W. S. Brown Elected IGB Chairman Of The Board Of Directors



At the annual meeting of the Iuka Guaranty Bank William S. (Bill) Brown, Jr. was elected Chairman of the Board of Directors.

Mr. Brown has been a director of the Iuka Guaranty Bank since 1969. He is married to the former Minnie Jourdan whose father was one of the founders of the Iuka Guaranty Bank in 1912. Mr. Brown is a graduate of Ole Miss, a retired executive of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and is now President of W. S. Brown & Company, a retail outlet in Iuka.

Natural Gas Is Still A Good Deal

In these times of natural gas shortage, some people are regretting that they have installed natural gas in their homes and businesses. Natural gas is no longer the cheap and plentiful fuel it was but it is still a good deal. Dwindling supplies in the pipeline are reserved for the home owner. He would be the last one to run out.

Natural gas has been increasing in price over the last few years but then, what hasn't? We may even see some major increases in natural gas if and when Congress decontrols the price of natural gas. In spite of all this, however, natural gas remains one of the cheapest forms of energy you can purchase. In the average home it costs about 2/3 what propane would cost: about 3/4 of what fuel oil would cost and about 1/3 of what electricity would cost for the same heating and cooling requirements. While it is comparable in price to coal where coal is plentiful, it is substantially cheaper than coal compared to the price of a 100 lb. bag. Firewood is generally cheaper than natural gas but 90% of the heat of firewood goes up the chimney.

President Carter has urged conservation on all gas users and not only is this a good idea in protecting the remaining supply, but it makes good dollars and sense. There are many things a homeowner can do to conserve gas. You can be comfortable in your home at 65 degrees wearing sweaters or jackets. Each degree on your thermostat saves about 3 1/2% on your gas bill. If, like most Americans, you've been keeping your home at about 75 degrees, that's a savings of a whopping 1/3 of your gas bill. Insulation in the walls and ceilings of your home will save substantial additional amounts of natural gas. You can close off unused rooms in your house or rooms which are seldom used, such as bedrooms and workshops and save additional gas.

You can turn down your thermostat at night to below 60 degrees and use extra blankets on the beds. If you are heating water with gas, you can

reduce the setting on the water heater thermostat to as low as 150 degrees and still get comfortably hot water.

Yes, gas is still a good deal. While the price may rise dramatically in coming months, other fuels are rising as fast or faster. Don't push the panic button yet or you will find yourself paying more for competitive fuels which also face shortages.

Landfill Equipment To Be Purchased

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors will approve the purchase of equipment for the operation of a county operated sanitary landfill and for garbage collection units throughout the county this week. The equipment will be purchased from an Appalachian

Regional Commission (ARC) grant administered by the Farmer's Home Administration.

The county has leased land located in the center of the county one mile off Highway 25 South near Midway. Signs will be posted to indicate the exact

location of the landfill in the near future. According to the anticipated growth for the area, this location should be suitable for at least ten years.

A man will be on duty to supervise and to eliminate air pollution the trash will be buried daily and not burned. According to the Board of Supervisors, the new landfill will be inspected by the Mississippi State Board of Health and will meet all requirements in pollution and sanitary regulations and control.

The municipalities in the county should be able to use

the sanitary landfill within 30 to 60 days. Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs stated that the City of Iuka will continue to pick up the Iuka city resident's garbage on a regular basis, but the Iuka City Dump will be closed as soon as the county landfill can be used. The county-wide use should be in operation in three to six months. Dumpsters will be located throughout the county for individuals to dispose of their trash, which the county will then dump into compactors and carry to the landfill in closed trucks. This will eliminate the scattering of garbage along the highways.

NRC Public Hearing On Proposed Nuclear Plant

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission will hold a public hearing to be conducted by an Atomic Safety and Licensing Board to determine whether construction permits should be issued to the Tennessee Valley Authority authorizing construction of the proposed Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant, Units 1 and 2, in Tishomingo County, Mississippi. The hearing will be held in the vicinity of the proposed facilities at a time and place to be set later. Issues to be considered at the hearing include both radiological safety and environmental. These issues are specified in a FEDERAL REGISTER notice published on February 10, 1977.

