Massey Acquitted Of Murder Charge

A Tishomingo County Circuit Court Jury found Joe Massey, 35, of Red Bay, Ala., innocent of the murder of Bobby Wade Harris in the January term of court.

The jury panel of seven men and five women deliberated more than two hours Saturday after a three-day trial acquitting Massey, who had been charged with murder in the April 17, 1976, shotgun slaying of Bobby Harris.

Bobby Harris' widow, Mrs. Sue Harris, was one of five witnesses who appeared Thursday in the trial's first day of testimony. Mrs. Harris, who divorced Massey in February, 1975, and is the mother of his five children, told the jury that on the day of the shooting, Massey had argued with her, threatened to kill Harris, pointed a gun at him and challenged Harris to meet him at Forest Grove Baptist Church, eight miles east of Tishomingo, where the shooting later occurred.

Mrs. Harris said Massey had come to her home to pick up their children and wanted them to spend the night with him. She said she agreed, but told Massey the children must be back by 10:00 a.m. the next morning (Easter Sunday) for an Easter egg hunt. She said Massey agreed at first, then became hostile and argumentous.

Prosecution witnesses testified that Massey left the Harris home and returned with his .12 gauge shotgun. They testified that when Massey threatened to shoot Harris with the gun Harris suggested the men not fight in front of the Massey five children.

Mrs. Harris told the jury that

she pleaded with her husband not to go and tried to stop him. "But he said it was something he had to do," she said tearfully, "and he got his gun and left."

When her husband left the home, she testified that she called the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and followed him to the church in a pick-up truck.

When she arrived at the scene, Mrs. Harris said she saw Massey "leaning on the front of his pick-up with a gun in his hand" and her husband lying on the ground near his automobile. Mrs. Harris said she ran to her husband, although Massey was still pointing his shotgun in Harris' direction.

At this point in her testimony, Circuit Court Judge Neal Biggers ordered the jury to retire while he listened to arguments from District Attorney John Young and Defense Attorneys Thomas Comer, Jr., Joe Ray Langston and Ed Jenkins on whether or not Harris' comments to his wife were dying declarations. Out of the jury's hearing, Mrs. Harris said she ran to her husband, who said, "I just opened the door." When told an ambulance had been called, Harris said, "It will be too late."

The defense then called O.J. Pierce who was also on the scene during Harris' statement. He testified that the "first thing" Mrs. Harris did when she arrived was to remove her husband's rifle from his car and place it in her pick-up. He said she reached over her husband's body to accomplish this. Then Mrs. Harris knelt. Her husband

spoke of opening the car door and the nearness of his death, Pierce said.

Before the jury, Mrs. Harris repeated her testimony, adding that "the gun was still in the car, just like he had put it in before he left the house."

"I removed the gun when O.J. Pierce told me to," she said. "The window on the driver's side of his car was shattered with a hole indicated where the bullet went through," she stated.

Harry Bowman, Tishomingo County Deputy Sheriff, testified that he received a call to go to the church about 4:30 that afternoon. When he arrived, he said he saw Harris' body on the ground, radioed for an ambulance, and went to find Massey.

While on the way to Massey's house, Bowman said he got a call on the radio that Massey had telephoned from his home and wanted to turn himself in. Bowman said when he picked up Massey, he was given a Remington .12 gauge automatic shotgun loaded with one slug and one shell of buck shot. Bowman also said he was later given an empty shotgun hull by Albert Taylor, who said he found it at the church.

Harris' gun, a 30.06 with a spent round in the chamber and a live round in the magazine was later given to Bowman by O. J. Pierce.

A firearms expert from the Mississippi Crime Lab in Jackson said he examined the weapons and shells and found markings on the spent shells of both weapons that indicated they had been fired in those guns.

Other defense witnesses testified that they had heard two shots rather than one fired on April 17th. Saturday's rebuttal testimony included testimony from two of Massey's five children.

Massey, taking the stand in his own defense, told the jury he fired the shot that killed Harris, but only because he was afraid for his life. He said Harris had armed himself behind the door of his car with a 30.06 rifle equipped with a scope, adding, "I was scared . . . I didn't know when it was coming. I knew he could pick my head off with that scope."

The coroner's report showed Harris died of a single 12-gauge shotgun blast to his left side, causing a cardiac arrest.

According to Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs, the natural gas supplier for the City of Iuka has notified the City that the supply of gas has been cut. At press time, the Mayor stated that just how much we have been cut is unknown.

