WHY RESIDENTS OF THE FIFTH DISTRICT SHOULD VOTE FOR MORE INDUSTRY

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COWARDS IN
ACADEMIC GOWN

THE NATIONAL Academy of Science is made up of about 1,000 top-rated intellectuals, specialists, as their corporate name implies, in various scientific fields. It is a sort of high-toned union, no different, essentially, than the "academy" of hod carriers and brick layers except that the NAS presents itself as a pro-bono-publico outfit, truth seekers.

What else the Academy is, in fact, is not so noble. It is a conglomeration of moral cowards who, in this time of crisis, don't dare face the very thing they are supposed to seek, the truth.

As a consequence of their cowardice, the nation is undergoing a worsening, degenerating racial situation that can end only in the twin evils of anarchy, first, then tyranny.

It isn't that the National Academy of Science caused our race problems. Rather, it is that this prestigious organization has the ability to re-channel public thought into avenues that will lead to harmonious — at least, fair — race relations and lacks the courage to do so. If there is a worse indictment that could be drawn against a professional group, I don't know what it is.

LET ME illustrate: A few weeks ago, Dr. William B. Shockley, a Nobel-prize-winning physicist and Academy gad fly, challenged Academy members to discuss their organization's public position on race. That position holds there is "no scientific basis" for saying Negroes differ from Whites in basic intelligence. Dr. Shockley put his challenge in the form of a motion and of the hundreds of Academy members, not one would second it.

Were it that there is no known scientific basis for Dr. Shockley's proposal, or were it that the NAS is ignorant of the known facts, the death of Dr. Shockley's motion could be understood, if not approved. But they know — they know plenty. Fact of the matter, two other Academy members at the same gathering, the day before, had presented what they had timorously called "reasonable evidence" that the Negro child may inherit a poorer ability to learn than the White child.

But neither of these two seconded Shockley's motion —

neither these nor any others. And it died.

WHY SO much stress on the Academy's failure to act in this area? There is good reason:

The question Dr. Shockley put to them for resolution embodies the paramount issue of our time. Its irresolution is tearing apart our nation. Now, then. These people are the recognized authorities on such things. If they would make an impartial study and then release their findings they would set the stage for the demolition of one or the other of the two protagonists in this affair and in so doing also set the stage for racial peace based on justice.

In lay terms, by the facts disclosed through study, they would either shut the mouths of the likes of me, or they would cut the ground from under the likes of Earl Warren, LBJ, Hubert Humphrey, Bobbie Kennedy, Nelson Rockefeller, Dick Nixon, and all the rest of the pusillanimous, preacher-politicians.

The fact is this: Our country is going to hell in a racial handbasket and the one voice — The National Academy of Science — that could serve nobly as a catalyst to stop our descent can't find the courage to do so.

THIS IS NOT the first time Dr. Shockley has exposed the Academy's shining, weak heel. Some time ago he told the Academy it was like a patient who suspected tumor but lacked the courage to have a physical examination. There has been no rebuttal to that charge, either.

Why do you suppose the Academy is like that? Who is it afraid of? Me? Dr. Shockley? Carleton Putnam; Henry E. Garrett; W. C. George? Are they afraid of the handful who still cry against this crime? It isn't likely; we have no legions and precious little voice.

What, then? Isn't the answer self evident? And do you wonder I find myself with a growing contempt for those who pose as intellectuals — the groveling cowards.

Such is the legacy of The Liberal Establishment.

THE NCC'S IRRESPONSIBILITY

As concerned churchmen weigh the moral tragedy of widening violence and lawlessness in American cities, they cannot ignore the role of the National Council of Churches in recent years and months or fail to ask themselves whether the NCC has contributed to the breakdown in public order.

For those citizens who are acquainted with the positions adopted by the NCC in the area of political action, consideration of the subject is almost inevitable. Year by year, the NCC has been moving out of the realm of religious work and into the field of political policy-making and encouragement of direct political action. This situation has been clearly cited by the editors of "Christianity Today" in their comments on a recent meeting of the General Board of the NCC in San Diego, Calif.

According to "Christianity Today," "the San Diego sessions signaled a full-speed-ahead socio politico-economic drive by the General Board that may lead many churchmen to re-evaluate their support of the National Council of Churches."

At the meeting, the NCC adopted a report that called for U. S. trade and cultural exchanges with Red China, recognition of Communist Cuba, acceptance of the brutal Red regime in East Germany, removal of travel restrictions on Soviet citizens in the U. S., admission of Red China to the United Nations and reduction of American forces in the Far East. The communist world certainly could not have asked for a nicer report — from their standpoint.

