New Judge To Be Named On June 4th

J. D. (Jack) Doty of Pontotoc is the only candidate in a special election to name a new chancery judge for Place Two in the First Judicial District of Mississippi.

This office was recently created by the legislature in an effort to give assistance to the present Chancery Judge Fred P. Wright of Amory. Unusual heavy dockets was the reason given for creating the new judgeship. There are seven Northeast Mississippi counties in the First Judicial District.

Action of the voters in this special election will be final. When elected, Mr. Doty will serve until the next general election for Chancery Court Judge. Full term is four years.

This special election will be held Tuesday and ballots will be cast at all precincts in the county. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.

Mr. Doty, for the past seven years, has been a professor on the faculty of the University of Miss. School of Law. He is a former district attorney for this district and is also a practicing attorney.

Special In 5th District Saturday

Possibly the most important election from a local standpoint to be held within the next few days is that of the \$350,000 bond issue for the Kaydee Metal Products Co. in the Fifth District. Voters will go to the polls this Saturday, June 1, in Belmont and at all precincts in the Fifth District to decide that issue.

A special effort is being made by the Belmont-Fifth District Chamber of Commerce to get everyone out to the polls to cast a ballot. In order for the issue to pass, 30 percent of the qualified voters must cast a ballot and of those voting, 60 percent must be in favor of the proposed enterprise.

Precincts at which voters will cast ballots are at Golden, Dennis, Cotton Springs, East Belmont, and Belmont. Residents inside the corporate limits of Belmont will also vote on the issue.

Constitutional Amendments Will Be Issue

Three proposed constitutional amendments will be on a special election ballot for voters in Mississippi in Tuesday's elections.

One deals with voter residency requirements, one with changing the legislative sessions and one with "construction, operation, and maintenance" in the development of mineral production in any of the navigable waters in the state.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 5 concerns voter qualifications and would enfranchise thousands of voters earlier. This is of particular interest to Tishomingo County and other northeast border counties. It would change the residence requirements to permit a person to vote after one year in the state and county and six months residence in his or her voting precinct.

Under existing laws, two years residence is required in both the state and voting precinct.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 36 is an amendment that will allow annual sessions of the legislature rather than the every-two-years regular sessions which is now the practice. The amendment would limit sessions to 125 calendar days in the first year of a new state administration and 90 days in the other three years.

There is an optional clause which would be possible to be extended for 30 days by two-thirds vote of the House and Senate, and there would be no limit on the number of extensions possible.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 71 deals with the development of mineral production in navigable waters in the state.

first started to work and needed every penny didn't like it at all. Employer took social security out of my wages. This was Wanda's first impression about the work.

Just a few days ago, she told the Welfare Office to take her and her son off Welfare rolls as she has earned and received disability benefits based on her work. What does she think of Social Security now? "I'm real proud," she said.

(Since Social Security records are all confidential, Mrs. Stanphill has consented for social security to publish her story, written with the aim of helping others, like herself know more about social security and its benefits.)