Members of the public who wish to participate in the hearing may do so in one of two ways:

1. They may make a limited appearance. A person making a limited appearance does not become party to the proceeding but may state his position and raise questions which he would like to have answered to the extent that the questions are within the scope of the hearing and are permitted by the Licensing Board. Persons desiring to make a limited appearance are requested to inform the Secretary of the Commission, U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, D.C. 20555, Attention: Docketing and Service Section, by March 14, 1977. A copy of the petition should also be sent to the Executive Legal Director, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, D.C. 20555, and to Herbert S. Sanger, Jr., Esquire, General Counsel, Tennessee Valley Authority, 400 Commerce Avenue, Knoxville, Tennessee 37902, attorney for the applicant.

A petition for leave to intervene must be accompanied by a supporting affidavit which identifies the specific aspects of the proceeding as to which intervention is desired and specifies with particularity the facts on which the petitioner relies as to both his interest and his contentions with regard to each aspect on which intervention is requested.

2. They may petition for leave to intervene. A person permitted to intervene becomes

a party and has a right to participate in the conduct of the hearing. For example, he may present evidence and examine and cross-examine witnesses.

Any person whose interest may be affected by the proceeding who wishes to participate as a party must file a petition for leave to intervene under oath or affirmation setting forth the interest of the petitioner in the proceeding, how that interest may be affected by the results of the proceeding, and the petitioner's contentions with respect to the proposed licensing action. Such petition must be filed in accordance with the above-referenced FEDERAL REGISTER notice and must be filed with the Secretary of the Commission, U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, D.C. 20555, Attention: Docketing and Service Section, by March 14, 1977. A copy of the petition should also be sent to the Executive Legal Director, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Washington, D.C. 20555, and to Herbert S. Sanger, Jr., Esquire, General Counsel, Tennessee Valley Authority, 400 Commerce Avenue, Knoxville, Tennessee 37902, attorney for the applicant.

All petitions will be acted upon by the Licensing Board. Those petitions stating contentions relating only to matters outside the Commission's jurisdiction will be denied.

Meeting Of Interest

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Hwy. 25 Bridge Contract Ok'd

The Mississippi State Highway Commission paved the way for construction of the second Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway bridge with the award of a \$5.3 million contract for the project.

The bridge project was one of three road improvement contracts totaling more than \$8.8 million awarded during the regular meeting of the three member commission.

The commissioners awarded a contract of \$5,388,282 to

Bower-Johnson-Kimes Corp., of Jackson, Tenn., for construction of the Mississippi Highway 25 bridge across the waterway route near the Paden Community in Tishomingo County.

Last November, the commission awarded a \$4.5 million contract on the Mississippi Highway 25 bridge between Iuka and Crossroads in Tishomingo County. It was the first of 10 spans the state is obligated to build across the waterway in Northeast Mississippi.

The Long, Cold Winter Of 1977

The winter of '77 will long be remembered with one word - COLD. Cold can best describe the other inconveniences: gas shortages, frozen water pipes, damaged roads and school closings.

Although our gas supply is not critical at this time, if the cold weather continues and if we don't work together to cut-back on our fuel needs, it could be critical. Many throughout the area suffered through frozen or broken water pipes and the sub-freezing temperatures, snow and ice have caused extensive damage to secondary and county roads. All maintenance personnel are working full-time when weather allows to put the roads back in shape before the spring rains. The cost of road damage in the county was not available but it was reported that in some sections of the county the ground had been frozen to a depth of 18 inches. A bill is now in the State Legislature to cut the required number of school days of 175 to 165 days. According to County School Superintendent, Alvia Blakney, the county schools have missed eight days that will have to be made up if the bill is not passed. Three of these days could be made up during the Spring Holidays and the rest at the end of the school

term. Mr. Blakney also stated the county schools are now using 25% less fuel to help conserve energy and keep the schools open.

