## Iuka Mayor John Biggs Seeks Re-Election

It is with pride in past  
accomplishments and confi-  
dence in the future of Iuka, that  
I take pleasure in announcing  
my candidacy for re-election to  
the position of Mayor of Iuka in  
the May 10, 1977 primary.

The people of Iuka were good  
enough to elect me to the un-  
expired term of the former  
mayor when he resigned this  
position to run for sheriff of  
Tishomingo County. Since that  
time you have been good enough  
to return me to this responsible  
position for two full terms.

In spite of the recent recession  
and the general uncertainty  
of our nation's economy, Iuka  
has continued to progress, as  
evidenced by a steady increase  
in sales tax collections for Iuka.

It is with pride that I point to  
the completion of our street  
resurfacing program, expanded  
water and sewer facilities for  
all citizens of Iuka, completion  
of the Ronnie King Baseball  
Park, and Neighborhood Youth  
Center, adjacent to the new  
elementary school, and the ad-  
dition of a new, modern fire  
truck received only last week,  
the second such piece of modern  
fire equipment to be purchased  
by the City within the last four  
years.

The network of streets and  
the water and sewer systems  
reach more citizens of Iuka  
and are in better condition than  
ever in the history of Iuka.

In the last three years, the  
city has put into operation  
another eight inch water well.  
Iuka now has a capacity of  
2200 gallons of water per min-  
ute. This well was paid for out  
of water system funds.

One of the major accomplish-  
ments of my administration,  
was the completion last year of  
the complete air conditioning of  
the elementary school. This  
was made possible at no cost  
to the taxpayers of our city,  
as accrued interest on bonds  
was utilized for this purpose.

Plans are in the formative  
shape to air condition the high  
school facility in the near future  
with similar financing.

Based on my experience as  
Mayor of Iuka and the contacts  
I have made in this office, I  
am aware of the availability of  
Federal monies and can assure  
you that if re-elected, Iuka will  
continue to receive its fair

share of Federal funds and  
grants for the update and ex-  
pansion of our governmental  
services.

At the present time, and par-  
ticularly during the coming four  
years, Iuka will experience a  
growth pattern and influx of new  
citizens as never before. My  
ten years experience in the  
office of mayor will better equip  
me to cope with the growth  
problems we will experience,  
more so than any other person.

I have made many friends and  
valuable contacts during my  
tenure as mayor and have de-  
voted a substantial amount of  
time in contacting friends at  
the State and National level to  
aid in the expansion of medical  
services offered by the Tishom-  
ingo County Hospital.

Crime is an ever increas-  
ing problem across our nation.  
Again, I take pride in announc-  
ing that there has been no  
substantial increase in crime  
during my administration and  
that the crime level in Iuka is  
greatly below the State and  
National level. I attribute this  
in large part to the manner in  
which City Court is conducted  
each Saturday morning at City  
Hall. I endeavor to temper  
justice with mercy in assess-  
ing fines and other penalties,  
particularly with reference to  
the young people of our com-  
munity. Habitual offenders re-  
ceive the stiffest penalty pos-  
sible so as to protect the citi-  
zens of this community and  
their property. If re-elected,  
I will continue my policy of  
assisting youthful and first of-  
fenders to respect the law and  
property of others, without bur-  
dening them with a criminal  
record, where such leniency is  
warranted and will continue to  
assess stiffer penalties for re-  
peated offenders to protect the  
law abiding citizens of Iuka.

During my tenure as mayor,  
I have been active in meeting  
with industrial prospects and  
have worked closely with rep-  
resentatives of the Mississippi  
Agricultural and Industrial  
Board and the North Mississippi  
Industrial Development Assoc-  
iation in an effort to create  
more and better paying jobs for  
the citizens of Iuka and Tishom-  
ingo County. At the present  
time I am actively involved with  
several industrial prospects

and will continue to represent  
Iuka to these companies in the  
interest of our economy.

