## Report TVA Port Project

among Federal, state and local agencies, with revenues from the project repaying the Federal and state investment. Yellow Creek, an embayment of Pickwick Lake, is the point where the proposed Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway would meet the present Tennessee River Waterway. There are no barge terminals now on the Mississippi shore of the Tennessee River Waterway. The report says a public port "could make a tremendous contribution to the economic potential of the area, as water-transportation-using industries are traditionally high-wage firms." The port facility and associated industrial sites ultimately could serve new industries employing more than 2,800 with an annual payroll of more than \$20 million, the studies indicate. Fifteen existing industries in the vicinity also could economically use the port. The plan of development envisions about 12 miles of railroad connecting the river terminal to existing Southern Railway tracks. This would provide a combination of barge, rail, and highway transportation access to large acreages of land suitable for industrial sites. Estimated cost of the overall plan, including purchase of industrial lands, is about \$7 million. The economic benefits are estimated at \$45 million.

Ground breaking ceremonies were held at the construction site of the new Kaydee Metal Products Company which will locate east of the Illinois Central railroad and north of Belmont, just off Highway 25.

## WALLACE AND THE NETWORK SHYLOCKS

IT OCCURS to me, come November, many people will vote for George Wallace who would not otherwise do so simply because of the shoddy treatment extended him by those who bear a public trust.

Americans, by and large, are fair-minded people who have an adverse reaction when they see the under-dog kicked around. Enough of that and Wallace will reap a harvest of votes he might not otherwise receive.

The latest incident has to do with the attempt to repeal the "equal-time" provision guaranteed all presidential candidates under Section 315 of the Communications Act. The repealer already has passed the senate and should be voted on by the house, this month.

Why do you suppose they want to abolish that provision — particularly at this time? You hear, in answer, a great deal of pious talk about splinter candidates cluttering up the air waves, etc. But that is just so much hogwash. The likes of Harold Stassen, and the Tax-Cut Party, and the Back-To-God Party (the number of such splinters runs to 20 or more), such as these can't raise enough money to rent a tent, let alone pay the exorbitant rates charged by the network shylocks.

WHAT IF they succeed? What practical effect would repeal have? This effect: Mr. Shylock could pick his own candidate, put him on the air, morning, noon, and night, at no charge — and exclude the remainder. But Mr. Shylock would not be so abrupt as that: restricting facilities to a single candidate. Dearie me, no. He would give you two from which to choose: Mr. Tweedle-dee and Mr. Tweedle-dum — and then ask you what could be fairer than that. In the doing he would make a great to-do over his "impartiality", his "fairness", his "public service" in donating — not charging for — his good deeds. And what of George Wallace?

George Wallace? With Section 315 repealed? Who he?

Who is he? He is the only major candidate who offers the people a choice. The shylocks know this. They also know that Wallace, as a choice, is not the choice they, the shylocks, prefer. And in truth, Wallace, as a choice, may not be the choice the American people prefer. But that is for the people to say, and not the

networks, and not the congress either.

THIS SAME shoddy conspiracy can be seen in the roadblocks the two "major" parties have placed in the path of "splinter" candidates who seek to qualify for ballot position in the various States.

Whatever minute differences there may be between the Republican and Democratic parties, they are in accord in one respect: They don't want a third force hornoring in on their playground. As a result, many State legislatures — Democrats and Republicans to a man — have fixed it so it is almost impossible for an outsider to qualify. Ohio comes to mind. Wallace, to qualify in Ohio, must gather over four-hundred thousand signatures of qualified voters.

Well, I have news for Ohio as I have for the network shylocks. Wallace will get his 412,000 signatures in Ohio — as he surmounted insurmountable difficulties in California — and public opinion will force the freeze-out artists to allow him fair time on the air.

There is a deep and an abiding determination abroad in this land. People are fed up with these "pusillanimous pseudo-intellectuals" and a lot of politicians (and network bigwigs) will be ground under before this public anger has run its course. Insurrection City, indeed!

George Wallace will be heard. The American people's sense of fair play will see to that. Nothing will stop him.

### THE LESSON OF FRANCE

The chaos that has overtaken the French Republic is a grim warning to free men everywhere that anarchism, unless promptly and firmly curbed, can destroy the most solid structures of government and disrupt the most prosperous countries.

No excuse existed for revolutionary upheaval in France. In the last decade, the French economy has moved forward steadily. The French people are better off financially than ever before. More young people have access to higher education than at any time in the history of the country. Nevertheless, France has been torn apart by disorders.

Why? To be sure, France has tolerated a large and active Communist Party. As a result, many working men in France still are influenced and conditioned by Marxist ideas. But the regular Communist Party of France did not spark the explosion in early May. It began at the University of Paris and had its roots in the Anti-American agitation of leftist students opposed to U. S. involvement in the Vietnam struggle. Only when the student anarchist disorders began to grow in size did the regular Communist Party organization order major strikes and take over the control of the disorders.

The anarchist groups that have been creating small-scale violence in France for over a year were not taken seriously by the French authorities. So long as the USA was the target of demonstrations, the De Gaulle government apparently didn't mind a little disorder and lawlessness. It learned the bitter lesson that a little strife soon grows into a monster of strife.

In the United States, good citizens can only hope that governmental authorities and heads of educational institutions will learn from the French experience. The groups of anarchists and civil disobedience advocates in American colleges and universities are numerically small. Too often they are dismissed as insignificant. Well, Columbia University at long last discovered that the anarchists aren't insignificant at all.

It takes only one individual yelling "fire!" in a crowded theater to cause a disaster that takes a terrible toll of life. And it takes only a scattering of organized, violence - inclined groups to upset great universities and throw chaos into towns and cities.

