Late Summer Wedding Planned By Miss James

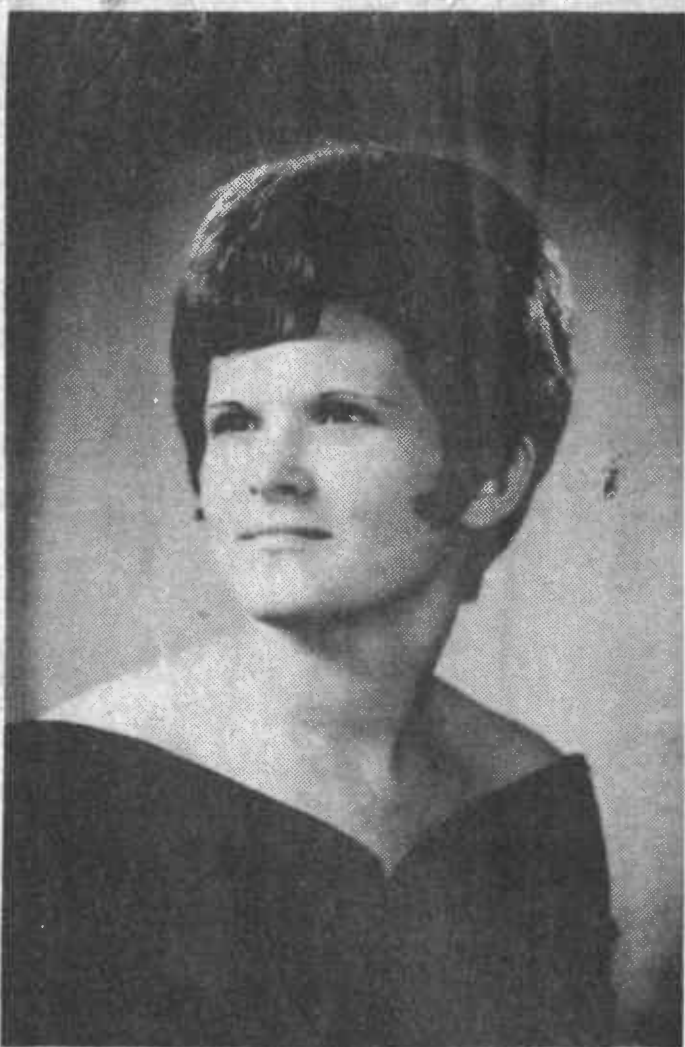

The purpose of this letter is to advise you and the citizens and taxpayers of the said municipalities to whom this Certificate is issued that the proposal submitted to the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for said municipalities to lease the premises acquired and constructed by said municipalities to Kaydee Metal Company does not meet the usual financial requirements of this Board, insofar as the net worth of said Kaydee Metal Company is concerned.

This Board has been advised by your representatives that the citizens of Belmont and the 5th Supervisor's District of Tishomingo County are practically unanimous in desiring to go ahead with this project, notwithstanding the fact that the usual financial requirements had not been met.

Upon such assurances and provided that the citizens may be fully advised so that they may vote their conviction in the bond election, this letter is being written to you with an understanding that it will be published for not less than two consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town of Belmont and the 5th Supervisor's District of Tishomingo County, and further that a copy of same

will be posted upon the bulletin board of the City Hall of Belmont and the Court House of Tishomingo County.

THE DAY AFTER Lyndon Johnson threw a white feather, rather than his hat, into the political ring. I received a letter from a favorite publisher - William Loeb of the Manchester (N.H.) Union Leader - asking how I figured that: what of the election, now?

Well, siree. Until now, my inquisitor has had no response. What was there to say when I couldn't, and still can't, get it in my head LBJ is going to turn tail and run. I know Lyndon Johnson to be a man who uses his tongue to conceal his thoughts, a shrewd operator, somewhat of a stripe with Earl Warren. Graceful retirement isn't in that sort. I simply could not take him at his word; I had to chew that one.

But even with Johnson as a conundrum, the full picture could have been envisaged, had that been all of it. It wasn't. There was something else.

When Loeb asked his question, Nixon was having a free ride and that didn't make sense. That is what stumped me. Now Rockefeller is in the act and - voila! - the thing levels out: all the pieces are at hand, the other shoe has dropped.

acceded to the cry of the multitude - the cynical old charlatan. And that will be more than the Democratic juveniles-of-all-ages can stand: they will bolt. I don't mean Bobbie Kennedy will bolt - he is too sissy for that - but the New Left, those ideologues who, today, are beating the bushes for both Kennedy and McCarthy (and who might just swallow Humphrey), they will set up shop on their own. In doing so they will destroy whatever chance Johnson might have at polling a majority Electoral-College vote. And I shall thank them for their good turn.

That's two.

THERE IS a third: George Wallace.

