Buster Marlar Exonerated

In action Monday, the Mississippi Supreme Court upheld a decision of the Tishomingo County Chancery court which held that C. E. (Buster) Marlar be re-instated to his job as game warden supervisor in Northeast Mississippi.

Mr. Marlar was relieved of his duties in 1964 without a hearing. He applied for and was given a hearing by the Fish & Game Commission who held to their decision to relieve him of his duties. Since that time, the case has been in circuit court and chancery court with a final decision coming on Monday of this week from the Supreme Court.

The court orders that Mr. Marlar be re-instated to his job with pay from the time of his attempted discharge.

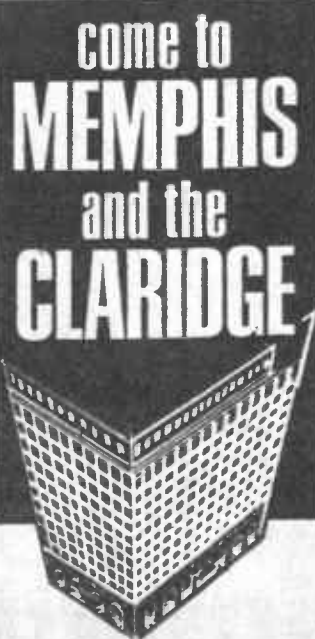

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THE IGNORANT
& THE CHICANE

Anyone who concerns himself with the greatest issue, an issue as old as the nation itself — race — learns early that many of those who support its "popular" side do so out of a depth of ignorance that is almost incomprehensible. Moreover, these popularists withdraw from contrary evidence as they might from the gaping jaws of perdition.

As harsh as is that indictment against the ignorant, it is less severe than the indictment that might be drawn against the knowing.

The more severe indictment would be of malice and pandering against those who know or suspect the truth, yet, because of what they deem to be a greater end, deny it.

I refer to those elements of the clergy who have adopted a sociological God; those elements of the mass media who enrich themselves at the expense of the yearning "deprived"; and I refer to those in public life who would — indeed, have — sold their souls for votes; those who pollute the thinking of people.

It is a terrible thing they are doing and a person who seeks the answer as to why they pursue this sure route to national disaster can conclude only that they are frauds and deceivers, seeking an end — revolution — without concern for the means.

What else? The basic tenet of Communism is this: All men are inherently equal and are unequal only as man has made them unequal. Every jot and tittle of Communist doctrine stems from that single, glaring falsehood. It is the opposite of the truth. This is the truth: God made men unequal.

Even so, it is their argument. See where it leads:

Communism, we have come to know, is the unsheathed fist of Socialism. Ideologically, the two are the same. Consider Socialism's first article: From each according to his ability, to each according to his needs.

That preachment, as Communism's, is an absolute denial of God: All men "need" heaven. If all men were equal in the sight of God, all would go to heaven. But God has promised perdition for some. Therefore, even in the sight of God, men — as the angels — are not equal.

The similarity of these theses — if that is the proper word — those of Socialism and Communism, is proof of their kinship.

Now, then. Socialism — the

Welfare State — has become a respectable concept in this land; a growing concept, growing in respectability. The whole of our flow of life, today, is inching in that revolutionary direction, towards Socialism, from each-to-each, and all-men-are-equal.

Thus, those whose first interest in this race-shaken world is the establishment of Socialism are faced with a stark fact: If, to stop the reverberations, they entertain the possibility that the essence of their belief — all men are equal — may be false, their house may fall. If it is admitted to be false, it does fall.

So, to protect that which they have wrought — the Welfare State — they are willing to live a lie, the lie that everything, is "good" so long as it benefits "the State". Logic, reason, and fact to the contrary notwithstanding. Such is their belief.

But if you do not hold this conviction, if it runs counter to your common sense, you will do what they refuse to do, you will look into the gaping maw that is race. You had better look. You had better learn. For our days as a republic, our days as a people who are the masters of their own lives, such days are drawing to an end. They are numbered unless Americans who believe in God stand against the purveyors of a nameless iniquity.