Most Americans don't understand the conspiratorial mentality. They don't grasp that the anarchists and civil disobedience types think along totalitarian lines — that is to say, that they are planning actual war within our country. Most Americans think in terms of practical discussions and sensible negotiations. But the radicals in the universities are like the North Vietnamese communists at the Paris conference table — they believe in total war to the end. The anarchists are playing for the highest stakes — the destruction and takeover of western

society. The example of France shows how far small militant groups can go in creating havoc. The example of Columbia University, which has been crippled, provides further confirmation.

It is not clear what else the anarchists may be planning in the United States this summer, but they surely will not be idle. It is possible, even likely, that they will try to repeat the Columbia University performance at the nominating conventions of the two national political parties. They may try their force methods as an attempt to demand political concessions from the convention delegates.

On the college and university front, however, it is time that responsible citizens realize that they cannot just stand on the sidelines and deplore what has taken place. A writer for "Barron's Financial Weekly" has spoken to this point. "Now is the time for intelligent counter-action," said the writer for "Barron's." "One means is to withhold financial support from colleges which condone or compromise with student terror tactics."

College and university trustees are under heavy pressure from the Left. Radical faculty members, as well as the militant students, are threatening strikes and other forms of intimidation. The trustees need to know that alumni and the general public feel very strongly on the subject of law and order in educational institutions.

At Columbia University, the students who want to study and oppose the radical rioters are organizing. Such students at Columbia and elsewhere deserve assistance from alumni and other interested students. Efforts should be widened to get the views and proposals of these law-abiding students into the news media. As the writer for "Barron's" declared, "A free society cannot survive unless men of reason rally to its defense."

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor:

Since the death of Mrs. Lurleen Wallace, Governor of the state of Alabama, Tuesday, May 7, 1968, I have watched almost all of the TV news programs in hopes of seeing films of this wonderful woman and her family. I waited for the President of the United States to issue a statement proclaiming a day of sorrow as he did for Martin Luther King. I was very disappointed that Governor Wallace's funeral was not shown live for the American people to see. It appears to me that this is discrimination.

The network diverted seven hours to Martin Luther King (live coverage), including scores of political public figures, and it seemed important that the President be represented by Vice-President Humphrey. In my opinion, Governor Wallace should have been given the respect at least equal to Martin Luther King.

I cannot recall any other government official dying when our American flag was not flown half mast. I do not recall when the President of the United States ever proclaimed a day of mourning for anyone (other than King).

I think the news media (radio and TV) have discriminated in the coverage of the death and funeral of Governor Wallace. I wonder if a governor of one of the northern, eastern or western states died, would he be given as little recognition as Governor Wallace received. I thought it was very rude for the civil rights march to have been sponsored at all under the circumstances, and especially to have continued on to Montgomery.

I cannot help but wonder if the news media is afraid to show the Wallace story for fear it will give George C. Wallace some free publicity.

We are facing a serious situation when Miss Jane Reeder, a school teacher in Trenton, N. J., can be dismissed for expressing her own views with reference to the eulogy of Martin Luther King, and also the dismissal of Howard Miller, a disc jockey in Chicago, for expressing his views.

I wonder what the future of the country will be if Rap Brown, Stokely Carmichael and other known agitators are permitted to openly denounce the United States and not be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law as has been the policy.

What influence would Martin Luther King have on President Johnson that would cause him to delay his important "peace" trip to Hawaii while so many of our boys are dying on the battlefield?

## New Interest Rates On Savings Bonds

R. A. McRee, Jr., the County Chairman of Tishomingo County's Savings Bonds Committee, calls the public's attention to the announcement by President Johnson regarding the new interest rates on United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares.

The interest rate on Series E and H Savings Bonds was raised from 4.15% to 4.25%, and the new Freedom Shares will pay 5%. The new rate applies to all Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares bought on or after June 1, 1968. The 4.25% rate also applies to all outstanding Series E and H Bonds for remaining time to next maturity. It does not apply to Freedom Shares bought from May 1 through May 31, 1968. The holders of these, however, after they have held them 1 1/2 years, will draw more than 5% to their 4 1/2 year maturity. They would not gain anything to cash them in and buy new Freedom Shares.

The County Chairman said April sales of Savings Bonds in Mississippi were the highest in 12 years, and 1968 sales the highest in 8 years. He said, "People

who really want to save find that a systematic program is the most desirable way. That's why the Payroll Savings and Bond-a-Month plans are so popular." He pointed out, however, Freedom Shares can now be bought over-the-counter.

## County's '67 Cotton Acreage Is Released

Last year Tishomingo County planted a total of 5,400 acres in cotton. This figure is released by the Mississippi Crop & Livestock Reporting Service.

Of the number planted, the report states that 3,200 acres were harvested; yielding 115 pounds per planted acre. The yield per harvested acre was 194 pounds. Tishomingo County had a total of 1,300 bales averaging 500 pounds gross weight, produced.

In neighboring counties, Alcorn planted 6,900 acres of cotton and

harvested 3,900 acres. Yield per planted acre was 128 pounds with the yield per harvested acre 226 pounds. Their production figure was 1,800 based on 500-lb. gross weight bales.

Itawamba County listed 6,500 acres planted in cotton in 1967 with 4,200 acres harvested. The yield per planted acre was 162 with the yield per harvested acre 251. They produced 2,200 bales at 500 pound gross weight.

Prentiss county reported 9,700 acres planted in cotton and 6,100 acres harvested. One hundred-fifty-six acres were yielded from those planted and 248 pounds from acres harvested. They produced 3,200 bales.