I have worked closely and in  
harmony with the members of  
the Board of Aldermen which  
you elected. If I am re-elected,  
I will continue to work in close  
harmony with all members of  
the Board of Aldermen in the  
interest of the progress of the  
city.

While the office of Mayor of  
Iuka is not considered a full  
time job, the position does re-  
quire more attention than in  
the past. My personal business  
is located adjacent to the City  
Hall and I am available at all  
times to attend to the business  
of the city and assist the people  
wherever possible.

As I stated earlier, it is with  
pride in past accomplishments  
and with confidence in the  
future that I announce for re-  
election as your mayor. Based  
on my record of accomplish-  
ments, I think I can continue  
to make you a good mayor;  
I know I can make you an  
honest mayor.

## Beauty Revue Re-Scheduled

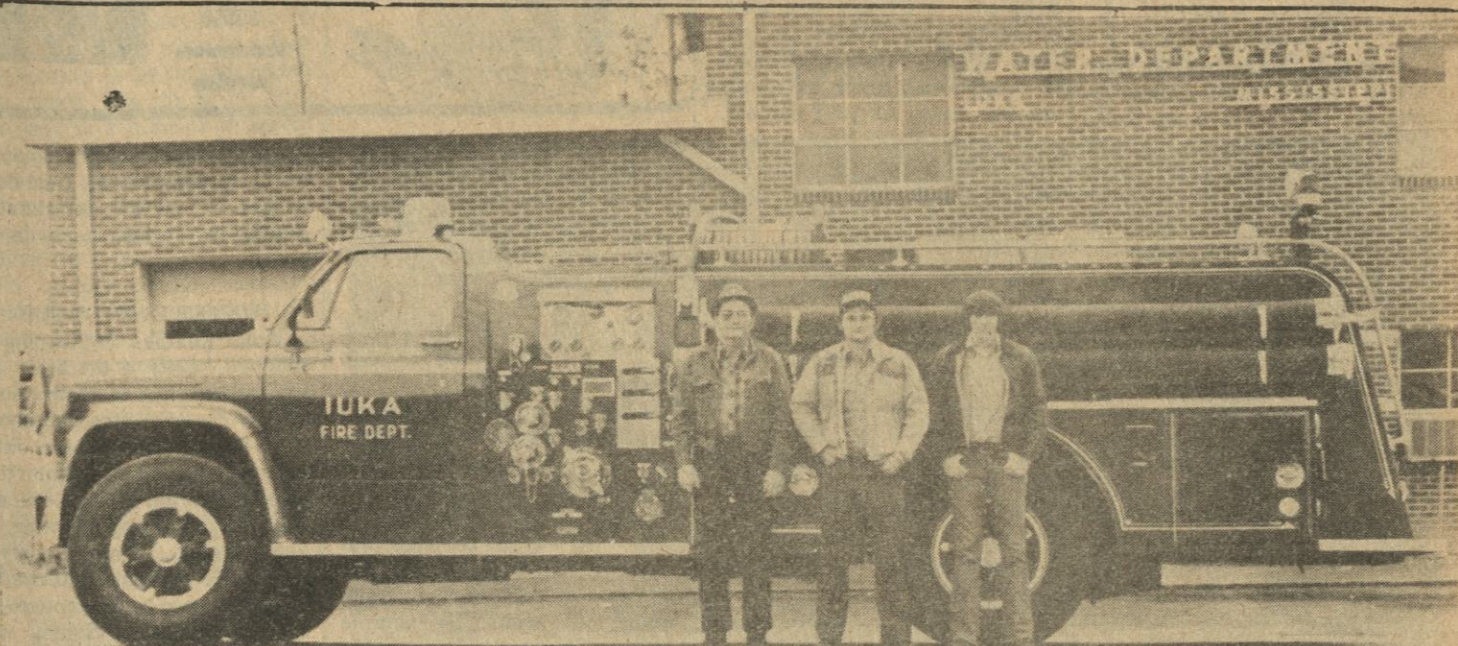
Due to the terrible weather,

## Body Of Missing Woman Discovered

Searchers discovered the  
body of a 70-year-old woman  
Sunday, January 23, still being  
guarded by the three small dogs  
she took for a walk on Friday  
afternoon.

