Rustling Is Still Game In County

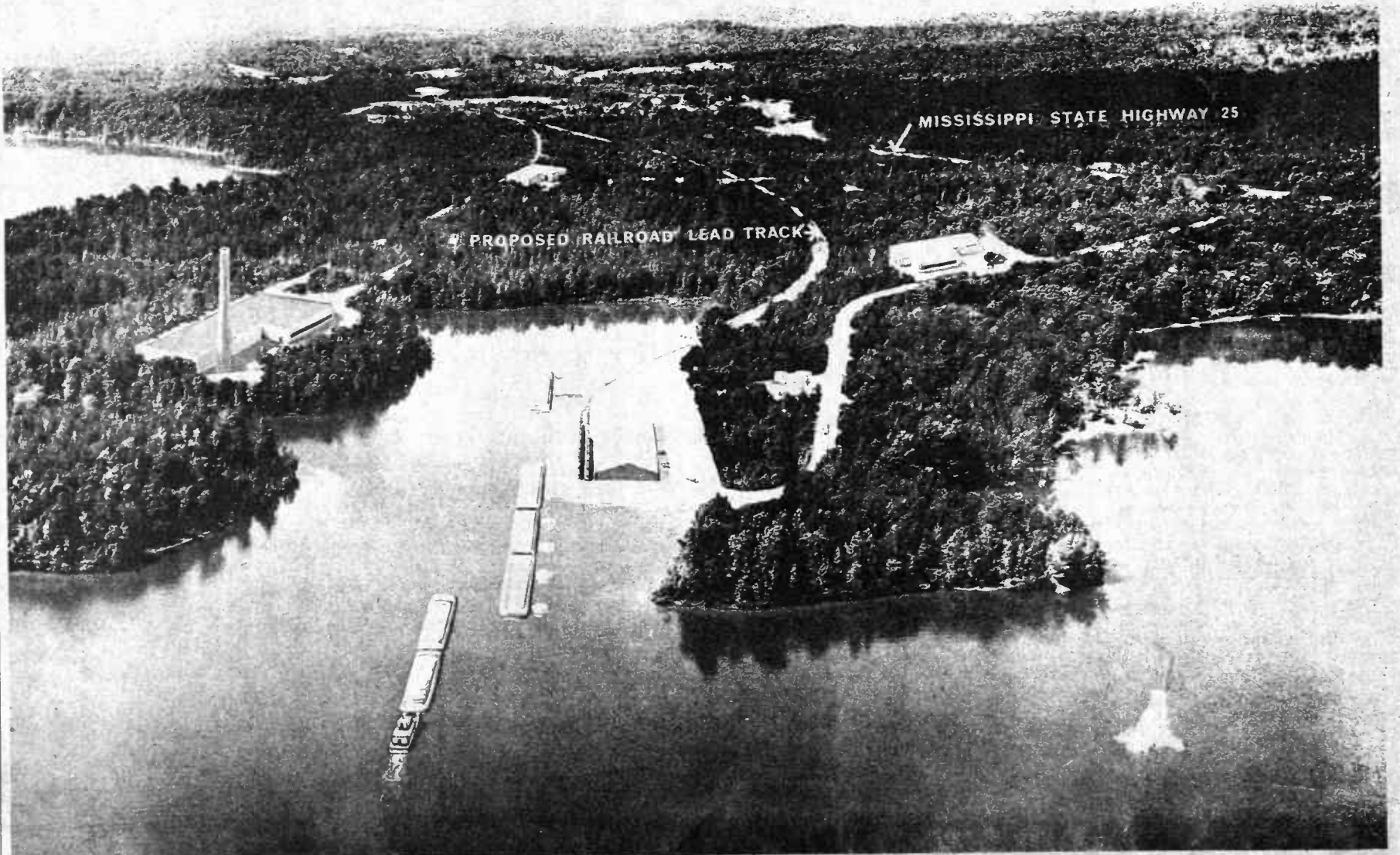

The financial assistance is given by the Jaycees along with the Northeast Mississippi Regional Library in cooperation with the Northeast Mississippi Junior College work-study program.

Funds Asked For Port

Congressman Jamie Whitten has requested that Federal funds for the construction of the Yellow Creek Port in Tishomingo County be included in the budget for fiscal year 1970.

