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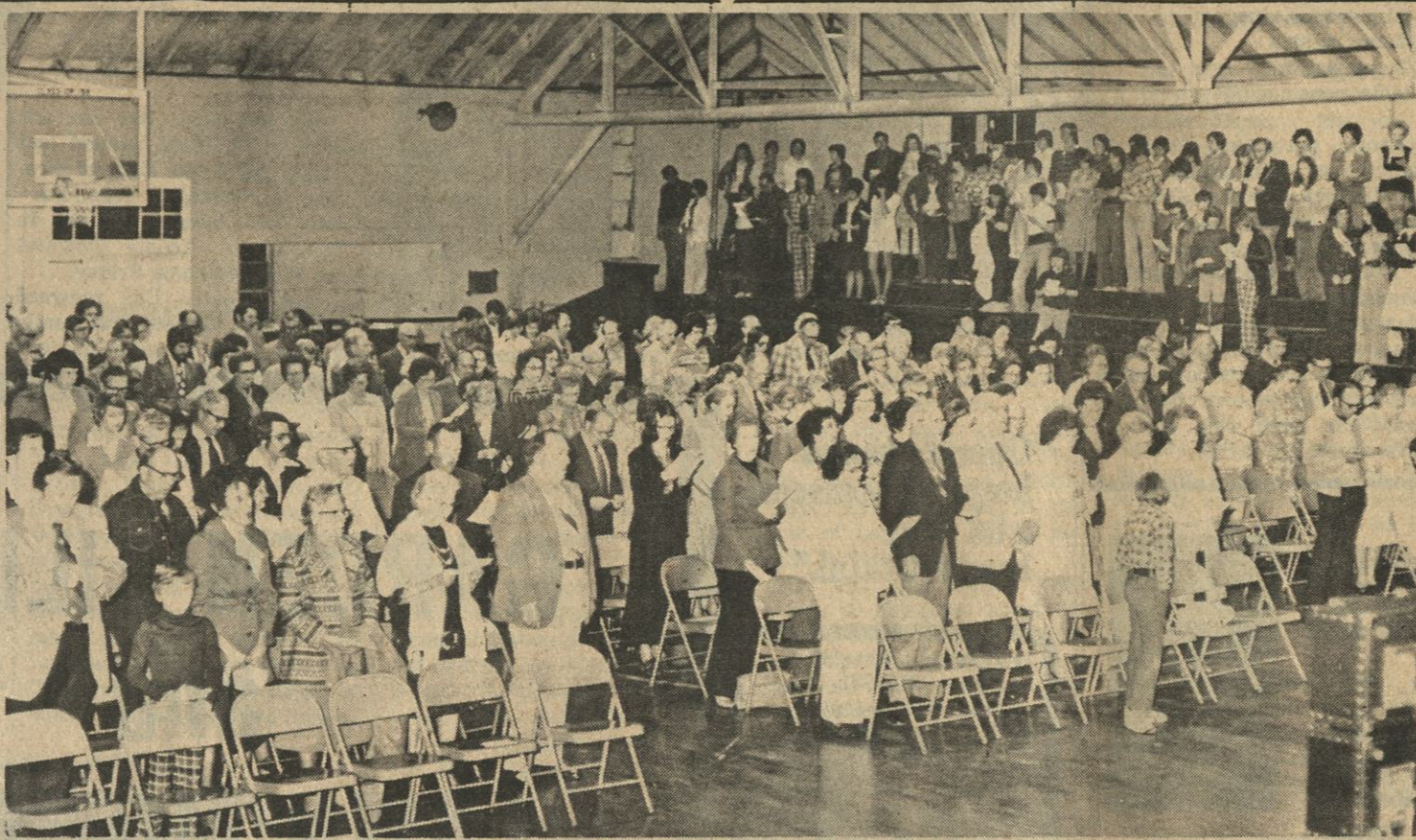
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Crusade Draws 750 On Opening Night In Iuka

Floyd Whitaker Announces For Chief Of Police

Floyd Clayton Whitaker, a resident of Iuka, takes this means to announce his candidacy for the office of Chief of Police of the City of Iuka. Mr. Whitaker's personal statement to the voters of the City of Iuka is as follows:

I am Floyd C. Whitaker and am married to Anita Faye Cox Whitaker. We have two children, Brian and Felicia. We are residents of the City of Iuka. My parents are Mr. and Mrs. Calude Whitaker and I am one of nine children. I am 27 years of age.