Mrs. Edna Harville left her  
home, which is located about  
four miles southwest of Chero-  
kee, Alabama, on Friday after-  
noon, January 21, failing to re-  
turn when expected.

Two rescue units from Tishom-  
ingo County, two rescue units  
from Alabama, one unit of the  
Alabama National Guard and  
several other volunteers assisted  
in the weekend search.

A search party member said  
the dogs were lying on top of  
Edna Harville's body when they

found her in a wooded area about  
three miles from her home at  
approximately 2 p.m. Sunday.  
She had numerous scratches  
from the bushes and is believed  
to have died from exposure. No  
foul play is suspected, but her  
body was being examined by a  
coroner Sunday to see if an  
autopsy would be necessary.

Funeral services were held  
Tuesday at the Iuka Pentecostal  
Church with the Rev. S. A.  
Bonds and the Rev. S. E. Wil-  
liamson officiating. Burial was  
in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include her hus-  
band, Willie Harville, Chero-  
kee; a daughter, Mrs. C. E.  
Grisham, Iuka; six grand-  
children; and five great-grand-  
children.

## Funeral Services Held For Bunion Skinner

John Bunion Skinner died on  
Wednesday night, January 19,  
at the Methodist Hospital in  
Memphis. He would have been  
93 on February 13th.

An Iuka merchant for at least  
50 years, he owned and operated  
a grocery and meat market  
where he was known far and  
wide for his quality meats. He  
was the oldest member of the  
Iuka Baptist Church where he  
had been a Deacon and Chair-  
man of the Board for many  
years. He also was a member  
and chairman of many commit-  
tees of the church, including  
Building and Search Commit-  
tees. He had been treasurer  
of the Tishomingo County Bap-  
tist Missions. He had helped  
start many county churches in-  
cluding the church's present  
mission, Yellow Creek Baptist  
Church. His love and interest  
remained with the church even  
through his last illness.

He was a member of the Iuka  
Lions Club, the Chamber of  
Commerce, and a Mason.  
Masonic services were held at  
the cemetery.

His wife, Laura Hamilton  
Skinner, died in June, 1975,  
after 57 years of marriage.

He leaves a brother, Paul  
Skinner, Iuka; two sisters, Mrs.  
Mattie Rutledge and Mrs. Bea-  
trice Brown, both of Iuka; and  
many nieces and nephews, in-  
cluding Ida Jean Stillwagon, of  
Memphis, who he was with when  
he died.

Funeral services were held  
Saturday, January 22, at the  
Iuka Baptist Church with the

Rev. Charles Dampier officiat-  
ing. Burial was in Oak Grove  
Cemetery. The church's Board  
of Deacons were honorary pall  
bearers. The family requests

## HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

### RETIREMENT ALERTS EATING HABITS

Now that you've retired, your eating habits may need to change. Here are some basic rules of proper eating that can help keep you and your budget in shape.

Continue to eat three good meals each day. It's easy to fall into snacking habits. Good eating doesn't happen; it needs some planning. Regular eating times will help you have better eating habits.

Eat breakfast each morning. Breakfast provides at least one fourth of daily nutritional needs.

Make lunch the main meal of the day. Generally you're more active in the afternoon than in the late evening; therefore, eat when you need extra energy. You'll also probably rest better if you eat your largest meal at lunch rather than in the evening.

Reduce your calorie intake to

match calories used. In retirement, activities are generally a little slower, so you need fewer calories. Extra calories will form an unbecoming bulge at your middle.

