Iuka Guard Unit Leaves On Sunday

Members of Company "C", 1st Battalion, 198th Armor Division, Mississippi National Guard, Iuka, will leave Sunday morning for the annual summer field training of the 30th Armor Division.

Summer training is held this year for two weeks, June 30-July 13, at Camp Shelby in south Mississippi.

Mr. Clack was a Baptist, a Veteran of World War II and a native of Belmont, Tishomingo County.

Night Crash Kills 3

Three persons were killed in a single car accident that occurred sometime Tuesday night on highway 25 about two miles north of Tishomingo.

The wrecked car was found early Wednesday morning about 5:30 when Cutshall ambulance and the county sheriff were called to investigate. Also assisting in the investigation were Patrolmen Jesse Coke and Jerry Robertson.

Dead are Johnny Earl Miller, 20, of Route 3, Macon, Miss., supposedly an airman in the U.S. Air Force stationed at McGuire AFB in New Jersey; Miller's wife, Wanda Jean Tutor Miller of Randolph, Miss., and Wayne Lee Tutor, 17 also of Randolph.

Details of the wreck are uncertain, however, law officials assume that the driver went to sleep, ran off the road down an embankment, sideswiping one tree and crashing dead-center headon into another tree. (See inset in photo.) Also, time of the wreck is not known. Miller was found under the steering wheel, Mrs. Miller was outside the car on left side and young Tutor was on right side of car. They all apparently died instantly.

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ENSLAVED CAPITOL CALLS FOR SUCCOR(S)

ONE RECENT day, Washington's afternoon newspaper, The Star, ran a pitiful advertisement. The ad disclosed the utter bankruptcy of the Democratic and Republican administrations of these 35 years past; our years of decline. It was a full-page spread headed, "An Appeal to the 200 million people in this great nation — all of whom own a share of Washington, D. C."

This is the way it went:

• For weeks now, even the heavens have been weeping at the tragedy that has befallen this once-proud city.

• Where are the tourists?
• Where are the shoppers?
• Where are the school children who came by the tens of thousands to discover their heritage?

• But most important — where are you?

• All 200 million of you. Why are your voices stilled? Isn't this your Capitol City, too?

• Don't you know, or don't you care that the stunned and shattered business community is afraid to act?

• Don't you know, or don't you care that the stricken and heart-sick residents are afraid to act?

• Don't you know, or don't you care that many of your fellow Americans are afraid to open their doors at night; afraid to take public transportation at night; afraid to stroll the streets at night; afraid to do little else but scurry from home to office and back again as quickly as possible?

• Of course you care!

• Then where is your storm of protest? Your outrage? If you fail to voice your concern soon, your share of Washington, D. C. will be worthless.

• Our mayor talks.
• Our police officials talk.
• Our Congress talks.
• Our President talks. But they have failed to dispel the current climate of fear.

• It wasn't too long ago we flew our flags at half-mast. Unless you insist upon action now, we may have to do it again.

• It is only fair to tell you — your nation's capitol is dying.

THAT WAS the ad, all of it. It was signed by some outfit called The Committee for a Safer Washington, made up, in part by the hand wringers whose stores lie in ashes.

They bring tears to my eyes,

these sycophants, tears as big as horse chestnuts, pleading for the rest of us to come to their succor. They call us to action though they themselves continue to sit, afraid, by self admission, to do a single thing in their own behalf. They sit there moaning, under a white-capped, black pyramid that the old toad, Earl Warren, did so much to fashion. The pyramid that Lyndon Johnson and his minion, Hubert Humphrey, have done so much to cement into a permanent state of affairs. They sit and want others to rescue them; they bleat as sheep in a pen. And if you go down the voting list of that soul-black town you will find 99 per cent of them voted, repeatedly, for just what they are getting. Where were they when the country needed them, when that nefarious Civil-Rights bill was under consideration?

Where? Coining nickels is where.

BUT WE are coming, anyway, y'all, hear? We are going to help you overcome. We are going to trample out the vineyards where you have stored the grapes of wrath.

You don't deserve succor but we are coming anyway because we are better men than you are.

Leading our parade of liberation will be a graceful, fearless, brilliant man whose clarion call should vibrate even the chords of your mind. We are going to free you, money grubber, just rest easy in your self-wrought chains a little while longer — until November. Listen for the tune, "Dixie".

ASSASSINATION AFTERMATH

The tragic death of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy in Los Angeles has deeply disturbed the American people and transformed the political situation in an election year.

