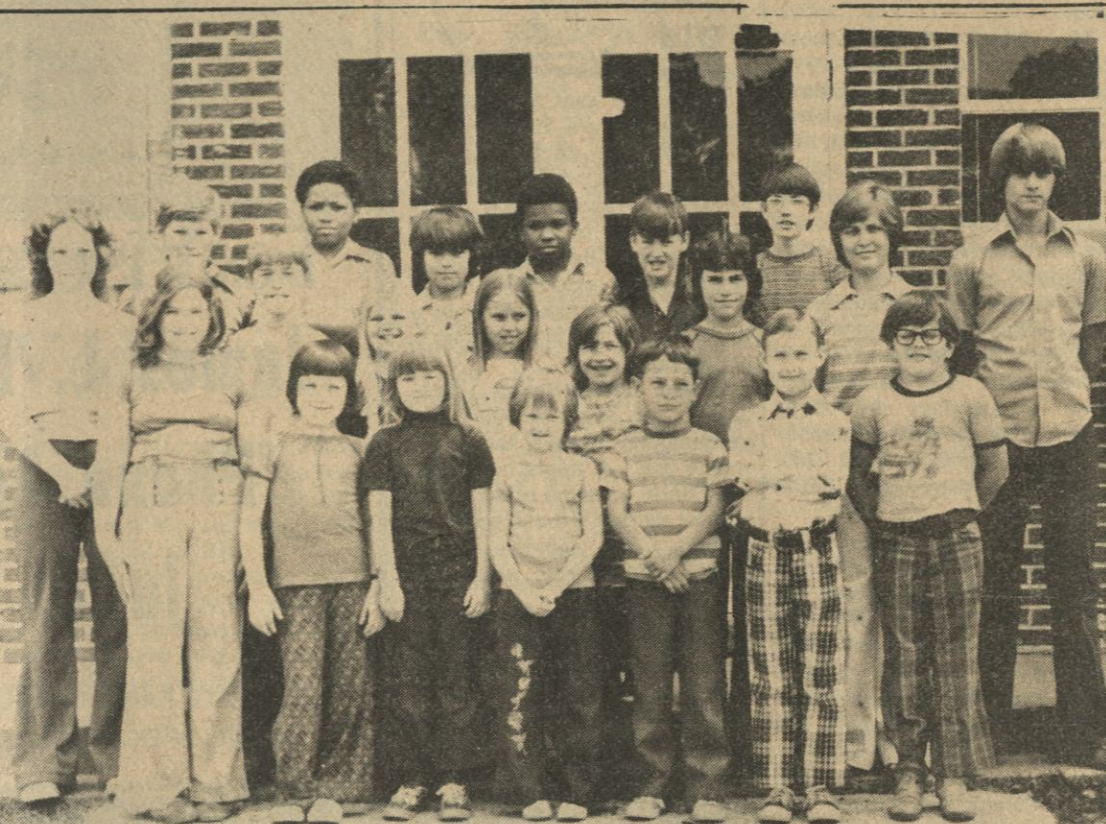

## Iuka Mail Going To Tupelo Center

Area mail processing is to be implemented at the Tupelo, Ms. Sectional Center Post Office April 23, 1977.

Area mail processing is applicable primarily to mail originating at post offices within the sectional center area destined for delivery outside the office of origin. It is not a curtailment of services, but a consolidation of mail volume for more efficient processing, better utilization of facilities and mechanized equipment and economy without detriment to the service.

Postmasters at effected offices will provide a box or boxes for deposit of mail for local postmark. All outgoing mail with the local postmark will be dispatched to the Tupelo Sectional Center post office for distribution.

The following post offices are included in the plan: Amory, Booneville, Fulton, Houston, Pontotoc, Baldwin, Belmont, Houka, Marietta, Nettleton, Okolona, Slaton, and Shannon. Corinth and Iuka will be phased in effective May 21, 1977.

## 43 Cases Disposed Of In Circuit Court

In April's Circuit Court, the Tishomingo County Grand Jury disposed of a total of 43 cases, twelve civil and thirty-one criminal, with Judge L. T. Senter, Jr. hearing the first week's cases and Judge Neal Biggers presiding over the second week.

Circuit Court Clerk Lamar Rutherford released the following Grand Jury Report, submitted by Jerry Allred, Foreman:

same be received by the Court and that we thereafter be fully and finally discharged.

