Contract **Awarded For** Waterway

Rep. Jamie Whitten said he was notified that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has awarded a contract of more than \$18 million to a Kansas firm for excavation work and bridge removal along the Tenn-Tom Waterway route in Northeast Mississippi.

The lawmaker said the \$18,-208,635 contract was awarded to Martin K. Eby Construction Co., of Wichita, Kan., for work on the Tenn-Tom project in Tishomingo County.

The contract calls for the excavation of about 8,150,000 cubic vards of unclassified material, 112,000 cubic yards of riprap, the clearning and grubbing of 660 acres, and seeding of 380 acres, the excavation of drainage ditches and the removal of an existing bridge.

Additional \$15 Million For Tenn-Tom

Congressman Jamie L. Whitten said the House approved an additional \$15 million for Tennessee-Tombigbee bridges and other similar projects throughout the nation.

The \$15 million -- making a total of \$50 million for the current fiscal yearfor "bridges crossing federal projects" -is part of the economic stimulus appropriations bill, H. R. 4876. Funds for fiscal year 1978, which begins October 1st, are currently pending before the House Appropriations Commit-

Whitten, ranking member of the Appropriations Committee and a member of the House/ Senate conference on the bill, is author of the amendment to the Federal Aid Highway Act which authorizes federal assistance in constructing bridges across federal projects.

Federal Aid Highway Act, Section 132, Highways Crossing Federal Projects, provides:

"The Secretary is authorized to construct and to reconstruct any public highway or highway bridge across any Federal public works project, notwithstanding any other provision of law, where there has been a substantial change in the requirements and costs of such highway or bridge since the public works project was authorized, and where such increased costs would work an undue hardship upon any one State . . .

HOME **ECONOMIST'S** NOTES

Chicken is an all American favorite. It's a week-day friend of the menu planner, a hit with the outdoor cooking crowd, and generally a big help to the food budget. Try it during Poultry and Egg Week in Mississippi. Broiler-fryers rate high with

consumers. Fryers outsell all other poultry meats. These round, tender, ready to cook chickens weigh from 1-1/2 to 3-1/2 pounds and are 6 to 10 weeks old. They're specially bred, fed and pampered to produce high quality birds that come to you in convenient forms at reasonable prices. Their balanced rations are enriched with vitamins and minerals, tailored to produce today's fryer. It's a fascinating story of scientific progress.

Your supermarket bird is ready to cook. This means that the chicken has been cleaned inside and out, is free of pinfeathers, and eviscerated -the head, feet and inedible organs have been removed before the bird was weighed for pric-

Cut-up chicken and chicken parts offer maximum convenience for little additional cost. For example, a cut-up 3 pound chicken may cost an average 12 cents more than a 3 pound whole bird.

Family preferences differ. If your family prefers white meat, it may be more economical for you to buy chicken breasts. Although you pay more per pound for the parts, you save money

BAKED MUSTARD CHICKEN 2 broiler-fryer chicken, quartered

1 teaspoon dried leaf thyme

2 teaspoons salt 1/2 cup prepared mustard

2 tablespoons vinegar 2 tablespoons water 2 tablespoons salad oil

1/2 teaspoon ginger

Sprinkle chicken on both sides with salt. Place skin side up in foil-lined shallow baking pan. Mix together mustard, vinegar, water, salad oil, thyme and ginger. Spoon over chicken. Bake in 375 degree F. oven 50 to 60 minutes, until tender. Makes 8 servings.



Landowners should carefully clip pastures and weedy areas to avoid destroying quail or turkey nests. Honeysuckle or blackberry patches next to field borders are especially good nesting areas.

Disking in early spring at a depth of four to six inches next to suitable cover can produce quail feed in some areas. To determine whether or not you can provide quail feed by disking, check a nearby area that has been plowed and left unplanted. If there are sufficient quantities of quail feed, disking is the method to use. If you were not able to plant bicolor seedlings, you might try planting the seeds from April 1 to May 15. Bicolor plots should be one-eighth to one-fourth acre

Cowpeas which furnish food for quail in late summer and early fall should be planted May 1 to June 1. Browntop millet can also be planted for quail

LIME SOYBEAN LAND Much soybean land is in critical need of lime. Farmers can apply lime right up to plant-Soft lime is more readily available than hardrock lime. But with the problems farmers are having getting lime, any high grade liming material should be applied any time farmers can get over the land without injuring the crop.


SIDEDRESS NITROGEN

Cotton and corn respond well to sidedress applications of nitrogen. Since a crop uses most of the nitrogen during fruiting, it is best to sidedress cotton before first square and corn by the time it is 12 to 15 inches high. Many farmers will apply additional nitrogen in May and June. Splitting the nitrogen reduces the risk of losses from | nell.

leaching and denitrification. Most corn will need sidedressing in May and cotton in late May or June.