Whitten made the request before the Public Works sub-committee and was able to get the following language included in the sub-committee's records:

"The Tennessee Valley Authority has completed a favorable study of the River Port Development of the Yellow Creek embayment of the Pickwick Reservoir.

"The analysis shows a very favorable cost ratio for the project, indicating that user and expansion benefits will total approximately \$6 for every \$1 spent for construction and land purchase.

"Development as planned is a joint project among Federal, state and local governments.

The completion of this study by the TVA should permit the state to proceed with the development of its portion of the cost and the committee contemplates that time to initiate construction of the Federal portion will be presented to the bureau of the budget for its consideration and formulation of the estimate for fiscal year 1970.

"The Federal share of the \$7.5 million project would be \$6 million with the state and county sharing the remainder."

Whitten said the report would be heard by the entire committee.

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A CALL TO CONSCIENCE

WITHIN FIVE years the Liberals have lost by assassination three of their heroes: John F. Kennedy, Martin L. King, and Robert F. Kennedy.

Two of the three, we know, were murdered by Communists or Communist-oriented assassins. Who killed King is yet to be disclosed. Even so, it is reasonable to suspect the same sort did him in, or caused him to be done in. That seems reasonable since King's death produced results comparable to those of the Kennedy murders: It inflamed the Negroes and in the doing brought the nation nearer to race war and chaos, things the murder of a Conservative leader would not accomplish. And that — chaos in this country — is the sought end of the Communist party.

And now the question comes, how could it be, why have such evil days fallen on us? What has happened to this nation? Who is responsible?

FOR WEEKS now, since King's death, I have been carefully scanning the words of the Liberal pundits in the hope one of them, publicly, would begin to question his philosophy, to examine his conscience. Certainly, it seemed to me, one of them — if only one — at long last would begin to wonder aloud as to the wisdom of the policies that have shaped this nation since 1933. None have; none that I have been able to detect.

TOUCH WITH me these past 35 years:

Shortly after F. D. Roosevelt was inaugurated, and at the urging of the new President, this country "recognized" the Soviet Union — and thereby rescued then-founding Communism.

A bit later, two Liberals — Walter Lippmann, the writer, and the late Supreme Court Justice (then Professor) Felix Frankfurter — introduced to FDR a man named Maynard Keynes. Keynes, it seemed, had "invented" a sure-fire form of economics. Roosevelt bought it. Now, 35 years later, the cost of operating the City of New York for one year exceeds what it cost in 1933, to operate the federal government. The national debt cannot be paid, now or ever. That we are facing economic disaster is recognized as probable.

That same year — I believe it was 1933 — a Moscow-trained

Liberal by the name of Walter Reuther marched his malcontents into the factories of Detroit and there sat them down. The red-led burglars, thanks to a Liberal governor, were allowed to stay until their demands were met. Thus, the ownership of property — heart beat of free-enterprise and anathema to the Communists — was undermined.

Under Roosevelt we became embroiled in a war that was none of our business — again the Liberals rescued Communism.

Liberals opened our gates to subversives. Liberals gave our inmost secrets — including the secrets of A-bomb manufacture — to the Communists.

A MAN, Joe McCarthy, tried (heavy handedly) to expose the corrupt Liberals in our State Department. For his pains he was hounded to death. Whatever was in the State Department remains there. None dares, any longer, to raise his voice.

Liberals put the Chinese "agrarian reformers" into business. And the death stench of Viet Nam is the result.

Liberals have given to foreigners 110 billion dollars of our treasury.

A Liberal President junked the Monroe Doctrine and in the doing allowed the installation of a Communist outpost but 75 miles from our shores.

Liberal Presidents reconstituted our Supreme Court with the resultant chain of internal events we have come to know too well.

Liberal philosophy has so permeated our religious establishment the very existence of God, Himself, is brought into question; our children are no longer allowed to pray in school.

Liberals are recreating a slave mentality (i.e. one of dependency) in the minds of Negroes.

Thus, the Liberals have brought this nation to the edge of disaster; assassination has become this nation's hallmark; Liberals now eat their own, to the detriment of all. And no Liberal spokesman yet questions the Liberal philosophy to be what it is: false, the sure road to national damnation.