We have been in session for 2 days, have heard testimony from 16 witnesses and return herewith into open court 11 true bills.

We have by committee examined the public buildings of the County and submit herewith our findings relative to the same.

We find the Tishomingo County Jail to be in generally a good state of repair, however, we recommend that the entire Jail receive a thorough cleaning and that the cell area needs painting as well as some other areas.

We find the Tishomingo

County Courthouse to be in generally a good state of repair, however, lighting needs to be re-arranged in the new Food Stamp Office. It was noted that there was no water fountain on the downstairs level of the Courthouse. The Chancery Clerk's office needs an electrical receptacle which would eliminate the need for an extension cord in this office. It is noted that there is now no Grand Jury Room and no suitable place for the Grand Jury to convene and conduct its business, and this body would recommend to the Board of Supervisors that they provide suitable accommodations in the form of a Grand Jury Room.

We find the County Home to be in need of numerous repairs, as follows: there is a broken electrical plug in the washhouse, the County Home is in need of a new top on the pump house, there are screens off of windows which need to be replaced, there are cobwebs in the hall inside the building, the men's bathroom leaks and also needs a thorough cleaning, holes were found in the tile on the floor in several places, six light fixtures were missing, the kitchen is in need of a thorough cleaning, there was a doorknob missing, there were two broken beds and there was a hot water leak on the hot water heater in the washhouse.

And now having submitted this our final report, we, the Grand Jury of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, for the April Term, 1977, beg to be discharged.

### POCKET WATCH

April 1 begins our second phase of POCKET WATCH -- April 1 to December 31 -- with emphasis on Foods and Nutrition. Many special events have been planned so be watching so you can learn to watch your pockets to save money. Mississippi Extension Home Economist wants to help you watch your pocket with money saving ideas from the Pocket Watch programs. When buying food, check the date on a perishable food. Be sure you can use all of it before it spoils.

### RECOGNIZE FEELINGS OF ANGER

Everyone has feelings, both good and bad. When one is happy, she doesn't hide it; that's healthy. Letting people know when one's angry is healthy, too, as long as feelings are expressed in healthy ways. Learn to admit your feelings rather than burying anger inside yourself. Repressed feelings are bound to explode. Try to become aware of your feelings. See if you can describe how you feel. Talking out a situation helps you blow off

steam without hurting anyone or anything. One young woman recalls how helpful this can be. Jean had been to a club meeting where things did not go well. In fact, she became so upset she got up and walked out. Jean hardly remembers driving home. But when she got there she did something positive about her feelings. Jean sat down and talked out her feelings while her husband listened. When she finished, her headache was gone and she felt human again. Her husband realized she didn't want advice. He merely listened while she blew off steam.

Driving home angry is dangerous. It's also an example of an unhealthy way to deal with anger. Talking it out is much safer.

When you begin to describe your feelings, you may not even know what they are. But when you share your feelings with someone you trust, you begin to know what you think and feel. This is a most important first step in dealing with anger.

**BEEF LOAF**  
2 pounds of ground beef  
1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/3 cup chopped green pepper  
2 medium-sized onions, chopped  
3/4 cup finely crushed cracker crumbs  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 cup catsup

Combine ground beef, tomato sauce, egg, Worcestershire sauce, green pepper, onions, cracker crumbs, salt and pepper. Mix lightly but thoroughly. Shape meat mixture into a loaf approximately 9" x 4" x 3" and place on a rack in an open roasting pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Pour catsup over top of beef loaf and continue baking 10 to 15 minutes or until done. 6 to 8 servings.

**PLANTING BERMUDAGRASS**  
Common and NK-37 bermudagrass are established from seed. Plant five pounds of hulled seed per acre between March 1 and June 1. Planting later in the year can be successful, but the forage from these grasses cannot be relied on the first year unless you plant early.