You had better come to learn this fact: There are deep meaningful differences between races, differences that mark us, that establish the sort of lives we live. To deny these differences is certain tragedy.

But remember this: Differences, of themselves, do not spell superiority and inferiority; whether they do or not is a subjective opinion, nothing more. The memory of the average Negro, for instance, is better than the average White's. Contrariwise, the White man's ability to think in the abstract — the ability upon which civilization is built — is greater than the average Negro's.

Such are examples of race differences, examples of the evidence denied by Socialists, crypto-Communists and Communists, alike.

Perhaps the Negro, in generations to come, will remember these golden days of free men better than those who succeed today's deceivers. Tales will be told in the dark of night, in folklore and legend — the stuff of memory.

Little good it will do.

HYPOCRISY ON THE DOLLAR

In calling on Americans not to travel or invest abroad, President Johnson took action that he described as protection of the U. S. dollar. The action hardly seems effective, however. Indeed there is the odor of hypocrisy about it.

The United States hasn't a balance of payments problem because U. S. Citizens want to visit the Tower of London or the Parthenon in Athens. The U. S. dollar is threatened with a crisis of confidence because the United States is spending more than it earns — at home and abroad. The biggest financial drain since the end of World War II has been the foreign aid program which has won America more enemies than friends.

In the last session of Congress, economy-minded senators and representatives wanted to slash spending on foreign aid — thereby buttressing the dollar — but the administration said "no." Invariably when the protection of the dollar comes down to some tough political action, the Great Society wants to go on spending and promoting the share-the-wealth philosophy.

The hypocrisy of the administration's stand on protecting the dollar was made crystal clear January 5 when Vice President Hubert Humphrey, visiting the unstable state of Zambia in South Central Africa, promised U. S. help to build a highway to the Indian Ocean.

Here is a prime example of foreign aid waste. It is, in the administration's book, wrong for Americans to make an educational tour of Europe, but it is all right for the federal government to dump millions of dollars in a road through an African jungle — simply to appease an African dictator and his fanatical followers.

The proposed road over which Zambian copper would be hauled to the ocean is totally unnecessary. The Rhodesian Railway is equipped and ready to haul the copper, as they have done in the past. However, Zambia wants to see Rhodesia destroyed, and insists that Uncle Sam provide an alternate method of moving the copper.

It is shocking and outrageous that the Johnson administration would agree to the Zambian plan. Yet wasting millions on synthetic African states is characteristic of the "liberals" in power in Washington. They haven't the will to defend the dollar as it should be defended.

Moreover, it is a mistake to accept Mr. Johnson's notion that the dollar only needs defense overseas. It is at home that the struggle to strengthen the dollar also must be carried on with great determination. Yet waste and big spending constitute a way of life for the Great Society.

Because the federal government is pouring billions into non-productive programs, such as the War on Poverty, the dollar is declining in value. This month, for example, the cost of Social Security increased, but real ben-

efits aren't increasing. The reason is that the cost of everything is going up. An American has only to buy a postage stamp to appreciate this truth. A stamp for a first-class letter now is six cents instead of five. Who knows? Perhaps a few years from now a stamp will cost a dime or a quarter.

As prices go up in the United States, America's ability to compete in world markets goes down. At the same time, influential elements in the administration are pressing for a reduction in tariffs so that foreign countries can sell more in the U. S. That outlook and action can only produce a further reduction in the strength of the American economy.

If the administration were truly concerned about the dollar, and determined to arrest its decline, it would do much more than tell citizens they can't take a trip abroad. It would begin with a massive reduction in federal spending and with telling the American people that this is not the time for expansion of the welfare state or other federal services.

After all, the deficit in our internal, national account is the fundamental financial problem. Years and years of profligate federal spending has eaten away much of the value of the dollar. Slippery-tongued economists have passed out the word that we don't have to worry about deficits because we owe the money to ourselves. British "liberal" economists said the same thing, but that didn't prevent devaluation of the pound.

