Mrs. Holtsford Is 3rd V-P Federated Womens Clubs

E. C. Holtsford, member Lucy Rowe Study Club has been elected to a term as third vice-president and junior director of the Mississippi Federation of

Women's Clubs. The election was held at the 70th annual state convention Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the Harrisburg Baptist Church, Tupelo.

Mrs. Holtsford, associate editor and bookkeeper of The Vidette and the Belmont Tri-County News, began her club work in the fall of 1951 when she became a member of the Lucy Rowe Study Club. She has taken an active part in all club work and served as publicity chairman for all of the club's activities. She was instrumental in planning and promoting all of the radio and newspaper publicity for the forty-fifth convention of the Third District of the MFWC held in 1960 in Iuka.

A native of Murfreesboro, Tenn., Mrs. Holtsford received her education in the Rutherford County Schools and Lawson's Business College. It was during that time she assisted the former Jean Marie Faircloth as typist at the Faircloth home in Murfreesboro. Miss Faircloth later left Murfreesboro and became the wife of the late Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Mrs. Holtsford, her editor husband and their three daughters live at 608 W. Quitman. They are members of the Iuka Church of Christ.

Among other club ladies from Iuka attending the convention were Mrs. Buster Ramsey, president of the Lucy Rowe Study Club, and members, Mrs. J. C. Byrd, Mrs. Waco Parsons and Mrs. Frank Brinkley.

During the presentation of awards that followed, the Lucy Rowe Study Club received an award on their scrapbook which placed first in the district and second in state competition. Highlighting the session was a style show presented by one of the Tupelo clubs featuring a beautiful line of clothes. In conclusion, the ladies had the pleasure of touring one of the old homes that had been recently restored, the J. R. Patterson home in Pontotoc. The convention closed with the installation of officers on Friday.

Mrs. Holtsford's duties as junior director will include work on the MFWC magazine and the designing of the covers for the Jan.-Feb. issues for two years.

Election Set For Bond Issue In 5th District For New Plant

PEPPER PLANTS AVAILABLE MONDAY

County Agent Percie B. Stricklen announces that another shipment of pepper plants will be delivered in the county next Monday, May 13, at the Midway community center.

Distribution of the plants will be from 8 to 9:30 in the morning and everyone needing pepper plants is asked to be at Midway at that time. Also, any new growers wanting pepper plants may also pick them up at this time, Mr. Stricklen said.

\$350,000 Needed for Kaydee Metal Co.; Will Make Furniture Parts

Voters in the Fifth District and the Town of Belmont will go to the polls on Saturday, June 1, and cast ballots for an industrial bond issue to build a building for the Kaydee Metal Co., of Chicago. The bond issue will be in the amount of \$350,000 with \$190,000 being issued against the Fifth District and \$160,000 being issued against the town of Belmont.

The polls will open at 7:00 o'clock in the morning and will be kept open until 6:00 o'clock in the evening and ballots will be

cast at the following precincts: Golden, Dennis, Cotton Springs, East Belmont, Belmont A-Mc, and Belmont N-Z. Thirty percent of the qualified voters in Belmont and in the Fifth District must go to the polls and cast ballots, and of those voting, 60 percent must vote for the proposed enterprise in order for it to pass.

The new industrial plant building will be situated an industrial site located north of Belmont and east of the I.C. Railroad. It will be 200 x 300 feet, containing 60,000 square feet. The new industry will occupy 8 acres of land.

Saul Reuben, owner of Kaydee Metal Co., says he will manufacture metal legs and parts for dinette suites and metal parts for office furniture. Other types of metal furniture to be manufactured will include couches, chairs, and other pieces.

Estimated employment will be 125 men with more to be added as the demand increases.

Joe E. Brown Will Retire This Year

The close of school this year at Iuka marks an important date, not only for seniors who will be beginning a new career, but for a dedicated teacher and administrator who will be closing a very fruitful career. Joe E. Brown thus announces his retirement as an outstanding educator in Northeast Mississippi.

Mr. Brown, high school principal at Iuka School, will conduct his last official school act Tuesday evening, May 28, when he presents awards to the seniors of the graduating class of 1968. Mr. Brown has given thirty-six years of his life to the teaching profession, all in Mississippi schools. Twenty-seven of these important years of offering guidance and instruction to many have been given here in Tishomingo County.

Youngsters studying in the fields of science, mathematics, vocational agriculture and social studies have all had the benefit of Mr. Brown's assistance, as he devoted a portion of many days to holding specific classes in each. In addition he has aptly served as school superintendent and high school principal for the past 18 years.