The city supplier - Alabama Tennessee Natural Gas notified the Mayor Tuesday morning that Tishomingo Shoe Company and Conalco should go on their emergency fuel supply. Tishomingo Shoe Company went on their emergency fuel system immediately. They only use natural gas for their heating system. Conalco is in the process of installing an emergency gas supply, but, according to Mr. Don Cowell, manager of the plant, they lack some ten to fourteen days having their tanks and supplies ready. He also stated that the production of the plant was halted as of January 19th due to the gas cut back. The installation crew size has been doubled and overtime has been planned to permit the earliest possible return to production.

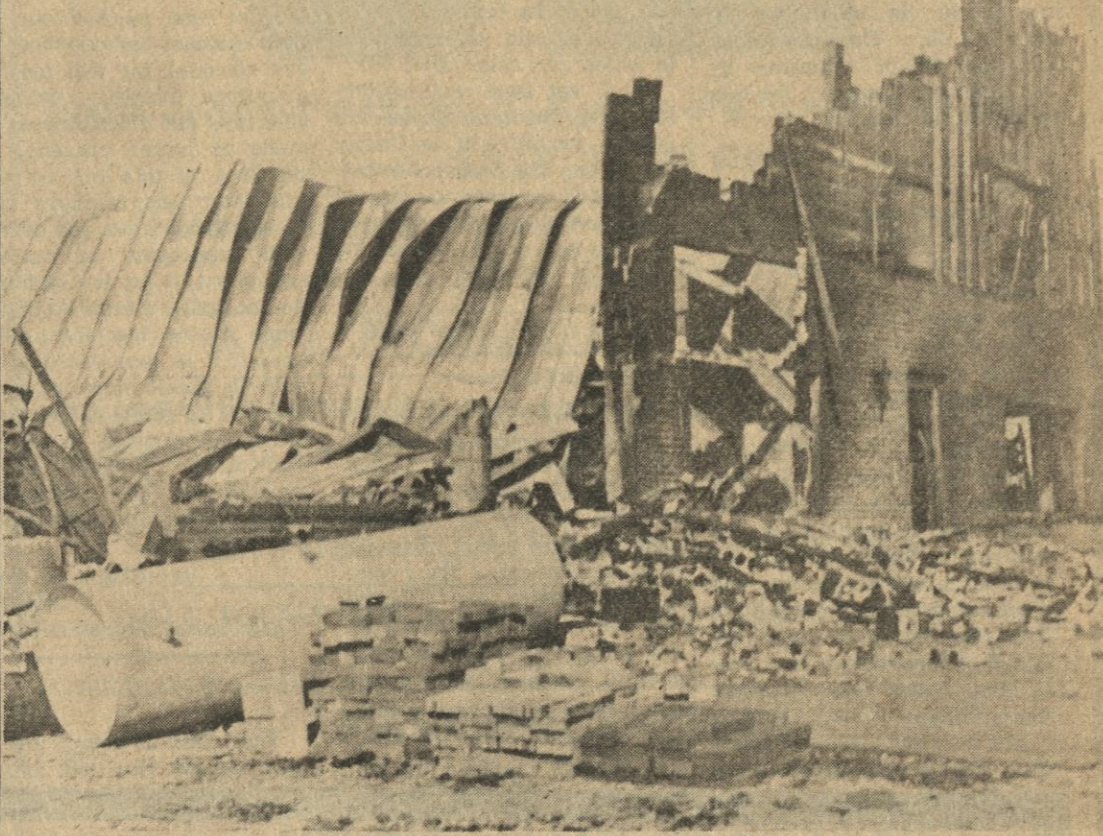
The Mayor encourages all people in Iuka, both business and residential, to conserve their gas and keep the thermostats turned as low as possible.

Snowy Weather And Fires Plague County

The old Co-op building in downtown Iuka was completely destroyed by fire in an early Sunday morning blaze - January 16th. The building housed the Iuka Hardware Store and the Farm Bureau Insurance office.

According to Howard Whitaker, Iuka Fire Chief, "I received a call at approximately 3:05 A.M. Sunday from Southern Railway Train No. 162 coming from Corinth spotted the fire and radioed ahead to the office in the Tri-Cities, who then placed the call to the Iuka Fire Department. Two Iuka fire trucks, scores of Iuka Volunteer Firemen, the Burnsville Fire Department, headed by Fire Chief Lucien Epperson, Burnsville Mayor, Mike Lambert, and volunteers from Burnsville worked in sub-zero weather fighting the fire. Whitaker said, "When we arrived, fire was coming from the northwest corner of the top floor of the building." Fanned by 30 mile an hour winds the fire quickly spread to the rest of the building. The structure was securely locked when the firemen arrived on the scene and electrical power was sending volts

through the metal doors in the rear of the building when the firemen would put their axes to the door to break in, making entry into the building almost impossible.