Plan snacks as part of your total day's food intake. Including snacks in your total day's food plan will help control calorie intake. You may feel like eating smaller amounts of food but at more frequent intervals. Your snacks can be a glass of milk, fresh fruits, a bowl of cereal and milk, or raw vegetables.

Plan a little exercise each day. A short walk or weeding the flower bed can be fun and promote good health. Wise eating and daily exercise can help you have a healthy, happy retirement.

**BAKED PORK CHOPS**  
4 pork chops  
Salt and Pepper  
4 tablespoons rice, cooked  
2 cups tomatoes, cooked

Brown pork chops, which have been sprinkled with salt and pepper, on both sides. Place in baking dish and put 1 tablespoon rice on each chop. Pour the cooked tomatoes over the chops. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. When ready to serve, lift chops carefully with rice and baked tomatoes intact. Yield: 4 servings.

### FERTILIZING PECAN TREES

If your pecan trees failed to produce a good crop of nuts last year, maybe you haven't fertilized them correctly. Fertilizing is one of the best things a homeowner with pecan trees growing in his lawn can do. The only way to be sure that you're fertilizing them right is to take a soil sample from around your trees. Soil sample boxes and directions for taking samples are available at your local county Extension office. We can also furnish additional

information on fertilizing pecan trees if you need it. And don't forget -- pecan fertilization should be started early in the year.

### WINTER COTTON JOBS

Cold weather is keeping us indoors, quite a bit these recent weeks, but there are some cotton farming jobs that should be done this winter when weather permits. Wintertime jobs for cotton include subsoiling or chiseling, rowing up heavy soils, liming, applying phosphate and potash if needed, lining up good quality cottonseed for planting, analyzing what happened to crops in 1976, and deciding how many acres of cotton to plant this year. All of these cotton jobs are important and must be considered by today's cotton producers. If weather permits, growers should also apply Tolban, Treflan, Basalin, Cobex, Prowl or Amex on heavy soils where grass is a problem.

### 1977 FERTILIZER SITUATION

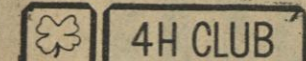
The fertilizer supply should be adequate for 1977, with the possible exception of nitrogen. The nitrogen supply will depend on the supply of natural gas as feedstock production of ammonia. The use of natural gas for production of nitrogen needs high priority if agricultural production is to remain high. There may be spot shortages of nitrogen during the peak use period next spring. Fertilizer prices are more stable than in recent years and only seasonal adjustments should occur.

### KEEP BABY PIGS ALIVE

Mortality among baby pigs is one of the major problems of any swine production operation. Proper maintenance of farrowing areas can reduce losses of baby pigs to disease. To help keep farrowing areas disease free, wash the sows

down thoroughly to remove contamination before placing them in the farrowing crate. Also, clean and disinfect the farrowing house to rest between farrowings. If possible, plow under the pasture where breeding animals are kept at least once a year.

**4-H SAFETY PROGRAMS**  
"Be Careful!" How many times are young people cautioned by adults, particularly parents, to be careful? This urging becomes especially important when the youngsters leave home to participate in recreational activities such as hunting, boating, and other water sports.

Yet, how many times do parents actually take the time to teach their children to take full advantage of these activities by being safe and careful?

Recognizing the need for safety instruction, 4-H includes many safety projects and activities in various subject areas.

Two of the most popular safety programs are the hunter or firearm safety program and the boat and water safety program.

The hunter safety program is directed by the 4-H Department in Cooperation with the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission. Statewide programs are taught by County 4-H Youth Agents who have been certified by the National Rifle Association and conservation officers. They are also qualified to instruct volunteers who assist in teaching the course.

Here are 10 commandments of gun safety that a hunter safety student knows before passing the required program:

Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely! Keep Safety on until ready to shoot. Unload guns when not in use; take down or have action open; carry guns in cases to shooting area. Be sure barrel is clear of obstruction, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the gun you carry. Be sure of target before you pull trigger; know identifying features of

## Marilyn Finds Challenge In Peace Corp

Marilyn Sims, 23 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Sims, of Booneville, is home from Bogota, Colombia, where she is stationed with the Peace Corps.

