Board Raises Water Rates; Rescinds On Appointing School Trustees

Among other business discussed and acted upon was a motion to withdraw, or rescind, the resolution passed earlier this month in which the board recommended a change in the method of naming trustees for the Iuka Special Municipal Separate

SHOULD THE METHOD OF NAMING SCHOOL BOARD TRUSTEES BE CHANGED?

In recent weeks there has been much discussion amongst a number of residents in the First District concerning the appointment of trustees to the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District.

Proponents of a plan to change the method of naming the trustees from an appointive to an elective system met with the mayor and board of aldermen on Tuesday night, April 2. At that meeting, it was pointed out by the delegation asking for the change that the democratic way to name the trustees was by popular vote. Everyone qualified to cast a ballot, they argued, would have a privilege to express his opinion as to who should serve on the school board. They also stated that, with the ballot, complete control of the school board could be kept out of the hands of a few and thereby all patrons of the school would be equally served.

The plan presented to the aldermen was to ask the Legislature now in session to enact a private act setting forth stipulations directing the school board trustees be elected in general elections by popular vote. This plan was adopted by the aldermen in the form of a resolution that was presented to the legislators representing the First Supervisor's District.

On Tuesday night, April 23, another group met with the mayor and board of aldermen and presented reasons why the appointive method of naming the school trustees should remain as it is. This group's arguments were that, in the formation of the school district, a decision to appoint the trustees was arrived at between the First District Supervisor, the Iuka Board of Aldermen, and the State Board of Education. The plan was to appoint 3 from outside the city limits and 2 inside. This plan is still in effect.

As further arguments for the method to remain as the appointive system, the group pointed out that better men could be obtained to serve on the board of trustees. They gave specific illustrations of instances where uneducated and unethical trustees had caused undue trouble in schools having trustees who were elected by popular vote. The group also pointed out that able and well qualified men would serve on the board of school trustees providing they were asked to do so, but that these same men would not enter their names in an election.

The board of aldermen's reaction to the group's arguments Tuesday night, April 23, was to rescind the resolution they passed on Tuesday night, April 2. Some aldermen gave as reasons for rescinding the resolution was that perhaps they acted too hastily before investigating the question as they should have.

Maybe the method of naming the school board trustees should be changed. But it seems to us that the bickering, delegating, mind-changing and involvement of the legislature is all uncalled for. We suggest the City Board of Aldermen and the First District Supervisor call a meeting of representatives of the city and district and decide on a plan that will be agreeable to all and that will still be within the general laws on education that were passed by the Mississippi legislature in 1956. That law gave five methods for naming the trustees and it seems to us that people of the First District should be able to select one of the five ways that would be satisfactory to everyone without involving the legislature. Most of us are believers in home rule, particularly in our schools, and since the school laws of 1956 have already spelled out five different ways of naming school trustees, we believe it is possible to work out our own method right here at home.

GARY: A CITY WITHOUT HOPE - II

ON NOVEMBER 7, 1967, Richard Hatcher, a law-trained, 34-year-old Negro was elected Gary's first Negro mayor. His election proved to be calamitous for the brawling steel town that sits just south of Chicago.

By common acknowledgment, Mayor Hatcher is an honest man; money honest. But that his election doomed Gary is equally true. Gary is now a city without hope, locked in a vise of terror and crime from which it sees no escape.

Richard Hatcher, the evidence indicates, is either incapable of competent service as mayor of this roiling town of 180,000 people, or is only superficially interested in its welfare. Critics say he is in residence about one day a week. When inquiry is made as to the reason for his peripetetic travels, word comes back that "the mayor is improving his national image" — speaking somewhere. His choice of topic, generally, is a hymn of praise to 1) Richard Hatcher, or 2) Bobby Kennedy, his political godfather.

This is an understandable combination. From the point of view of both, it is a politically profitable arrangement; they wash each other's shirt. Kennedy has the money; Hatcher has the votes. An executive of the town's bland daily newspaper says, "the Bobby Kennedy Foundation is sending in money to upgrade the mayor's staff". No one can fault that; if money can upgrade, even by a cubit, the motley, mostly-Negro entourage now cavorting at Gary's city hall, it will be money well spent. Gary's municipal government, since Hatcher's inauguration, has become a circus. The staff's ludicrous inefficiency is attributed by some to inexperience, to their being amateurs, to their being amateurs. A not-so-friendly voice calls it "a Kingfish operation".

