Constitutional Amendments Pass

Tishomingo county went with the balance of the state in endorsing three constitutional amendments in special elections held Tuesday.

Questions voted on were House Concurrent Resolution No. 5 which is designed to change the voting requirements from two years' residency in the state to one year and from one year residency in a precinct to six months. Incomplete statewide tabulations at presstime Wednesday afternoon were 117,825 for, to 51,359 against. Tishomingo county's vote on this amendment was 484 for, to 120 against.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 36 which will change State Legislative sessions from once every two years to a session each year, drew the smallest total vote in the state. Incomplete tabulations Wednesday afternoon were 85,016 for, to 80,383 against. Our county vote on this one was 385 for, to 216 against.

Yellow Creek Port Given Approval By Legislature

The long-sought riverport on Yellow Creek is fast approaching a reality with passage this week of a measure in the House of Representatives which will permit the State Agricultural and Industrial Board to assist in the development of inland riverports.

The Bill, steered to passage by Rep. J. A. (Bud) Thigpen of Cleveland, is similar to one approved previously by the Senate in action last Friday.

Rep. Thigpen said the project would be financed by TVA putting up \$5.3 million and a \$1.5 million bond issue authorized by the A&I Board. He further stated that the inland ports act passed this week has statewide application but was primarily designed to help pave the way for the proposed Yellow Creek Port.

Situated at Piney Point, the port will be located on land owned by TVA. The port facility will be joined to the Southern Railroad with a connecting rail spur terminating near Burnsville.

The Bill passed Monday by the lower House, provides that any three counties, working with the A&I Board, may enter an agreement under which an additional local tax of up to two mills could be levied to pay deficits which might occur in operation of the port. Rep. W. A. Stevens of Corinth said the counties of Tishomingo, Alcorn and Prentiss already have expressed an intent to go into the Yellow Creek venture.

In the event three counties do not wish to participate, the act allows the state to enter an agreement with any master water management district such as the Tombigbee Valley Water Management District.

Mr. Thigpen further stated that the Yellow Creek port would be a great economic impact to northeast Mississippi. "It is possible that 15 industries now in the area would use the port, and proceeds from the port could be used to retire bonds," he said.

1200 POUNDS! — Eight Game Wardens took part in a giant "catch" Monday night of this week on Bear Creek. Troy Lee Johnson of Iuka was arrested and charged with illegal fishing and illegal nets. Johnson was released from the Tishomingo County jail on bond. The 1200 pounds of fish pictured above were distributed by the wardens to the Tishomingo County Home and the Tishomingo County Hospital. According to the report, Johnson was using about 5 illegal nets. The wardens confiscated the fish, nets and a 95 hp Mercury motor and commercial boat around 5:45 Tuesday morning after an all night

watch which began around 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. The wardens witnessed Johnson and a companion go out in the Bear Creek-Fish Trap Hollow area with the nets and then kept watch throughout the night. Johnson was picked up the following morning after the haul but his companion "hit the water" and escaped. Game Wardens assisting with the catch were Roy Chatham and James Leathers of Itawamba County; Lyle Pippin and Earl Womack of Prentiss; Charles Rhinehart of Alcorn; and Reece Grisham, L. D. Phifer and C. E. Marlar, all of Tishomingo County.

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WHAT IS NEW IN ACADEMIC CIRCLES

Read the roster of collegiate race developments as reported by U. S. News for just one week in May. See if you can divine what is common to all of them; beyond the obvious, that is:

• Students dodging bullets in Chicago schools ("You would have thought you were in Vietnam"); in Cincinnati (demonstrations triggered by the suspension of four unruly students); in East St. Louis (bomb threats); in South Bend (72 adults and 59 juveniles arrested); in Pittsburgh, Calif. (11 schools closed).

• In Flint, Michigan (police called to unhitch 200 Negroes who had taken over a school cafeteria); in Detroit ("The number of episodes involving physical attack on teachers by students is now about 160 a year"); in New York City (violence is commonplace, from which has come "a hardening of attitude on the part of many teachers"); in Los Angeles (mounting concern about violence against teachers, vandalism, walkouts and other troubles); in Washington (teachers demanding guarantees of their physical safety).

The above are all high-school troubles, mind you, but that is not what I want you to look for.