More than 300 years ago, in 1650, Oliver Cromwell addressed a letter to the General Assembly of The Church of Scotland. In part, he wrote: "I beseech you, in the bowels of Christ, think it possible you may be wrong".

THE FUTURE OF THE REPUBLIC

As the country plunges into the election season, with candidates for the presidential nomination stepping up their appeals, there is a depressing air of staleness about many of the statements and speeches. So many of the proposals by the candidates have the smell of defeatism about them. Their ideas for running the United States during the next four years smack of philosophies that have failed.

The American people may be discerning that the country has traveled too far down one road — to a dead end. The nation needs a new start and under new leadership.

Seven years ago, when the Kennedy administration took power, the country was forced into a path that too many citizens seemed alien and unwise. One disaster after another has struck this country since 1961. There was the Bay of Pigs fiasco, in which the Kennedy administration failed to press ahead and re-win Cuba for freedom. Then there was the Cuban missile crisis of 1962, which left the Reds firmly in control of Cuba and resulted in the U. S. quietly withdrawing missiles from Turkish soil. The nuclear test ban treaty of 1963 left the U. S. in a position where it couldn't test the super weapons that the Russians already had acquired. That treaty, surely, was one of the greatest menaces to American security.

In 1964, the Johnson administration imposed the War on Poverty on the United States. Billions of dollars were pumped into "community action" organizations, with the result that strife worsened in the country and agitation groups found an enormous new source of funds.

As 1965 began, the Johnson administration began to send large numbers of U. S. servicemen to Vietnam. The cost of the Vietnam war commenced to sky rocket, but the administration declined to press for victory in Vietnam. To this day, the administration has refused to lay waste the homefront base of the Communists in North Vietnam. It has resisted appeals from Congress that the port of Haiphong be blockaded.

The administration made the tragic mistake of allowing the war to be fought on the soil of our allies, instead of carrying the war to North Vietnam. Despite the billions of dollars spent on the war, the administration has declined to accept the truth of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's observation that "there is no substitute for victory."

The situation is perhaps even more disturbing on the home front. Inflationary spending policies, in time of war, has damaged the dollar, to the point where a major monetary crisis threatens to overwhelm us.

The Johnson administration has failed utterly in maintaining the domestic tranquility that the Constitution seeks to guarantee. Several public figures of the administration cloth have actually encouraged the social rebellion that now causes massive

upheavals in the nation's cities. The environment of Liberalism that has been dominant in the federal government since 1961 has given the demonstrator-hoodlum elements a feeling of great confidence. They invaded the nation's capital in late April and say they will camp there until Congress meets their demands.

A rabble of Vietnaks and Black Power elements believes that it can dictate to the U. S. government. Who can say what will come from this rabble army of protesters that has built a shanty-town between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial? The British once burnt the capital of the United States. This time the deed of arson may be perpetrated by the new anarchists who have been encouraged by two recent administrations to believe that civil disobedience is their right.

Never in its history has the United States been at such a pass as it is today. The arsonist and the looter openly threaten law-abiding people and entire communities. Urban revolutionaries threaten to "burn" America if they do not get their way.

If the United States does not get a change of leadership next year, if civil disobedience is not repudiated and the revolutionaries are not jailed, the future existence of the Republic will be in question. In the next election, the American people may be deciding whether they want their nation to survive as a free and peaceful land. "Law and Order" is by no means an empty phrase.

From Olivia Bauer, Tell City, Indiana: I remember the asafetida bag we wore around our neck to ward off disease. We also had to swallow a small pill of it now and then.

I remember the baby carriages made of reed. And the heavy homemade comforters to keep us warm in the winter. And how we brightened the carpets with a solution of water and ammonia.

I remember the sprays of artificial greenery and flowers that were used for funerals and now the artificial flowers are coming back into use. I remember, too, that the dead were embalmed in the home and the body was kept at home where friends called and paid their respects. And the wakes, too, with the low-voiced conversation in the night and later a light lunch. The "crepe" that hung on the front door during the time the body was in the home. "A Political Spectator"

The current edition of the Mississippi Legislature will make an effort to implement a constitutional amendment — approved by the voters in 1962 — to permit sheriffs to seek re-election if their law enforcement and tax collecting duties are separated.

