The Mississippi Park Commission hereby gives public notice of a floating Courtesy Boat Dock to be installed at J. P. Coleman State Park near Iuka, Mississippi.

In compliance with requirements of Section 401 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251, 1341), the Mississippi Park Commission has requested certification from the Mississippi Air and Water Pollution Control Commission that the above mentioned activity will be in compliance with applicable provisions of Section 301 (33 U.S.C. 1311), Section 302 (33 U.S.C. 1312), Section 306 (33 U.S.C. 1316), and Section 307 (33 U.S.C. 1317) of the Act and appropriate requirements of the State law. Any persons wishing to make comments pertinent to this certification must submit such comments in writing to the Mississippi Air and Water Pollution Control Commission at P. O. Box 827, Jackson, Mississippi 39205, before 10:00 A.M. on the third Tuesday following the publication of this notice; at such time, certification will be considered.

Summer Program

Governor Finch recently announced the allocation of CETA funds for the Summer Youth Program totaling \$6,996,061. This program is federally funded and is sponsored by the Governor's Office - Job Development and Training, under the direction of Mr. J. H. McMillan. The Summer Youth Program will be operating in 80 counties within the state (excluding Hinds and Rankin), with recruitment taking place mostly in the schools.

Governor Finch stated "The Summer Youth Program is primarily concerned with high school dropout prevention through developing good work habits, work training, and counseling services. The program is designed for economically disadvantaged students, 14 - 21 years old."

The Governor further explained that participating student's work will generally take place within the school itself, with such tasks as janitorial, typing of all kinds, keeping school records, serving as a library aid, or ground maintenance being performed.

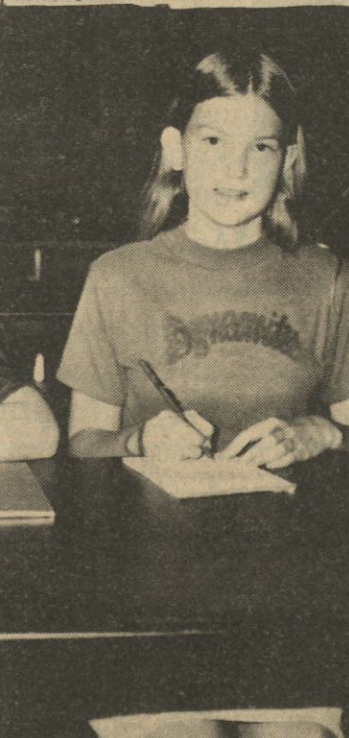

Two Ladies Killed In Burnsville Car Crash

A 36-year-old Burnsville woman and a 55-year-old Memphis woman were killed Friday, March 11, in a two-car accident on Highway 72 near Burnsville.

The Burnsville woman was identified as Mrs. Norma Jean Walker, wife of Roy Walker. Mrs. Walker was alone in the car. Authorities identified the second victim as Mrs. Christine Butler, of Memphis, a passenger in a car driven by her husband, Lester A. Butler.

Mr. Butler was taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka and then transferred to St. Joseph Hospital East in Memphis where he was listed in critical condition in the hospital's intensive care unit.

The accident occurred at approximately 5:30 p.m. Friday less than a mile outside Burnsville city limits. According to

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, the cause of the crash is not known but the accident is being investigated by the Mississippi Highway Patrol and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Funeral services for Mrs. Walker, an employee of Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, were held Sunday, March 13, at 2 p.m. at Harmony Hill Baptist Church with Rev. Billy Paul Feltman officiating. Burial was in Harmony Hill Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include her husband, Roy Walker, Burnsville; three daughters, Mrs. Pamela Lynn Johnson, Burnsville, Mrs. Daisy Wilson, Burnsville, Miss Georgia Byrd, Burnsville; two sons, David Byrd and Timothy Byrd, both of Burnsville; her

father, Virgil Clark, Dayton, Ohio; one sister, Joann Grubbs, Louisville, Ky.; two brothers, Jim Clark and Randall Clark, both of Dayton, Ohio; and three grandchildren.

Funeral services for Mrs. Butler were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, March 13, at Memphis Funeral Home Poplar Chapel with a graveside service at 3:30 p.m. Monday in Elmwood Cemetery in Birmingham, Ala.