Spring - can it be far away to help ease the woes of winter? If it's true that misery loves company it may be some consolation to know that a lot of people this year have been miserably cold.

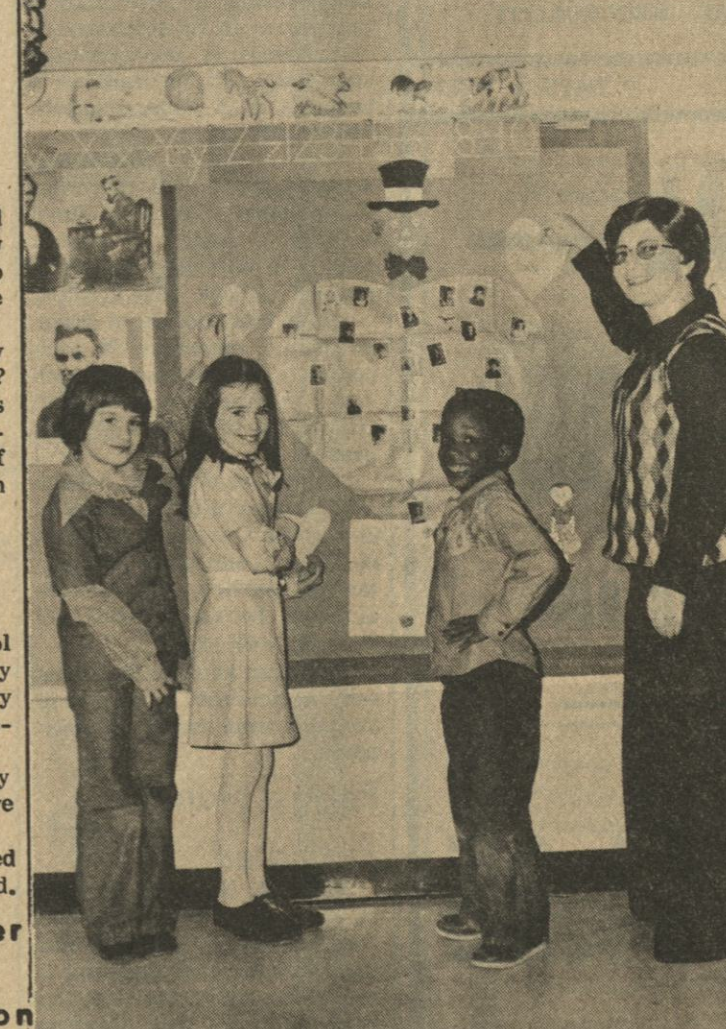
The Iuka Elementary School P.T.A. will hold its monthly meeting Thursday, February 10, at 7:00 p.m. in the Elementary Cafeteria.

WASHABLE LEATHER GLOVES

Suds Preserve Their Loveliness

It is advisable to look for leather gloves that are marked washable or include care instructions to benefit from the convenience and economy of at-home treatment.

Generally, American-made leather gloves, such as doeskin, calf and pig-skin, are washable since the tanning agents -- chrome or oil -- are soluble in water. Alum-tanned leather, however, is not washable and should be dry cleaned. Linings such as silk, cashmere, acrylic are also washable.

Once leather gloves are dry cleaned, they cannot be washed. So begin and continue to treat soiled gloves at home.

Although dark gloves don't show soil, they need washing often since they get dirty on the inside as well as on the

outside, and because they absorb perspiration. Wash light and dark color gloves separately. Wash doeskin off the hands; as a delicate leather, it tears easily when wet. Wash pig-skin, calf and other leathers on the hands. Apply rich warm detergent or soap lather with hand-washing motions, so that each glove hand washes the other. A wash cloth or soft brush is handy for gently rubbing heavily soiled areas such as fingertips.