As I write - May 8 - there is, north of the Mason-Dixon, a virtual blackout on news copy relative to Wallace: they fear him just that much. No matter. Wallace is going beautifully. He is qualifying for the November ballot in State after State. In the past 60 days, his potential vote has risen by millions. He will sweep the South, from Virginia through Texas. He will do at least that well, baby, and thank you very much, you and your riotous kind.

AND SO IT will come to this: Following the November election (but before the Electoral-College vote is cast in December) there will be the most momentous meeting of this century, a true summit meeting. Lyndon Johnson (unless he is fatally ailing), Nelson Rockefeller and George Wallace will join in a vote-swapping, eyeball-to-eyeball confrontation. One of the three will emerge as the next President of the United States.

But who?

Well, now, let's see.

VALUES IN DISARRAY

In these mixed-up, turbulent times that distort truth and real values, the law-abiding and the respectable suffer and the violent and irresponsible receive praise or kind treatment.

An example of this is the pressure successfully applied on the International Olympics Committee to ban South African athletes from the games, even though they had been formally accepted for participation in the summer Olympics at Mexico City. The Olympics, which should stand for good sportsmanship, have had to bend before the winds of politics.

The banning of South African sportsmen is a cruel blow to the South African athletes of all colors and race who would have taken part in the games this summer. They have been discriminated against and denied an opportunity to excel in international competition.

The refusal to let the South Africans compete testifies to the degree to which our world is in disarray. The communist and Afro-Asian nations never miss an opportunity to force South Africa, a constitutional republic, into the pillory of "world opinion."

If nations are to be barred from the Olympics on the basis of their political records, responsible men can easily think of some prime candidates for banning. The first would be the Soviet Union, the country that holds millions of captive people in its grip - the nation that swallowed up the little states of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania and deported millions of men, women and children to Siberia.

Few of the black African nations would be exempt from banning if a strict political behavior rule were applied. Tanzania is a one-party state that gives communists a base for terrorist campaigns against its neighbors. Guinea is a communist dictatorship, as is Congo (Brazzaville). The Republic of the Congo (Kinshasa) is a tyranny with mixed elements of force and tribal terror.

Ethiopia is an absolutist monarchy where no one has any rights. Almost everywhere one looks on the African continent, one finds cruelty and despotism and backwardness in sub-Saharan Africa. Only in South Africa, Rhodesia and the Portuguese Provinces will one find civilization and the rule of law. These advanced nations and territories are condemned, however, because they will not accept the kind of governmental system that prevails elsewhere in Africa; they will not agree to give up and accept a return of primitivism. That's why the South Africans are banned from the summer Olympics.

The real tragedy is that some supposedly responsible people in Western countries are delighted that the South Africans are banned. They mistakenly view this vindictive action against a highly modern country, which spends more than any other African country on social services and education of all its people, as a victory for human rights. This reaction only indicates the extent to which logic is ignored in

our time.

We see the same phenomenon with respect to the law enforcement authority in our own country. For example, when the New York police finally were called in to remove radical students from Columbia University buildings, they didn't get any thanks for a tough and nasty job. On the contrary, Mayor John Lindsay of New York called for an investigation into charges of "police brutality." He apparently didn't find it expedient to order an investigation into the student groups that ran the red flag up over Columbia, who placed the communist hammer and sickle symbol on blackboards, who shouted "Lenin won; Fidel won; we'll win." No, the radicals were virtually excused; Mr. Lindsay upheld their right to "dissent."

It is a strange world, all right. Apparently academic freedom doesn't include the right of a university to maintain order on campus, hold classes and end student hoodlums. But, in the view of the prevailing "liberals," academic freedom involves toleration of sit-ins, wrecking college administration buildings, pulling down bookshelves for barricades, and screaming obscenities at police and students who want to study.

Confusion of basic values is one of the worst things that can happen in a free society. It means that society is being undermined. Such confusion took place at the end of the Roman Empire when the Dark Ages began to fall on Europe. Nowadays, it often seems that a new Dark Age is beginning, as the police are condemned, universities are terrorized, riots take place in great cities and anti-communist countries such as South Africa are victimized by political extremists. The outlook is very grim for the forces of civilization.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

House Concurrent Resolution No. 71

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI OF 1890 SO AS TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY AUTHORIZE THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF FACILITIES INCIDENT TO THE EXPLORATION, PRODUCTION OR TRANSPORTATION OF OIL, GAS OR OTHER MINERALS, UNDER PROPER AUTHORITY, IN ANY OF THE NAVIGABLE WATERS OF THE STATE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Mississippi for ratification or rejection in an election to be held on the first Tuesday of June, A.D., 1968, viz:

Amend Section 81 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 to read as follows:

"Section 81. The Legislature shall never authorize the permanent obstruction of any of the navigable waters of the State, but may provide for the removal of such obstructions as now exist, whenever the public welfare demands. This section shall

not prevent the construction under proper authority of drawbridges for railroads, other roads, nor the construction of booms, chutes for logs, nor the construction, operation or maintenance of facilities incident to the exploration, production or transportation of oil, gas or other minerals, nor the construction, operation and maintenance of bridges and causeways in such manner as not to prevent the safe passage of vessels or logs under regulations to be provided by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give notice of election in the manner and for the time as provided by Section 273 of said Constitution, and a special election is hereby called and to be held on the first Tuesday of June, A.D., 1968, for the purpose of submitting this amendment to the qualified electors of this State for approval or rejection; said election to be conducted and held as provided by law for statewide general elections.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION OF STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

House Concurrent Resolution No. 36

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTION 36 OF THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, SO AS TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL MEET IN ANNUAL LIMITED SESSIONS NOT TO EXCEED 125 CALENDAR DAYS FOR THE REGULAR 1972 SESSION AND EVERY FOURTH YEAR THEREAFTER AND 90 CALENDAR DAYS FOR ALL OTHER REGULAR SESSIONS THEREAFTER.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of June, 1968:

Amend Section 36 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 so that it will read as follows:

"Section 36. The Legislature shall meet at the seat of government in regular session on the Tuesday after the first Monday of January of the year A.D. 1970, and annually thereafter, unless sooner convened by the Governor; provided, however, that such sessions shall be limited to a period of one hundred twenty-five (125)

calendar days for regular 1972 session and every fourth year thereafter, but ninety (90) calendar days for every other regular session thereafter. Provided further that the house of Representatives, by resolution with the Senate concurring therein, and by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present and voting in each house, may extend such limited session for a period of thirty (30) days with no limit on the number of extensions to each session."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of said election in the manner, form and time as provided by law and Section 273 of said Constitution, and said election is hereby called and fixed to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of June, 1968, for the purpose of submitting this and other amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this State for ratification or rejection; said election to be conducted and held as provided by law for statewide general elections.

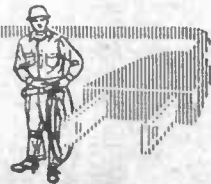

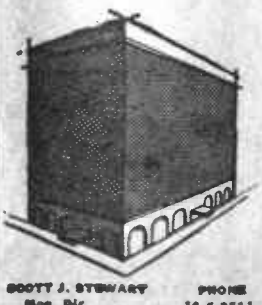

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION OF STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

House Concurrent Resolution No. 5

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTION 241, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO PROVIDE FOR ONE-YEAR RESIDENCY WITHIN THE STATE AND COUNTY AND A SIX-MONTH RESIDENCY WITHIN THE ELECTION PRECINCT TO BE A QUALIFIED ELECTOR; TO DELETE CERTAIN IMPROPER PARTS OF THE SECTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES PRESENT AND VOTING CONCURRING THEREIN, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for ratification or rejection, in an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of June, 1968, viz:

Amend Section 241, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, so that it will read as follows:

"241. Every inhabitant of this State, except idiots and insane persons, who is a citizen of the United States of America, twenty-one (21) years old and upwards, who has resided in this State for one (1) year, and for one (1) year in the county in which he offers to vote, and for six (6) months in the election precinct or in the incorporated city or town in which he offers to vote, and who is duly registered as provided in this article, and who has never been convicted of murder, rape, bribery, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods under false pretense, perjury, forgery, embezzlement or bigamy, is declared to be a qualified elector."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to file public notice of said election in the manner, form and time, as provided by law and Section 273 of the said Constitution, and said election is hereby called and fixed to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of June, 1968, for the purpose of submitting this and other amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this State for ratification or rejection; said election to be conducted and held as provided by law.

Supervisor's District No. Five not to exceed the sum of \$190,000.00 and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, to issue bonds in the principal amount of \$160,000.00 and not to exceed that sum for the construction of a factory for a metal fabricating plant type of industry containing sufficient square feet floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed One Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$190,000.00) Dollars for Supervisor's District No. Five and One Hundred Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars for the Town of Belmont, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as set forth in joint Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 541 issued by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 23rd day of April, 1968.

SECTION 3. That a special election shall be, and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held within said Supervisor's District No. Five on the 1st day of June, 1968, and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, on the 1st day of June, 1968, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District and Municipality the proposition set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section Five of this Resolution.

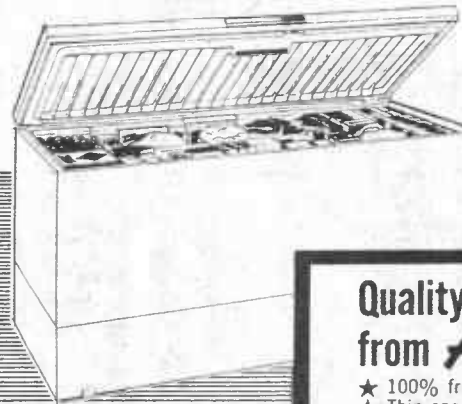
