Mayor Proclaims January 16-22 As Jaycee Week

Mayor John H. Biggs today proclaimed January 16-22 as Jaycee Week in Iuka and asked local organizations to cooperate in the observance. He said the purpose of the week is to focus attention on young men and the work they are doing, and to emphasize that the Iuka Jaycees have done an outstanding job in the fields of Community Involvement and Individual Development.

The week celebrates the founding of the Jaycees in 1915, when Henry Giessenbier saw a need for a young men's civic group and organized the first chapter in St. Louis. The movement spread so fast that in 1920, the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce was formed with 24 cities represented. The name of the national organization was changed from Junior Chamber of Commerce to U.S. Jaycees in 1965 at the national convention of the young men's organization.

Built on solid foundation of creating opportunities for leadership training through community betterment projects, the Jaycees today, 350,000 strong, are active in 8,500 communities in the United States. The organization's headquarters is located in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The Iuka Jaycees, chartered in 1966, have maintained a strong chapter, not only on the local level but on the state level as well. The Iuka Jaycees have been among the top eight ranked chapters in the state all this year. The local chapter will be observing Jaycee Week with a Jaycee display of activities during the week and with Jaycee Radio Day on W.V.O.M. on Saturday, January 22. Also, a local Jaycees continue to search for Outstanding Young Men, Outstanding Young Educators, and Outstanding Young Teenagers to be nominated and recognized for their contributions to our community. Anyone wishing to nominate someone for one of these are urged to contact Frank O'Neal (OYM), Robbie Grisham (OYE), or Lloyd Murrah (OYT). These nominees will be recognized at the Merchant's Appreciation Banquet and one Outstanding Nominee will be selected from each group.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

STEPS TO BETTER STORAGE

Have you ever said, "I don't have any place to store things?" Have you ever put something away and forgot where you put it? Have you found that items taken from storage were unfit for use or needed pressing or repair? If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, then it's time to take steps to better storage.

Good storage can help make your home look cleaner, neater and easier to keep. It helps keep things clean and ready for use. Good storage will also help you keep things in a handy place so you can find them.

As you do your spring cleaning, take steps to better storage. The first step to better storage is clean and sort. Go through the family's belongings such as clothes, toys and kitchen utensils. Find out what you have and what you use. Give away, throw away or sell

what can't be used.

Next, store items at point of first use. Each activity you do in each part of your home requires certain items. You will save time and energy if these items are stored near where they are most often used first. Make a list of what you have to store in your home. Beside each item write where you use it first.

You now have the items in the right room of the house. Where do you put them in the room? Using the list you have already made, write beside each item the place it is first used in the room.

Some items such as cleaning supplies will be used in different areas of the house. If possible, duplicate those items in the places needed. If that is not possible, then a place where they will be most convenient to all areas.

The third step is store items

together that are used together. Items such as dishes and silverware; soap, bleach and detergent; and sheets and pillowcases are used together. Store them together. Jobs will be done quicker and easier if you have items together when you do a job. Try to store similar or like items together. Stack only like items. This will make your job much easier and save time.

Next step, store items so they are easy to see and reach. Do you have to take many items from the front of the shelf before you can find what you are looking for? Use these ideas for easier seeing, reaching and using items:

1. Put taller, larger items on the back of the shelves and place shorter, smaller items in the front.
 2. Put items you use often within easy reach.
 3. Store seldom used items in less accessible places.
 4. Store heavy, bulky items on lower shelves.
- Fifth step, keep storage flexible. As families change, storage needs will change. A family with young children will have different things to store than a family with teenage children. It is a good idea to keep storage flexible by including features such as adjustable shelves and drawer dividers.

Make the best use of available storage space.

When taking steps to better storage, it is easier to work on the storage in one room at a time.

POT ROAST WITH VEGETABLES

1 (4 to 5 lb.) beef chuck roast
Salt and pepper
All-purpose flour
3 tablespoons shortening
1/4 teaspoon thyme or marjoram
1/2 cup onions, chopped
1/2 cup water
1 medium carrots
1 small onion
4 medium potatoes, quartered

Sprinkle roast with salt and pepper and dredge in flour. Melt shortening in heavy skillet, and brown roast slowly and thoroughly. Sprinkle meat with thyme and chopped onions. Add water, cover tightly, and cook slowly over low heat for 2 1/2 hours, or until meat is almost tender. Turn meat two or three times during cooking, and add small amounts of water when necessary. Add vegetables, and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover, and cook until meat and vegetables are tender - about 20 minutes. To make gravy, dilute drippings with water, and thicken with a flour and water paste. Season. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

