23 True Bills Returned By County Grand Jury

Northeast Jr. College Tourney Friday & Sat.

The Northeast Jr. College Annual Holiday Tournament will be held Friday and Saturday nights, January 5 & 6.

Losers will play the consolation game Saturday night at 7:00 and winners are matched for championship at 8:30.

Larry Durham of Tishomingo will be one of the starting guards. Other starters are Gaylon Baird, Robbie Bogue, James Harmon, and Bruce Rich.

The greatest number of indictments in many years was returned this week by the Tishomingo County Grand Jury, meeting in session Monday and Tuesday. After examining 11 witnesses, the Jury returned into open court 23 true bills.

Court opened Tuesday morning with Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr., presiding. Among first business of the court was the swearing in of some of the elected officials for the county and the districts.

Court recessed Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. to reconvene Friday morning at 9 o'clock at which

time those accused in the indictments handed down by the Grand Jury will be arraigned.

Billy Dean served as foreman of the Grand Jury. Other members included W. E. Wilson, W. A. Bonds, E. C. Bullard, S. A. Taylor, L. B. Hill, Chester Johnson, Earl Alred, John Spoon, Bobby Kennedy, C. R. Curtis, Johnny Ramey, W. C. Dickinson, A. T. Grimes, Lester Belue, L. E. Hathcock, and Vester Howie.

The Grand Jury report for the January term, 1968, Circuit Court follows:

"Now comes your grand jury for the January, 1968, term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session two days, have examined 11 witnesses, and have returned into open court 23 true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all factories of the county, the tax collector's books, and the county auditor's books, and the hotel.

"We find the county home to be in need of a general clean up. Several of the doors do not have doorknobs on them, making it impossible to escape from this building in case of an emergency.

"We find that repairs are needed in the men's and ladies' restrooms, and that the door on the north end of the building should be repaired at the county home.

"We find that the county jail is in such a poor state of repair that it seems improbable it could be renovated without the expenditure of a great amount of money. It is recommended that consideration be given to the construction of both a new courthouse and a new jail for Tishomingo County, Mississippi.

"We also find that the county courthouse is in such a state of disrepair that any further expenditures on this building would be impractical and it is recommended by the grand jury that the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County take the necessary measures to begin construction on a new courthouse for the county.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law, and properly marked.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well kept and in balance.

"AND, now, having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged."

Dignitaries Will Be In Iuka Friday

Hiram A. Jones, local USDA Soil Conservationist, announces that the Honorable Jamie L. Whitten, congressman, the Honorable Donald A. Williams, Administrator of the Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C., W. L. Heard, State Conservationist, USDA, of Jackson; and L. A. Wilkins, Area Conservationist of Tupelo, will be present in Iuka Friday, January 5, for a special meeting with the District Conservationists of the Soil Conservation District.

Included in the meeting will be visitors from Corinth, W. C. Hamilton of the Yellow Creek Water Shed Authority, Iuka, and a number of other guests. The meeting will be held at the Iuka Methodist Church, beginning at 2 o'clock.

Purpose of the gathering is a part of a 3-county tour of Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo on Friday. Discussion will be held concerning plans for a possible project for the 19-counties included in the Resource, Conservation Development program.

Mr. Williams, acting on au-

thority from Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, has recently announced the approval of applications which provide for the addition of Marshall and Benton counties to the area originally covered by the Northeast Mississippi Resource Conservation and Development project. The addition of these two counties, which brings the total to 21 counties involved, was approved by the sponsors and co-sponsors - the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District, and the Soil Conservation District Commissioners, respectively - and had the approval of the State Conservationist, SCS, and Governor Paul B. Johnson.

The Department of Agriculture, in agreement with the applicants and sponsors that the problems, objectives, and proposal for inclusion of Marshall and Benton Counties were compatible with those of the already existing project area, declared the additional area eligible to receive planning assistance under the program, and authorized agencies of the Department to provide all possible assistance to the sponsors of the Northeast Mississippi RC&D Project in planning and carrying out work

Special Election Called To Name Mayor Of Iuka

A special election will be held on Monday, February 5, 1968, for the purpose of naming a mayor of Iuka to fill the unexpired term of George William Cutshall. Mr. Cutshall resigned the office on Thursday night, December 28, at a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen. As will be remembered, Mr. Cutshall was elected County Sheriff during the 1967 elections.