Unfortunately, there is no evidence that the Johnson administration will consider introducing fundamental fiscal reforms. It has its mind set on the 1968 election.

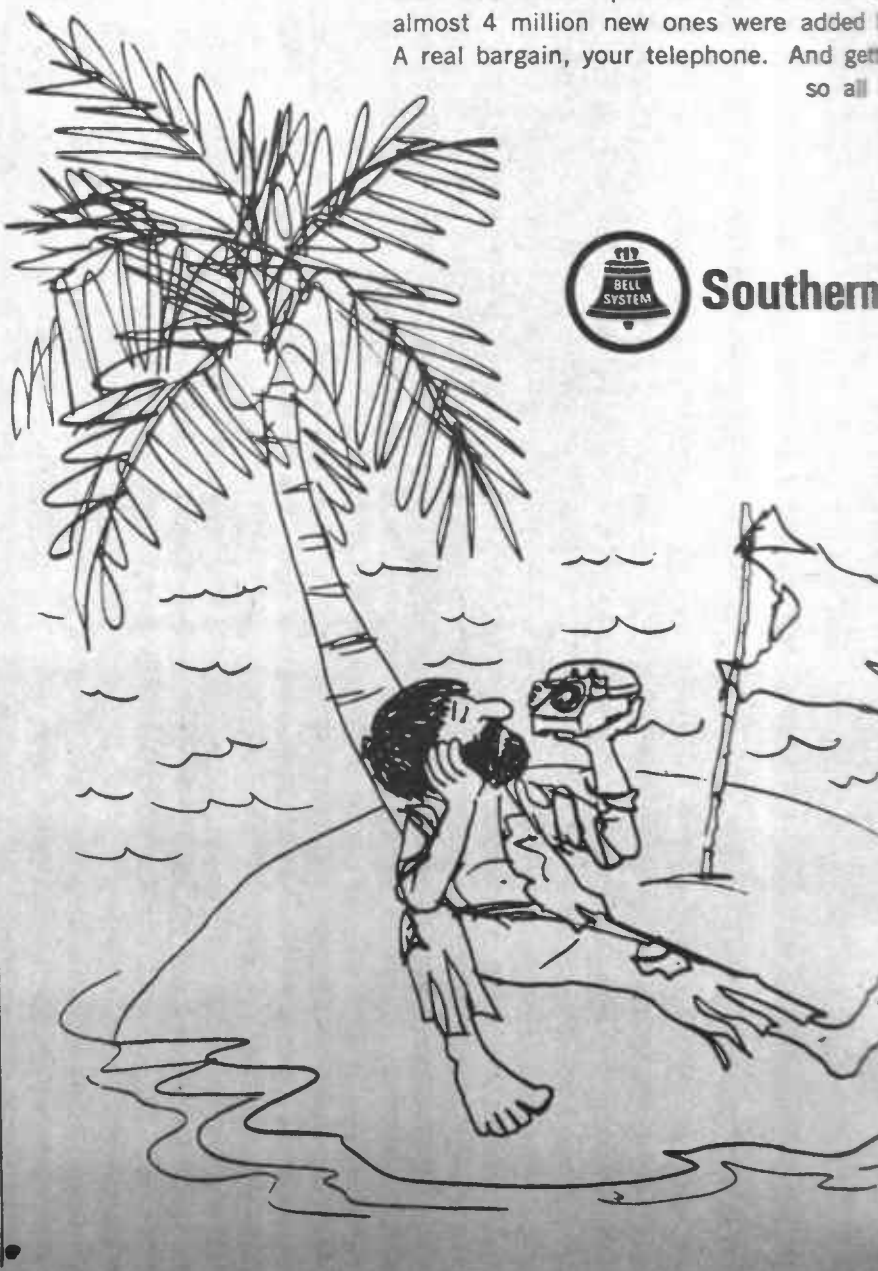

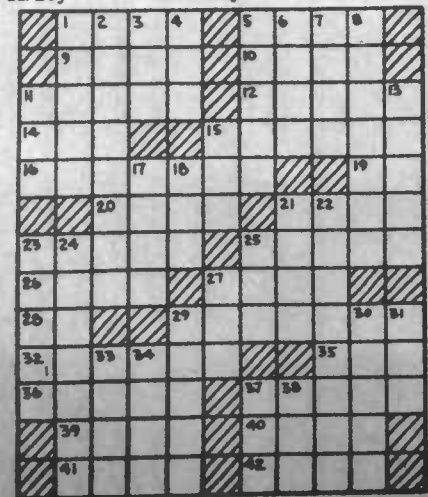

Dates Set For Cotton, Feed Grain Sign-Up

Sign-Up dates for farmers in Tishomingo County who wish to take part in the 1968 Feed Grain and Upland Cotton Programs have been announced beginning February 5th through March 15. Notices of Payment rates on both feed grain and cotton will be mailed from the County Office on January 31, 1968.

At the present time, it is not definite as to whether advance payments will be made on either of the programs. However, this will be announced later.

If any farmer in the county would like to have information on how the Feed Grain Program will operate during 1968 before payment rates are mailed, he may visit the County ASCS Office on Eastport Street.

Feed Grain payments will be in line with the 1967 Program Year. Farmers with Corn Bases above 25.0 acres will be able to rent land and plant corn during 1968. Under the 1967 program, a farmer who expected to plant some corn could not rent any acreage. He could only draw Price Support on 50 percent of his base. Under the 1968 Program, a farmer with above 25.0 acres can rent 25.0 acres or 50 percent of his base, whichever is larger and in addition, draw Price Support on permitted acres.

Farmers with 25.0 acres and down may rent all their base or they may rent part and plant part, whichever, fits his needs.

Due to the short period of the Sign-Up on both Feed Grain and Cotton Programs, it will be necessary for Tishomingo county farmers to make their plans to visit the ASCS Office immediately after the beginning of the sign-up, February 5, 1968, and sign their intentions. If you put this off and wait, it could be that all farmers would not have the opportunity to sign before the Deadline Date of March 15, 1968.

On the 1968 Cotton Program, all farms with allotments 10.0 acres or less may elect to plant all their acreage and receive Diversion payment on 35 percent & Price Support Payment on 65 percent or he may elect to cut 35 percent and plant 65 percent of the farm allotment and get an additional Diversion on 35 percent of his allotment at 6 cents

