Area Feels Bite Of Weather's Bad Cold; Many Events Called Off, Re-Scheduled

Scheduled events were called
off and plants and schools
were closed Monday of this week
following the second onslaught
of real winter weather.

Temperatures dipped below
freezing Friday around 5 o'clock
with the first flakes of fresh
snow falling in Tishomingo coun-
ty. Virtually all of the country
was caught in the same vice-
like grip as snow, sleet and
freezing temperatures were in
effect even below Tupelo. The

snow continued to fall all night,
Friday, Saturday, Saturday night
and on and off Sunday until late
Sunday night. This was a very
unusual sight for residents in
this part of the country. The
actual measure was around 4
to 4 1/2 inches but some say
that if all the snow that fell
during the storm had "stuck"
it would have reached almost
a foot.

Patrolman Ira Pace reported
that although highways were very
hazardous, there were no ser-
ious accidents over the week
end. A truck did jack-knife
Friday night on the steep hill
coming into Iuka on Highway 72-
West. No one was injured.

Two events scheduled for Sat-
urday night, the finals of the
Highland Conference basketball
tournament and the installation
of officers for the Iuka Order
126 of the Eastern Star, were
called off and rescheduled for
this week, as was a meeting of
the Burnsville Parent-Teacher's
League.

Sunday a number of church
services were cancelled as peo-
ple were virtually snow-bound.
WVOM Radio broadcast the reg-
ular morning worship services
of the Iuka Methodist Church to
those who were shut-in.

County Schools; Iuka, Bel-
mont, Burnsville, Tishomingo
were all closed on Monday as
well as headstart centers in Iu-
ka, Burnsville, Tishomingo and
Holcut. Classes at Northeast
Mississippi Junior College were
also cancelled for Monday.

The Iuka Shirt Company, Hol-
cut Garment Company and area
employees of Wurlitzer in Cor-
inth were not at work on Monday
due to the dangerous driving con-
ditions which prevailed.

Work and school activities at
Iuka resumed on Tuesday as us-
ual. However, the county schools
and Northeast Jr. College did
not return to classes until Wed-
nesday.

Judge Pronounces Sentences For January Term Of Court

Bulldogs Will Host Tourney

The Tishomingo High School
gymnasium will be the scene of

Coach Billy Tidwell of the
Bulldogs states that the admis-
sion will be 50¢ and 75¢ on
Thursday and Friday nights and
50¢ and \$1.00 for Saturday night,
the finals.

A complete bracket showing
the game docket for each of the
three nights may be found
elsewhere in the paper.

Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr., pro-
nounced sentences Thursday,
January 11, in the January term
of Tishomingo County Circuit
Court.

In the case of the county versus
Kimberley Brothers Construc-
tion Company, it was transferred
to Chancery Court and will be
heard at a later date. This suit
concerns the county's attempt to
retain some of the funds lost when
the construction company went
into bankruptcy, while building
an addition to the Tishomingo
County Hospital.

Johnny Huggins, Harry Jake
Davis and Gary Albert Watson,
along with Bobby Joe Fountain

were all involved in larceny and
burglary charges. Watson pled
guilty and was sentenced to serve
7 years in prison. Watson had 9
indictments against him but was
charged with only 3.

Harry Jake Davis pled guilty
and was sentenced to 5 years in
prison. His sentence was upheld
to 5 years probation with 30 days
to be served in the county jail
as a condition of his probation.
Johnny Huggins also pled guilty
of his charges. His sentence of
3 years in jail was suspended.
He was placed under 5 year
probation with 10 days to be
served in the county jail.

Bobby Joe Fountain pled inno-
cent of charges of accessory to
acts of burglary and larceny.
His case was argued by a Tus-
cumbia lawyer. After several
hours of deliberation, the 12-man
jury found him not guilty.

W. L. McCollom pled guilty to
forgery charges and was sen-
tenced to 2 years in jail. This
suspended and he was placed
under 5 year probation, with
10 days in the county jail.