But of special concern at this time are the actions of the NCC General Board with respect to the domestic scene. For example, the NCC increased support for poverty-rights action groups by Church Women United and gave financial backing to the National Urban Coalition. It called on local churches to provide "funds for local black groups to strategize for the summer" and to support "inclusion of black power and black nationalist organization in local task groups seeking action and solution to problems."

The General Board also called for observation of police behavior and reporting of any so-called police brutality. Churchmen were further urged by the NCC General Board to form action task groups to move on basic issues in cooperation with the "ghetto" community rather than through "white paternalism" programs.

In short, the General Board recommended a big package of programs that are highly political in content and controversial in character. Arthur S. Fleming, in presiding at the NCC meeting, frankly stated that "the church should become more and more involved in political action. We're going to push hard on this one."

Though the NCC professes to speak for 40 million Protestants, there is no real evidence that the

ordinary churchman believes as the General Board believes. Indeed there is a very strong and insistent grassroots protest in the churches against the increasingly-political and "ultra-liberal" nature of the NCC.

In the past, church programs were not regarded as material for public commentary. But the NCC has virtually ceased to be a religious organization in the accepted sense, and instead has become an instrument for political change and re-orientation of public opinion. Thus informed citizens, irrespective of their religious background, feel it entirely proper — indeed necessary — to discuss the political positions adopted by the NCC and distributed around the country in printed and broadcast form.

It is deeply unfortunate that the NCC has taken this political bent, for there is need of cooperation among churches and churchmen in works of charity and in discussion of spiritual questions. But religion and politics do not mix. Certainly the pulpit is not the place for a partisan plea in behalf of specific legislation or controversial public programs. The introduction of the content and spirit of politics into religious life simply drives out the element of genuine spirituality.

It is true that some churchmen in our time believe that they have a duty to be "activists." If activism is confined to good works, to giving a personal example by way of faith and dedication and love, then it always will be welcomed by men of good will. But activism that is defined in political terms and that manifests it by supporting movements and organizations that disrupt a nation or community — that kind of activism is contrary to everything for which religion is supposed to stand.

And when the NCC turns activist, in giving money and moral support to black power and black nationalist groups, it is contributing to the breakdown of peace and goodwill in the country. It is heaping coals on the fires of unrest and bitterness.

Thus the NCC, by its political involvements, is rejecting a ministry of reconciliation and is lending support to an angry confrontation in the streets that can only bring internal disaster to our free society based on the rule of law.

FIVE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED NINETY THOUSAND (\$190,000) DOLLARS AND THE TOWN OF BELMONT IN THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND (\$160,000) DOLLARS FOR SAID PURPOSE; AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICT AND MUNICIPALITY SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT FOR THE PURPOSE AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of said Town finds and adjudicates that, acting pursuant to provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi, of 1944, does hereby fix and determine the rights, powers and duties conferred and subject to the grant of permission and authority by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, at an election held for the purpose, has the power lawfully to issue the bonds of said Supervisor's District No. Five and for the purpose of constructing and establishing a factory for a metal fabricating plant type of industry as an industrial enterprise for Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, sufficient square feet floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed \$190,000.00 for District No. Five of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and \$160,000.00 for the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, Tishomingo County, Mississippi.

Supervisor's District No. Five not to exceed the sum of \$190,000.00 and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, to issue bonds in the principal amount of \$160,000.00 and not to exceed that sum for the construction of a factory for a metal fabricating plant type of industry containing sufficient square feet floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed One Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$190,000.00) Dollars for Supervisor's District No. Five and One Hundred Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars for the Town of Belmont, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as set forth in joint Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 541 issued by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 23rd day of April, 1968.

SECTION 3. That a special election shall be, and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held within said Supervisor's District No. Five on the 1st day of June, 1968, and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, on the 1st day of June, 1968, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District and Municipality the proposition set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section Five of this Resolution.

The qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing outside the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, shall vote separately from those residing within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and those qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, shall vote within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, including all of the qualified electors residing in the Fifth District who reside within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and the officers holding the election shall make separate returns of the results of the voting of those residing within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and those residing outside the Town of Belmont, Mississippi.

SECTION 4. That the said special election shall be held at the polling places designated and set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section Five of this resolution. After his death his widow went to Iuka to make her home with her son who was Dr. Walter Hodges. She died in 1894.

The house stood vacant until purchased by James Turner Blissit, Sr. in 1900. Since that time the Blissits have had memories of it as "The Home Place." The older children — four older girls — attended school in that community and their childhood memories therefore surround the place. All of them look to it as their birthplace. It is fitting to join Mother there for Mother's Day, and she having passed her 91st birthday, had the best day of all, the family stated.