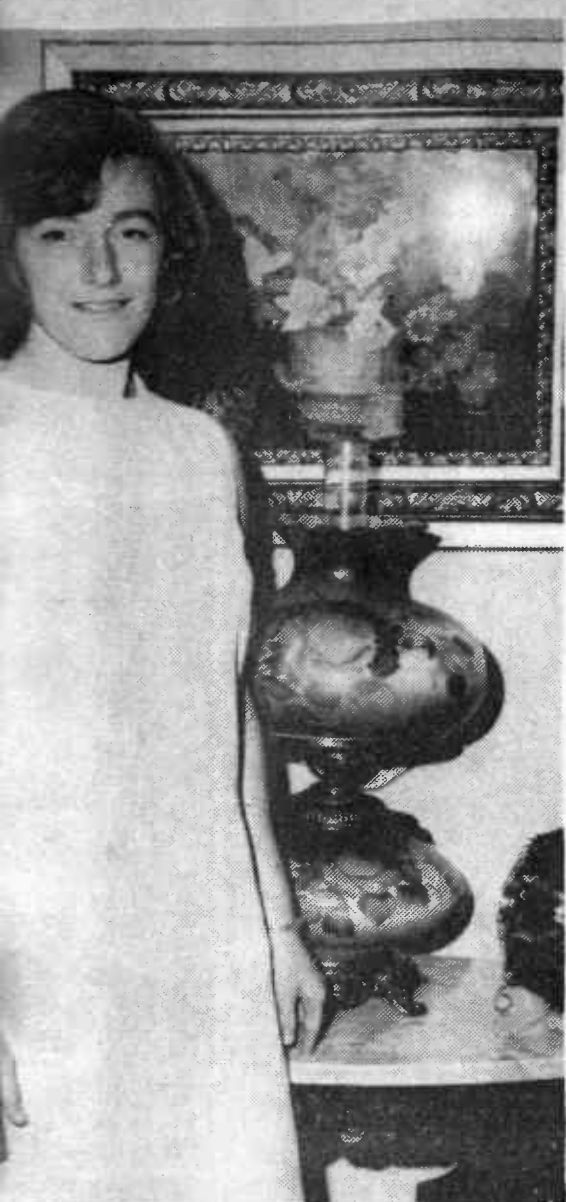

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTIONS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICT NO. FIVE OF SAID COUNTY AND THE TOWN OF BELMONT, MISSISSIPPI, FOR A JOINT ENTERPRISE TO ENTER UPON FURTHER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT: TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICT NO. FIVE IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED NINETY THOUSAND (\$190,000) DOLLARS AND THE TOWN OF BELMONT IN THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND (\$160,000) DOLLARS FOR SAID PURPOSE; AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICT AND MUNICIPALITY SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT FOR THE PURPOSE AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of said Town finds and adjudicates that, acting pursuant to provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi, of 1944, does hereby fix and determine the rights, powers and duties conferred and subject to the grant of permission and authority by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, at an election held for the purpose, has the power lawfully to issue the bonds of said Supervisor's District No. Five and for the purpose of constructing and establishing a factory for a metal fabricating plant type of industry as an industrial enterprise for Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, sufficient square feet floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed \$190,000.00 for District No. Five of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and \$160,000.00 for the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, Tishomingo County, Mississippi.

WHEREAS, the assessed value of all taxable property within said Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, as ascertained by the last completed assessment, is Town of Belmont \$1,194,635.00 and Fifth District \$1,560,123.00 and the amount of bonds hereinafter proposed to be issued by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. Five and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, when added to the present bonded indebtedness will not exceed Twenty (20) per centum of said assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Belmont has a population of less than Two Thousand (2,000) and the proposed enterprise is to be located within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICT NO. FIVE AND THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BELMONT, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF THE TOWN OF BELMONT, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That all of the findings of fact made and set forth in the preamble to this resolution shall be, and the same are hereby declared to be true and correct.

SECTION 2. That it is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. Five and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen acting for and on behalf of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, to issue the bonds of said

Supervisor's District No. Five not to exceed the sum of \$190,000.00 and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, to issue bonds in the principal amount of \$160,000.00 and not to exceed that sum for the construction of a factory for a metal fabricating plant type of industry containing sufficient square feet floor space to meet the needs of such industrial enterprise and to expend therefor a sum not to exceed One Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$190,000.00) Dollars for Supervisor's District No. Five and One Hundred Sixty Thousand (\$160,000.00) Dollars for the Town of Belmont, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as set forth in joint Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 541 issued by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 23rd day of April, 1968.

SECTION 3. That a special election shall be, and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held within said Supervisor's District No. Five on the 1st day of June, 1968, and the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, on the 1st day of June, 1968, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District and Municipality the proposition set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section Five of this Resolution.

The qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing outside the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, shall vote separately from those residing within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and those qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, shall vote within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, including all of the qualified electors residing in the Fifth District who reside within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and the officers holding the election shall make separate returns of the results of the voting of those residing within the Town of Belmont, Mississippi, and those residing outside the Town of Belmont, Mississippi.

SECTION 4. That the said special election shall be held at the polling places designated and set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section Five of this resolution. The polling places for said election shall be opened at seven o'clock in the morning and shall be kept open until the hour of six o'clock in the evening on the aforesaid date, and all qualified electors of Supervisor's District No. Five will be entitled to vote in said election. All qualified electors voting in said election shall vote at their usual voting precincts. The proposition submitted at said election shall be deemed to have been assented to, provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition within the Town of Belmont shall be at least thirty per cent (30%) of the total number of qualified electors residing within said Town and provided, further, that at least sixty per cent (60%) of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof, and provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition by those residing within said Supervisor's District No. Five outside the Town of Belmont, and provided, further that at least three fifths (3/5) of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof.