It was daylight before the blaze was finally put under control. No damage estimate has been made but the building and contents of the Iuka Hardware Store were described as a total loss.

The County Extension Offices which had occupied the upstairs of the building for many years had started moving to new quarters on Friday, so their loss was minor. The Farm Bureau Insurance office, which was also located in the building, also suffered extensive damages. According to employees of Farm Bureau, they were able to salvage some of the insurance records but duplicates of all records and policies are kept on file in Jackson and should arrive by Friday. The insurance office is continuing operations in a mobile office located across from the former offices.

Kay-Way Foods, located next door to the building suffered damage to frozen foods and meats due to the loss of power.

Had it not been for the heroic efforts of the fire departments and the volunteers keeping the fire under control, extensive damage could have resulted. Whitaker said, "I really want to thank all the people from Iuka and Burnsville who withstood the sub-zero cold to fight the fire. It was so cold that the clothes were actually frozen on the men."

Tommy E. Marlar of Burnsville lost his billfold containing \$78.00 and at press time, it had still not been found. Iuka Fire Chief Whitaker, Mayor John H. Biggs, and several Iuka business people contributed \$78.00 to return to Mr. Marlar, in appreciation for the effort he put forth in fighting the fire. If anyone finds his billfold, please bring it to Iuka Fire Chief, Howard Whitaker, the Mayor's office or to Tommy E. Marlar in Burnsville. Besides the money, it contained papers important to Mr. Marlar and he would appreciate having it back.

No cause for the fire has been determined, but the fire is still being investigated by the Iuka Fire Department.

Iuka Man Injured At TVA Steam Plant

Donnie Williams, a 33 year old Iuka resident, was injured in an accident at TVA's Colbert Steam Plant Saturday, January 15, 1977. He reportedly suffered second and third degree burns on his legs in the accident and was listed in serious condition in the Intensive Care Unit at Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital before being transferred to the Burn Center of the University Hospital in Birmingham on Sunday afternoon.

Donnie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Williams of Eastport Road in Iuka. He and his wife, Dora, have three

children - Vickie, Tina, and Kimberly.

Two other workers injured in the accident were treated and dismissed from Colbert County Hospital Sunday. They were Dennis Biggers, 20, and Jerry Luster, 27, both of Marietta, Georgia and both employees of Guardian Industrial Services of Marietta.