"Nobody in his right mind," the voice said, "would ask the City Attorney" (a Hatcher-appointed Negro) "for a legal opinion".

Stories of the staff's hilarious incompetence abound. A stringer for a great Chicago daily has said he once waited two hours for an answer to a routine question. "They couldn't find the answer." Another tells of a secretary who snatched back a posed, dignified photograph of the mayor with the silly comment, "Nobody is supposed to see that".

A favorite tale deals with the clever method Hatcher designed

to discourage black office seekers. Shortly after his election, amid a clamor for jobs, the new mayor pompously announced it would be the policy of his administration to hire only the best, that is, Ph. D. holders, preferably, but college graduates, certainly; none other need apply. That took care of that.

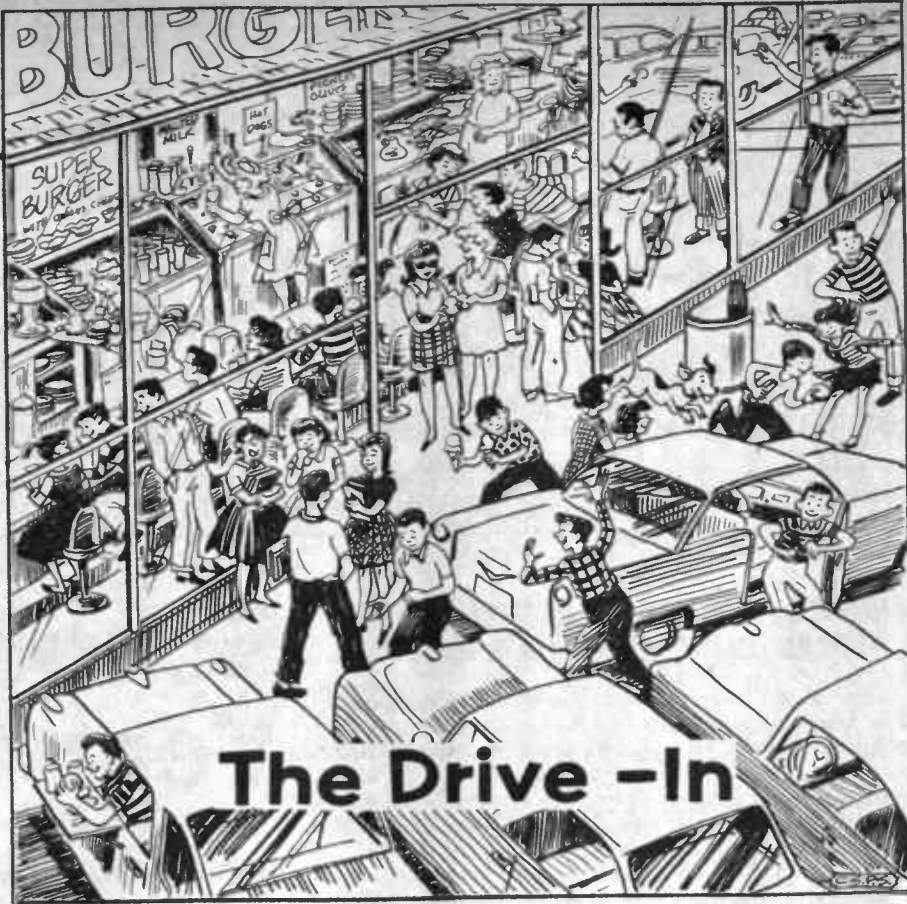
GARY'S TAX RATE is becoming a macabre sort of joke and its public schools have become custodial institutions: Of 47 practise teachers who trained last year in Gary, only two would consider contracts; no assurance could be given they would not be assigned to Negro schools. "We never get Big Ten graduates any more," the father of a teenage student said. "They all come from unknown places. You should see them in action. If they are teachers, I'm Kenyatta".

Gary, to use a trite phrase, has had it. Its situation is hopeless.

Why wouldn't it be? The two opposing forces — the black Ins and the white Outs — that today make up Gary's public life, apparently are controlled by evil. There are no pro-bono-publico spirits in this absentee-landlord town, none in sufficient number to make a difference. A group of concerned private citizens — shop owners, mostly — some months ago did form themselves into a Committee For A Safer Gary; they hoped to slow the robbery rate, the assaults and the murders. Unfortunately, they proved ineffectual. The group is now withering into a nothingness.