One other case, that of Otis
Eugene Rogers, charged with sta-
tutory rape, was put off until the
August term of court, due to the
fact that his attorney did not have
sufficient time to review the case
before trial, according to La-
mar Rutherford, Circuit Clerk.

Diddler Thorne Announces For City Mayor

R. K. (Diddler) Thorne makes
his formal announcement this
week concerning his candidacy
for Mayor of the City of Iuka.
Citizens of Iuka will cast ballots
in a special election to be held
February 5, to elect a mayor
to fill the unexpired term of
George Cutshall.

Mr. Cutshall resigned this po-
sition at the end of the year to
assume duties January 1 as
Sheriff of Tishomingo County.

In making his announcement,
Mr. Thorne states that "I am
fully qualified to handle the duties
of Mayor, having been a City
Alderman for 6 1/2 years. I
have worked closely with the
Mayor and am familiar with all
phases which this job involves.

"As City Alderman, I am
officiating as Commissioner of
Streets and am also serving on
other committees including the
sanitation committee and the
committee on sewer, gas and
water lines.

"As a long-time resident of
Iuka, I have watched the pro-
gress and growth of our City.
It is one of the best places in
the world to live and to raise
families. Elected as your Mayor,
I will do my utmost to keep Iuka
the fine City that it is today
and be ever working to promote
its growth for the betterment
of its residents.

"I know that I can serve you
all, and serve you well. I take
this opportunity to ask for your
full support and confidence, by
giving me your vote on Monday,
February 5.

TV POLLS SHOW
WALLACE LEADING

It is astounding but George Wallace is consistently leading in TV polls wherever they are taken. In poll after poll, Wallace leads the field.

The strength of sentiment for the outspoken former governor of Alabama began to unfold during Wallace's successful effort for a place on the California ballot; no mean victory itself. In December, with Wallace stumping the State, a Sacramento TV station reported 62 per cent of 5,000 listeners listed Wallace as their first choice for President.

That finding seemed to trigger other TV stations. A rash of them, subsequently, have conducted polls of their own and in none has Wallace trailed anyone. In most he has topped the field. It is astounding. But there it is.

In an elimination poll conducted by Pittsburgh's WHIC-TV, for instance, Bobby Kennedy went down before Wallace, 68 per cent to 32 per cent. Johnson fell, 70-30. Reagan lost, 68-32. Of the 1,000 Pittsburghers who participated in the poll, 14,801 "voted" for Wallace.

In Houston, KHOU-TV reported 64 per cent of its listeners "voted" for Wallace. In commenting on this result, the Houston Tribune said Wallace's showing was "remarkable".

In Nashville, WSIX-TV, on opening its wires to listeners, reported, "For 24 hours the special telephone-answer lines were frantically keeping pace with the overwhelming response... Over 4,900 calls were received... the largest number of calls yet to be received by TV-8, and gave Wallace 75.1 per cent affirmative margin".

So it goes:
Dayton (WLND-TV, 54 per cent); Wichita (56 per cent); Chattanooga (WDEF-TV, 79 per cent); Cleveland (WJW-TV, 64 per cent); Peoria (WIRL-TV, 58 per cent); Cincinnati (WKRC-TV, 69 per cent); Daytona Beach (Ch. 10, 65 per cent). In Pensacola, Fla., WEAR-TV reported Wallace led Johnson by four-to-one, and led Reagan by three-to-one.

In only one poll, conducted in Syracuse, New York, has Wallace failed to win a majority. Even so, in that instance he broke even, receiving 50 per cent of the "votes" cast.

I picked up these figures last week at the governor's office in Montgomery and was impressed

not only at the results but by the quantity of such polls and by the wide-spread area over which they were conducted. Those stations listed are by no means the total. George Wallace, himself, doesn't know just how many readings have been had. He told me he didn't; they keep coming in, he said. I asked if he had heard of any that saw him trailing. He said he had not, the Syracuse poll — 50-50 — being the closest.

The "scientific" nature of these polls is open to criticism, of course. They are "raw", as they say in the trade, and prove only that the majority of TV viewers prefer George Wallace to all other candidates, announced and otherwise.