Both the 1964 and 1966 sessions failed to enact legislation to make the amendment, already inserted in the constitution, effective.

But the appropriate House of Representatives committee is now considering measures to breathe life into the amendment, to remove it from its dormant state.

The language of the voter-endorsed change deliberately prohibits sheriffs' succession until the Legislature passes a law specifically creating separate offices for sheriffs and tax collectors.

The 1962 Legislature was also authorized to place sheriffs on a salary scale based on a county's population. If it does, the generally lucrative fee system under which they're now paid would be abolished.

Until now, the Legislature has ignored the people's mandate to allow succession. Obviously, the issue smacks of politics and the Legislators are reluctant to act.

The Mississippi Economic Council, the state Chamber of Commerce, has consistently pushed for legislation to implement the succession amendment.

In a position paper, the MEC noted that it "believes, as do the majority of Mississippi voters, that the office of sheriff and tax collector should be separated, tax collecting duties should be combined with the duties of the tax assessor, both the sheriff and the tax assessor-collector should be paid salaries and both should be permitted to succeed themselves in office."

The MEC recommends that the fees presently collected by the dual office continue to be collected and "placed in the county's general fund, with salaries being paid from the general fund." Any surplus — and it would be significant in the larger counties — would be expended for other governmental services. The organization reasons, with

logic, that a sheriff — as the chief law enforcement officer of his county — would devote full-time to his elected duties.

He wouldn't be wearing two hats.

Since a sheriff-tax collector can't serve successive, back-to-back terms, there's obviously only minor incentive to fashion a long-term law enforcement program in a county.

The MEC phrases it with a pull-no-punches sentence, to wit: "Most of his pay comes from tax collecting duties, which can lead to neglect of law enforcement duties, causing a general breakdown of respect for the law."

These remarks shouldn't be considered a blanket indictment of Mississippi's 82 sheriffs. Most — but certainly not all — handle their policing chores efficiently.

The tax collecting duties, which generate most of the sheriffs' personal income, are time consuming. Consequently, collecting taxes often commands a higher — or at least equal — priority than policing responsibilities.

Gov. John Bell Williams hasn't publicly detailed his views on sheriffs' succession.

Former Gov. Paul B. Johnson, whose long suit during his four-year term was maintaining law and order, supported the move to permit sheriffs to succeed themselves. He didn't however, pinpoint exactly what form succession should take — that is, whether they should be paid on a salaried or fee basis, with the present sheriff-tax collector offices being continued as one.

Understandably, Mississippi's sheriffs support succession. And as expected, they generally favor the fee system.

The fiscal issue before the Legislature is law enforcement.

The Mississippi voters, by approving the succession constitutional amendment almost six years ago, apparently feel that modern society demands full-time — not part-time — sheriffs.

The people, through their ballots, have spoken.

Now, the Legislature should act.

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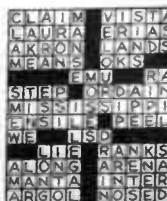
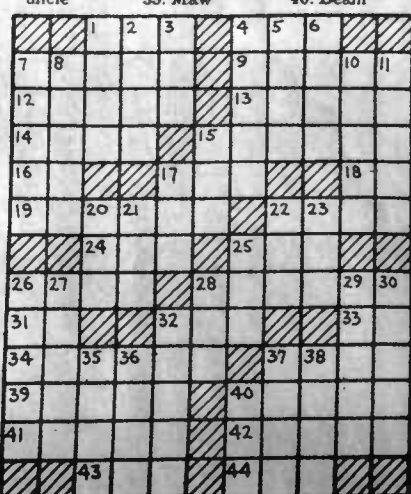

The bride-elect is the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Bud Milligan of Luka and the late

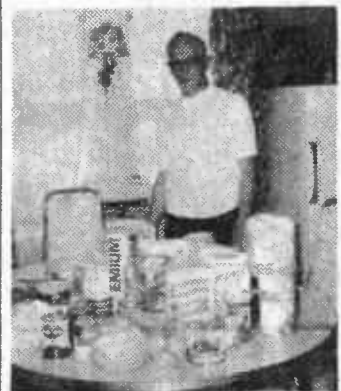
Mr. and Mrs. Atlas Carson of Luka.