Named to serve as mayor until one can be elected was Charles Daugherty who was one of the alderman serving as vice-mayor. Other aldermen are P. O. Beard, F. Curtis, R. K. "Diddler" Thorne and Johnny Biggs.

WHY SUPPORT THE
UNPOPULAR SIDE?

There is before me a rather churlish letter: "What's eating you", my correspondent wants to know, "why don't you get off this race thing?"

I have an answer. I persist because I look upon racial integration — miscegenation — as the only mistake we cannot undo. I take it to be the most serious issue of our time, incalculably greater than all the rest. Therefore, I persist.

I maintain the unpopular side because I have gone to some pains to learn what the evidence discloses; I have read what very wise men have written. Among the wisest of these writers is Dr. Wesley C. George, professor emeritus of histology and embryology, formerly head of the department of anatomy, University of North Carolina School of Medicine.

Here are excerpts from this wise man's writings. I offer them for your consideration and for the consideration of my correspondent:

The people of the entire country might well concern themselves with the race problem in a most serious and thoughtful way. It requires our best thought and a careful consideration of all pertinent facts. It will not be solved by good-intentioned but ill-informed people giving what they consider to be idealistic, inspired advice and exerting pressures to bring about ill-advised revolution.

On a television religious program I heard a minister report that the National Council of Churches has recently said that love is the ultimate solution of the race problem. Any one worthy of being the shepherd of a flock should know that unrestrained and unguided love has led many people to tragedy. By all means, love should be involved in considering human affairs including race relations; but love is not necessarily wisdom and it does not eliminate the necessity for making judgment based on fact and reason.

The United States Supreme Court's ruling on the school integration cases is potentially one of the most fateful decisions ever made by a court. It could largely determine the nature of the

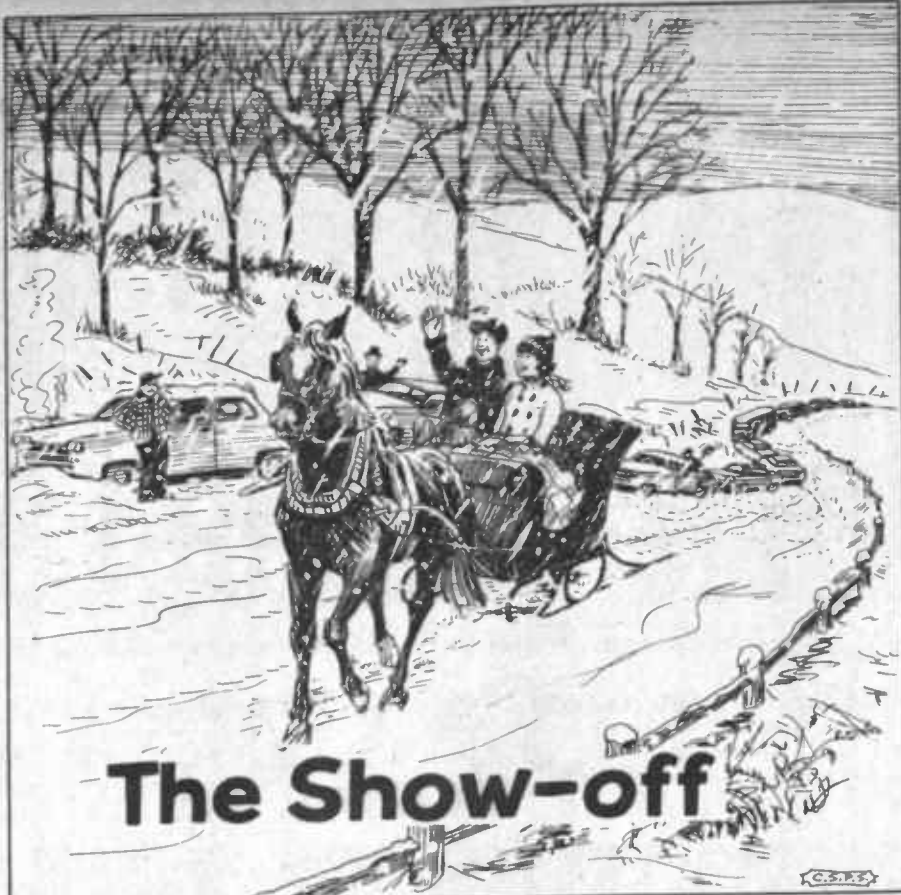
flesh, bone, blood and mind of future generations of Americans. Support for that decision and adherence to or rejection of the programs that it imposes should be based upon the most complete and reliable knowledge and understanding that it is possible to obtain. There is no record that the Court or the Federal government has at any time sought to get that knowledge and understanding . . .