per pound times the yield for the farm. This is spoken of as the double pay for the 35 percent you leave out.

Farms with above 10.0 acre allotments are required to Divert 5 percent of their allotment to be eligible for Price Support Payment on 65 percent of the farm allotment. He may, in addition, divert another 30 percent of the Voluntary Diversion rate, which is 6 cents per pound times the yield on his farm. This makes a total of 35 percent Diversion on the farm.

If any farmer needs information on this program to help decide what plan to sign for, please visit the ASCS Office before the Sign-Up begins, so you will be ready to file your intention immediately after the opening date, February 5, 1968.

Landowners should be sure to bring their tenant with them when coming in to sign. This will speed up the work and could mean the difference in getting your intention signed or not signed before the closing date on March 15, 1968.

Change In Social Security Law; Increase For Persons On Rolls

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on January 2, 1968, will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 percent in the social security checks of about 2300 men, women and children in Tishomingo County.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are figuring the increases for all 23,700,000 social security beneficiaries around the country and will finish the task in time to include the increases in the checks delivered on March 2.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Residents of Tishomingo county can expect the first increased check on Saturday, March 2, one day earlier than the usual 3rd of the month delivery of social security benefit checks. Under a recent arrangement with the Treasury Department and the Post Office, social security checks are delivered a day early instead of a day late when the 3rd of the month falls on a Sunday or holiday.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 percent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The average benefit payable to a retired worker, about \$86, will be raised to \$98, an increase of \$12 a month. The average couple's benefit, now \$145, will go up to \$165; and the average aged widow's bene-

fit will rise \$11, from the current average of \$75 to \$86.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them the children of working fathers who have died.