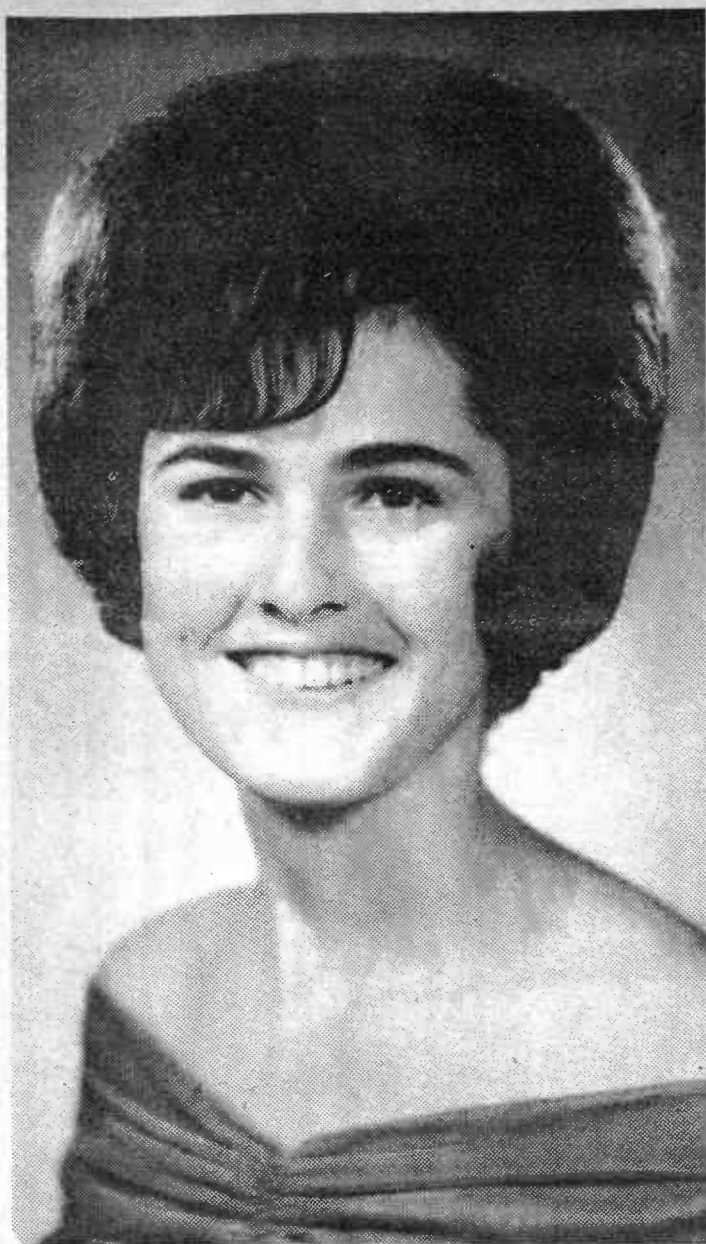

YOU BE THE JUDGE

By L. D. Edwards

Was I fired or did I retire? As I had planned to retire after one more year of teaching, I had not planned to write anything for publication in regard to my dismissal from my present job as teacher of Vocational Agriculture in the Tishomingo School. However, so many people have been mis-informed, I feel it to be important to inform the people of the Tishomingo school district and many other friends of mine in Tishomingo County just what did take place. Let us examine the facts.

As you well know, most Business, Edicts and regulations passed upon by the County School Board are recommended by the County Superintendent of Education. To make it appear that my dismissal was compulsory under the 1958 Retirement Act, just ahead of the time to elect teachers, the Tishomingo County School Board passed a regulation which included only one phrase taken from the 1958 Retirement Act and mailed a copy of the regulation to each of the school principals, stating that it applied to me and two other teachers. The Board's statement—"To abide by the Compulsory Retirement Provisions of the State Retirement Act", that is (quote of phrase from the Act) "any members who shall have attained age sixty-five (65) years, shall be retired forthwith". Then the Board added "by December 31, 1968". This December 31, 1968" did not come from the Retirement Act but was evidently added so it could be applied to me as I will not be sixty-five until December 1968. The Regulation did not contain any statement that would make it apply beyond 1968, nor did it mention the part of the Retirement Act which states that "The Board may authorize the

continuance in service beyond age sixty-five (65) years for periods of one year until age seventy (70) years is attained, at which time Retirement shall be Mandatory".