I was educated in the Burnsville School system and have worked locally at Jourdan Hardware and for the firm of Dunbar & Sullivan in the dredging of Yellow Creek. I am presently the Constable for the Third Supervisors District, having campaigned successfully for that post during the last general election. Previously I was elected to fill the unexpired term of the late Mr. Bob Waters as Constable of the First Supervisors District in Tishomingo County. I have served as a member of the Police Force for the City of Iuka and as a member of the Police Force for the City of Cherokee, Alabama. Yellow Creek Port Seeks Bonding Hike And Local Support

The House Ways and Means subcommittee voted to kill a bill authorizing \$10 million bonding authority for Yellow Creek Port Authority stating the legislature should see some enthusiasm for self-help from the counties involved.

A search of the legislative history of the port in Tishomingo County revealed it was never intended to be treated in any fashion other than the local ports at Pascagoula, Yazoo City, Boliver, and so on. It was to be supported by local effort with the state only lending its expertise in issuing bonds to get the port started.

The original legislation authorized \$1.5 million in bonds with additional funds to be spent by Tennessee Valley Authority under a contract agreement with Tishomingo, Prentiss, Alcorn & Itawamba counties. The three counties had to join together to levy two mills before the port became operative, but they never did it. The other local ports, have always been generated by local interest in development and they have been willing to lay their resources on the line to insure that there would be no chance if the state having to pick up the tab.

The proposed \$10 million Yellow Creek Port bond authorization would have enlarged by more than six times the original bond authorization that created the port.

The port had \$400,000 in Appalachian Regional Commission money available for water and sewer, which only required \$100,000 match of local money and no one had taken steps to do anything except by proposing that we issue more bonds. The subcommittee felt the emphasis should be shifted from "looking at this as a state port to looking at it as really is: a local port."

Tishomingo County's assessed valuation is only \$10 million and an added mill wouldn't amount to anything. The bond authorization itself would equal Tishomingo County's assessed valuation.

Rep. Richard Clark, of Iuka, one of the authors of the measure, said he was not surprised

at the subcommittee's action.

"It was apparent to me by the questions asked by the subcommittee that they were not satisfied with the local contribution for the Yellow Creek project and they called on us to work towards obtaining more local funds in the way of millage or taxes or any other means of revenue before they would give the authority to issue bonds," said Clark.

Clark also said, "One of the reasons I voted for the voluntary reappraisal bill last week was to help counties like Tishomingo and Prentiss to provide enough funds through levying of millage for projects such as Yellow Creek Port; and under the present assessment it would be almost impossible to provide the needed revenues for the ongoing operation of the port, and something must be done on the

local level."

Yellow Creek Port Authority director Neil Davis said he expects to recommend a meeting between officials and agencies involved in the port project to discuss its funding problems.

Davis said he will ask the authority within 30 days to consider calling the meeting between supervisors from the three counties, key legislators, Tennessee Valley Authority representatives and port authority officials.

During the proposed meeting, legislators and port officials would advise the local leaders of the port's current situation. Davis said he did not expect to recommend actions for the local officials to consider.

"It is now obvious to us that the state legislature now views the port as a local project," Davis added.

NOTES

HANDLING THE GAUZE:

100% cotton gauze has a soft, crinkly texture which is quite flexible. The gauze look-alikes, made from blends, both crinkled and plain, are more stable. These blends require no special sewing techniques. The following information is helpful for stitching the 100% cotton gauzes and other similar textured fabrics.