Coastal and Midland bermudagrass have to be planted by sprigging. Use about 20,000 sprigs per acre on a well prepared seedbed. Usually you set sprigs 2-3 feet apart. You can begin sprigging as early as February and complete by late June. If you have irrigation available, planting as late as bermudagrasses by "disking in" the fresh hay clippings, as is recommended for Alicia bermudagrass. Since Alicia bermudagrass has a very poorly developed rhizome (underground stem) system, it does not make many sprigs. Plant it with fresh hay clippings. Broadcast about 1,400 pounds of freshly cut mature plants per acre in May to August, depending on the time the clippings are available. One acre of good Alicia should provide enough planting material for clippings to plant 10-15 acres. Disk immediately after spreading and cultipak. A manure spreader is a good machine for spreading the clippings. Normally Alicia, Coastal, and Midland clippings will live in the soil for up to ten days following planting without a rain. Alicia has been reported to live longer without water than any other variety. It should be noted, however, that the earlier in the season you plant, the better the chances for survival, since most of the summer rainfall in Mississippi occurs by early July.

soil sample boxes and information sheets for you. If you do not have a soil test report, broadcast the equivalent of 500 pounds of 13-13-13 per acre at planting time and follow about five weeks later with the equivalent of 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre.

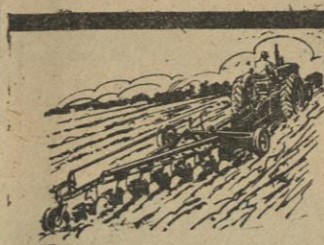
The amount of fertilizer for maintenance purposes should be determined by the amount of growth you desire. Again a soil test analysis should be followed for all lime, phosphate, and potash recommendations. If a mixed fertilizer is needed, apply it in April or May. Topdress once or twice during the season with a nitrogen-containing fertilizer for additional growth. An average annual maintenance fertilizer program is topdress in June with 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 150 pounds urea per acre. If you have an improved bermudagrass and desire more hay, an additional 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre applied in August should give another good quality hay cutting.

### GRAZING MANAGEMENT

Bermudagrass will persist under continuous grazing, but you can get much more grazing per acre with the same amount of fertilizer if your pastures are crossfenced. Try to provide at least three pastures and rotate cattle from one pasture to another on approximately ten-day intervals. This means that each pasture will get about 20 days rest between grazings. A grazing pressure of about three cows per acre should be used in determining the size of common bermudagrass pastures.

### NEW ASC STATE COMMITTEE NAMED IN MISSISSIPPI

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced on April 11, 1977, the appointment of Charles F. Riddell, of Canton, as chairman of the Mississippi Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. Named as committee members are: Wardell Gray, Carson; Pauline Wells Herring, Eddington; Jess Karr Hurdle, Holly Springs; and Dr. McKinley C. Martin, Clarksdale. The five-person committee is responsible for the State Administration of Federal Farm Programs.

Mr. Riddell, 47, has farmed in Madison County since 1949. He now plants approximately 2,200 acres of cotton and owns and operates a cotton gin. He also has 20 years of experience raising cattle. The Madison County farmer is a member of the Farm Bureau and the Mississippi Cattleman's Association. Active in community affairs, Mr. Riddell served as chairman of the Board of Directors for the Mississippi State Penitentiary for three years. He is also a member of the Kiwanis Club, Elks Club, and First Presbyterian Church of Canton.

Mr. Gray, 58, farms 300 acres in Jefferson Davis County, raising beef, hogs, and cotton. In addition to farming his own operation, he is part-time manager of the Prentiss Institute Farm for the Prentiss High School - Junior College. The new committeeman is a member of the Board of Directors of his County Cattleman's Association, a member of Farm Bureau and is active in 4-H Club activities. For the past four years he served as president of the Jefferson Davis County NAACP. Mr. Gray is a member of the American Legion, Masons, and the Methodist Church.

Mrs. Herring, 52, served three years on the Franklin County ASC Committee -- the first woman elected -- and was also the first woman appointed to the local Farmer's Home Administration Committee. The owner and operator of Ridge Point Ranch, Mrs. Herring raises soybeans and registered cattle. Mrs. Herring attended the University of Mississippi and is a member of the Farm Bureau, Mississippi Cattleman's Association and the Santa Gertrudis Association. She is active in activities of 4-H, Girl Scouts and the Bude Methodist Church.

Mr. Hurdle, 62, is the senior partner and part-owner of a farming operation which raises cattle, cotton and soybeans on 4,330 acres near Holly Springs. Chairman of the Marshall County ASC Committee, Mr. Hurdle has previous experience as a dairy farmer, businessman and state legislator. The University of Southern Mississippi graduate has served as president of the Marshall County Cattleman's Association, and has been a member of the Board of Directors of the First State Bank of Holly Springs, a member of Farm Bureau, American Legion, Holly Springs First Baptist Church and the Marshall County Education Foundation.

