MARTIN IS PROMOTED TO SERGEANT RANK

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Martin, Jr., have recently received word that their son, Sp-4 Clarence Wayne Martin, 20, has been promoted to the rank of Sergeant. The promotion was made in An Khe, Vietnam.

Bobby Joe Fountain, Harry Jake Davis and Gary Albert Watson have pled guilty to charges of burglary and larceny and will be sentenced today in Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr.'s January term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court.

Among other cases to be tried today is the County versus Kimberley Brothers Construction Company. This is a suit wherein the county is attempting to regain some of the funds lost when the construction company went into bankruptcy while building an addition to the Tishomingo County Hospital. Named as co-de-

fendants in the suit is the Hartford Accident & Fidelity Company, bonding agents for Kimberley Brothers. Attorneys for the complainants are Clark & Clark of Iuka and Smith & Smith of Corinth. Attorney Joe Daniels is counselor for the defendants. This case is expected to consume a great deal of time, according to Lamar Rutherford, circuit court clerk.

Among other cases coming before this term of court is the State versus Ralph Bowen. Bowen is charged with embezzlement while serving as mayor of Belmont. He was arraigned before Judge Sweat Friday morning. The judge granted a delay in the hearing until Monday morning when bond for Bowen was set at \$1,000.00. At the hearing, Bowen, through his attorney, Donald Franks of Booneville, entered a plea of not guilty. Continued hearing of the case has been set for the August term of court.

In commenting on the charges, Bowen, among other things, said: "I was elected to the office of mayor of the Town of Belmont by a majority of the people and served for the majority rather than the minority. On March 6, 1967, I resigned from this office due to personal reasons at which time I issued a statement to the press giving my reasons. These reasons still stand. I did not resign under pressure and fire was reported last week in certain news media.

"In all battles, someone must fire the first gun. The gun has been fired. When this battle is over and the smoke clears, I sincerely believe we will have a much better town and community in which to live. I personally believe there will be less rumors, gossip and ridicule. However, the scars will always remain.

"As I stated before, I was elected by and served for the majority of the people and this majority is with me yet. This has been proven to me by moral, legal, and financial support as a result of this false charge of embezzlement of the funds of the Town of Belmont."

Bowen was elected mayor of Belmont in 1965.

Time To Sign Homestead Exemptions

Residents of the county are reminded that now is the time to sign homestead exemption applications on homes if they expect to avoid paying the full amount of taxes.

Alvia J. Blakney, tax assessor, says that is necessary for you to bring all your 1968 automobile and truck tag numbers with you as the numbers have to be listed on your application.

Also, he says, you should let him know if you have any changes in your property such as additions of buildings, removal of buildings, or any changes in acreage.

Home owners should go to the tax assessor's office in the courthouse in Iuka to sign their homestead exemption applications.

Sheriff's Off. Open Six Days

Sheriff George Cutshall announces that his office will be open 6 full days each week during tax paying time.

"This means we will be open during the noon hour so factory workers and others may pay their taxes at that time if they wish to," he said. Also, the sheriff's office will not close on Thursday afternoons during taxpaying time.

Those who have not already paid their taxes are urged to do so as soon as possible and avoid the last minute rush. "You will be doing yourself a favor if you can possibly come in before the deadline as it is extremely inconvenient and time consuming to have to stand in line," the sheriff said.

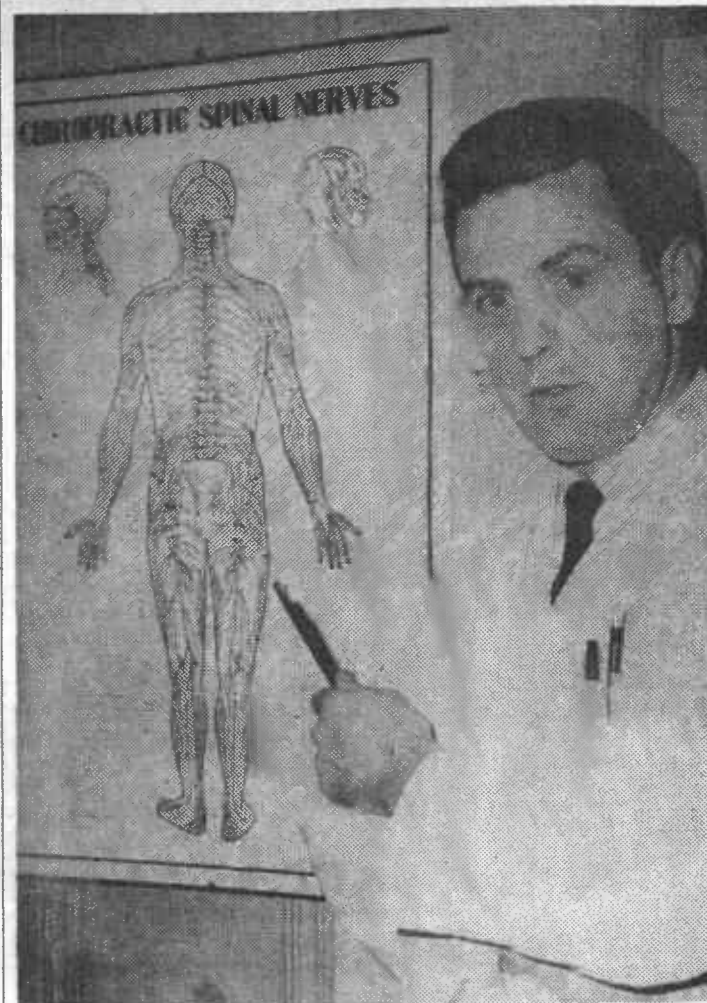
