BENEDICT ARNOLD
FOUNDATION AWARD

Now comes word, via The Manchester (N.H.) Union Leader, of something called The Benedict Arnold Foundation.

The foundation, so the story goes, is the creation of a Mr. Hezekiah Applethwaite (that's got to be a cognomen) of West Musquash, Maine (that, too).

In any event, John Gardiner, writing in the Union Leader, says Mr. Applethwaite proposes, through The Benedict Arnold Foundation, to present the foundation's highest award, The Grand Double Cross O.B.A., "to that American who, in the opinion of the trustees, had done his own country the most damage during any calendar year."

Well, sir. If John Gardiner's story is not a put-on — even if it is — Mr. Hezekiah Applethwaite may accept this as notice of application for membership in his laudable organization. I have candidates for the GDC-OBA 'til hell won't have it.

It may be, however, my application is premature. It seems the foundation is still in flux, Mr. Applethwaite having gotten himself bogged down by secondary interests. As I get it, Mr. Applethwaite had thought to cast one of the minor awards — The Stinker of the Month — in the image of a skunk-at-the-ready but along came a lady who objected to that concept as demeaning to the skunk. So, temporarily at least, Mr. Applethwaite has switched his thinking to "a very dead haddock."

And I object to that. "A very dead haddock," indubitably, would be an award the angels on high would learn about but, somehow, "haddock" doesn't carry the wham of "skunk".

Mr. Applethwaite realizes that, I take it, since consideration is being given to the mackerel as a replacement for the tentative haddock, and that's better. A mackerel "shines and stinks", you know.

But Mr. Applethwaite should get on with the big deal, that's all minor stuff, it's that Grand Double Cross, Order Benedict Arnold that holds my interest. And its design, so far as I can gather, hasn't even been considered.

And that is where I may be of some assistance.

I would suggest the award be cast as a bust — what else? I would give it Lyndon's beady eyes, for sure; and Bobby's mop for hair. I would give it the smirk of Fulbright, and Humphrey's reverberating jaw. And I would give it the dirt-encrusted nose and the mud-spattered ears of Drew Pearson.

That would be one side of it. On the backside of this janus-like monster, I would repeat the process. But, instead of eye sockets, I would gouge one big hole and call that the incredibility gap. For hair, our shredded constitution. Opposite Humphrey's jaw, I would have another, with Samson's thumbprint inscribed thereon. Then, tear off the top of the Ford Foundation and send it along with your suggestion to Mr. Applethwaite of West Musquash, Maine. Tell him who you think should be the initial recipient of The Grand Double Cross, Order of Benedict Arnold.

Go ahead. So far as I know, Virginia, there is a Mr. Applethwaite and a West Musquash, too. Whether so or not, there is no doubt about the merit of the idea.