The shock of the senator's death at the hands of a lone killer has been compounded by the highly emotional and irresponsible comments of some television commentators. Again, as after the death of President John F. Kennedy, there has emerged the illogical theme that all Americans share in the guilt of the killing. President Johnson is to be commended, in his initial comment on the shooting, for stressing that America is not sick and that the murder was not committed by 200 million people. No society, no matter how well organized, can completely protect prominent citizens from attacks by determined fanatics in its midst.

What a society can and must do, however, is to maintain general law and order and to stand firm against notions of anarchy and civil disobedience that are a breeding ground for acts of personal violence. The death of Sen. Kennedy is especially tragic in that it might not have occurred, if in his political career, he had applied his energy and ambition to stressing the importance of law and order. A fair and balanced account of the senator's career must include recognition of his role in encouraging movements of social protest that included trespass on the rights of others.

It also is unfortunate that the aides of the late senator, in commenting on his role in politics, have not acknowledged that campus and inner-city protest movements are the source of serious infection in our public life. Indeed it has been reported by "The New York Times" that a reputed leader of the Revolutionary Action Movement listed Sen. Kennedy as one of their targets. When the forces of civil disobedience are unleashed in a country, no one can tell in what direction they will strike.

The killing of Robert F. Kennedy is a cruel reminder of the surge of violence in the last year. In a way, it is remarkable that there have not been more assassinations of government officials. For many months, President Johnson and Secretary of State Rusk have been the targets of Vietnams mobs on their appearances in New York City and elsewhere. Massive police manpower has been necessary to protect them.

In Washington recently, members of the Poor People's Campaign rampaged in front of the Supreme Court building, throwing rocks at windows. Other Members of this protest group shouted threats at the U. S. Attorney General. Newsmen, attempting to visit the camp-in on the banks of the Potomac also have been threatened with violence. Columbia University this spring was the scene of shocking student brutality against uni-

versity administrators. Members of the clergy have invaded draft board offices and destroyed Selective Service records. Indeed the entire New Left has a commitment to violence to secure its ends. A militant minority of dissenting demonstrators in the United States has sought to overrule the majority of citizens who give assent to law and order and representative government.

Had Robert F. Kennedy devoted his energies to the cause of sound, conservative government, he could have performed an outstanding work. Instead, he chose to align himself with those who want to "restructure" the United States, as the New Left says. Ironically, he was gunned down by a man who had no respect for the law.

It is time for the American people to fully restore the domestic tranquility that our Constitution states as a goal of our national life. It is time to curb the anarchists and to cease the

civil disobedience. If those who mourn for Sen. Kennedy truly want to perform a good work in his memory, they can use their influence to stop the marches and demonstrations, the singing and slogan-shouting that help create a feverish atmosphere in the country.

The laws and customs of the United States provide ample opportunity for change and reform, where and when the people desire it. But this nation cannot afford to tolerate change by violent means. It cannot afford intimidation by mobs and organized leftwing groups. It cannot afford sit-ins, camp-ins, lie-ins and other forms of basically irrational activity that lead to wide disturbances, threaten lives and property and excite unstable persons to acts of terrorism.

"A Political Spectator"

The voting voice of Mississippi Negroes, merely a timid whisper as recently as four years ago, will become increasingly vocal in future elections.

It will ricochet with authority throughout all levels of state government — state, county, district and local.

And, in some areas of the state, the Negro bloc vote will represent the balance of polling power. The 1960 federal census showed that 29 of the state's 82 counties have more Negroes than whites.

In March of 1964, Negro voter registration was estimated at about 29,000. Less than two years later, the figure was unofficially pegged at about 64,000 — a significant climb.

Now, more than 200,000 Mississippi Negroes are eligible to vote.

The reason: They took mass advantage of the 1965 federal Voting Rights Act and lowered requirements for registering under amended state election laws.

Last year, Negroes won about 22 elective offices — including a seat in the House of Representatives.

Political observers predict that Negro office seekers will win additional posts in the 1971 elections.

In 1965, former Gov. Paul B. Johnson said he believed that Negro participation in the Mississippi Democratic party would be restricted to voting — at least for the present.

But Johnson erred in his thinking, since Negroes participated in several sub-state level party conventions in recent weeks.

In fact, district caucuses elected two Negro delegates to the National Democratic Convention in Chicago later this summer. Mississippi Democratic regu-

lars have made no pronounced move to encourage Negro participation in party affairs, although biracial loyalists have.