Before coming to Tishomingo County as an educator, Mr. Brown was superintendent of the 5th District School in Prentiss County.

A graduate of Tishomingo County Agriculture High School with the Class of 1927, Mr. Brown went on to Mississippi State University to earn his BS

and MS degrees.

With the retirement of the late Prof. W. R. Nettles, in 1950, Mr. Brown was named superintendent of Tishomingo Hi School and served in this capacity for 9 years. He joined the Iuka School administration in 1959 at a time when the system was first entering a vast expansion program. He has continued in this office of high school principal to the present day.

During this time, Mr. Brown has served as president of the County Teacher's Association at various terms.

"It is with a deep sense of regret that I separate myself from the fine student body and faculty," the educator said. "I will always hold a warm place for each in my heart." Mr. Brown went on to express his greatest appreciation to the faculty, students, trustees and many others over the years who have helped to make his associations with the Iuka System and the Tishomingo System most enjoyable experiences.

After building so many fine memories, Mr. and Mrs. Brown will enjoy recalling each. He looks forward now to plenty of leisure time, some of which will be devoted to working in his garden. Other plans include some travel perhaps to Louisiana for visits with their daughter, Betty Ann and her family.

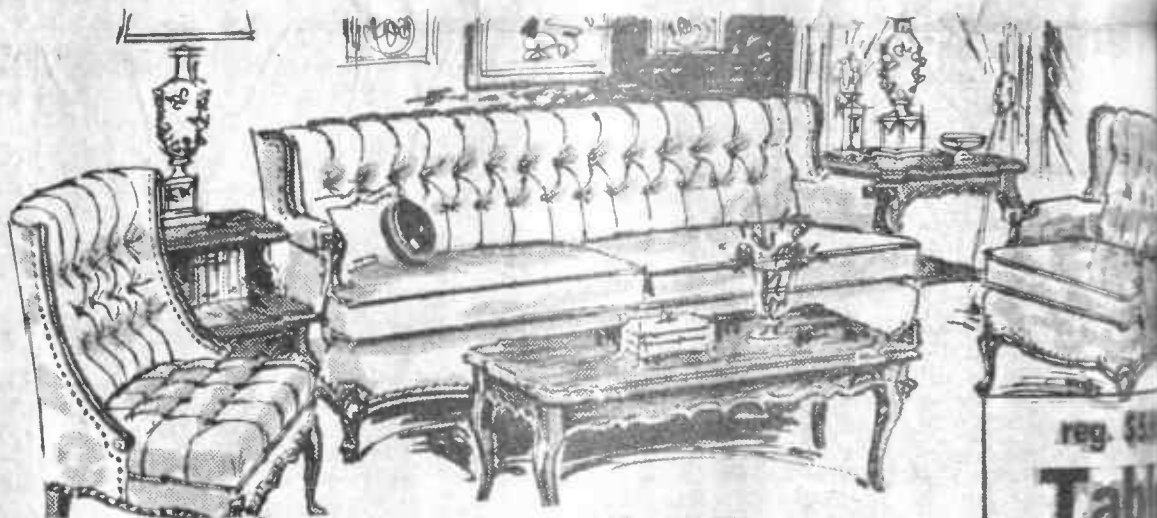

The meeting was held at the park lodge and was followed by a get-acquainted period and fish fry on the shores of Pickwick Lake. The Iuka Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and Industrial Committee were hosts for the event.

In his briefing, Carnathan told the group that the Yellow Creek riverport would come in three phases: construction of the dock; laying the railroad spur; and purchase of the 2,000 acres of land for the industrial purposes.

He stressed the need for the project, saying that the "average annual earnings per manufacturing worker in Northeast Mississippi in 1966 was \$3,882. The Northeast Mississippi area needs to attract more industries in the high-wage bracket in order to increase the level of earnings of its labor force."

Carnathan pointed out to the state legislators that the harbor would not cost Mississippi anything in the long run. In effect, the state would loan the project \$1.5 million. The revenue that would be coming in from the purchase of the land by industries would be offset the initial expense.

Bill Barrett, director of the North Mississippi Industrial Development Association, noted that as the condition exists now, the northeast section of the state is the only area that is land locked. The construction of the port would open northeast Mississippi to river transportation to all water oriented industries.

According to a recent release by TVA, the project will include the construction of a river terminal on Yellow Creek embayment of Pickwick reservoir in Tishomingo County. The terminal will be a general purpose freight-handling facility for transferring industrial raw materials and products between barges and rail cars or trucks.

The TVA spokesman pointed out that some 15 industry groups had already expressed interest

in the proposed riverport, but they "would not locate here unless the facilities are put in for them to have access to the inland waterway."