But saying that is like saying "only" the majority of newspaper readers prefer Wallace, or "only" the majority of those who are interested in politics prefer the man from Alabama. A person might reasonably conclude that such majorities "raw" though they be, represent a "raw" majority of voters. In any event, they are pretty hard to brush aside.

Those who, from the beginning, have taken the Wallace campaign seriously have known that Wallace sentiment was bubbling but the extent of it, as evidenced by such polls, amazes even his most optimistic supporters.

And the area — North or South, wherever the polls are taken — seems to make no material difference: Wallace wins everywhere.

What the Democratic and Republican politicians can do about it remains as mysterious as the Sphinx.

ALLIES AND COST-CUTTING

As the outlook for the Vietnam war in 1968 is continued heavy fighting, costing huge sums to the American taxpayer, it is essential that the United States find ways of limiting defense expenditures in regions other than the Far East. One way to do this is to make better use of existing allies and to develop new ties with other anti-communist states.

In this connection, Americans have to consider the defense problems arising in the Indian Ocean as a result of growing Soviet sea power. The Soviet Union, long considered a land power exclusively, today is turning to the seas. It has a big naval task force in the Mediterranean and has even greater naval ambitions in the Persian Gulf and Indian Ocean areas. Behind the Soviet moves to the seas is a desire to manipulate world commerce, to capture control of the oil resources of the Middle East and to dominate Africa.

The United States cannot afford to ignore Soviet communism's power drives in these areas. Yet the question arises: where will the U. S. find the financial resources to take on new military commitments in the Indian Ocean and adjacent areas of Africa threatened by communist pressures?

The answer to this question may lie in making better use of diplomacy and in accepting friendship that has been offered and rejected in the past. A case in point is the willingness of the Republic of South Africa, a powerful anti-communist nation, to assume burdens of defense in the Indian Ocean area.

With a strong economy and a currency based on gold, South Africa is in a position to devote extensive resources to the curbing of communism in and around Africa. With the naval traditions of the British and the Dutch — two great seafaring peoples behind them, the South Africans have the know-how to develop a sizeable fleet to deter communist ambitions in the Indian Ocean.

Yet the United States has not taken advantage of the offer of South African friendship. Failure to take advantage of it already has cost the American people a lot of money. Ironically, though South Africa is staunchly anti-communist, the U. S. government refuses to sell military equipment to the Republic. This refusal is all the more absurd in view of the Johnson administration's insistence that the U. S. should trade with the communist countries of Eastern Europe and "build bridges" to those violently anti-American nations.

Britain's socialist government, which has brought England to the door of economic ruin, likewise persists in refusing to sell warships and jets to South Africa although Englishmen need the jobs the defense contracts would produce. Happily, even some Labor ministers now recognize the wisdom of renewed

arms sales. It is to be hoped that the U. S. government will move in that direction in 1968.

Failure to use South Africa as an anti-communist bulwark may drive that country into a neutralist stance, a posture the U. S. can politically ill afford. Gen. De Gaulle is eager to woo the South Africans and to sell them arms.

The whole fanatical crusade against South Africa, because it won't bow to the winds of bar-

barism and communism blowing over the African continent, has a high dollars and cents cost to the American people. For years, the U. S. has shouldered an increasingly large share of the burden of Western defense against communism. U. S. expenditures have to be reduced to protect the dollar. One of the ways to reduce those expenditures overseas is to find other countries that have the courage and the financial means to work as real allies in the global struggle for victory in the cold war.

Nor should Americans forget little Rhodesia, the courageous country in South-Central Africa that had the intestinal fortitude to stand up to Britain's socialist regime and to the Afro-Asian dominated United Nations organization. Rhodesia is another stabilizing force on a continent that lives with the threat of chaos and communist subversion. The Rhodesians, unlike the British

and other so-called allies, have offered to send a contingent of troops to fight against the communists in Vietnam, even though Rhodesia faces communists on its own northern border.

If the friendships of these true Western states in Africa are accepted, and if America's military know-how is shared with them, it will not be necessary for the United States to spend vast new sums to create military bulwarks against the expansionist Russians in the Indian Ocean and Africa. These anti-communist states in Africa are natural bulwarks to Red aggression.