When the Justices of the Supreme Court abandoned former legal precedents and the historic meaning of the Constitution, and based their decision . . . upon "science" and the opinions of "authorities", they inevitably made the validity of their ruling dependent upon the truth and validity of their scientific material. This should have been subjected to critical examination and was not. In addition there was a great deal of established fact and pertinent evidence bearing on the issue which the court neglected entirely.

Our special concern in seeking an answer to the question confronting us should be with truth and genuine goodness, with creativeness and the capacity to develop and maintain a high culture and the virtues and benefits of what we call civilization. Transformation of that concern into wise action requires knowledge and thoughtful rather than emotional judgment. Insofar as the races are involved in that problem, we have no better guide to wise decisions than knowledge of the natures of the two races and their record of behavior and achievement. To ignore those natures and those records is to court tragedy.

That is what is "eating" me, why I don't "get off" the race question. The truth, the wisdom of Dr. George's words rings in my ears. There it is: To ignore, as we are ignoring, those natures and to ignore, as we are ignoring, those records is to court tragedy. And I don't want tragedy for this nation. It has been a long time building.

TIME FOR AUSTERITY

As the year begins, Americans watch with dismay as raids are made on the nation's gold supply by gold speculators in Europe, including the French Republic which was once a staunch friend of the United States. Attempts are being made to undermine the value of the dollar and, thereby, to jeopardize the entire U. S. economy.

This is a grave danger which requires across-the-board effort by the federal government. On the foreign front, the nation needs to stop the flow of gold to France. U. S. Sen. Vance Hartke (D-Ind) has proposed a legislative ban on further shipments of gold to the French until they resume payments on their World War I debt to the United States. This debt exceeds \$6 billion. It is high time that the Johnson administration publicly remind the French that they owe this sum to the American people. Of course, it is only a part of the much vaster sum that the United States has devoted to the protection or assistance of France in this century.

Halting the gold flow by law is only one part of the remedial effort that must be undertaken promptly to protect the dollar. Action at home also is needed. What sort of action is required has been succinctly stated by Prof. James C. Dole of the Department of Finance at the University of Texas.

Prof. Dole has stated that the U. S. should take these steps: (1) Balance the federal budget by cutting non-defense spending; (2) balance our international payments by eliminating all foreign economic aid; and (3) take steps to stop the wage-price spiral.

Unfortunately, the Johnson administration apparently is unwilling to take steps of this sort. Instead of cutting non-defense spending, the administration continues to press for new or expanded Great Society programs. The administration bitterly resisted reductions in the foreign aid program this year.

Mr. Johnson also is unwilling to incur the enmity of the union bosses by suggesting that wages as well as prices should be restrained. Settlements in the automobile industry, imposed by the union monopoly, virtually guarantee an additional round of inflation in that key industrial sector. When a manufacturer wants to go up on his prices, he faces heavy administration pressure. But the union bosses are not reprimanded by the White House when they upset the wage structure in the country. That's the political pattern of the Great Society.

Holding the line on public spending of a non-defense character and restraining inflation constitute truly vital tasks for this nation in the year ahead. Americans have before them the horrible example of Great Britain. The British are in deep trouble because they have spent more than they earned and because wages were allowed to shoot up to the point where Bri-

tish goods priced themselves out of markets.