Dr. Martin, 40, grows cotton and soybeans on 260 acres in Coahoma County and teaches at Coahoma Junior College and at Delta State University. A Ph.D. graduate of Florida State Uni-

versity, Dr. Martin is a member of the Masons, Elks, NAACP, Alpha Phi Alpha and Phi Delta Kappa. The new appointee was nominated for the Outstanding Young Man in America Award in 1975. Dr. Martin serves as a deacon in the Arstede Chapel Baptist Church.

Many happy memories like this of the past afford a degree of pleasant reminiscing.

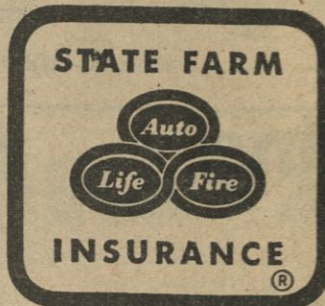

Cool and seal in jars. They will last two months.

with her in a ditch near Pickwick Lake by a conscientious little girl from Mexico, Aileen Bribiesca, then 9 years old. That was on July 20, 1970. Leeny is also survived by her constant companion and best canine friend, Charlie; a just-so-so friend, Mr. Black; and her definite enemy, Seppie.

Leeny despised the cats and had to be separated from them at all times. Despite this fact, the three surviving cats who saw Leeny daily -- at a distance -- still seem to be looking for her.

But Charlie was definitely grieved. He looked everywhere the first two days after her death; under and behind the large chair in their room -- everywhere. Outside in the fence, he'd run up and down, looking; he'd check their house that's inside the fence, puzzled. He was bewildered and didn't eat for the next three days. (And some people think animals have no feelings???)

After her daughter, Inky, got fully grown, she resented her little mama, Leeny, babying her so much -- and started fighting with her. At that time, we put them in separate quarters. So, I doubt if Inky really realizes that her gentle little mama is dead. But Charlie knows. And Art and I know.

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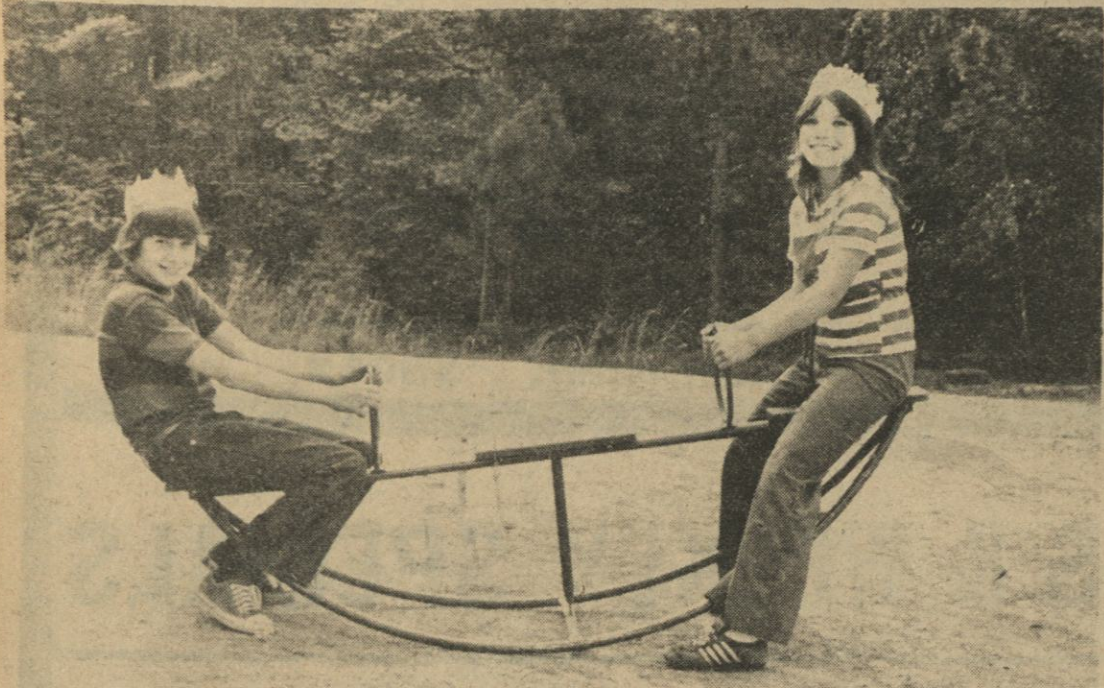

