P. Coleman State Park for an overnight stay tonight and an inspection of the proposed riverport freight dock at Piney Point on Yellow Creek embayment on Pickwick Lake tomorrow.

Proposed Port On Yellow Creek Is Declared Feasible By TVA

The long-sought riverport on Yellow Creek embayment on Pickwick Lake in North Tishomingo County has been declared feasible by TVA. Congressman Jamie L. Whitten makes this announcement and quotes Aubrey J. Wagner, Chairman of the TVA Board of Directors as saying the "cost and benefits attributable to the proposed port project indicates that user and expansion benefits will total approximately \$6 on a present value basis for each dollar expended on construction and land purchases."

Congressman Whitten's announcement came in response to a directive by the Mississippi Representative who is a member of the House Appropriations Committee on Public Works.

The investment cost of the Yellow Creek Port project, the report says, is estimated to be about \$7 million. The average annual cost, including operating and maintenance expenses, is estimated to total just under a half-million.

Noting that development is planned as a joint project among the three governments, financial participation would be:

-- TVA would construct a terminal, warehouse, rail spur, and make necessary channel improvements at an estimated cost of \$5.3 million.

-- The State of Mississippi would invest \$1.5 million in land by purchasing a minimum of 2,000 acres of potential industrial land along the rail spur.

-- Tishomingo County would construct and improve roads and provide the equipment necessary for the operation of the port at an estimated cost of \$65,000.

The project would include:

1. Construction of a 12-mile rail spur connecting the river terminal with a main east-west line of the Southern Railway.

2. Construction of a highway connection between State Route 25 and the river terminal.

3. Acquisition of upwards of 2,000 acres of lands suitable for industrial development along the rail spur. Suitable lands already in TVA ownership in the immediate vicinity of the terminal will also be dedicated to future industrial use.

4. Establishment of a Port Authority by the State of Mississippi which will operate the river terminal, have custodial responsibilities for all publicly financed properties and facilities, and will market the lands acquired for industrial use.

The harbor site will be at the Tri-State (Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee) point where the long-proposed \$288 million Tombigbee Waterway would begin its journey south, linking the Tennessee River with the Gulf of Mexico via Yellow Creek, Mackey's Creek, the Tombigbee River and the now existing Warrior-Tombigbee Waterway, whose northern terminal is Demopolis, Ala.

Whitten stated that, "This is a cooperative venture and the Mississippi State Legislature is expected to hold hearings soon on the state's part in the project."

The report listed the economic impact of the project on the area as follows:

"The development of upwards of 2,000 acres of industrial land near a rail-served port facility and warehouse will attract an estimated 15 industrial firms during the 25-year period following construction. This projected growth will stimulate the economy of the Northeast Mississippi area by providing 2,820 new jobs with a total payroll of more than \$2 million annually."

"In addition, it is expected that the projected growth in industrial employment will increase the demand for trades and services and create an equal number of new jobs with a payroll of \$13 million annually."

"Development of the port project is estimated to increase the value of the industrial land from its appraised value of \$1.5 million to about \$3 million."

The appropriation by the State of Mississippi, the report continues, would be expected to be amortized during a 25-year period by the sale of land to industry and the anticipated net revenues of the port project.

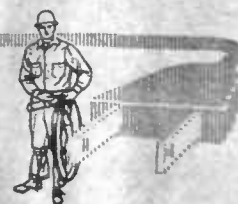

The sergeant is a graduate of Belmont High School.



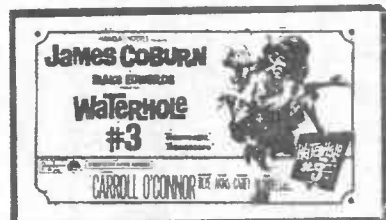

Spradling Coach For 'Stangs

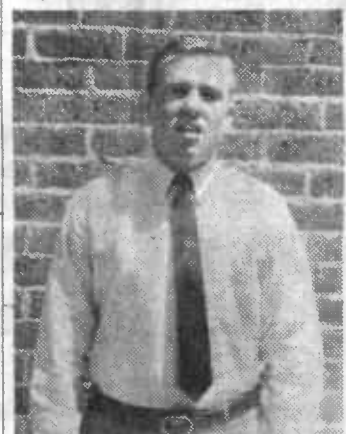

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GARY: A CITY
WITHOUT HOPE - III

JOHN J. SYNON

IF ANY CITY in this nation should be able to integrate successfully, it should be Gary, Indiana. And yet, except for "tokenism" and except for forced public-school integration, Gary is as segregated as any Southern city - more segregated than many.

