Luka Jewelry Store Hit By Night Robber

Bill and Judy Moore take an inventory of jewelry that was

stolen from their store a few hours earlier.

Michael Warren, 30, of Nashville, is under \$10,000 bond and in the Tishomingo County Jail after being charged with breaking and entering in connection with Thursday morning's robbery of Moore's Jewelry in downtown Luka.

The store, located on Front Street, was robbed at approximately 1:30 a.m., April 21. The robber and all jewelry were recovered a few hours later after the man was stopped in Colbert County, Alabama.

Apparently Mr. Warren used a tire tool to pry open the back door of the jewelry store and then pried open a second door before gaining entry to the store.

He was very selective in taking the most expensive merchandise from the cases and put them in trash cans before heading out of town.

Officer Criswell, of the Cherokee Police Department, had a vehicle stopped on the side of the highway with the lights on the police car flashing when Warren approached. Apparently, thinking it was a road block, he panicked and almost ran over Officer Criswell in his attempt to flee in the stolen 1965 Plymouth Valiant he was driving. Officer Criswell gave chase and after pulling Warren over, noticed the stolen jewelry. Cherokee Police Chief Pat Patterson called the Sheriff's Department to see if a robbery had taken place in this area.

Luka Chief of Police, Jack Rye, and Officer Woodrow Davis, along with Bill Moore, owner of Moore's Jewelry, who identified the stolen goods, went to Alabama to pick up Mr. Warren, who signed a waiver to be returned to Mississippi.

Michael Warren was arraigned in City Court on Saturday morning, appearing before Luka Mayor, John H. Biggs, who after hearing the evidence presented, found probable cause and bound the defendant over to the Grand Jury, placing him under a \$5,000 bond for breaking and entering and a \$5,000 bond for grand larceny. Mr. Warren is still in custody at this time in the Tishomingo County Jail.

In preparing for a surgeon in this type of surgical specialty, Tishomingo County Hospital has purchased special equipment such as an operative microscope and other specialized instruments to equal that of any hospital in the country.

Prior to these two doctors moving to Luka, area residents requiring this type of specialized services have had to go elsewhere, often as far as Memphis.

We welcome the Cooks to our community.

NOTES

POCKET WATCH HINT
Here is a Pocket Watch program tip for saving money when buying meat products. Consider the amount of lean meat in a cut, as well as the price per pound. A relatively high-priced cut with little or no waste may provide more meat for your money than a low-priced cut with a great deal of bone, gristle or fat. Chicken or turkey are often bargains compared to other meats. Fish is also often a good buy. One way to find the best buy is to compare the cost of packages of meat, poultry or fish that will provide enough for a family meal.

FROZEN FOOD PACKAGING
Use only good quality moisture-vapor-resistant or moisture-vapor-proof packaging material when freezing fruits, vegetables, prepared foods or other foods at home. Always choose packaging best suited to the size and shape of the food. Good packaging is particularly important in frost-free freezers that have a fan blowing air over the food, drawing moisture from the package.
Exclude as much air as possible from each package. Air will reduce storage life, because it affects food color, flavor and texture.
Fasten or seal the package to make it as airtight as possible. If container lids do not fit well, place a piece of freezer tape all around the lid to hold it tightly. When using

plastic bags, always press air out of top between food and opening; then close it by twisting the top and doubling over the twisted part before fastening it.
For more information on freezing food, contact your Extension Home Economist and request free copies of "Freezing Prepared Foods at Home," Publication 581; "Freezing Fruits," Publication 663; "Freezing Vegetables," Publication 974 and "Your Home Freezer - a tool to Good Nutrition," Information Sheet 827. These publications and other information on food preservation are available to you through the POCKET WATCH program of Extension Home Economists.

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LEMON POT ROAST
3 1/2 to 4 lb. beef arm pot roast
2 tablespoons oil
1 bay leaf
1 onion, sliced
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon lemon pepper

3/4 cup water
4 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons brown sugar
3 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon cornstarch

Brown pot roast in oil in Dutch oven until golden brown on all sides. Pour off fat. Add bay leaf, onion, salt, lemon pepper and 3/4 cup water. Cook 2 1/2 hours until fork tender. Combine catsup, brown sugar, vinegar and raisins. Pour over roast and heat 20 minutes. Thicken sauce with cornstarch and 1/2 cup water. Sauce is great for other cuts such as brisket and spareribs.

FARM TRACTOR SAFETY
The following article recently appeared in the "Farm Safety Review" on farm tractor safety.

THOU SHALT present thyself to thy tractor fit and ready to operate it well and safely, thus reaping a handsome day's work and good health.

THOU SHALT never permit a gear to turn nor a wheel to roll until all guards and safety devices are in place to shield thee from harm.