Not all the blame should be heaped on the White House, to be sure. If the U. S. is to return to fiscal responsibility, there must be a concern for fiscal responsibility at the grassroots and in the state legislative assemblies.

Observers of the state legislative scene note that inflation also is hitting hard at state governments. Costs of public education and other programs are soaring. In addition, state governments are under heavy pressure this winter to provide pay raises for public employees that state revenues often do not cover.

In short, the states are being urged to engage in fiscal irresponsibility, to spend more than they have or to dip into reserve funds created for a rainy day. As this is an election year, the state legislators are especially vulnerable to the pressure for pay hikes.

It is essential, therefore, that there be a national mobilization (and a mobilization within each state) of responsible public opinion in behalf of curbs on spending. Thoughtful citizens will have to organize to let national and state legislators know that a period of austerity is needed if the country is to weather the period of rough economic weather ahead.

Though the United States is rich in material and human resources, it cannot ignore the laws of economics or engage in giveaways when revenues are down or confidence in the nation's money has dipped somewhat. Only by the practice of frugality will the United States come through the year ahead with its strength unimpaired.

The Worth of a Will

Here's a statistic that ought to make you blink — or open your eyes. Seems that around sixty per cent of Americans die without leaving a will. "Intestate," as the legal eagles say.

Why? Likeliest answer is that most people think they still have plenty of time left. Keep putting off the business of making a will until it's too late. They aren't around to experience the consequences, but their relatives sure know what's happened.

So do the lawyers who so often have aggrieved heirs for clients. There's lots of scope for litigation, considering the ambiguities of the law.

How much of your estate can your spouse claim? How much goes to your children, or your parents? What if you have no close relatives when you die?

It's only common sense to answer these questions yourself instead of leaving it up to the state to do it for you. Besides, you may save your heirs from legal delays, painful anxieties, and the bitterness of a family quarrel.

So, make a will — and make it right. That means you need a lawyer. He'll want to know the size of the estate after debts, taxes and expenses have been subtracted; how much will go to each heir; and the name of the executor who will see to the

proper distribution.

With these facts, a document prepared by a lawyer will make your wishes known.

If you don't already, you might want to join the Bar Association, or some organization that belongs. Perhaps a lawyer who has solved his own problem will be able to help you.

When you remember to you, remember the most important possession. Keep it safe where it can easily be found. A safe deposit box is satisfactory, but it's away from a desk in the executor gets a doubly secure.

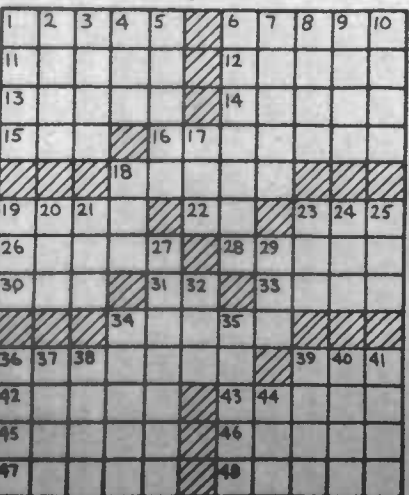

Postal Rates Go Up Beginning January 7

Postmasters in the county remind postal customers that increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," the postmasters declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50

states, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

The Postmasters pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

The postmasters said that the new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, the postmasters said.

He emphasized that the new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until January 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

The county postmasters also noted that effective January 7, special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance, the postmasters said.

Higher rates also will go into effect January 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of 4th class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact their local Post Office, the postmasters said.