Try the college troubles for the same week, see if you can spot the common factor among them:

• In New York City (Columbia's student upheaval virtually paralyzed the university for weeks); in Evanston, Ill. (Northwestern University Negroes demanding — note this — segregated dormitories, seized the university's business office to enforce their will. The authorities capitulated); in Stanford, Calif. (200 students rushed a university administration building in protest over the suspension of seven students).

• In Carbondale, Illinois (So. Illinois University students, 500 of them, were repulsed by police for attempting to storm the president's office. The trouble grew out of the university's refusal to allow Stokeley Carmichael to speak on campus); in Cheyney, Penna., (Cheyney State College, a Negro school, saw 400 students take over the administration building. A protest leader said: "There is nothing racial involved").

• In Princeton, New Jersey (1,000 students massed to de-

mand a turnover of power); in Trenton, New Jersey (more than 2,500 students from six State-supported colleges marched on the New Jersey capitol to demand more funds for "higher education"); in Denver, Colorado (a "student rights" sit-in was attempted at the University of Denver; police were called and 40 demonstrators were arrested and expelled on the spot).

That is the way it went in the academic world, as reported by U. S. News, during one week in May.

Now, then. What do you notice common to all of these incidents? Check the list and you will see every one occurred outside the South.

When in 1963-64, I had the high honor of being the only Washington lobbyist registered in opposition to the Civil Rights Bill, I tried repeatedly to make my point with Northern Senators. I told them, demonstrated to them: The real thrust of the integrationists is aimed at the North, not the South; that there is little the radicals want, south of the Mason-Dixon; that the cry "Mississippi" is a shibboleth, nothing more; and if they allowed the bill to become law, they would see proof of my argument. Perhaps some of them remember, now, as the chickens they incubated come home to roost.

Such is the legacy of The Liberal Establishment.

THE OMNIBUS CRIME CONTROL BILL

The massive 72 to 4 vote by which the U. S. Senate passed a sweeping crime control bill reflects that body's awareness of the people's desire that lawlessness be curbed. No matter what happens in the Senate-House conference committee, or when the bill reaches President Johnson's desk, it is clear that the country has turned a corner. Members of Congress realize, at long last, that truly decisive action must be taken to curb crime.

Senator Sam J. Ervin (D-NC) in arguing for passage of the bill, spelled out the crime situation confronting the country. Referring to an FBI chart, he said: "It shows that while the population of the United States has increased 48 per cent, serious crimes — murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny of property of the value of \$50 or more, and auto theft — have increased 368 per cent." Large parts of many American cities are unsafe. Hoodlumism is rampant. Obviously, strong measures are needed to remedy these conditions.

One of the most important features of the crime control bill passed by the Senate is provision for overturning Supreme Court decisions on the admissibility of confessions. These decisions limit the use of confessions by police and also limit the use of line-up identification. Under the Senate-passed bill, a trial judge would determine whether a confession was given voluntarily and whether eye witness identification was admissible.

Law enforcement agencies have been enormously handicapped by the Supreme Court decisions on these matters. Senator Ervin also spelled this out very clearly in the Senate debate. Quoting a federal judge in the District of Columbia, the Senator declared:

"He said that the courts have stopped trying to determine whether the accused in criminal cases are innocent or guilty of the crimes charged. He said the courts have to spend all their time trying to determine whether the police officers of the District violated one or the other of these recently elected rules."

The rules newly invented by the U. S. Supreme Court are a boon to criminals of all types. Among other things, they deprive the state of the most convincing evidence that can be obtained, namely, a voluntary confession of the accused that he committed the crime of which he is accused. Only in this era of judicial nonsense, would the nation's highest court place an absurd ban on voluntary confessions. The ban is contrary to everything the nation's courts have accepted since the founding of the United States.

It is important, of course, to protect the rights of the accused. But there has to be a balance struck between the rights of the individual and the rights of society to be free from terrorization by criminal elements.

In recent years, there has been

a vast amount of judge-made law that has upset this balance and stripped society of protection that is essential. The Supreme Court has placed so many legal impediments in the way of law enforcement agencies that criminals know they enjoy a virtual mandate to commit crime. Nor has the trend toward impeding the police shifted in any way. On the contrary, the Supreme Court and radical legal activists increasingly insist on new restrictions on society's agencies created to preserve law and order. In the recent riots, for example, activists have campaigned for massive legal aid to rioters and for turning them loose almost as soon as they have been arrested.