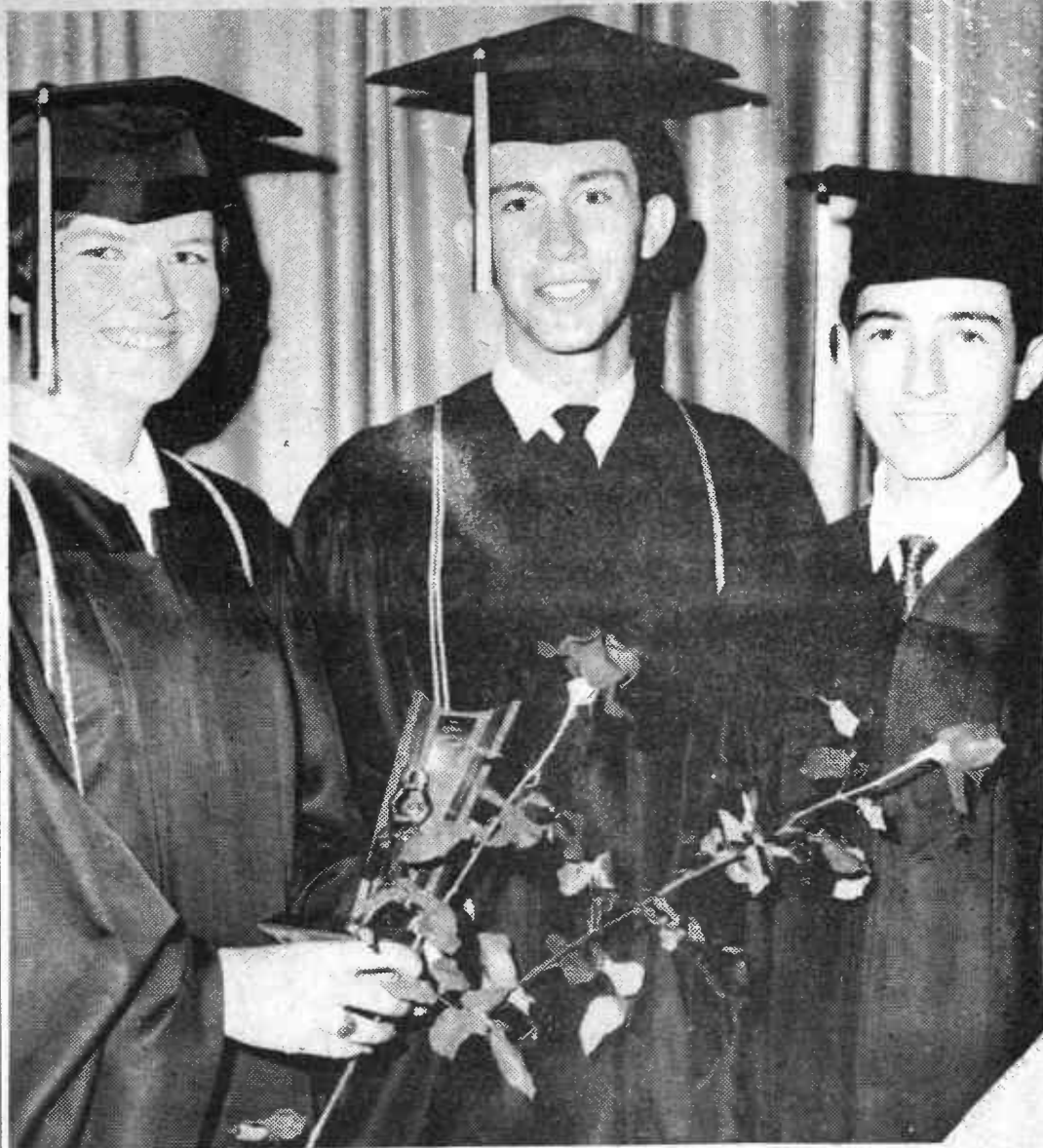

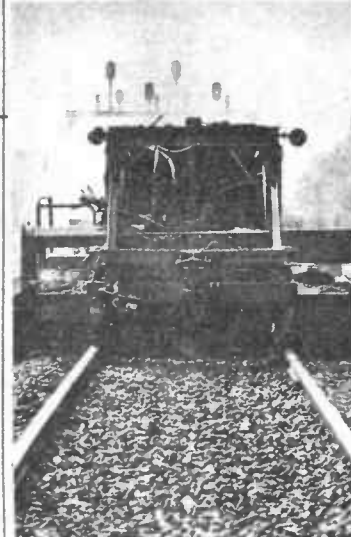
through the use of horn signals and radio. The T & S supervisor maintains constant radio contact with the front and rear units of the gang and also with Southern's dispatchers via microwave to coordinate the gang's operations with area train movements.