ROVING GANGS of black criminals hold the town in thrall. Apparently they are untouchable. Even The Syndicates, the world's hitherto toughest, avoid crossing

lances with this new breed of cut-throat and Mayor Hatcher seems unwilling to vigorously prosecute the murderous acts of the apes. It may be he has in mind his "national image" as Gary's first Negro mayor and the politics of "civil rights". Whatever the reason, the national news media will not touch the story, either. As a result, every decent person in Gary — black and white, alike — lives in a self-spun cocoon, withdrawn from civic problems as though the land were ruled by these phantom terrorists, as indeed, for all practical purposes, it is.

FOR LAW AND ORDER

With many innocent people dead, with more than 100 cities torn by riots and with destruction from looting and arson totaling in the millions of dollars, the United States has suffered a blow that is truly staggering. It behooves every businessman and community leader to ponder the meaning of the shameful disaster caused by savagery in the streets and to consider what can be done to prevent such outbreaks in the future.

First, however, it is essential to clear the air of the emotionalism that spread over the country in the wake of the death of Martin Luther King Jr. Hundreds of thousands of words have been spoken on television and by opportunistic politicians of Dr. King's "dream." But the harsh truth is that the philosophy expounded by the messiah of "social revolution" was not truly non-violent. The campaigns of civil disobedience that he led constituted an incitement to riot. In the final days before his shocking death, he was preparing a new mass march in defiance of a court order.

The nation must hope that in the aftermath of the orgy of destruction there will be a clearer understanding of the ugly fruits of civil disobedience. For more than a decade, demagogues have been shouting "freedom now." It turns out that "freedom now" means freedom now to rob liquor stores, to burn credit records, to pull innocent people from their automobiles and stab them, to break plate glass windows, and to set on fire stores and dwelling places. The chant of "freedom now," the call to civil disobedience, and the contempt engendered thereby for civic authority has culminated in internal wreckage of our country on an unprecedented scale.

Part of the tragedy is that civil disobedience has been encouraged by unthinking or unscrupulous men in high places. "Revolution" has been a pet word among glib people in the government bureaucracy and in the academic world.

Now the American people have seen the true face of "social revolution" in the smoke rising above the national capital and other cities of this great country.

Shockingly, there has been very little effort to trace the riots to their roots — to the apostles of "non-violence" and to the advocates of civil disobedience. The United States cannot live with the myth of beneficent marches and protest movements. The mass action promoted by the advocates of "social revolution" is alien to the United States, destructive of the true American dream of liberty within the law.

Riots cannot be prevented in the future by paying tribute to rioters, whether in the form of new special privilege legislation or by additional federal hand-outs. The time for that kind of appeasement is past. The need now is for the strongest defense of law and order, for far-reaching measures to return peace and ci-

vic obedience to the troubled cities of the United States.

If "law and order" were an issue a month ago, it certainly is the prime issue in the aftermath of the early April riots. Gradually, over the years, law and order have been retreating in America. More and more cities became dangerous to their own inhabitants. Overnight, many cities became battlegrounds as urban terrorists set fires, robbed stores and fired at policemen and firefighters.

Property was not adequately protected during the early April riots. Stores were looted while many police stood by and watched. This was not the fault of the police. They needed the support of political authorities for firm anti-looter measures. In future, looters must be warned that they will be shot on sight. If this kind of police measure is not applied, city after city will be pillaged. No place of business, no store or plant, will be safe from terrorists in the night. Always in the past, when natural disasters took place and looting was a danger, the warning went out that looters would be shot. Why weren't they dealt with firmly this time? Is it because it is an election year?

The American people are enormously tolerant. They are slow to anger. But they have had enough. Taxpayers are entitled to protection — full protection — of the law. They are entitled to civil government that is determined to smash those who would turn great cities and peaceful towns into jungles. But the roots of the riots must also be pulled up. These roots are entangled in the "liberal" myths about civil disobedience and social protest. Disorderly marches and lawless campaigns in the streets must be stopped. They threaten people of good will and respectability in all races and all walks of life. Law and order must overcome the agitators and exponents of "social revolution" in America.

City & State Leaders Urged to 'Get Tough'

Washington, D. C. — A call to governors and mayors to proclaim that anyone using a Molotov cocktail or a sniper's rifle, or looting a store, will be shot on sight was issued today by Thurman Sensing, Executive Vice President of the Southern States Industrial Council.