The growth of the Negro voting power prompted veiled, "desegregated politics" by some candidates in 1967. Most — but certainly not all — office seekers sought the Negro vote.

Their approach was subtle.

But when a gubernatorial candidate shouted he would be the Governor "of all the people — of all Mississippians," he was bidding for Negro ballots.

Candidates generally spurned the relatively minor Negro vote prior to last summer. Until then, it was diluted and without muscle.

Now, it's potentially potent — and the Negro bloc vote can be the difference between victory and defeat for a particular candidate in some areas.

The first major change in political expression became apparent in the 1965 special session of the Legislature that lowered voter registration requirements.

Several legislators, who boomed "Never — Never" in the past, delivered impassioned speeches admitting the requirements were unrealistically stiff. They acknowledged the Negro voter had been discriminated against at the polling places.

The speeches on the chamber floors were surprising and, in the opinion of some legislators, unwarranted and unnecessary.

Race loomed as an issue — though largely submerged — in last year's elections.

It will remain a quiet point of contention, although the voice of the Negro voter will be amplified in the future.

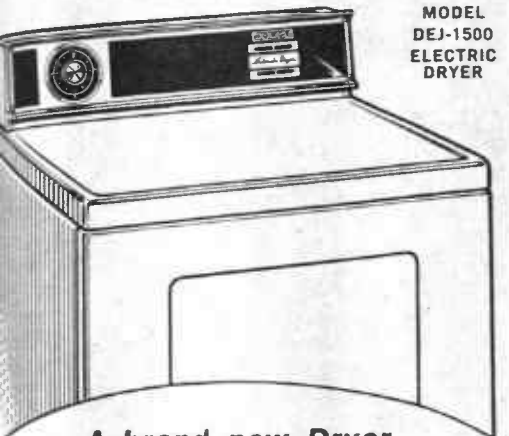

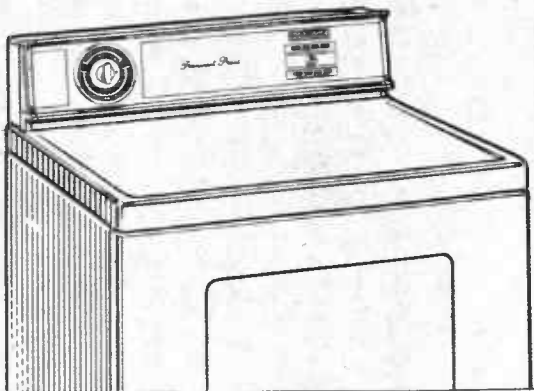

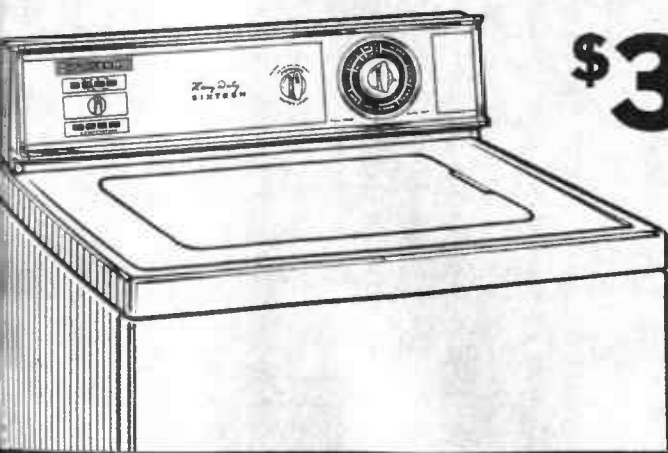

Letters to the Editor

June 24, 1968

Dear Editor:

To the Citizens of Alcorn and Tishomingo Counties: I wish to take this means of giving you some information that will be of interest to you. Now, let us review some of the Legislative Action on the issues that many of you are concerned about at the present time. Also, I will attempt to explain how this action affects the people of our area.

Let us begin with the Education Program first. I am sure that most of you are familiar with the Governor's Program and his recommendation as it deals with Education. Bills have been approved by both Houses of the Legislature and signed by the Governor to grant the Teachers an increase in Salary for the new school terms. At present, the Bill to raise the money for this increase is in a deadlock between the two houses. This problem will have to be worked out in a conference committee.

For the bus drivers, it has been agreed by a conference committee that the bus drivers will renew term. I worked for and supported an amendment to raise this amount to \$150.00 per month, but this amendment was voted down. It was pointed out that the State could not pay this kind of a salary for Bus Driving.