Highly coordinated and equipped with the latest in specialized machinery, Southern's T & S gangs replace worn crossties, rework ballast and align track to maintain the smooth, stable track and roadbed vital to modern high speed railroading.

Southern's three T & S gangs maintain all main and secondary track on the railroad on a five-to-seven year cycle. In practice, main line is worked every five years and the less heavily used track is refurbished at about seven-year intervals.

Timbering and surfacing work is planned a year in advance, therefore each division engineer and track supervisor knows at the start of the year exactly how much work will be done in his territory the next 12 months.

All phases of the work by T & S gangs have been in effect in Iuka during the past week. The job has just recently been completed and the gang has moved on down the line as they work their year's route. Accompanying photos show part of the local work as it went on.

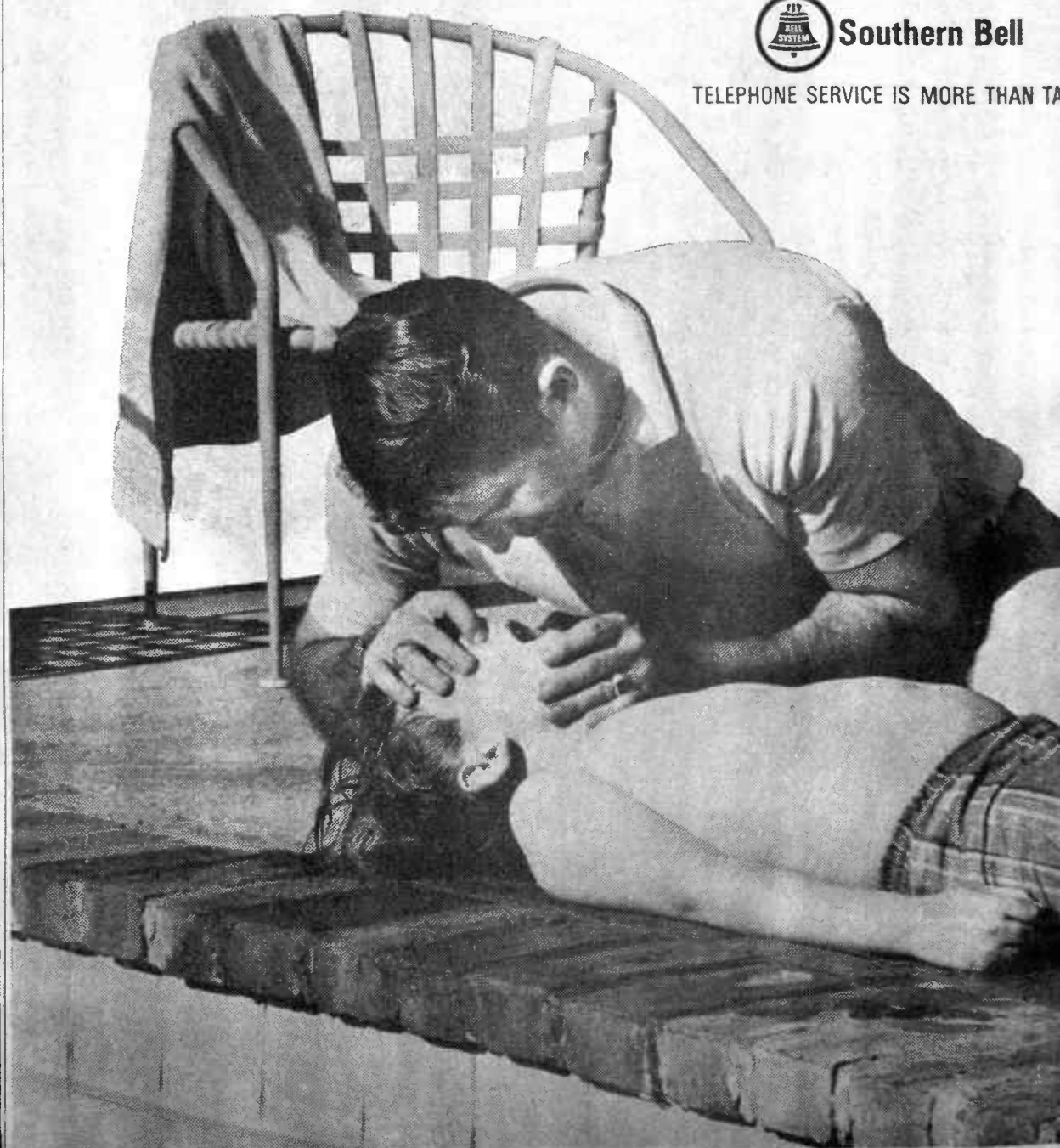