Speaking before the national convention of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Washington, D. C., Sensing said the governors and mayors should now "issue proclamations loud and clear that the time has come to be firm, to be positive, in fact, to get tough."

The executive head of the SS-IC, an organization of some 2,800 industrial and business firms with headquarters in Nashville, Tennessee, said law enforcement officers are beginning to realize there is no other solution to the problem of looting, burning and rioting. He pointed to the absence of any major disorders in Philadelphia and Miami, where police chiefs had issued orders to "get tough."

In Miami, where the Chief of Police declared before Christmas that "when the looting starts, then the shooting starts," not a single Negro has been shot by a Miami policeman, but crimes of violence have shown a 70% drop, Sensing stated.

"This is not a racial solution — it is a law and order solution," he said, "because law and order must be observed by everyone alike, both black and white, if we are to live in a civilized country."

Sensing told the D.A.R. Members that one of the principal causes of riots is the preaching of civil disobedience and so-called non-violent resistance

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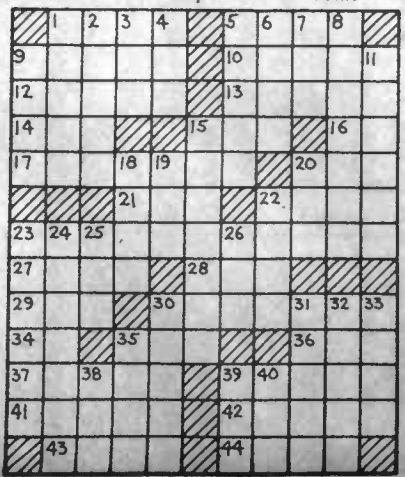

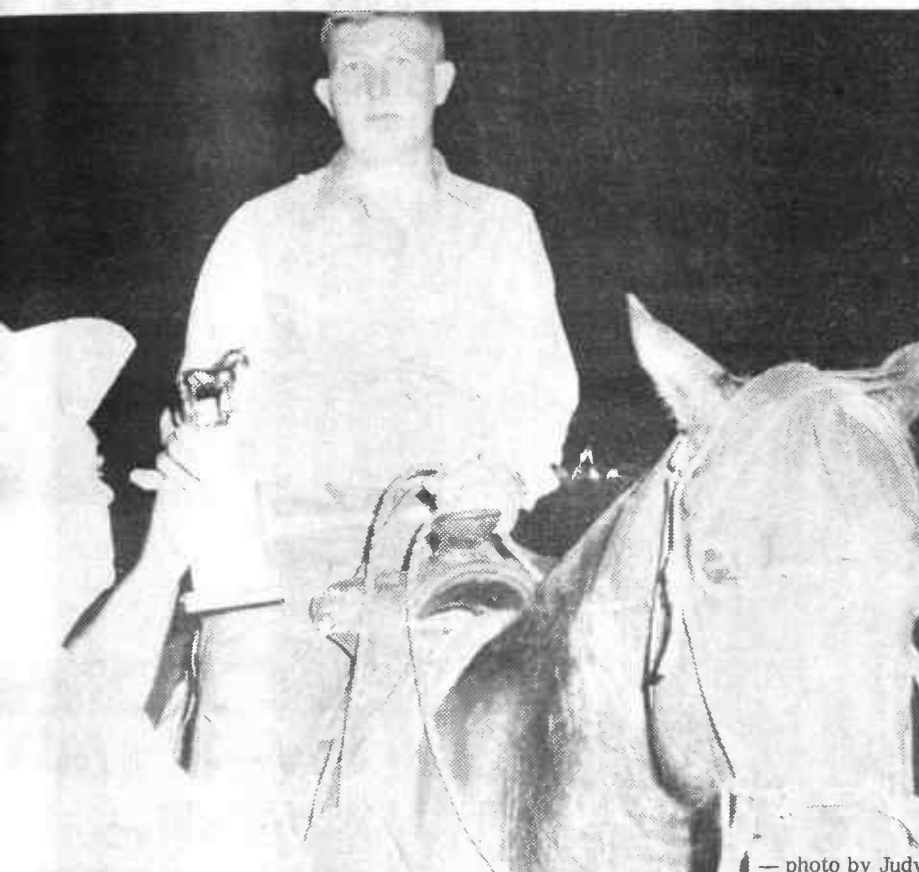