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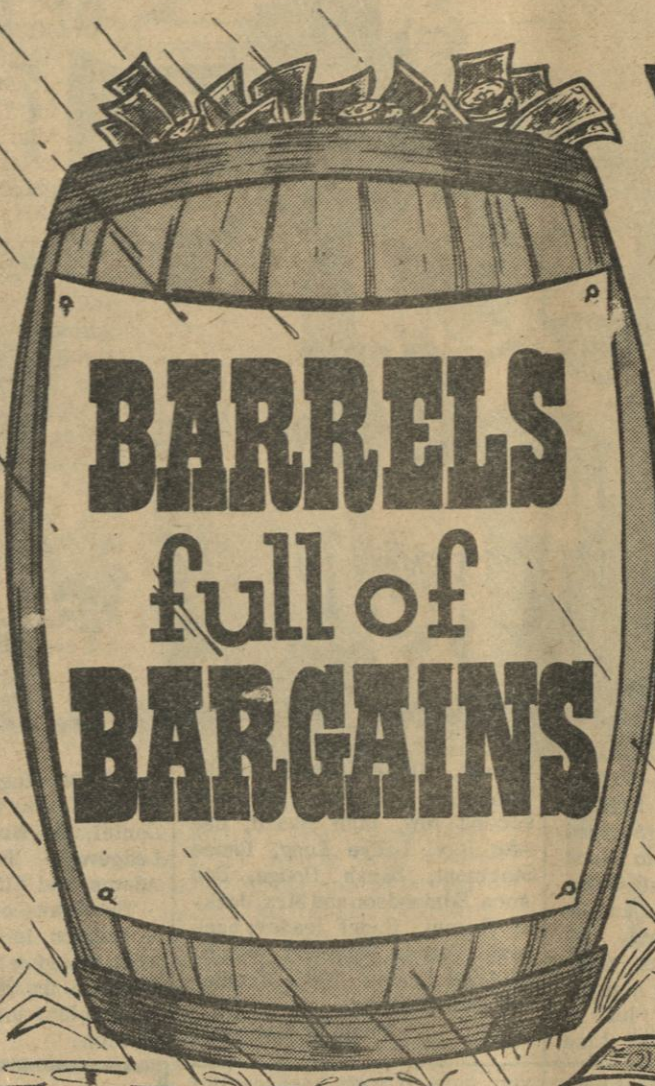

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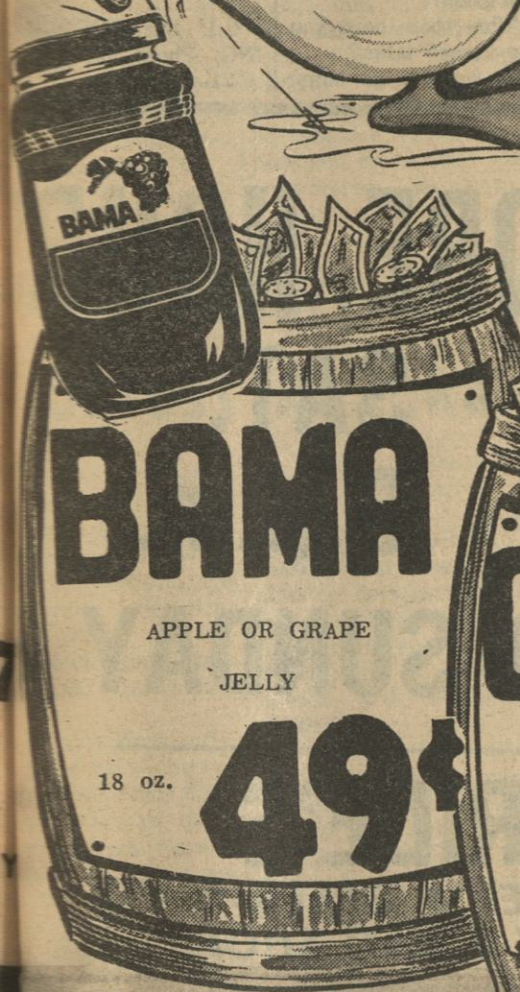