COTTON PRODUCERS
APPROVE SUPPLEMENTAL
ASSESSMENT;
Vote returns from Missis-

issippi Upland Cotton producers showed 75.6 percent favoring an amendment to the Cotton Research and Promotion Order to provide a supplemental assessment on each bale of cotton they market, Henry L. Knox, Acting County Executive Director, reported. Of the 4,363 voting, 3,300 indicated "yes" and 1,063 indicated "no". Nationally, 67.1 percent of the producers voting in the mail referendum, which ended December 17, favored the proposal, with 35,042 in favor and 17,147 opposing. Knox said approval by two-thirds of the producers voting nationally or by a majority accounting for two-thirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, was necessary for the amendment to become effective. Beginning with the 1977 crop the supplemental assessment would

be four-tenths of one percent of the value of cotton as determined by the Cotton Board and the Secretary of Agriculture. This amount, together with the \$1 per bale growers now pay, will be used to strengthen cotton's competitive position and to maintain and expand domestic and foreign markets and use for U. S. Cotton. The administration of this program is handled by the Cotton Board comprised of producer representatives named by the Secretary

of Agriculture. The amendment also authorizes reimbursement to USDA of up to \$200,000 for referendum expenses and

for administrative and supervisory cost, up to five employee-years annually.

COUNTRY STYLE HAMS & BACON

CURING INGREDIENTS:

The ingredients you need are salt, sugar, and saltpeper. Mix them in this proportion: 8 pounds salt, 2 pounds sugar, 2 ounces saltpeper.

To mix a larger amount, multiply each ingredient by 2, 3, or 4 depending on how many times you want to increase the formula.

Use regular meat curing salt. You may use either white or brown sugar. Spread salt on table or in a wash tub. Sprinkle sugar over it, then the saltpeper. Mix thoroughly.

WEIGHING HAM:

Next, weigh the ham. For hams weighing under 24 pounds, you may use kitchen scales. You need 1 1/4 ounces of the curing mixture for each pound. This is enough to cure a ham satisfactorily for it to age 6 months or more at natural temperature.

CURING PROCEDURE:

Assume that your ham weighs 20 pounds. You need 25 ounces of curing mixture (1 1/4 times 20).

Rub on half of the amount (13 ounces) the first time. Do not try to rub mixture into the meat, just rub thoroughly enough for ingredients to cling to it. Force some mixture into the hock end.

On the third day, apply half of the remaining mixture (6 ounces). Be careful not to knock off salt already on ham.

Five to seven days later, apply the last 6 ounces. For bacon, use the same curing mixture and rub each side of bacon thoroughly. Shake off excess salt and place in box, table or shelf to cure. This is all it needs.

CURING SCHEDULE:

Place hams skin side down in a box, on a work table or in a refrigerator to cure. The safest curing ranges from 36 to 45 degrees F. Select dry, not damp weather for pork curing. The first week of the curing period is the most important. Chill the meat quickly and keep it cold.

Follow this curing schedule:

Ham Weight	Curing Period
15 and under	30 days
16 - 20	35 days
21 - 25	40 days

For each day the temperature is below freezing, add an extra day to the curing period. Bacon requires about 10 days for salt to penetrate sufficiently, but you need not remove bacon to smoke it until hams and shoulders are ready for the smokehouse.

LETTING SALT EQUALIZE:

At the end of the curing period remove the ham from cure. Salt goes through meat very slowly. At the end of the curing period very little salt has penetrated around the bond and to the skin side of the ham.

If hams are not to be smoked, only brush off any excess salt. Soak hams that you will smoke in tap water for 1 1/4 to 2 hours to remove surface salt. Bacon needs no soaking. Just before smoking wipe off surface with wet cloth.

The next step is to let the ham hang in a cool place for about 20 days to give salt time to equalize through the ham. Do not expose ham to high temperatures during this equalizing period.

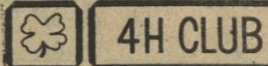
Bacon does not require equalizing.

SMOKING:

Use green hardwoods as hickory, pecan or oak not resinous woods as pine. The cooler the smoke, the better. Most people prefer a light mahogany color to their ham and bacon. Smoke the meat continuously for 2 to 3 days or off and on during 8 to 10 days until you get this color. Don't oversmoke or you will remove too much moisture, making it too dry.

For best results, keep your smokehouse temperature between 80 and 100 degrees F. Avoid 110 to 120 degrees F. temperature for this means the internal temperature of the ham

will be around 100 degrees F. This is an ideal temperature for spoilage bacteria growth.

4-H FOR URBAN YOUTH

Although 4-H offers many projects to youth, often we fail to explain what is involved in project work.