Mrs. Butler also leaves two sons, Robert A. Butler and Jimmy L. Butler, both of Nashville; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Wells; a sister, Mrs. Lily Dowd; and three brothers, Joe Wells, William Wells and Hiram Wells, all of Birmingham; and a grandchild.



County Man Dies In Crash

A Mississippi man was killed and another injured near Selmer, Tennessee Friday afternoon, March 11, when the car they were riding in hit a pole and overturned, according to the Tennessee Highway Patrol.

Killed was Lloyd Chester (Cooter) Whirley, 32, of Burnsville, Miss., a Southern Railway track repairman. Injured but in satisfactory condition is Ernie Lee Waldon, 43, of Walnut, Miss.

Whirley was driving west on Tennessee 57 when he ran through a stop sign at the intersection of Tennessee 22, went off the road, hit a utility

pole and overturned, the patrol reported. Both men were thrown from the car.

Services for Mr. Whirley were held Sunday, March 13, at Glendale Baptist Church in Glen, Miss. Burial was in the church cemetery.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Paulette Whirley; three sons, Rickie Whirley, Anthony Whirley and Randy Whirley; two daughters, Cynthia Whirley and Theresa Whirley; and a sister, Mrs. Bertha Meeks, all of Burnsville; and two brothers, Lester Whirley, Jr., of Corinth, and Jessie Whirley, of Jasper, Ala.

Accident Takes Life Of Dennis Man

Two men were killed as the result of a multi-vehicle accident on Highway 45A near Prairie Tuesday morning, March 15.

Killed in the accident were J. C. Milam, 25, Dennis; and Milton Terry, Jr., 32, West Point.

One other person, not identified, was injured in the accident, which involved several trucks.

The wreck blocked traffic on the highway for several hours. Mississippi Highway Patrol officials in Starkville District Office said details were not available and that the accident was still under investigation.

Mr. Milam was a truck driver for Nichols Trucking Company of Belmont, and Mr. Terry was a pipefitter for Babcock and Williams Company of West Point.

Services for Mr. Milam will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 17, at the East Prentiss Baptist Church with burial in the church cemetery.

Milam is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Delton Milam, Dennis; three brothers, Charles Milam, Tupelo, David and Bobby Milam, both of Dennis.

BEEF PRICES
REMARKABLY MANAGED
Beef isn't really so expensive when you look at the long road it has traveled getting to you.

The process starts as a newborn calf and ends as a steak on your dinner table. It is remarkable that the process can be accomplished economically. The winter born calf is kept on the range for almost one year. In the fall it is shipped to a feedlot operator. There the animal eats its way through one and half tons of corn, hay and protein supplement and winds up as a 1,000 pound steer. All these feed ingredients have skyrocketed in price in recent months.

A packer will probably pay about \$400 for the steer and sell the resulting 600 pounds of carcass beef to a retailer for the same amount. The 400 pounds of hide, tail and other inedible by-products he keeps as his operating margin.

The retailer, after the carcass is cut and trimmed, has only 450 pounds to sell. He would have to sell it at 80 cents a pound to recover what

he paid for the carcass. Profit and operating expenses such as labor and merchandising add another 30 cents a pound for even the most efficient retailer. Most of the 450 pounds of beef consists of ground beef, stewing meat and pot roasts that sell at or under \$1.10 a pound. Retailers must charge much more for the choice cuts to make even a small profit.

There is also another factor that drives the price of meat up. Everybody is eating higher off the hog or steer these days and consumer competition for the choice cuts reflects in higher prices at the retail level.

DAIRY PRODUCTS PROVIDE NUTRIENTS ECONOMICALLY
Everyone needs dairy products daily. The recommended servings range from two eight-ounce glasses for the very young and those over 18 years of age to four or more eight-ounce glasses for teenagers.

Dairy products are important sources of calcium, riboflavin and protein. Other essential nutrients, including vitamin B 12 are also present in milk. If members of your family

don't like to drink milk, try these ideas:

*Serve fresh fruit and cheddar cheese cubes for desserts and snacks.

*Keep a tray of cheese kabobs for snacking. Use cheese cubes and apples or cheese cubes and olives on toothpicks.

*Serve salads featuring cottage cheese.

*Flavor the glass of milk with honey, chocolate or peanut butter.

*Make cream soups with milk.

*Serve more puddings made with milk for dessert.

