Great Society are insisting that the War on Poverty must be escalated and that a vast financial appeasement operation must be conducted for those who are in a mood to riot in the nation's cities. Influential liberals call for a domestic Marshall Plan that will involve the spending of more billions for rebuilding of urban "ghetto" areas at government expense.

These expenditures, domestic and foreign, are undermining the value of the American dollar. The reason is that they are non-productive expenditures. Unlike money spent on building a new plant in the United States, the federal projects don't lead to any financial return for the American people. They constitute a form of blackmail of this nation, whereby money is spent simply to keep the restless from committing havoc.

The United States cannot af-

ford to pay this kind of tribute forever. Rich as this nation is in material and human resources, its economy is not a bottomless well. Our society cannot get around basic economic laws. In our lifetime, we have seen the U. S. dollar devalued through unwise federal spending from 100 cents on the dollar to less than 50 cents. The grim prospect is that a more direct and speedy form of devaluation may be required unless immediate action is taken to bring spending in line with the nation's income.

The burden of defense is an immense one. Yet the Congress cannot get rid of this burden at a time when the enemies of freedom and the capitalist system are warring against the U. S. Thus the United States has fixed expenditures in the defense area that are inescapable. Reduction in public costs, designed to bolster domestic and foreign confidence in the dollar, has to come out of the innumerable non-essential spending items that have been added to the budget during the Kennedy and Johnson administrations.

We have seen the result of continuous spending of more than is received — as has been the case in the United States for 32 of the last 38 years — in two formerly great nations of the world in recent years. One of these nations, France, accepted a dictatorship. The other, Great Britain, accepted second, or third-rate ranking among nations, with still a very uncertain future.

If you've ever been gypped in a business transaction, here's a good point to remember. Reputable American businessmen are as angry as you are about this kind of thing.

In fact, they've banded together to form an organization dedicated to the maintenance of ethical standards in buying and selling. It's called the Better Business Bureau, and it's worth knowing about if only because you may need the services it provides.

What can happen to you? Well, let's look at the criminal record.

Exhibit A. A woman in Topeka opened her door to a caller who offered to paint her house (a \$400 dollar job) for \$50. He quickly bowed himself out of the house, and disappeared, when she said she'd have to talk it over with her husband. Turned out the contract was full of fine print adding up to hidden charges of over \$500.

Exhibit B. A man in La Jolla sank \$750 into automatic vending machines. The promotion literature said he'd be able to run a tidy little business on the

side. Actually, he broke down, leaving with a pile of machines, needles to hang around him, service them.

Exhibit C. A man more listened to a insurance salesman, they checked with learned that representatives a