Following his report, spokesmen from Tishomingo, Alcorn, Lee, Tippah, Prentiss, Itawamba, Clay, Monroe and Pontotoc counties gave their personal opinions as to why the riverport would be such a great asset to the Northeast Mississippi area.

The moderator was Charles Caviness, Corinth, secretary of the Tennessee-Tombigbee River Valley Water Management Dist.

The state legislators were taken on a tour of the proposed riverport site on Friday morning by way of a water route from Coleman Park down the river to the Yellow Creek embayment.

Pepper Program In County Is Underway

The first commercial pimienta pepper production program in Mississippi was introduced Monday in Tishomingo County when the Pomona Products Company of Griffin, Georgia, delivered plants to the county to be transplanted in the fields.

Tishomingo County farmers have contracted with the Pomona Products Company to grow 180 acres of pimienta pepper this year. Farmers can expect to gross from \$300.00 to \$500.00 per acre from pimientos.

Last year farmers in the county contracted to grow 140 acres of cucumbers on a commercial program and about the same acreage is being planted this year.

The pimienta pepper fits well in the cucumber program since

the harvesting of cucumbers will be finished by the time the pimientos are ready to start harvesting. Family labor can handle both crops on the same farm since the dates of harvesting is different. Farmers with these two crops can have a weekly income from June 1 to November 1, according to County Agent Percie B. Stricklen.

Vegetable production is expected to increase in Tishomingo County due to the small size farms with family labor available.

Two other counties in northeast Mississippi, Prentiss and Alcorn will be participating in the pimienta pepper program with approximately 130 acres being planted in each county.

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GARY: A CITY WITHOUT HOPE - IV

JOHN J. SYNON

A FRIEND had told me I could not get a meaningful impression of Gary, Indiana, without talking to one of the merchants "on the firing line".

I asked if he had any suggestions. He named several possibilities. I asked which was the closest. He said, of the four, Lake County Furniture Company.

Lake County Furniture Company is located at 2172 Broadway, Gary. It is owned by a friendly, middle-aged man named Richard Burke. Mr. Burke proved to be the only person in Gary I found who would allow himself to be quoted.

It was early afternoon when I arrived. Even so, the door of the store was bolted. But a rattle brought the owner and I expressed surprise at his closing at that time of day.

"We aren't closed", he said, as he replaced the one-inch steel rod that locked the door. "This is the way we do business — and so is that", he added, pointing to a neat, round hole in his plate-glass window. "Bullet", was his laconic explanation.

"And so is this", he said, patting the six-gun that swung from his hip.

My eyes must have bugged. "Sit down", he grinned. "What would you like to know?"

I told Mr. Burke I was trying to get a line on Gary; the sort of town it is.

"You came to the right place; how many holes can you count in the ceiling?"

I looked, and tallied four. "See that hole in the lamp shade; see the one in the stove — all bullet holes. I have undergone 12 unsuccessful attempts to rob me; I have been actually robbed three times, and I have had three shoot outs."

"Shoot outs?"

"Shoot outs. After I got tired of turning over my receipts to the black criminals that scourge this town, I prepared for them. They got to me one day, shortly afterwards, took my money and made me lie face down on the floor. Then they took a can of gasoline, sprinkled it all over the place and set it afire — then they ran."

"Did you catch them?"

"Catch 'em? I dropped them as they went through the door."

I ASKED if his case was unique, isolated.

"Oh, no. I'm about average. Some places have been held up

twice a day. You should see Midtown Market, at 16th and Jackson. That place looks like a fortress. It should; it's been held up 40 times in 37 months.

"Or Comays; they are the biggest jewelers in town. Everybody on the floor, there, wears a six gun in plain view. That's something to see; swankiest jeweler in town."

I asked what kept him at such a business, in such a town. He answered: "I've got accounts receivable". And when I made no response to so shallow an answer, he added:

"I came to Gary 20 years ago with nothing. I'm not going to leave with nothing. I've worked hard. These blacks have this place bulldozed; people are afraid to come into the city; my daughters in college, for instance. They are afraid to come home. Even my wife won't come into the store."

AS WE TALKED, the door rattled. Mr. Burke eyed the newcomer, then beckoned his clerk to permit entrance.

"That fellow comes as my friend", he said, sotto voce, "but he isn't. He is a stoofy for city hall. Just keep your voice down."

After chatting with the clerk a moment, the newcomer left. The door was again bolted.

"What did he want?" Mr. Burke asked his employee.

"He wanted to know who your visitor is. I told him a salesman."

"Good."