*Use hot cocoa and cookies for the before-bedtime snack.

Milk and milk products give much nutritive value for their share of your food dollar.

BARBECUED POT-ROAST
3 to 4 pound chuck roast
3 tablespoons drippings
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup catsup
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon brown sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 medium onion, sliced

Brown pot roast in drippings and drain. Season with pepper and 1 teaspoon salt. Mix together remaining ingredients and add to pot-roast. Cover tightly and simmer 3 1/2 to 4 hours or until tender. Thicken liquid for gravy.

STRETCHING FERTILIZER SUPPLIES AND DOLLARS

The time of heavy fertilizer use on Mississippi farms is here. There are several practices farmers should follow to get the most crop response from fertilizer as well as to reduce fertilizer costs.

The first step is to soil test to see where phosphorus and potash are needed most. Many soils are high in phosphate and potash, especially if high rates of fertilizer have been used for several years. Nitrogen should be applied as near to the time as the crop will actually use it as possible. Some nitrogen is lost through leaching or volatilization if applied now for this year's crop.

Another suggestion is to omit nitrogen or legume crops that seldom, if ever, respond to its use. Major crops that do not need nitrogen are soybeans and clover-grass pastures with good stands of clover. Plant legumes in permanent grass pasture to help supply nitrogen for grass.

Lime all soils that need lime. This improves the fertilizer efficiency, especially of phosphorus. Soil testing is the only way to know for sure which soils need lime. It's not too late to lime for this year's crops.

Use of poultry or other animal waste where available will also help reduce fertilizer costs. They substitute for or supplement commercial fertilizers. A good rule of thumb for dry barnyard fertilizers or poultry litter is to expect about 2-1-1 fertilizer grade.

Nitrogen materials in good supply usually are cheaper, too. Anhydrous ammonia, ammonium nitrate and urea are in

good supply. Likely anhydrous ammonia will be farmer's best buy if he can use it. It must be sealed into the soil.

Band placement of fertilizer on soils testing low in phosphorus will increase efficiency of the applied phosphate.

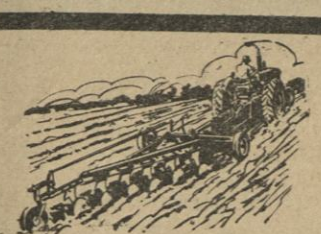
PLANT VEGETABLE SEED CORRECTLY

Planting vegetable seed at the correct depth is necessary to get a good stand of plants. Many of the cool season leafy greens such as mustard, lettuce and turnips have very small seed. Covering these seed with too much soil will result in poor germination and reduce plant stands. To avoid this, don't cover small vegetable seed with more than one-fourth inch of soil.

If you plan to grow small seeded vegetables varieties in heavy soils, it's a good idea to mix sand or peat moss into the row. This will reduce soil compaction and improve seed germination.

GRAZING CLOVER PASTURES

As clover pastures produce lush growth, they should be heavily grazed. It's recommended that cattle be given a fill of dry forage before being turned onto lush clover. This will help prevent bloat. Give grazing preference to cows with calves if there isn't enough clover pasture for the entire herd. Clover is a good source of magnesium, which helps reduce the grass tetany threat and often aids in getting cows rebred.

TARGET PRICES ANNOUNCED

Henry L. Knox, County Executive Director of Tishomingo County, reported the following 1977 target prices: Wheat, \$2.47 per bushel; corn, \$1.70; sorghum, \$1.62; barley, \$1.39; and upland cotton 47.80 cents per pound.

Knox said 1977 prices were adjusted from 1976 levels to reflect increases in the index of prices paid by farmers for production items, interest, taxes and wage rates, as well as changes in the three-year moving average of yields for each crop.

"Target prices represent a floor price that eligible producers may receive for their crops," Knox said. If the national average market price of a particular crop falls below the target price, a deficiency payment is made equal to the difference between the target price and the market price, he explained. Deficiency payments have not been made on wheat, feed grains or upland cotton in the three years of the program.

Target prices are also used to determine disaster payments if a farmer is prevented from planting a crop, or if yields are substantially reduced. The disaster payment rate is generally one-third of the target price for each commodity, Knox said. Last year's target prices were \$2.29 per bushel for wheat; \$1.57 for corn; \$1.49 for sorghum; \$1.29 for barley; and 43.20 cents per pound for upland cotton. Applications for all ASCS Programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed or national origin.