PREPARATION:

Pre-wash natural gauze fabric before layout and cutting to prevent later shrinkage. Some precautions for color fastness are a must, if care instructions are not indicated on the hangtag or bolt end. Wash with cold water on a delicate cycle and line dry or machine dry on a permanent press setting.

LAYOUT AND CUTTING:

Since the very nature of gauze is flexibility, allow it to "relax" on a flat cutting surface before layout and cutting. Don't let the fabric hang off the edge of the cutting surface. Use very sharp scissors. Avoid stretching fabric unnecessarily as you cut since this can distort the

garment sections.

STITCHING:

Polyester or cotton-covered polyester thread is recommended due to its stretchability. Use medium tension and pressure on the presser foot for easy feeding of fabric, and a very sharp regular needle or ballpoint needle (size 11). Make a test sample of stitching, 10-12 stitches per inch, both on the lengthwise and crosswise grain. Pull stitched seam; if thread breaks, test again with more stitches per inch. Seams must be able to "give" with the fabric in wearing.

STRETCH STITCHES:

You may also try one of the stretchy stitches available on some sewing machines, such as a special stretch stitch, a tiny zigzag stitch, or an overedge stitch. Some seams, shoulder or waistline seams, may need to be stabilized to prevent stretching. For these, include seam tape when stitching seams.

FINISHING:

Gauze seam allowances do ravel. To finish them, you have three options: turn the seam

edge under and stitch, zigzag stitch along the edge, or straight stitch 1/8" from edge and pink. FRENCH SEAM:

Since gauze tend to be slightly sheer, the mock French seam is a nice finish for straight seams. Stitch a plain seam, then turn raw edge of seam allowances in toward each other, matching folded edges. Stitch together close to folds.

INTERFACING:

Fusible, nonwoven interfacing with "built-in" give in one direction are ideal for adding some firmness, while maintaining the flexibility of the fabric. For more rigid firmness, a conventional woven or nonwoven can be used. Test any fusible interfacing on a fabric scrap first to see if it forms on the right side. If it does, try pinning the edge of the interfacing before fusing, or fuse it to the facing.

UNDERLINING:

Part of the beauty of gauze is its sheerness. However, if an underlining is desired, cut the underlining on the bias or use a second layer of gauze.

BUTTONHOLES:

Machine-made buttonholes are best. Place them on the lengthwise direction, since they have a tendency to "gap" otherwise. Use a fusible interfacing in the buttonhole area for stability.

TOPSTITCHING:

Test on the same number of layers before stitching garment. Use polyester top-stitching thread in the upper threading

and polyester thread in the bobbin. Tension should be slightly loosened. Use 7-9 stitches per inch.

HEMS:

Allow garment to hang 24 hours before hemming. Finish hem edge with a machine zigzag or overedge stitch so it "gives" with the garment. Use a loose catchstitch or tailor's hem.

PRESSING:

Set iron for correct fiber content and press with an up and down motion (not gliding) to avoid stretching the gauze out of shape.

LEMON POT ROAST

3 1/2 to 4 lb. beef arm pot roast
2 tablespoons oil
1 bay leaf
1 onion, sliced
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon lemon pepper
3/4 cup water
4 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons brown sugar
3 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon cornstarch

Brown pot roast in oil in Dutch oven until golden brown on all sides. Pour off fat. Add bay leaf, onion, salt, lemon pepper and 3/4 cup water. Cook 2 1/2 hours until fork tender. Combine catsup, brown sugar, vinegar and raisins. Pour over roast and heat 20 minutes. Thicken sauce with cornstarch and 1/2 cup water. Sauce is great for other cuts such as brisket and spareribs.

GRASS TETANY

Grass tetany, sometimes called grass staggers, magnesium tetany or wheat poisoning, may be a problem for cattle following heavy spring rains when grass is growing rapidly. Cows that have recently calved are highly susceptible to this disease.

Feeding one-half to one ounce of magnesium oxide or epsom salts per head daily will help prevent this condition. Some researchers say that grass tetany can be prevented by feeding one to two pounds of cottonseed meal before grazing. Call a veterinarian promptly if grass tetany is noted in your herd.