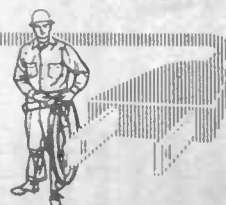

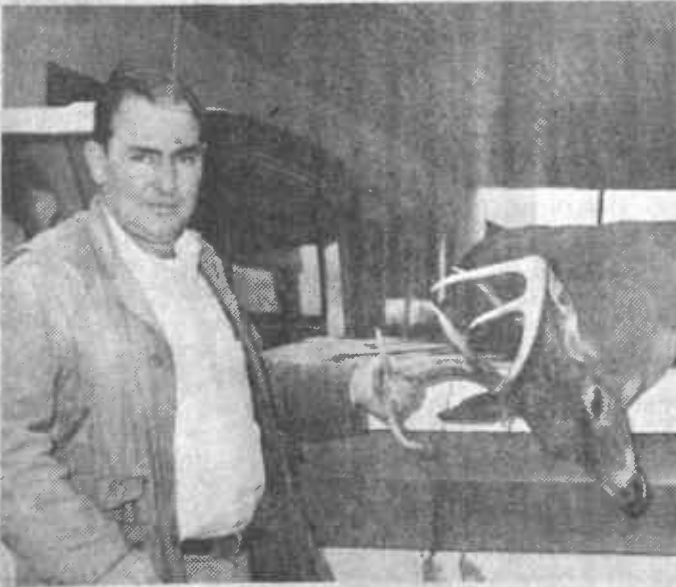

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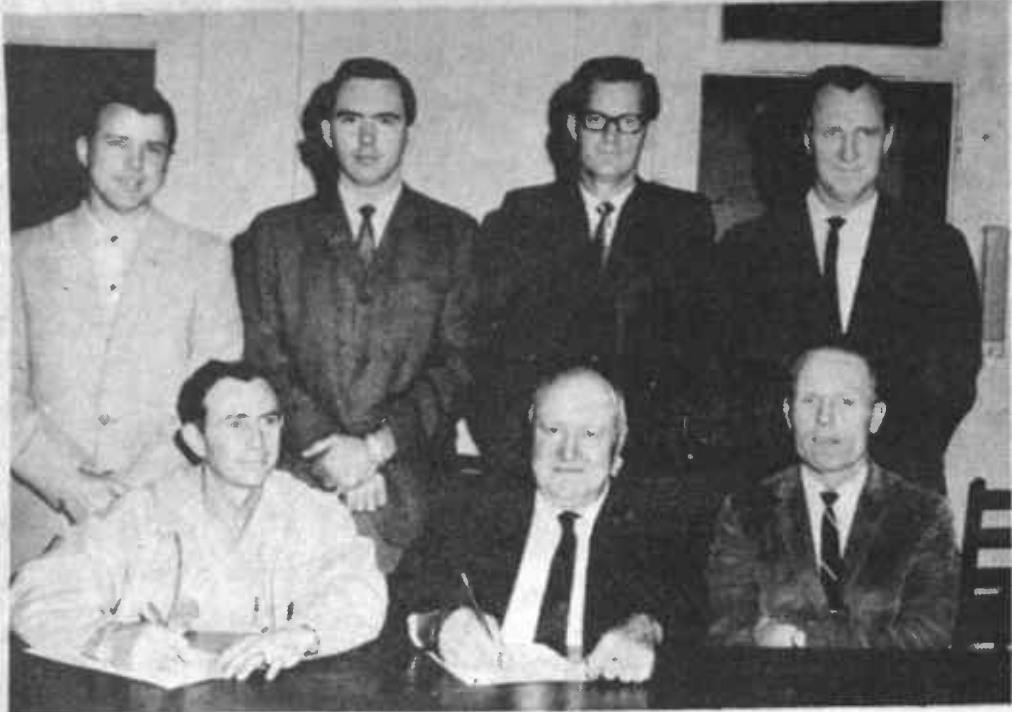

Capt. Hosey earned the award last Feb. 24 while serving as aircraft commander of a command and control helicopter during the evacuation of battlefield casualties near Di Linh, Vietnam.

The captain volunteered to make a hazardous landing in a landing zone swept by enemy fire to pick up wounded soldiers. Making a low approach, his helicopter was hit repeatedly by the intense ground fire and both he and his co-pilot were wounded.

Nevertheless, Capt. Hosey remained on the ground until four casualties were placed aboard his aircraft. He flew to a hospital and, despite his wounds, helped unload the other casualties.

Capt. Hosey is presently a student at the Army Artillery and Missile Center at Ft. Sill.

His wife, Freida, lives at 1226 Carroll Drive, Lawton, Okla.