To further show my dismissal was planned, the father of a young man now teaching in Florida, stated that his son was mailed an application form from the County Superintendent of Tishomingo County requesting him to fill it out and apply for the Vocational Agriculture teaching job here in the Tishomingo School for 1968-69, which the young man did. When his son was not elected, the father remarked, "they were just using my son to be sure they would have an application on file with the Tishomingo School before election of teachers, weren't they?"

I replied, "Judge for yourself."

I have talked with County Superintendents, Principals, VO-AG teachers and to our District Supervisor and in no case did any of them know of teachers of other counties being retired under the 1958 Retirement Act where they were not sixty-five (65) years of age before the school year begins. The practice in a number of cases is to give annual extensions as long as the teacher is doing a reasonably good job of teaching. As to my health, the Lord has been exceedingly good to me as I have taught forty years without missing a day from school except days I was away on business. As to my teaching, a larger percent of my students continue their education beyond the high school level than the Tishomingo School average and in only one case, to my knowledge, has a student of mine ever failed an agriculture subject in college. As further evidence that my teaching is improving with experience is the fact that during the last nine years, my judging teams have won first place in the state three times, Dairy cattle judging in 1960, Poultry 1964 and Poultry 1968. Now the boys on the 1968 team are worried about me not being here to prepare them for the National Contest in Kansas in October.

Why was I dismissed? Maybe someone thinks I did not vote right in the last election, maybe a board member wanted his neighbor's son a job in the Tishomingo school or maybe I do not buy my groceries at the right place. You Be the Judge.

Finally, let me express my sincere regrets to the other two teachers dismissed for I feel they would have been given annual extensions of their contracts, as has been the practice for at least the last two years, had it not been for the plans to make their Regulation apply to me.