Theoretically, though, social integration in Gary should pose no problem. This is why:

Gary was created from a wasteland only 62 years ago. It has never known a middle class, and the upper class, the town's owners, live elsewhere. Its workers, with rare exception were, as they remain, muscled immigrants - now the sons of immigrants - who make steel. Until World War II, its citizenry had seen Negroes, a few even lived in Gary, but "race" as we know it today was not among the problems besetting the town built by U. S. Steel. There was no overt "prejudice"; there were not enough Negroes in residence to form an opinion.

Since 1940 or thereabouts, and the coming of the war, the unprecedented demand for the output of the mills has maintained an extraordinarily high demand for labor - any strong back will do, white or black. Today, the lowest paid receives about \$3.00 per hour, \$25.00 a day, and many such jobs go begging.

Because of this high hourly rate, servants are practically unknown in Gary. Every man is his opposite's economic equal, if he has what it takes. If not, there is an abundance of Federal "relief" money - no stigma attached - for those who find both millwork and domestic employment not to their liking. Moreover, with the Negroes now in complete political command, with a Federal government anxious to spend whatever is needed to make the town's Negro mayor (and thus, its own policy) look good, there is no cause for riot - nor have there been any riots.

Gary, then, is a near-perfect hotbed for the theories of the integrationists.

But there is no social integration in Gary, nor any sign of it.

INSTEAD, the "native" population, pushed off balance by the black newcomers, eyes them warily and goes its own way. Where integration is forced, however, as in the public schools, racial troubles do exist. They are vicious, unceasing and unre-

ported. There is little on-the-job trouble because the white workers of Gary, as elsewhere, are not really in competition with the Negroes since the whites hold the straw-boss and supervisory positions while the Negroes seem unable to rise above the lowest - the \$3.00 - rung. There are exceptions.

Thus, while there is no integration, in the sense sought by the Federal government, neither is there any threat of grand-scale racial troubles. Times are too good for that.

A NUMBER of knowledgeable Garyites were questioned as to the upcoming November election. They were in near-unanimous agreement: Against Nixon, and anybody else but Bobby Kennedy, George Wallace would carry Gary (Lake County). But if Bobby Kennedy is the Democratic nominee, they were not so sure of a Wallace victory. "Wallace would have a fight on his hands". Their reasoning turned on the voting practices of Gary's Catholic women. In their opinion, the white women of Gary would thoughtlessly abide by what the church urged them to do, vote for Kennedy. Their votes could spell the difference.

They would do so, it is believed, despite their resentment of the preferential treatment being given Negroes. They would do so despite these facts:

*Public housing - mostly Negro occupied - is being erected in Gary at a cost of \$16,000 to \$18,000 per unit, and is eligible to people making to \$9,000 per year.

*Public schools have degenerated to such a point some Negroes, now, are refusing to allow their children to attend.

*Lawless is universal. In a Gary area known as Tolleston, Negroes have armed patrols to protect themselves from other Negroes.

Gary's present is black. Its future is blacker.

"It is inevitable", a resident said, "Gary will be totally black, one day. And the blacker it gets, the worse it gets. It is hopeless; just be less".

That's Gary, Indiana, a city without hope.

NO BOWING TO MOBS

Even as the "no-win" elements are opposed to the use of massive force to achieve an American victory in Vietnam, they are opposed to the employment of adequate police measures to restore law and order to the cities of America.

Setting forth the "no-win" line on riots, Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark recently told the American Society of Newspaper Editors: "I do not believe that the use of deadly force by law enforcement officers is permissible except in self-defense or when it is necessary to protect the lives of others."

Mr. Clark's statement in effect was a reply to Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago who had criticized his own police force for not shooting looters and arsonists. The Mayor issued orders that deadly force be used in future outbreaks of violence.

The Attorney General's weak argument was that shooting of looters could lead to a "very dangerous escalation" of racial violence in the cities. His words must have had a sweet sound to the apostles of street violence whose slogan is "burn, baby, burn." They have had the word from the chief law enforcement officer of the federal government that protecting the lives of looters and arsonists is more important than stopping barbaric outbreaks in America's towns and cities.

In effect saying that the lives of lawbreakers come ahead of defense of property or the prevention of disastrous fires, Mr. Clark turns his back on every principle of law and practice of law enforcement. Shooting of looters always has been standard practice in America. Moreover, police are regularly authorized to shoot burglars or other persons who resist arrest or who are fleeing from the scene of a crime and will not stop.