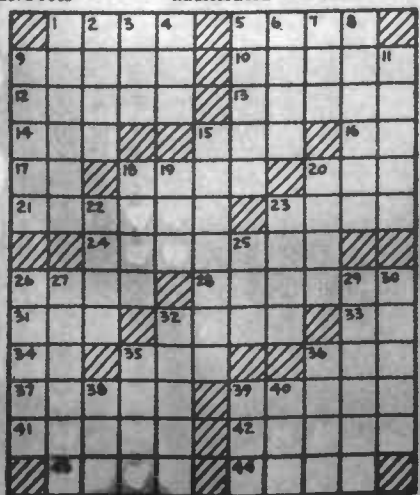
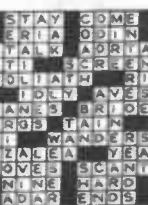

Tenn.-Tom Officials To Be Briefed By Top Appalachian Official

One of the top officials in the Appalachian program will be a special guest of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority at their first meeting of the new year, to be held in New Orleans on January 22.

Col. John C. H. Lee, Director of the Office of Appalachian Studies and Deputy Division Engineer for Appalachia of the Army Engineers Ohio River Division, Cincinnati, Ohio, will talk to members of the five-state Authority during their morning executive session.

The Appalachian program took on added significance to the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project in recent months, when 20 counties in Mississippi and two in Alabama were included in the official Region. This extension placed practically all of the actual Tennessee-Tombigbee construction area in Appalachia.

This addition led to a new assessment of the waterway in regard to what it will mean to these 22 counties in economic assistance to chronically depressed areas. The assessment, which is expected to upgrade the already much-more-than-adequate benefit/cost ratio of \$1.24 to \$1, is being conducted for Col. Lee by the Mississippi Research and Development Center of Jackson, Miss.

Col. Lee will brief the Tenn.-Tom officials on the effects of Appalachia on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

TTWDA was invited to hold their January meeting in historic New Orleans, the transportation center of the nation's inland waterways, and gateway to the Seven Seas, by Captain James R. Ayers, president of the influential Mississippi Valley Association. MVA, the nation's largest water resource group, is a staunch supporter of the Tennessee-Tombigbee project.

Tennessee-Tombigbee officials will host a luncheon at the Monteleone Hotel following the business session of the morning.

Attending will be New Orleans business, civic and political leaders, MVA officials and Tennessee-Tombigbee special guests.

Guest speakers at the luncheon will be Florida Secretary of State and new Authority member Tom Adams, who will speak on "Achievements in Water Resource Development Through Close Cooperative Action"; and president of the Nashville Bridge Company and former Authority chairman, Col. Gilbert M. Dordland, whose address will be "The Present Status and Future Hopes of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Project."

Others of note expected to be present at the meeting are Col. Robert Snetzer, the Mobile District Engineer with the Corps of Engineers; Randolph Hodges, Director of the Florida Board of Conservation; Col. Giles Evans of the Cross-Florida Barge Canal Authority. Col. Evans will talk during the TTWDA executive session on the mutual benefits of the Tennessee-Tombigbee and Cross-Florida Barge Canal projects. J. W. Woodruff, Jr., Chairman of the Southeast Basins Resources Advisory Board and Inter-Agency Committee; Thompson Pound, executive director of the Tombigbee Water Management District; and representatives of Governor Paul Johnson will also be in attendance.