Marilyn, a Tishomingo High School and Northeast Mississippi Junior College graduate, talked to a representative from the Peace Corps while a senior at Mississippi State University. "I never thought about the Peace Corps, but I talked to a representative and really liked the idea. But my parents really didn't like the idea of my joining but they are very understanding," she said.

Marilyn left from Miami for Bogota, the capital of Colombia, situated in Northwestern South America, in June after graduating from Miss. State in May, 1975. Along with 21 other Peace Corps volunteers, she received 2 1/2 months of language instruction and technical training upon arrival in Bogota. The volunteers were then sent to various communities throughout Colombia after completion of training.

Having no formal training in Spanish except that offered in the 2 1/2 month training period, Marilyn cited the language barrier as the biggest problem in adjusting to Colombian way of life. "I was lucky," Marilyn said, referring to the family with whom she lives in the small town of Mesitas, only 2 hours away from Bogota. "The family knew a little bit of English where I went to live. They also understood that I was used to different customs. The Colombian people are the most understanding and patient people that I have ever seen. Americans could really learn a lot from them," Marilyn said.

The climate of Colombia, which is not that different from ours, was also a surprise for her. Positioned along the Andes Mountain range, Colombia varies in temperature averages according to altitude. Mesitas, the small town in which she works, has a year-round temperature average of 65-70 degrees, while Bogota, which is only two hours up the mountain, has a 45-50 degree temperature average.

Marilyn was a home economics major while at Mississippi and uses her training to instruct the residents of Mesitas on the importance of nutrition.

"The people of Mesitas don't realize the importance of nutrition. I started my instruction with arts and crafts, such as crocheting, macrame, or knitting, to build up interest so I could teach them about nutrition. Starting home gardens is my big project," Marilyn stated. These gardens are not the usual type of plot that we as Southerners might imagine. The gardens take up only a small area about the size of two office desks.

They are able to grow vegetables year round in these gardens, and the people of Mesitas are urged by Marilyn to grow more nourishing foods, such as carrots and spinach. Not all the people of Mesitas were overly anxious to cultivate these gardens, however, she does have a foolproof plan to assure that they will plant these small plots. "I pick up a hoe or shovel or pick and start digging away. There is no machinery, and this is the only means of cultivating the ground. If I get out and start working by myself, they get embarrassed and finally get out to help me," Marilyn explained.

"The people in the United States have the opportunity to learn, but they don't have the opportunity there in Colombia. The people in Mesitas are lucky if they get through the fourth grade, I really feel like I am doing the most good for the most people that I can by working with the Peace Corps with these people," Marilyn stated.

Beside the adventure and learning experiences that sparked Marilyn to go to Colombia, there was a much more profound encouragement. "I felt it was my place in God's plan to join the Peace Corps. Doors kept opening, and everything fell into place. I was sure that it was what I should do. But I was more sure after I got there. Enough faith will smooth problems over," she confided. "I would definitely do it again (join the Peace Corps). Working with the Peace Corps has been a great experience. It has given

me a chance to learn about myself. Being in the Peace Corps has allowed me to learn the life style, customs, language, and people of another culture. I have also learned the opinions of other people about the United States, and become much more open-minded," Marilyn said.

Marilyn plans to travel and see the rest of South America when her program with the Peace Corps terminates in September of this year, but has no idea what she will do when she returns to the United States. She would like to work with the poor in a similar program as the one in Colombia, but she feels that they would resent her efforts and not be as understanding as the Colombians.

Marilyn urges anyone, especially college seniors nearing graduation, to consider the Peace Corps. "You can learn the attitudes, customs, language of the country while being able to travel extensively," Marilyn said.