Are the police now to be deprived of that right? Are the police of America to be virtually disarmed? Mr. Clark's statement points to a wholly new attitude regarding crimes against property.

The illogic of Mr. Clark's statement is underscored by the fact that a property owner is fully entitled under the law to use firearms to protect his property. If a homeowner or the owner of a store is legally entitled to shoot a looter or an arsonist, why should a policeman not have that right?

Mr. Clark's statement carries the suggestion of a curious philosophy - the philosophy that property is not important. But ownership of property, in the American system, is a fundamental civil right. A home or a store is the product of an individual's enterprise or the labor and savings of a number of people. Life's struggle has gone into every private dwelling and business in this country. Society can't just say "sorry about that" when a home or store is gutted or burned. Local government must not say to the taxpayer, "The money and effort

you have put into your property doesn't really have any value. We have to be concerned that no harm befalls the youngster with the Molotov cocktail or the citizen with an armload of stolen shirts." No, society can't operate on that philosophy and still be civilized.

What deserves defense is, first of all, the law-abiding citizen's life, and then the property of that type of good citizen. The law-breaker is entitled to only one thing from a responsible society - punishment for his misdeeds. And to be credible, local government has to be prepared to use adequate force against lawbreakers. In the case of riots, credibility requires the use of deadly force.

As for Mr. Clark's fear of "escalation," that fear is shameful. Is the United States to admit that it is afraid to enforce the law, afraid to take rioters in hand? If that is the case, we are fast approaching a state of chaos in this country. We are virtually admitting that criminal elements have a veto on lawful government. A government that fears to crack down - and crack down hard - on rioters is a government that is about to fall and that is bowing to the dictates of street mobs.

Obviously, government - federal, state or local - must not bow to the mob. If confronted with rising violence, it must meet that violence with lawful force in whatever amount is needed. Otherwise, anarchy will prevail. No one's life, let alone his property, will be safe if Atty. Clark's policy prevails.

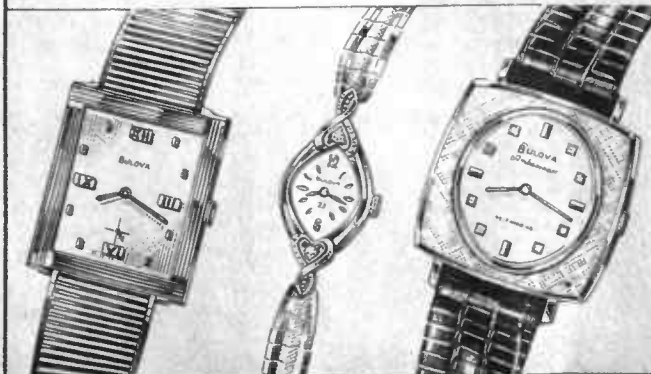

Tennessee-Tombigbee Allocations Are Pushed

A delegation of Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway supporters appeared before the House Public Works Appropriations Sub-com- mittee Wednesday to support President Johnson's budget rec- ommendation of \$500,000 for their project. They will appear before a similar committee in the Senate today.

Headed by Kenneth Woods of Henderson, Tenn., who serves as vice-chairman of the five-state Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, the group presented the Congress with a statement by Tennessee Gov- ernor Buford Ellington, chair- man of the Authority.

Ellington, in asking that the Congress recommend the ap- propriation of funds in the amount of the Budget, said, "we are most appreciative of the President's action in recom- mending these funds, evidencing as it does his assessment of the pro- ject as worthy of an allocation of funds at a time of extreme bud- getary stringency."

Of the project, Ellington point- ed out that "throughout the South, where the future of the economy is deeply dependent on the full development of its waterways, the people look to this project as a means for stimulating economic growth, for assisting in the re- habilitation of a region long pla- gued by chronic depression, and for providing a sound foundation for achieving the great potential of the area in natural and human resources."

He added, "failure to continue at an orderly rate with a pro- ject so long delayed would fur- ther frustrate the legitimate ex- pectations of innumerable citi- zens seeking a brighter future for themselves and their chil- dren."

The Tennessee governor con- cluded that the long-sought wa- terway, which would connect the Tennessee and Tombigbee Riv- ers, represents "a development

potential of outstanding merit and promise in an area where the need is critical."

Alabama Lt. Gov. Albert P. Brewer said in a statement pre- sented to the sub-committee "The continued progress toward the development of the Tennes- see - Tombigbee Waterway be- comes more important every day to the economic and industrial growth of the South and mid-A- merica. For example, in Alaba- ma last year the state had \$656 million invested in new and ex- panded industries with approxi- mately \$418 million of that to-