SECTION 5. REALITY VS.
CLEANLINESS

IF YOU HAVE a child aimed towards college, I have, here, something of interest. I have, that is, if your intention is to have your youngster taught cynical, low comedy, have him made a fool of. If that is what you want for your bud, enroll him in the drama department of Fairleigh Dickinson University, a New Jersey school that sits just west of New York.

See what you will get for your money at Fairleigh Dickinson: Last fall, this liberal arts institution imported 50 young Negroes, aged 17 to 22, in the hope of upgrading their mental deficiencies; in itself a well-meant act, misguided, perhaps, but defensible. The project was government sponsored, naturally, and was given the name High School Equivalent Program; HEP for short.

Well, sir. After seven months exposure to things academe, the 50 young blacks were marched on stage to face a battery of some hundreds of regular Fairleigh Dickinson students. They — the 50 — were to say howdy and be questioned. Questioned they were:

"Why can't the HEP students keep themselves clean?"

"Are the HEP students really interested in an education?"

"Why does the administration want them integrated in the dormitories?"

"Why does the administration want them to share the main classrooms with the regular student body?"

SUCH QUESTIONS, one may assume from the reaction, were not what the sponsors had hoped for. Indeed not; the unexpectedly pointed queries, as a matter of fact, sent two of the university's drama instructors into a UHF tizzy.

These two — one of whom is the bearded son of the late David J. McDonald, United Steelworkers boss — told their aspiring thespians that, as a result of the questions asked by the student body at large, they, the drama students, must offer a public apology in the name of all Fairleigh Dickinson or they — the drama students, mind you — would be given "incomplete" grades: "incomplete" being tantamount to failure.

McDonald said, as a result of such bigoted expressions, not

only must his students make the university's apology, but they must, as well, obtain from university authorities a promise to increase the enrollment of Negroes. And if the students failed in their assignment, that is, if they failed to make the administration knuckle under — zap! for all the students' fine posturings, their mellifluous, non-sibilant enunciations, their dramatic pauses, and their wagging ears and eyebrows, zap! the undergraduate artists would be flunked. What, upon enrollment, the aspiring actors had hoped would be instruction in "trod-ding" the boards would become, instead, an exercise in walking the plank.

How about that? That's higher education, right?

THE OTHER instructor involved in this zany farce, a high-falootin' gentleman named Evans, said that although the racial issue "doesn't fit directly" into his and McDonald's course material, the first step in studying drama — pronounced draw-ma — is "to begin examining reality". That's why, he said, the drama — pronounced draw-ma — students were given assignments such as clobbering the university's administrative authorities.

So that's academic reality: Whacking your superiors. Hail, Columbia! And I suppose it is. Fact is, the whole thing is far too real, and was too real right from the beginning, from the moment the 50 on-stage Negroes were asked that first question: "Why can't HEP students keep themselves clean?" That — cleanliness, or the lack thereof — is the very essence of reality. Or so it seems to me. Real and pungent.

Never mind the racist charges, Mc, the charges you and your tu-tu brother leveled at the curious young. Never mind that; first things first: one "real" thing at a time: How about that question? You demand reality, Thespis, what's the answer? Why can't HEP students keep themselves clean? There comes a time you know — or so the poet says — when even pigs may get up and slowly walk away.

AN OVERDOSE OF SOLICITUDE

One of the big success stories of recent years has been the technical education programs sponsored by the states and carried out with the cooperation and assistance of private enterprise. Great numbers of working people, whose occupations either weren't very rewarding or whose line of work has been virtually abolished by automation, have learned new skills and found new employment in industry.

These technical training programs have proved to be a roaring success whereas the heavily funded War on Poverty programs have been a dismal failure. Part of the reason why is that the former are dealing with the best type of human material — people who are eager to work. Fortunately, despite all the brainwashing the American people have been subjected to on welfareism, the vast majority of our citizens want to work. They are what the sociologists call inner-directed. They prefer to stand on their own feet and support themselves rather than be supported by the federal government.

There is, however, a very different element in this country — an element that might be described as the hard core non-worker. These are the people who are drones. Nowadays, it isn't fashionable to refer to anyone as a drone. The "bleeding hearts" really begin to bleed if anyone suggests that some people are bums who want a free ride through life. Yet the drones are a reality.

Every society has had the problem of this element to some degree. Not all people are equally motivated. In the past, the sharp edge of poverty limited the size of the non-productive drone population. There were absolute conditions of hunger and privation that drove men to take a job even though they preferred to stay in bed in the morning. Today this sharp edge of reality has been blunted. A maze of social services reduce even the most severe "poverty," in today's terms, to relative deprivation — to not having as much as the next fellow.