LIQUID OR SOLID

Most farmers have a choice of using either solid or liquid fertilizer on their cropland. Liquid fertilizers have been used satisfactorily for years and have proved equal to solid fertilizers when applied at the same rate and in the recom-

mended manner. However, small amounts of liquid fertilizer will not replace large amounts of dry fertilizer.

The most important thing to remember when choosing a fertilizer is to pick one that meets the requirements of your soil. The only way to be sure of this is to take a soil sample and have it analyzed. Information and materials for taking soil samples are available at your local Extension Service Office.

FERTILIZE FESCUE AND RYEGRASS

If ryegrass and fescue pastures haven't been topdressed during the past six weeks, you should fertilize them now with about 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 150 pounds of urea per acre. Ryegrass and fescue pastures are the least expensive forage that a farmer will grow all year. The application of nitrogen will produce about one ton of good quality grazing

or hay from ryegrass, or about six weeks of good grazing on fescue. Fescue can also be cut for hay, even though the quality will not be as good as ryegrass hay.

DON'T PLANT TOO EARLY

Don't get in too much of a hurry about planting warm season vegetables crops in your home garden. There's still plenty to do in caring for the plantings already made and in completing the planting of cool season crops.

The lowest soil temperature for germination of plants like beans, sweet corn, okra, southern peas and tomatoes is 60 degrees or higher. So for best results, let the soil warm up before planting these vegetables.

4-H'ERS LEARN NOT TO BURN

Through her special 4-H training, Lynette, of Weirton, West Virginia, saved her family from disaster.

When she was 13, Lynette and a 4-H teammate created a visual demonstration on "What to do in case of fire".

Two years later, Lynette and two younger children in the

family were asleep while their mother was out and their father was downstairs.

Lynette awoke "feeling that something was wrong". Alerting her father, who quickly discovered an electrical fire in progress, Lynette next telephoned a fire fighter who lived nearby, informed him of the house and fire's location, then ran upstairs for the others.

Remembering instructions from her 4-H demonstration, Lynette placed wet cloths over the faces of the youngsters to help them breathe in the thickening smoke. Finally, carrying her little brother, she led her 13-year-old sister to the safety of a neighbor's home. She even remembered to close doors between the room on fire.

Lynette's composure and prompt actions allowed her father to locate and fight the fire until help arrived, without added worry over his children's safety. Her 4-H lessons saved the day -- and the family and home as well.

HELP FRIENDLESS YOUNGSTERS

A youngster who is having trouble making friends may need your help. But before you act, find the reason why he doesn't have friends, suggests Leo Yates, New Mexico Extension Family Life Specialist.

If the youngster just moved into your area, working into a

new group can be difficult. Other youngsters may have formed cliques and be slow to let someone new join their group. This will take time, so be patient.

Invite the youngster to join activities, group like 4-H can help him. If he is having trouble because of the way he behaves, talk to teachers or specialist who can help. Overly aggressive or overly shy children may need those symptoms treated so they can better relate to others.

Also, some kids, just as some adults, prefer being by themselves or with one or two persons, rather than a crowd. This isn't necessarily a problem, says Leo. Just respect the child's feelings and need for privacy, and help him find activities in a small group.

Regency Square To Be Built

Regency Square, destined to become the largest regional enclosed mall in northern Alabama, is currently being developed in Florence by Ralph Biernbaum, of Stamford, Connecticut. It will consist of more than 630,000 sq. ft. and 76 stores, including five department stores.

Available space is 87% leased. Major tenants include Sears, 135,000 sq. ft.; J. C. Penney Co., 102,000 sq. ft.; Castner-Knott, 95,000 sq. ft.; Parisian, headquartered in Birmingham, will have a 50,000 sq. ft. store; and Pizitz, a Birmingham department store chain, will occupy 40,000 sq. ft.

First phase construction, consisting of site work, is scheduled to start April first of this year. Sears is expected to open in June of 1978,

with the rest of the center opening of August of that year. Permanent mortgage financing is with Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company of Philadelphia. Construction lender is the First National Bank of Florence, in association with the Third National Bank of Nashville.