While we were at Rowen Oake, we met a rather distinguished man. His name is A. I. Bizerides, otherwise known as Buzz. Mr. Bizerides used to be a script writer for Warner Bros. He has written several movies one of which was "Beneath the Twelve Mile Reef", starring Gilbert Roland and Robert Wagner. Buzz also

wrote the script for several movies starring Humphrey Bogart and one starring Robert Mitchum. He also wrote the series "The Big Valley", which most of you are familiar with. Buzz was a very good friend of William Faulkner's, and he is presently working on the script for a movie about Faulkner entitled, "Life on Paper". This movie will be shown on Miss. Educational TV between November and June. Buzz is working with Walter Lowe, who is a director for Miss. Educational TV. We were also able to meet Mr. Lowe and talk with him.

Mr. Bizerides told us a story about how he met William Faulkner and became his friend. Buzz said that when he was in college he was given a copy of Faulkner's "As I Lay Dying". He really liked it and became an avid reader of Faulkner's works. A few years later, in 1938, Buzz and his family were eating in a restaurant on Hollywood Blvd., in Hollywood, Calif., when he noticed a man a few tables away. You can imagine his delight when he discovered that the man was none other than his idol, William Faulkner. Buzz went over to talk to him and was further delighted to discover what a nice person Faulkner was.

Four years later in 1942, Buzz was working in a studio when he walked William Faulkner. Well, here was another treat for Buzz: his idol again. He went in to talk to Faulkner and was amazed to find that he remembered him. Upon asking if he had a ride to his hotel, Buzz was told no, so he offered transportation. That was the start of a great friendship. Buzz picked Faulkner up in the mornings and dropped him off at his hotel in the evenings. They went out to dinner together, had drinks together and in general enjoyed one another's company immensely. Out of two chance meetings in life long friendship was formed.

You can imagine how Buzz must have felt upon coming to Rowen Oake, which had been the home of someone so close to him and the memories that visit evoked.

I know Buzz was happy to be able to share his experiences with us, and we were equally as happy to be able to hear the story and to actually see someone who is famous in his own right and had also been the friend of one so famous.

Mr. Bizerides is a very nice man and I for one was thrilled to have met him. He told the story of his meeting with Faulkner, especially so that I could put it in my column in order to share it with all of you. Buzz also gave me his autograph, shook my hand and called me a fellow writer. This may not seem like much to some of you, but it means a great deal to me. I know I can't begin to compare with a real writer but it's a start and Mr. Bizerides was very nice to say it just the same.

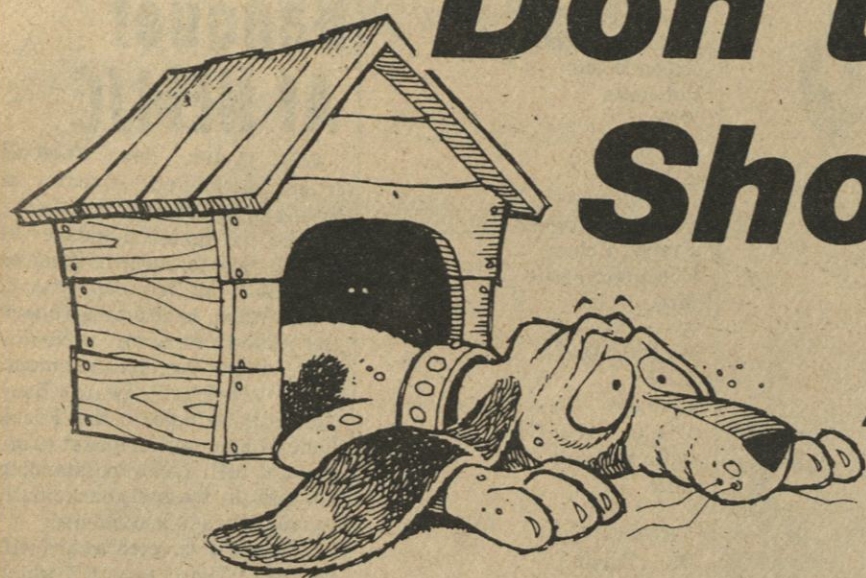