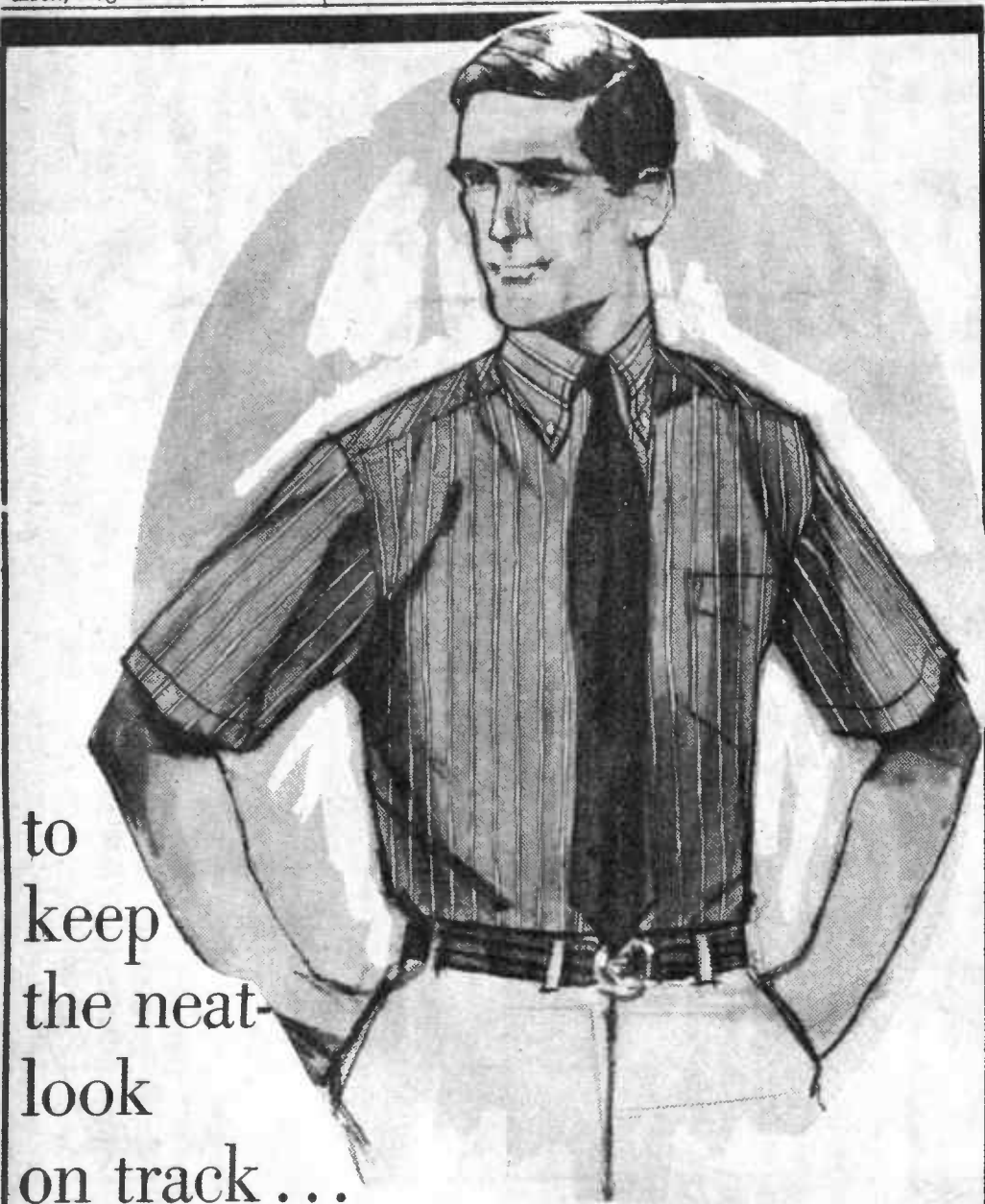

Beavers: Farmer's Plight But Solution Is Simple

M. W. Solomon and his wife, Retha, of Route 1, Iuka, are plagued with the problem of beavers.

"The rascals have a good 30 acres of land flooded with water. It's good farming land that belongs not only to me but several other farmers who live in this area along Cripple Deer Creek," the farmer explained.

Nearing the age of 70, Mr. Solomon starts each day by making breaks in the beaver dam to help drain the area of his land that's covered by water. "The reason we have to break the dam each day is every night the beavers come back and repair the breaks made the day before." As soon as enough land is cleared Mr. Solomon will plant corn.

The beaver dam was first started by a small colony some 15 years ago on Cripple Deer Creek. Mr. Solomon estimates that the colony has grown to a population in the thousands. It is not uncommon for a beaver colony to develop to this size over a period of years.

The rodents use their well-developed front teeth set in strong jaws, to feed on bark of poplar, aspen, willow and birch trees. Whole groves of these trees are cut down, brought to the pond and sunk.

Dead trees stand all along Cripple Deer Creek where the beavers are proving their handiwork. The stagnant water held back by the dam is covered with a thick oily-brown slime and the dense brush and undergrowth in the swamp-like area below the dam is a haven for snakes.

The entire section is wild country that is of no use to anyone until it can be rid of the rodents and tamed with clearing and cultivation.

According to Buster Marlar, local game warden, in addition to several beaver dams on Cripple Deer Creek, there are also reports of beaver dams on Bear Creek and Macle Creek.

He went on to explain that the beaver is now classified as a predatory animal which is not protected by any special law. Beavers may be taken at any time, year round. In the past they received special protection when the price of their fur was high. However, this has been changed by recent amended laws.

Billy Joe Cross, director of the State Game & Fish Commission, explained in a telephone conversation Tuesday, that the commission has employed an official eradicator. He is Bob Mitchell of Eupora who is trained in trapping beavers and in destroying dams with explosives.

The solution to the farmer's problem is relatively simple. The director explained that the farmer or land owner must make a request for assistance to the

commission personally. He must give his name, address and telephone number. In turn, the director of the Game & Fish Commission will contact Mr. Mitchell and relay the specific order. The eradicator will then get in contact with the party in the county.

Now that the status of the beaver in Mississippi is becoming clearer, farmers and land owners can get efficient help through their state officials and in turn rid their lands of the troublesome rodent.