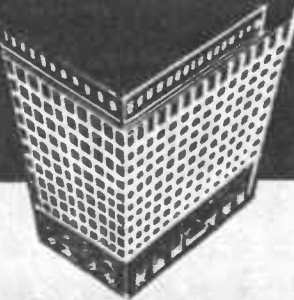

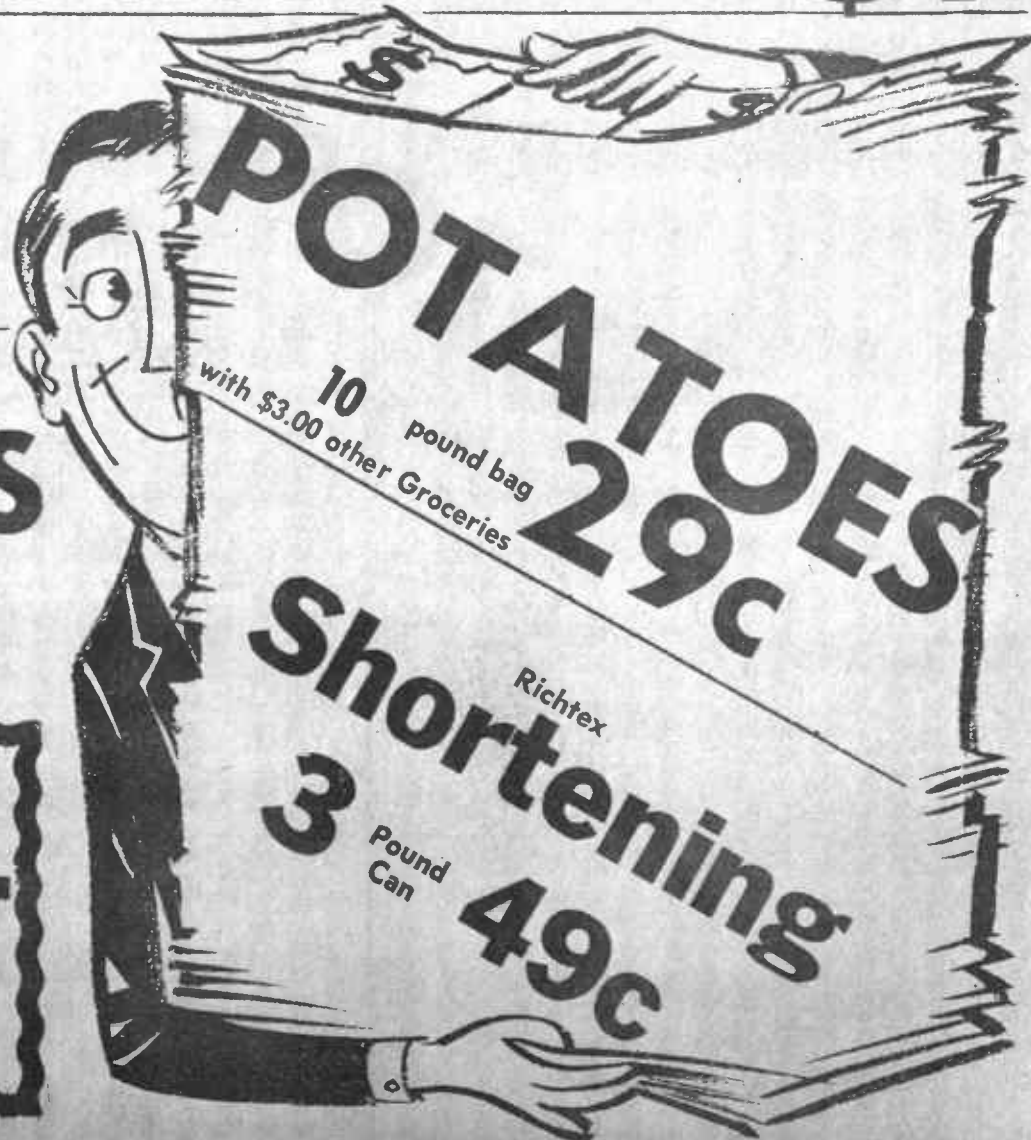

Returns sent direct to the
center can be processed faster
and more economically by the
IRS. Direct filing saves the

district office to the center.

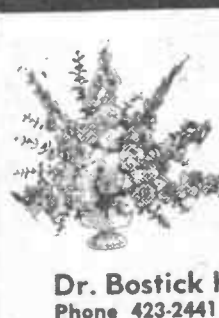

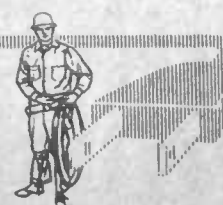