It was time to go and I asked Mr. Burke if he would call a cab. He said cabs were not available. I offered to walk; it was about 14 blocks to my mid-town hotel — straight down Broadway, the town's main street.

"Oh, no, don't do that — that's a pretty good suit you have on. I'll drive you."

It was a memorable drive. Mr. Burke knows all the merchants, those still in business and those who have fled. He pointed to their places as we passed — some are boarded up now — recounting the times their owners had been robbed, beaten or murdered — "poor Mr. Rosenberg".

"See that place", he said, as we neared my hotel. I nodded.

"Two years ago it was offered to me at \$200 a month. Today, it houses Youth Opportunity, or something like that. The government pays \$975 a month rent to a trust."

TIME TO CRUSH ANARCHISM

The virtual collapse of Columbia University in New York during late April as a result of terrorization by members of the left-wing Students For A Democratic Society is an ominous sign of impending anarchy in the United States.

At Columbia, a small segment of radicals — aided by so-called Mau Mau Chief Charles Kenyatta of Harlem and professional agitators Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown — destroyed the good order and normal work of a university with more than 27,000 students. The office of the president of Columbia, one of the great universities in America, was captured by the destructive minority who demand virtual authority over the university in future.

Hopefully, the American people will derive a shock of recognition from the shameful scene on the Columbia campus. The situation on the campus at Morning-side Heights is a taste of what could happen at every campus in the land if there is not a firm application of law and order and if toleration of anarchists and campus hoodlums is not ended forthwith.

Around the world, communists and anarchists are sparking similar college and university take-overs. In Italy, for example, 23 of the nation's 27 universities have suffered campus rebellions and seizures of university property. It is shocking and almost incredible that responsible people in any civilized land would let the seats of learning be turned into political circuses and places of hostage-taking.

What Americans are seeing today are the ugly fruits of the permissive philosophy — the philosophy that says tolerance is the highest virtue and must be carried to any length. The disorders have been in the making for a number of years. People in high places have encouraged civil disorders. They have excused rioting and looting. They have condemned strong police action against dangerous mobs. They have insisted that protesters have more rights than law-abiding people.

If the United States continues to go the way it is going, granting unlimited tolerance to left-wing agitators, the Republic will collapse into anarchy. The infection of anarchy is spreading because little or nothing is done to stop it.

Certainly, the officials of Columbia University are at fault for failing to crack down hard when the disorders started. Rebellious and destructive students should have been expelled from the university and charges filed against them if they did not leave the campus. The police should have been called onto the campus when the rebels began to barricade themselves into university buildings.

Had stern action been taken at the beginning, the disorders would have been crushed in the bud. That's the only way to handle any type of mass disorder

or insurrection against constituted authority. Maximum lawful force should be used against those engaged in unlawful activity.

The authorities at Columbia are not the only educators to blame. Authorities at Duke University made the same mistake recently when they failed to crack down hard on students attempting to dictate university wage policies. Students that failed to attend classes or that caused a commotion on campus should have been promptly expelled. Faculty members who aided the student protestors should have been fired.

Unfortunately, the notion is widespread that anything goes in the name of "academic freedom." This apparently includes camping in academic halls or the residence of a college president or denying teachers access to their classroom.

What has happened at Columbia University cannot be endured in a country that believes in responsible freedom. Order is too valuable to be sacrificed to the whim of a handful of anarchists, professional wreckers of our society.

Unquestionably, the broad mass of the American people are moving towards a massive reaction. They will insist on a restoration of order and decency by any means. No one wants authoritarian rule in the United States. No one wants to go overboard. But unless there is swift and immediate official reaction against law-breakers and campus anarchists, the country is likely to swing far in the opposite direction. Pulitzer-Prize winning columnist Edgar A. Mower has summed up the situation, saying: "One thing I am sure of: violence condoned or tolerated could spell the end of democracy. For in the long run, people will accept an autocratic regime that guarantees order to a democracy that cannot or will not."

Thus even the "liberals" should understand that anarchism in America must be suppressed and suppressed now.

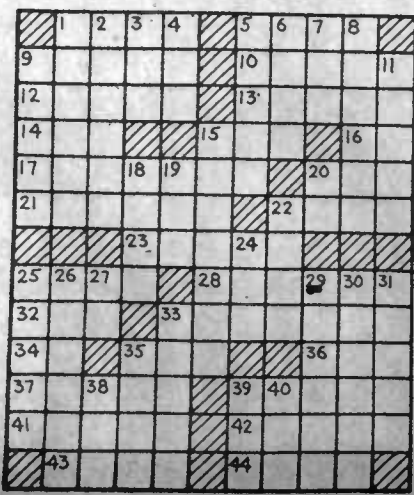