The Lunchroom Workers of our State have been given a dirty deal by a few of the leaders of the Old Guard Group in the House of Representatives, who are Chairmen of all of the Major committees. I am a member of the Education Committee and was one of three members of this committee appointed to make studies and recommendations into the salaries for the lunchroom workers of our state. Rep. Helen McDade, of Kemper County, was appointed as Chairman of this Sub-Committee. Rep. Neil Smith of Walthall County, and myself were to make up this sub-committee. After much work, study and consideration of the problems involved, we reached the

following conclusion and recommendation for salaries for these workers in the lunchroom workers' program: our recommendations for the workers is \$180.00 per month for workers and \$200.00 per month for Supervisors in the lunchroom program. This recommendation was based on a 40-hour work week. The education committee agreed by a unanimous decision that this was a fair and reasonable salary for these people.

When the Chairman of the Education Committee, Rep. Charles Allen of Amory, presented this recommendation to the House of Representatives for action and consideration most of the discussion was friendly, until Rep. Edgar Stephens of New Albany, chairman of the Appropriation Committee, got permission to speak against the bill. He stated "the State could not afford to pay the salaries for lunchroom workers as provided by this bill," and he further stated, "that this was too much to pay for this kind of work." In the course of discussing the bill further, a motion was made by Rep. Kenneth Williams of Clarksdale, to Re-Committee the bill to the Appropriation Committee. The vote was 69 to 39 with 14 members recorded as absent or not voting. Friends, this kind of action in effect, kills this bill for this session of the legislature. I voted and Rep. Burns voted NOT to re-committee the Bill because there is very little chance of this bill being reported out of this, unfriendly, committee under the chairmanship of Rep. Edgar Stephens of New Albany.

Our Old Age Pension Program has, for all practical purposes, met the same old argument in that the State cannot afford to raise the maximum payment for old age from \$50.00 per month to \$75.00 per month as provided in a bill that was before the House June 21. After a great deal of argument on this bill, an amendment was offered to lower the payment from \$75.00 to \$65.00 per month. This amendment

failed to get a majority vote and Rep. Edgar Stephens of New Albany tried unsuccessfully to amend the bill to keep the maximum payment at \$50.00 per month. Luckily, we were able to get enough votes to raise the maximum payment to \$55.00 per month and to include about 2000 to be put back on the pension rolls who were dropped from the rolls in March due to the increase in Social Security Payments. The average Old Age check is \$39.00 per month, according to the information given to us in the discussion of the Old Age Pension program.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I have tried to give you a factual report on the above issues that I feel you are, sincerely, interested in at the present time. Joe E. Brown of Iuka, member of the Tishomingo Alumni Association, states that James Cullen Looney, Democratic party leader, Hidalgo County, Texas, will be the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Tishomingo Alumni Association on Saturday night, July 6, in Tishomingo.

Looney, a graduate of the Tishomingo Class of 1918, is the son of the founder of the old Tishomingo school. His father was also a former Mississippi state senator.

A law graduate of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Mr. Looney opened his practice in 1926 in Edinburg, Texas, in the Rio Grande Valley. In 1930 he teamed together for his first law firm.

The Kelley, Looney, Norvell law firm took over the W. R. Montgomery practice in 1940 and later Norvell dropped out to become a state supreme court justice.

The former Tishomingo student is a Texas lawyer of varied interests. He has been legal advisor to many government agencies through the years, has performed outstanding criminal case work and has been one of the foremost important lawyers in the Rio Grande Water Rights lawsuit.

Looney is the present Democratic Party chairman of Hidalgo County, Texas. He served in this office beginning with appointment to fill an unexpired term in 1932 and was elected to the office that same year. He served in this capacity until 1940 when he was elected county judge. Mr. Looney retained the judgeship until 1946.

His next stint in politics began in 1954 when he ran and once again was elected as county democratic chairman. He has announced that he will not seek reelection after this last term.

Mr. Looney's interests include corporate directorships in four banks and one savings and loan

association in his state of Texas. Possibly his most valuable interest is in Valley Transit Co., which he and his associates developed from a one-bus operation. Mr. Looney is also a part owner of Harbenito Broadcasting Co. of Harlingen and Harbenito Radio Corporation which own KG-BT television and radio, Texas.

Other interests include realty corporations, ready-mix concrete companies, land companies, oil and gas corporations, numerous investment companies and mortgage companies as well as tire companies, hotels, lumber companies, banks and two additional radio incorporations.