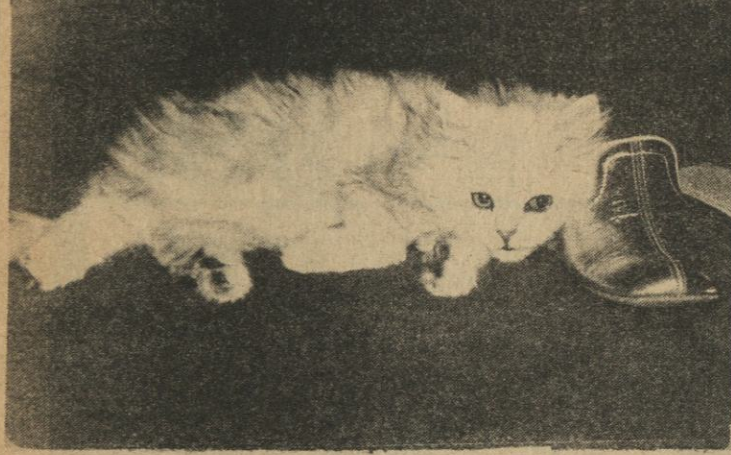

FROSTY
Frosty is one of the cutest kittens I've seen in many a day. And one of the luckiest.

Why do I think he's so fortunate? Well, I'll tell you. He lives in a home where the man and the wife are both crazy about him -- both equally interested in his welfare. And that mutual feeling about the family pet doesn't always exist.

Now, of course, there are a lot of wives and husbands, I'm sure, who both like their pet. But quite often, the man will

prefer a dog; the wife, a cat -- or vice versa. In plenty of homes there will even be several kinds of animals. But I still say it's "right rare" to find a couple who both have a deep, sincere feeling for their pets.

I have a very good humane friend who told me that her husband didn't care how many stray cats she brought home because he loved cats himself. But he had forbidden her to bring in more than one dog! He'd tolerate one dog -- but he didn't care for it!

Anyway, back to Frosty. He is definitely appreciated by both his folks, Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Easterling, of Iuka, Miss.

Jimmy and Jeanette got Frosty from Mrs. Danny Holland when the kitten was eight weeks old. As Mrs. Holland herself likes cats very much, I'm certain she knew that Frosty was going into a good home when he went to live with Jimmy and Jeanette Easterling. (Mrs. Holland lives off the Coleman Park Road, in the Hubbard Salem Community, a few miles from Iuka.)

Now about seven months old, Frosty is going to be neutered when he's a little older. This humane operation will be a blessing for Frosty in more ways than one. It will make him more content to stay in the house (the only safe place for a cat).

And in addition to helping Frosty, the operation will prevent many kittens from being born that would not have homes after they arrive in this already overpopulated cat and dog world. I cannot stress enough what a kindness it is for a cat or dog to be "fixed" so that it cannot have or cause litters.

Frosty will also probably be declawed because he is a house cat. Declawing a cat will help save your furniture and when done by a good veterinarian, I understand that the operation is fairly simple. We have never had one of our cats declawed; but if you could see our furniture, I wouldn't have to tell you this fact! (Outside cats should never be declawed because you take away their defense and they'd be helpless against their enemies; but a scratching post will NOT keep cats from scratching furniture. I know from experience.)

Thank you, Jimmy and Jeanette Easterling, for giving Frosty a kind, responsible home.

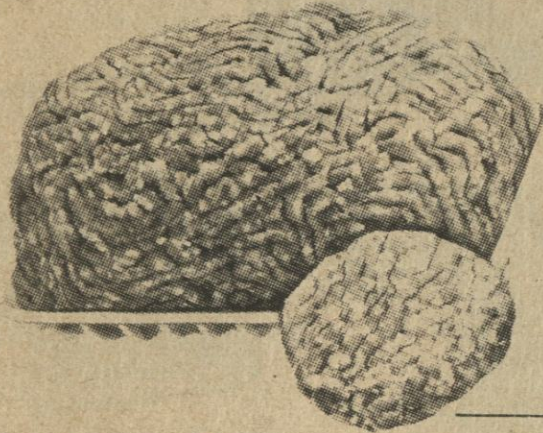