THOU SHALT require thy sons and daughters (and thy neighbor's offspring) to keep themselves apart from farm machinery.

THOU SHALT hitch drawbar loads low and forsake wrapping chain or cable around the axle, lest thy tractor wrap itself around its own axle and smother thee beneath.

THOU SHALT weigh thy tractor's front to balance it if the drawbar be heavily burdened with such as a two-wheel spreader, and also place upon the rear sufficient weight to effect balance when thy tractor is encumbered with a front-end loader.

THOU SHALT faithfully cause thine eyes to remain open to discern precisely where thee and thy tractor are going and furthermore, to spy hidden obstacles and other hazards so thou can avoid them.

THOU SHALT contain thy temper, even though the day goes foul and everything attempted conspireth against thee, as robust anger not only maketh thee look foolish and exclaim unkind sentiments, but also multiplieth thy prospects of coming to grief by accident.

THOU SHALT diminish thy speed on rough ground and when approaching ditches and turning corners, thereby smiting prospects of thee supporting thy tractor's weight with thine neck.

THOU SHALT interrupt the flow of power before exploring, reaching or poking about in thy machinery, if thou treasure thy limbs.

THOU SHALT mind thy manners on the roadway, acting courteously to highway travelers by not entering the roadway until after thou hast established that the way is clear, by always signalling what thou art contriving to do, and by decorating the rear of thy machinery with a SMV emblem, to proclaim that thou art proceeding slowly.

THOU SHALT render thy tractor out of gear and stoutly set the brakes before dismounting.

THOU SHALT NOT require nor permit thy offspring to perform tasks without first ascertaining if they are capable in body and temperament and are sufficiently trained to operate a tractor without risk.

THOU SHALT enlist a protective cab or frame to assist thee in surviving should thy tractor tumble over despite thy good intentions.

THOU SHALT respect thy tractor, keep it well, and not demand more than it can deliver, nor require that it labor under burdens better suited to a huskier steel lest it repay thy maltreatment with low performance, mechanical troubles, and accidents.

If you'd like to have less required training than a doctor, dream of a career as a physician's assistant. Or you might see yourself as an emergency room technician, racing to the scene of an accident in an ambulance.

What about a registered nurse? Boys and girls alike can dream of becoming a nurse in today's world and become one. Remember that there are nursing careers which require less training than a registered nurse.

There are health care specialists for almost every part of the body. For the eyes there are ophthalmologists, optometrists and opticians. Audiologists work with hearing problems; speech pathologists, with speech problems; physical therapists, with problems of body movements, dentists, with tooth and gum problems; and respiratory therapists, with breathing problems.

If your career dream has a hospital setting, you could be an admissions clerk, a bookkeeper, insurance clerk or even a computer keypunch operator or programmer. Hospitals also employ medical records librarians, dietitians, purchasing agents and executive housekeepers. Don't forget to include in your dream the hospital administrator who keeps a watchful eye on the entire hospital operation.

For a more complete view, visit a health-care facility and make a list of the jobs in which you are interested. A health career just might be your dream come true.

Get in touch with your County 4-H Youth Agent and ask how you can learn more about careers. There are 4-H health and career projects just suited for a dream weaver like you.



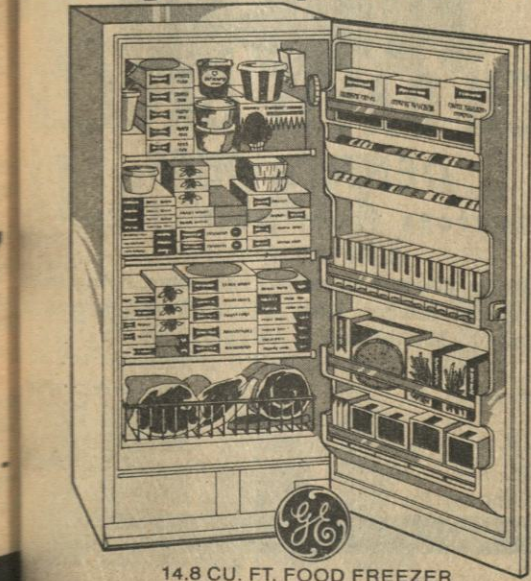

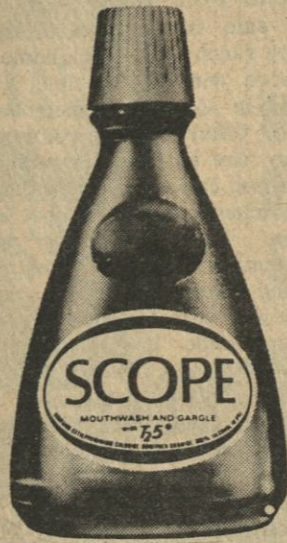

"The Tennessee River Hills rise in northeastern Mississippi. They include the highest point in the state, 806 ft. (246 meters) Woodall Mountain."
In Another place under "Gulf Coastal Plains," we find this. "The Tombigbee and Tennessee River Hills occupy a 120 mile strip along the Alabama border in the northeast near Iuka. Woodall Mountain rises to 806 feet, the highest point in the

state."