The man or woman who doesn't want to work will find reality cushioned by federal handouts. He will be encouraged to believe that his difficult lot in life is the fault of society, not his own fault. Working citizens are told that their failure to provide more and bigger benefits for the non-workers is evidence that this is a sick society and an immoral society. They are told that they have an obligation to make a commitment of personal service to the economically or socially "disadvantaged."

Certainly, charity always is a worthy thing. But it is not charitable in any true sense to encourage people in their laziness or to make the self-reliant citizen feel that he is immoral in not wanting to pay for more handouts.

We have the strange situation today wherein a flood of tears is shed for the shiftless, for the sit-down specialists in society. The

whole rhetoric of contemporary social preaching is off-base. Thus self-reliant citizens are told that they are committing violence when they don't do more for the "disadvantaged." Yet no one cites the violence being done to our society when a woman has five or six children out of wedlock and gives no thought to how they will be fed and housed.

It is time for an end to be put to the excessive solicitude lavished on people who make a career of dependency in our society. The cultivation of warped values is damaging this country as much as a foreign enemy could do with bullets and shells. This thought must have been in the minds of countless viewers who watched the television coverage of the Poor People's Caravan and heard one woman say she was joining the pilgrimage because her husband earned "only \$100 a week."

This remark indicates very clearly the escalation of non-sense in America. Each year, the government does more to help the non-workers; and each year government heaps larger burdens on working citizens who generate the country's income. At the same time, sociologists and the "liberal" clergymen protest louder and louder against employing the carrot or the stick method to get the drones element to support themselves. Efforts to make responsible citizens feel guilty about the non-workers are continuously intensified.

The United States will have to get off the guilt "dick." What is in order now is less sympathy for all types of drop-outs in our society and more sympathy for those who busy themselves with working and learning and advancing themselves, their families and communities. The doers in life deserve a break.