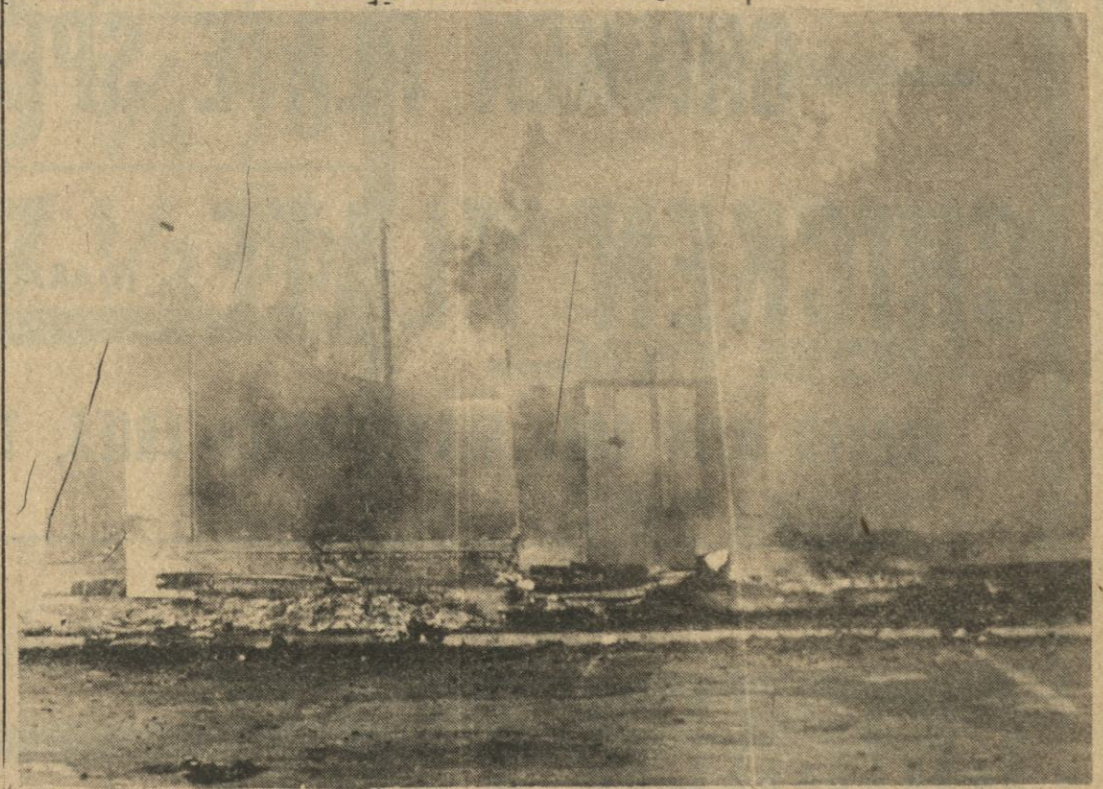

FIRE LEVELS CYCLE CITY — A pre-dawn fire completely destroyed Cycle City located on Highway 25 South in Iuka. At approximately 2:00 A.M. Wednesday morning, Patrolman Woodrow Davis of the Iuka Police Department spotted the smoke at Cycle City and immediately called the fire department. The Iuka Fire

Department quickly responded to the call and fought the blaze until approximately 6:00 A.M. The building had a flat roof and also a built up roof over it and the fire quickly spread between the two roofs and it was impossible to save, according to Fire Chief Howard Whitaker and Iuka Mayor John

H. Biggs, who were both on the scene. Most of the larger contents of Cycle City were removed as the men fought the fire. The building was completely destroyed, but the cycle repair shop at the back was not damaged as firemen kept water on the building. The cause of the fire is unknown at this time.

TO THE EDITOR:

I, James J. Kirk, have a bid on the leasing of the County Home with intentions of hiring competent personnel to take care of the home and patients. My bid was the lowest bid by \$18.40, in which my bid was \$21.60. The only other bid was \$40.00 submitted by Mrs. Virgie Rhodes. She was awarded the contract.

When I asked the Board of Supervisors why they awarded her the contract they told me they knew there were several things that were wrong at the County Home, but they didn't know about what I would do. This is questioning my ability to run the County Home even after they had said there were several things wrong at the County Home.

After the Board's decision to let Mrs. Rhodes keep the contract, the reporter from the newspaper, The Burnsville Informer, asked for the bid and proposal that I had submitted. The reporter then asked the Board of Supervisors for a copy of Mrs. Rhodes' bid. This was the morning of January 11, 1977. The next day I was called into the Board of Supervisors' meeting and was told to vacate my office of Justice Court Judge (Justice of Peace), effective January 17, 1977. The Board has provided space for the Justice Court Judge (J. P.) office since 1952.

I asked the Board if my bid on the County Home had anything to do with their decision in which they said "WHY NO?" As I set here writing this letter the County employees are moving the office of the County Agent into the Courthouse but they will not help an elected county official move out because he asked an embarrassing question. Why?

REPORT OF ASCS PAYMENTS
TO BE MAILED TO FARMERS

Before January 31 of each year, the Data System Field Office of ASCS prepares Form CCC-182, Report of Payments to Producer, and mails them directly to farmers.

The Internal Revenue Service Code requires USDA to report payments, (other than loan payments), made to producers. At the time the report of payments is prepared for the Internal Revenue Service the CCC-

182's, Report of Payments to Producer, are prepared and mailed directly to the farmers involved. Payments are reported for the year in which paid and not necessarily in the year in which earned. A separate CCC-182 will be prepared for each county from which a payment is received by the producer and will show payments made in only that county. Furnishing to each farmer a report of ASCS program payments on CCC-182 is a service, intended merely to assist the farmer in reporting this taxable income. Upon receipt of the report, farmers are urged to carefully review the form and in the event of an error or question they may have, contact the county ASCS office. Farmers who receive payments in 1976 and do not receive the report may contact County ASCS Offices to obtain a statement of payments under agricultural programs.

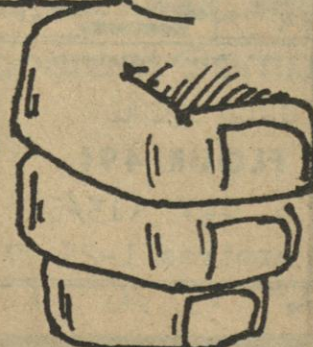