Here on top of the state, clean mowed play-ground, picnic tables and the amazing Microwave Tower, that I will not try to describe, but after asking around I learned it is a sister (or brother) to the one by the railroad track there in Iuka, but is much better equipped, taller and this being on the highest spot in Mississippi is much more important to the railroad's message department.
The writer in 1968 called it "A walk with childhood," for it makes one think of childhood challenges.

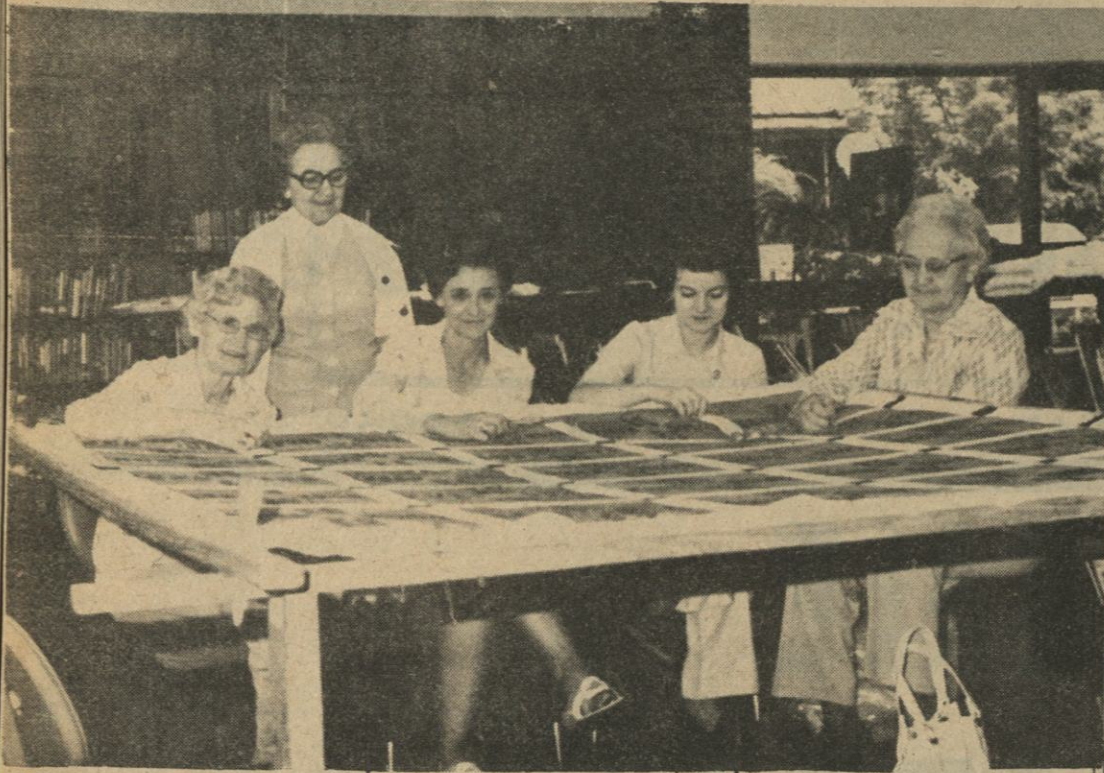

LOMENICK RECEIVES COMMENDATION MEDAL AND CERTIFICATE OF SERVICE AWARD — On February 7, 1977, Lieutenant Yost presented Sergeant First Class Harold T. Lomenick, of Iuka, with a Certificate of Service Award from the Departments of the Army and the Air Force in recognition of twenty-three years of service in the Armed Forces of the United States, including twenty-one years of service in the National Guard and the Mississippi Commendation Medal for meritorious achievement during the period 16 January 1974 to 31 December 1976, while serving as Postal NCO. During this period, SFC Lomenick took the initiative to effectively

train personnel of the Postal Section to become proficient and professional in their MOS. The end results of his enthusiasm and know-how in accomplishing his mission was climaxed by the efficient and professional manner in which Camp Shelby Post Office was operated during AT 1976. The professionalism and knowledge of postal operations which he demonstrated to visitors and evaluators were most commendable. His enthusiasm, confidence, knowledge and ability were contributing factors in the exceptional training of the Postal Section. He consistently displays a commendable attitude toward the National Guard program, actively supporting it

in both a military and civilian capacity, reflecting most favorably upon himself, his unit and the Mississippi National Guard.