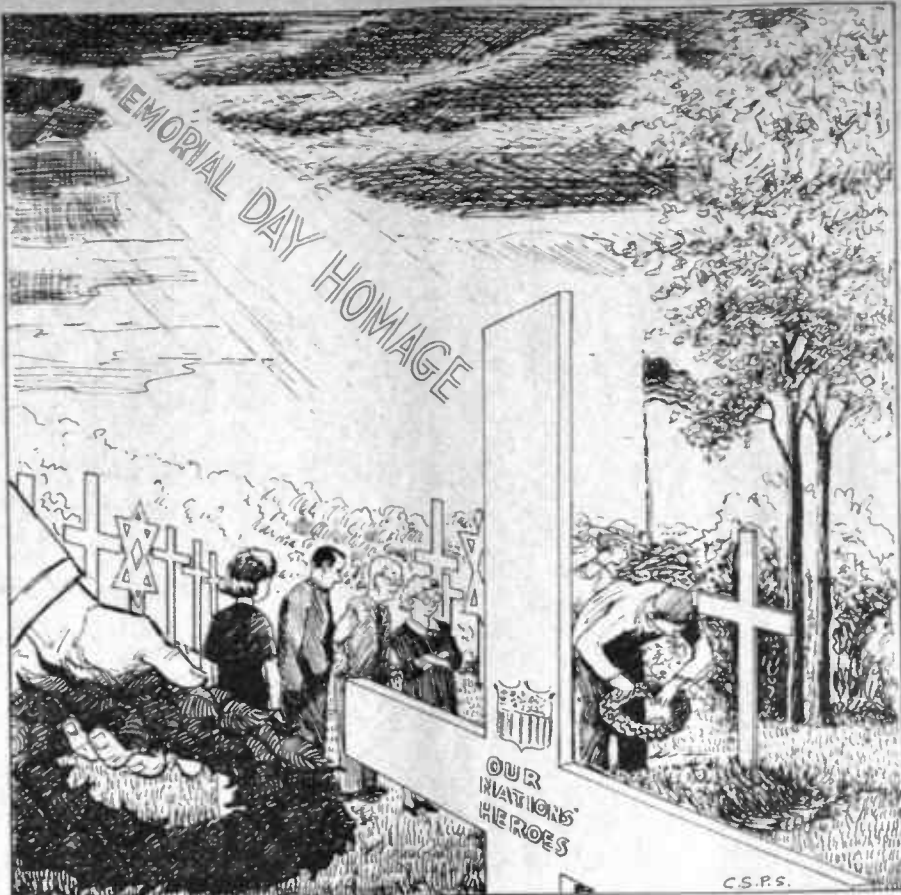
PAIN & SORROW

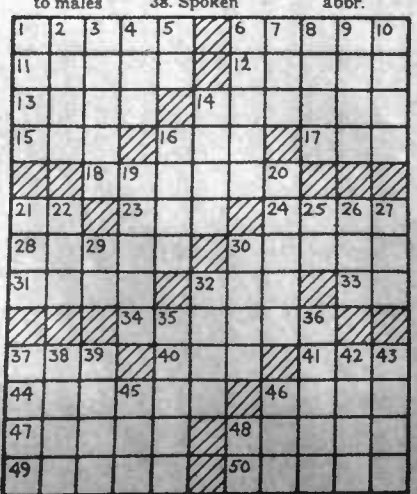

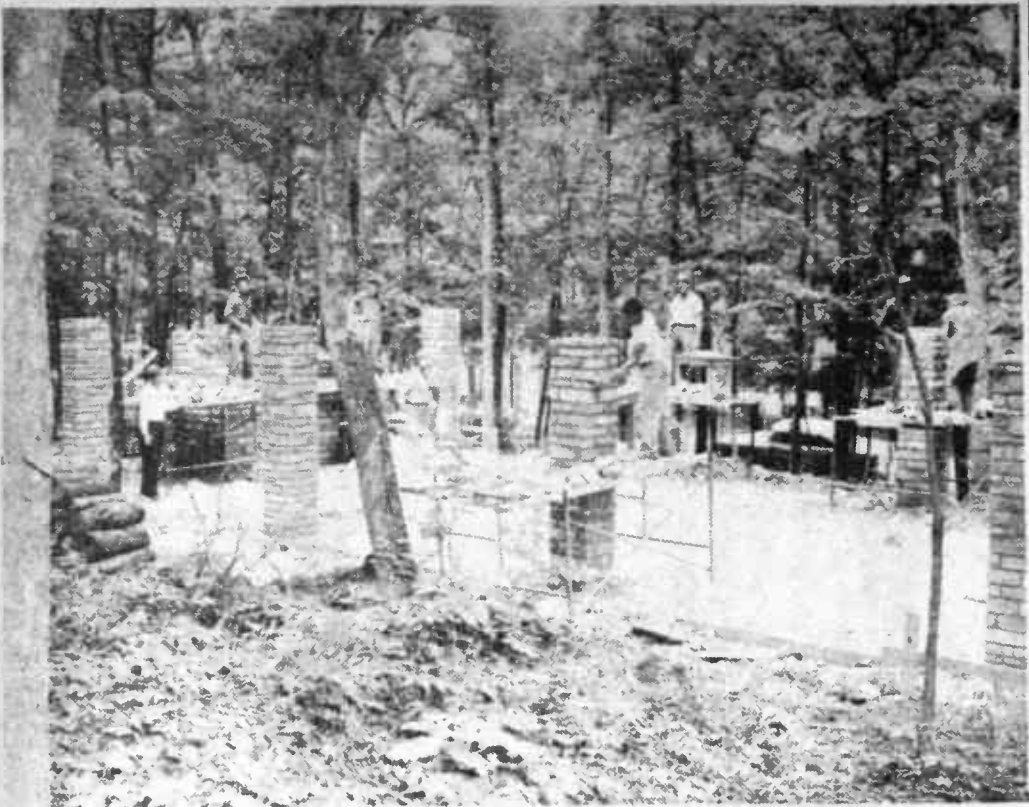

Q. I have been told that sinusitis is the same as a head cold, and that it will go away in a couple of weeks. I have constant pain above my eyes and have recently noticed considerable swelling around my eyes. Would this be classified as a head cold or sinusitis?

A. Sinusitis, or infection of the sinuses of the head, is not the same as a head cold, nor is it an involvement of the nasal passages but rather it involves the small cavities located in the bones of the skull. The symptoms are headache, nasal discharge, watering of the eyes, pain and tenderness over the affected areas, swelling of the jaw, and protrusion of the eyes. Medical treatment of sinusitis comprise nose drops, antibiotics, and in some cases a surgical procedure to provide temporary relief by draining the affected sinuses.

Chiropractic procedures have been very effective in relieving the pain of sinusitis. Research shows that of the cases treated for sinusitis, 83.2% for completely well or much improved, 11.8% showed noticeable improvement, while only 5% of all cases studied did not respond to treatment.