When the outside surfaces are clean, reverse the gloves by carefully "peeling" or pushing them off from the cuffs down, and wash them inside. Rinse in clear warm water and squeeze gently; do NOT wring or twist. Remove excess moisture by blotting in a clean towel. Finger-press gloves while still damp, gently stretching, working and kneading. Dry leather away from direct heat or sun-

light. Before gloves are completely dry, work them onto hands to soften and reshape them. If dry, re-moistengloves in a damp towel before re-fitting them in the same way. Acrylics and blends and cotton gloves are generally machine washable and dryable, unless instructions state to the contrary. Hand wash wools and allow to dry flat before stretching back into shape. Do not rub wools; this can cause pilling, matting or shrinking. Since man-made fiber gloves such as vinyl may be fur-lined for warmth, simply wash the outside with a sudsy cloth. Fur cannot be washed.

GUARD AGAINST CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

Because of the unusually cold winter, many people are looking for additional heat sources. If you use a fuel-burning heater regularly, vent it to the outside. Or if you must use one that isn't vented, leave a window open at least one inch. Turn it off at night, because carbon monoxide is produced when fuels burn incompletely, as almost all fuels do to some extent. When a generous supply of fresh air is available, and the fuel is burning properly, there is little danger of carbon monoxide poisoning. But operating an improperly adjusted fuel-burning heater in a closed area without air can be fatal.

Use particular care in mobile homes which are smaller and may have less adequate ventilation than houses.

Resist the urge to warm the house by leaving the oven door open. You could get carbon monoxide poisoning as a result.

QUICK-n-EASY CHERRY PUDDING

1/2 pkg. cake mix (white or

yellow or spice), or 1 small pkg. cake mix designed for one layer
1 no. 303 can red, tart cherries
1 1/2 cups cherry juice (drained from cherries) and water
3/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch

Drain cherries, measure juice and add water to make 1 1/2 cups. Mix cake batter according to package directions. Pour batter in un-

greased 8 x 8 x 2" pan. Combine sugar and cornstarch. Sprinkle over batter. Arrange cherries on top of batter. Heat juice and water to boiling and pour over cherries. Bake at 375 degrees 45-50 minutes. Cake will rise to top and cherries will form sauce on bottom, similar to an upside-down cake. Serve warm or cold. If desired, sprinkle 3/4 cup finely chopped nuts on top of mixture before adding the juice and water.

FEEDING CATTLE

We still have approximately 1 1/2 months to feed our cattle unless we have an exceptionally early spring. We do not know yet the status of the emergency feed program for our area. The request for Tishomingo County to be declared eligible has been sent to Washington and we are waiting action.

The following information was recently released by Dr. James C. Collins, Leader, Extension Animal at MSU.

As all of you know, we are experiencing an unusually cold, long winter and are doing this with a short supply of hay and no winter grazing.

Hay is in extremely short supply and almost impossible to find. There appears to be some small amount in some locations. What this means is that, for the most part, only local feeds are available. There does not appear to be a supply of hay for sale in any state.

Producers must consider feeds other than hay and feeds that will "stretch" what hay remains. Listed below are several rations using corn and hulls to supplement hay.

COW WITH CALF

RATION #1
21# hay
2# protein supplement

RATION #2
11# hay
10# hulls
2# protein supplement

RATION #3
7# hay
7# hulls
5# corn
2# protein supplement

This shows that cottonseed hulls can replace hay, pound for pound, if it is properly supplemented with protein. Also, corn can replace hay or hulls and furnish more energy. Three pounds of corn can replace 5-6 pounds of hay or hulls.

450 POUND YEARLINGS
RATION #1
10# hay
1 1/2# protein supplement

RATION #2
5# hay
5# corn
1# protein supplement

RATION #3
5# hulls
5# corn
1# protein supplement

Many combinations can be made. The best ration will depend upon supply available and cost.

Grain sorghum may be substituted for corn on a pound for pound basis. Actually, sorghum is 90-95 percent as efficient as corn.

I hope this information will help you play your feeding program.