Job Service Information

Charles Smith, Manager of the Corinth Office of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the civilian labor force for Tishomingo County, totaling 8,580 at mid-March, rose 120 over last month's estimated work force. Unemployment for the county was estimated to be 7.1 percent of the civilian labor force, or 610 individuals. This figure indicates a drop of 140 from the February estimate. The number employed also increased over the month by 260. Smith also stated that manufacturing employment increased from last month by around 150 individuals, while nonmanufacturing employment remained relatively the same in Tishomingo County.

Smith also stated that the civilian labor force in the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo

at mid-March experienced a continuous rise, with an addition of 270 from February and 1,000 from March one year ago. New and re-entrants into the local labor market attributed primarily to the gain from last month. Unemployment for the four-county area was estimated to be 3,620, a drop of 330 from last month but an increase of 430 from one year ago. The rate of unemployment for the area for mid-March was estimated to be 9.1 percent of the civilian labor force. Area employment from February to March gained 600 workers to total 36,270. A gain of 570 was noted in comparison to the same period one year ago. According to Smith, manufacturing employment totaling 12,780 workers at mid-March, experienced losses from last month and last year. These losses were found primarily in the durable goods group. Nonmanufacturing employment rose 90 workers from last month to reach 13,520 at mid-March. An encouraging rise of 350 in nonmanufacturing occurred from March one year ago with increases in most all of the categories.

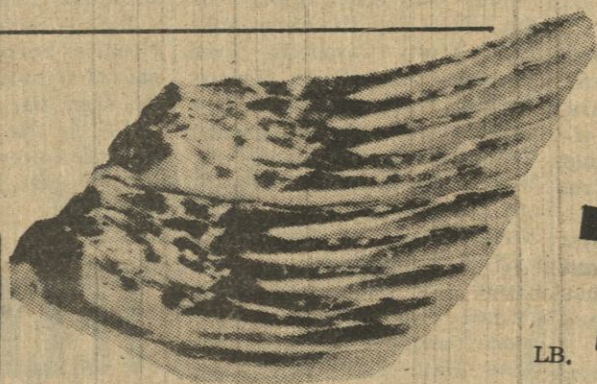

Here's how to buy air conditioner

First, decide what size air conditioner you need. The dealer can help you, but a good rule of thumb is 20 Btu's per square foot of area to be cooled. Getting a unit that's too large will cost you more, of course, and it won't dehumidify the air properly. A unit that's too small has to work overtime and still can't make the area cool enough. So decide whether you're going to cool one room or several and figure the square footage involved before you go shopping.

Another important factor is the energy efficiency ratio (EER). This number

tells you how economical the unit will be in its use of electricity. The higher the

EER, the more energy-efficient the unit. Since cooling your home takes more energy than anything else except heating, it's wise not to buy a unit with an EER below 7. Ask the dealer

about the EER of any unit before you buy, or figure it yourself by dividing watts into the Btu/hr. figure.

You may need additional wiring to: accommodate your new air conditioner. Units that operate on 115 volts and 7.5 amperes can be plugged into ordinary outlets. But units with

higher voltage will need a special circuit. If you're sure, check with a qualified electrician or your power distributor.

Forest Taxation Workshop Will Feature Six Experts

MISSISSIPPI STATE — "Forest Taxation" is the subject of a short course to be held May 18-19 by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service (MCES) forestry department and the department of forestry, School of Forest Resources, Mississippi State University, according to Robert Parker, leader, Extension forestry, and conference coordinator.

The workshop, third in a series on Analyzing Forestry Investments, is designed for owners of large forests, professional foresters, supervisory personnel and resource managers who analyze and evaluate the financial aspects of long-term forestry opera-

tions, explains Parker. Recent changes in forest tax laws make this course particularly timely, he adds.

Faculty for the session, which begins Wednesday morning and ends Thursday at noon, includes six Mississippi State University experts in business law, finance,

forest economics and forest management. Off-campus lecturers will be Ken Stewart, regional tax manager, Weyerhaeuser Company, and Keith Utz, specialist in forest finance and taxation, U. S. Forest Service, State and Private Forestry.

According to Parker, the course will introduce basic principles of current tax laws and their relationships to forest management decisions on land, timber and equipment. Concepts of capital gains taxation, depletion recovery, casualty losses, property taxes, inheritance taxes and accelerated depreciation of equipment will be developed analytically as they relate to returns from forestry investment, adds the MCES forestry specialist.

Prospective enrollees are urged to register by May 6; enrollment is limited. For information, write Robert Parker, P. O. Box 5426, Mississippi State, MS 39762. The workshop will be held at the Ramada Inn.