Located on a 65-acre tract on Cox Creek Parkway, a perimeter road around Florence, Regency Square will be easily accessible to shoppers, and will provide parking for 3,500 cars.

Regency Square's exterior finish of warm beige brick will tie in with the earth tones used in the interior. Mall decor will feature many skylights, high ceilings, sunken fountains, and lush planters, providing a formal setting with a relaxed atmosphere. Mall floor covering will be of hand-made tiles, with selected seating areas floored in natural wood parquet. Architect is Marc Weissman Associates of New York City.

The developer of Regency Square, Ralph Biernbaum, is a nationally known figure in the shopping center development field. A former past president of the International Council of Shopping Centers and one of the pioneers in the shopping center industry, Biernbaum has developed over 7,000,000 sq. ft. of shopping centers since the beginning of his career in this field in 1940.

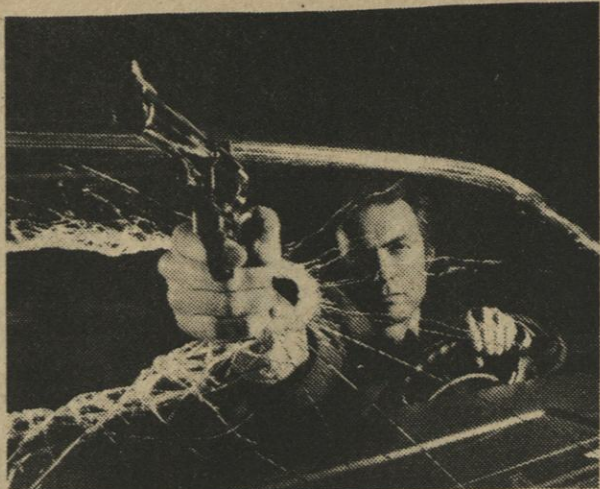
perhaps he would like to hear the viewpoint of one who believes compulsory school attendance law is essential and, in fact, lack of it can be indirectly "tyranny over the mind of men" since lack of education can put one in "bonds".

The proposed forced school attendance law would NOT change the purpose of our schools from education to detention but instead would provide the teachers the fullest opportunity to present education as it should be -- a continuous process -- not present one day and perhaps missing the next two -- thus causing the child mental anguish of lagging behind and the teacher the problem of presenting material on a dozen different levels for those who choose to miss school whenever they desire.

With reference to the trouble makers, just who can we place in this category? Surely not six, seven, eight, nine, and ten year olds unless they have been allowed to be absent from school so much that by the time they are in the fourth or fifth grade that they are frustrated, misplaced individuals (why we do need the law). Judging from teachers who complain about the extra work absenteeism causes, I would say this (rather than forced attendance) causes teacher fatigue. I hesitate to use the word "battle" fatigue since I feel if a teacher thinks of dealing with children in this term perhaps he is in the wrong profession. I believe teachers are trained with enough psychology to deal with the hyperactive child, to some degree, at least enough not to get into the "battle" category.

Special schools, special classes, special personnel, etc., may be expensive but I prefer trying to provide educational opportunities to give direction and meaning to people's lives rather than write them off as juveniles and later criminals and then pay for their upkeep in institutions when they cannot cope with society -- is this not just as expensive and look what it eventually does to society -- survival of the fittest!

Although I do not believe the average student dislikes school, I will agree that most children (like adults) would prefer to play rather than study but giving a child everything he wants is also the first rule for raising a juvenile delinquent so this alone tells us the child cannot always be given his way just to make his happy or less frustrated. According to my interpretation of the news media, the

damage to buildings, broken windows, etc. was not done by six to thirteen year olds in school but by the older youth whose parents allowed them freedom and they operate in gangs lashing out at society, not education.

Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it -- Pro. 22:6. Although this is my concluding statement, it is really first and foremost of my reasons in believing we owe it to our youngsters to see that they are properly exposed to education. I believe this is why mandatory school attendance is necessary!