The value of social security survivors insurance is often overlooked. Social Security is more than just a retirement system. But it is also income protection for the family in case of the breadwinner's death or disability.

With the increased benefit payments provided under the new amendments to the law, the face value of social security survivors insurance protection is increased to about \$940 billion.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from the currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40.

Mr. Martin stressed that employers should not be expecting a new issuance of circular E, also referred to as Publication No. 15, but should use their current edition for withholding information and tables.

Employers can make certain they have the latest edition of the "Employer's Tax Guide" by checking that the front cover bears the notation, Publication No. 15 (Rev. Jan. 1967).

While there has been no increase in the social security tax rates for 1968; Mr. Martin pointed out that the maximum annual income subject to Social Security has been increased from \$6,600 to \$7,800 for both employees and the self-employed. This is effective January 1, 1968.

The Social Security employee tax tables in the current Circular E can be used to accommodate this increase, Mr. Martin said.

Because there have been no changes in the Federal Income Tax and Social Security Withholding Rates for 1968, employers should continue to use their present copy of Circular E, "Employer's Tax Guide," J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for the State

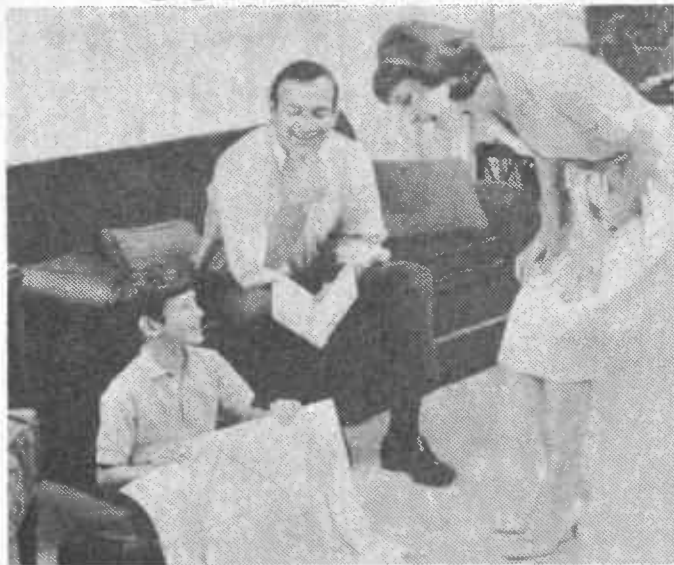

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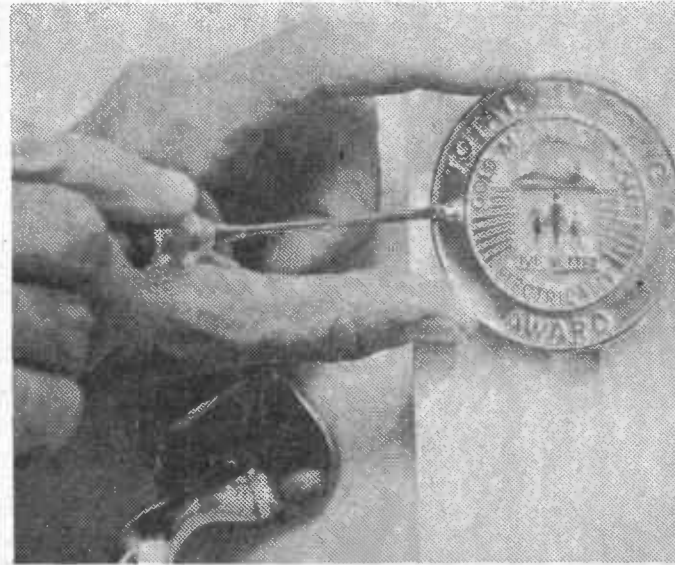
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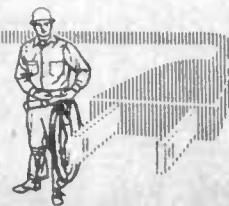