A country's legal system does not exist in a vacuum. Not only does it derive from the fundamental law of the land — the Constitution — but it has to take into consideration the basic reasons for which a government of laws is created. The individual

lies in a society based on law and that cannot exist without peace and good order. In other words, a society's right of self-protection against disorderly and lawless elements is fundamental.

Without the crime control bill, approved by the Senate, our free society will be at a terrible disadvantage in the struggle with criminal elements. Unless the absurd and hurtful decisions of the Supreme Court are overturned, crime will have a field day. If nothing is done to buttress law enforcement agencies, crime will increase year by year. Finally, the republic will be destroyed from within.

It is no wonder, therefore, that 72 U. S. Senators decided that the time had come to help promote the cause of law and order by passage of a tough anti-crime bill.

Is it possible to wave the flag too much? Provided, of course, that you wave it with integrity? Is it possible to study Lincoln or Shakespeare too much? Is it possible to read the Bible too much? The great, the good, the true, are inexhaustible for inspiration, example and strength. I believe that we are not waving our flag enough, not nearly enough. It seems to me that we are developing a tendency to be timid or even apologetic about waving the stars and stripes. Walk up and down the streets on July 4th and count the flags. It is our nation's birthday, a sacred day in world history, the most important day of America. Why isn't the flag flying on every rooftop and from every home and building? This complacent attitude is strong evidence of cancerous patriotic decay. The flag is a symbol of our national unity. It is the spirit of our undying devotion to our country. It stands for the best that is in us . . . for loyalty, character, and faith in democracy. Isn't our flag a synonym of the United States of America? Does it not represent man's greatest, noblest, most sublime dream? Is it not the zenith of achievement, the goal to which generations have aspired? Ladies and gentlemen, I believe it is time for us . . . for the mad, rushing Twentieth Century American . . . to stop for a moment and think. Let us arrest our near reverential admiration of material success and return to the spiritual and ethical values. Let us imbue and rekindle in ourselves and our children the so-called old-fashioned way of patriotism, a burning devotion to the principles and ideals upon which our country was founded. Should not every home own and proudly display the colors on holidays and other such occasions? Isn't the flag Patrick Henry, Jefferson, Franklin, Washington, Nathan Hale, Gettysburg and Valley Forge, Paul Revere, Jackson and other great men and women who have given us our heritage. When you look at the flag can't you see the Alamo, Corregidor, Pearl Harbor, The Monitor, The Merrimac, Wake Island, and Korea? Lest we forget, isn't the flag Flanders Field, Bataan, Iwo Jima, Normandy, Babe Ruth and Davy Crockett? The great events of our past and present are wrapped up in our flag. It is a symbol of this blessed nation, a giant in industry, education and commerce. Millions of fertile square miles, wheatlands, coal mines, steel plants. Our great republic, the chosen infant destined to be man's last and remaining hope for suffering humanity, a shining beacon of light, noble and glorious, the haven for the oppressed and persecuted and truly God's gift to mankind. That is what the flag means to me. Can we wave it too much? I don't think so.

Dairy Herds Decline In State and County

According to a report made by the Mississippi Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, there were 1,966 Grade "A" Dairy herds in the state as compared to 2,131 on January 1, 1967, and 3,939 on January 1, 1958. This is a decrease of approximately 6 percent from January 1, 1967, but a decline of about 49 percent since 1958.

The service reports that in Tishomingo County there are 9 such Grade "A" dairy herds as of the first of this year. In 1958 and 59, there were 15 herds. The figure dropped to 13 herds in 1959 and rose to 16 herds in 1961 where it stayed until 1964 when the figure dropped to 14. It stayed at this number for two years and in 1966 fell to 11 and in 1967 to 9 where the number still stays.

In Alcorn County, there are 21 Grade "A" Dairy Herds as

of the first of this year. For years 1958 to 1968, the figures ranged from 54, 49, 48, 42, 42, 41, 28, 27, 36, 23 and the 21 of this year.

Itawamba County reports a total of 5 Grade A Dairy herds as of the first of this year. Corresponding figures for the years 1958-1968 are 19, 18, 17, 15, 12, 12, 9, 9, 6, 5 and 5 this year.

Of the neighboring counties, prentiss has the highest number of Grade A Dairy herds. Beginning with 1958 and running thru 1968 the figures show 34, 37, 38, 33, 35, 36, 35, 34, 37, 34, and 31 for the corresponding year.