What project can an urban child take? Why not the electric project? The electric program helps the child learn more about electricity. First, he will learn how the electric current is formed and basic safety precautions. As he becomes more involved in the project, he will learn about the different sized wires and when and where they are used. He will learn the importance of fuses and circuit breakers as electrical supplies. This project enables the child to help his parents with problems like blown fuses and outlets not properly used.

In this project, youth also learn how to wire a house. They learn the proper spacing for outlets, switches and lighting fixtures. This project will be useful as the child grows up. Contests are held so the child can show what he has learned.

Another project both urban and rural children can participate in is the garden project. Everyone enjoys fresh vegetables. In the garden project the child learns how to take a soil sample, how to apply fertilizer correctly, how to plant the garden and how to care for it. This project helps the child learn the importance of faithful work and the rewards of this work.

Of course, these are only two of the 4-H projects for youth 9 - 19.

The observance of traditional New Year's customs hopefully starts your year with excellent prospects for good health and increased prosperity. Here's some news to help you have an even better year. Telephone customers get a tax break again this year. Effective January 1, the federal excise tax rate applied to charges for taxable communications services decreased from 6 to 5 cents. The new 5 percent tax applies to local and long distance service and will continue to drop one percentage point yearly until the tax is eliminated in 1982. Happy New Year!

Telephone users can dial One-Plus to almost any of the 14 million phones in the country. One-Plus dialing helps hold down the costs and rates of long distance service. And customers who dial the One-Plus way share in the savings. For example, by taking advantage of the lower night rate a customer can dial One-Plus from the east coast to the west coast and talk for three minutes for only 52 cents (only 21 cents if the call lasts one minute or less). Placing the same call through an operator would cost \$3.55 (person-to-person) or \$2.25 (station-to-station) for the first three minutes. So, dial the One-Plus way and you'll save.

*One-Plus rates do not apply to Zero-Plus dialed, operator-handled, coin telephone calls, or calls from a hotel or motel.

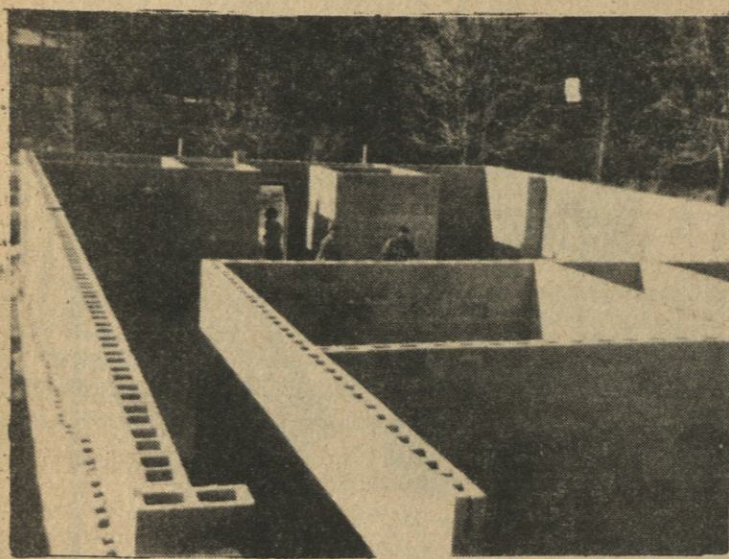

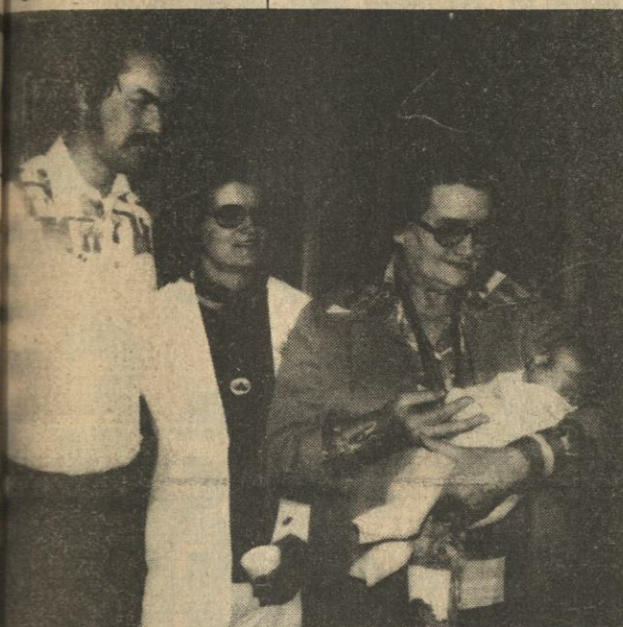