SOYBEAN WEED CONTROL Many soybean growers should apply a preemergence herbicide at or shortly after planting soybeans. Their choice of herbicides should be based on weed species, soil type, organic matter or other herbicides to be used in the overall program. Preemergence herbicides work best when applied to moist seedbeds and when they are followed with rainfall within a week or 10 days.


When seedling grasses and pigweed are the major problems and an incorporated herbicide was used, the herbicide Lasso is a good selection. For cocklebur, teaweed, sicklepod and sesbania, Lexone or Sencor have the best preemergence activity. Dynap or Klean Krop as well as Lorox also may provide fair to good control of many broadleaf weeds. Farmers should study their soil and variety restrictions before choosing from this group of herbicides. For example, it is not recommended to use Lexone or Sencor with Tracy or Semmes varieties.

Critical repairs on brakes and gear-shifting mechanisms should be made by a qualified serviceman. Simple adjustments on seats and handlebars can usually be performed by cyclists themselves, especially if they are among the more than half million girls and boys enrolled in 4-H bicycle projects and activities.

As they cycle for fun, physical fitness, transportation and tal Day Care Center in Iuka. community service, 4-H members learn-by-doing to improve their bicycle skills and attitudes. The 4-H bicycle program encourages young people to make the best use of their bicycles by teaching proper handling techniques, safety procedures, rules of the road, and care and maintenance.

4-H'ers who serve as junior or teen leaders in the program can earn state, sectional and national awards donated by Goodyear. Recognition includes one \$50 U. S. Savings Bond per state, 18 expense-paid trips to the 56th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 27 - Dec. 1 in Chicago, awarded on a sectional basis, and six \$1,000 scholarships at the national le-

In addition, any 4-H bicycle program participant is eligible for one of the four medals of honor available to each county.

Awards are arranged by National 4-H Council and winners are selected by the Extension Service. More information on the program is available from County Extension Agents.

Special **Employment Assistance**

Special employment assistance for many unemployed individuals may become available in the Tishomingo County Area under economic recovery programs being considered nationally for operation through the Office of the Governor, Charles Smith, Manager of the Corinth office of the Mississippi Job Service, said.

To be ready for these special programs, local staff members are preparing files of individuals who are members of families with total annual incomes below the lower living standard, who are unemployed and who meet special requirements. These special requirements include being a welfare recipient or one of several special types of unemployment compensation claimants. Veterans meeting eligibility requirements will receive priority, Smith said.

As the programs will be designed to assist the long term unemployed, those filing claims under unemployment insurance for more than 15 weeks or who have exhausted their benefits or who were ruled ineligible for unemployment compensation and have been unemployed for more than 15 weeks will be considered, Smith added.

Anyone who thinks he might qualify should check with the Iuka Job Service Office between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday for more information. Smith said the local staff is working on these lists now so that immediate action can be taken if these programs become operational. 

ALERT INDUSTRY Howard W. Hjort, Director of Agriculture Economics at the Department of Agriculture, said that at present the world supply of soybeans and their products are quite tight and prices are strong. This should alert the

Speaking recently before the American Fats and Oils Association in New York City, Hjort, the top USDA economist, said if the prices remain strong look for the soybean industry to be affected in 5 areas.

1.A cutback in livestock feeding rates, both domestically

and abroad. 2. Increased feed usage of milk powder in the European Community.

3. A heavy switch to soybean and sunflowerseed plantings in the U.S.

4. Sharply above-trend gains in foreign oil and meal output in 1977-78. 5. Higher feed costs and ulti-

mately some increase in consumer prices for livestock and poultry products.

Hjort said, because Brazil is a major producer it could affect world prices. So the U.S. Soybean industry should keep an eye on market developments in that country.

"Brazil's 1977 soybean crop supply, although less than originally anticipated because of wet conditions, is above that of last year," Hjort said. "Traditionally, the bulk of Brazil's soybeans and products move into export during the April - September period. This year, the sharply inverted price structure



Hey, Everybody! Last Monday, May 2, the Co-Op students of Iuka went to Parchman Prison for a tour. We have been studying business law this last six weeks, and our teacher, Miss Becky Bowen, thought the tour would help us understand our notes better. The trip proved to be very educational and interesting. While we were waiting for our guide, we saw the warden, Mr. John Watkins, and the commissioner of corrections, Dr. Alt. When our guide, Mrs. McBride, arrived we went back to the bus and she explained some things to us. Then we started the tour.

The first camp we stopped at was camp five. This is an old camp that was built in 1916. Camp five is now closed; they moved the men into a different camp the Friday before our We didn't go into camp three, but Mrs. McBride told us that it is the rehabilitation center. In Parchman's rehabilitation program there is a family plan. The family plan allows the members of an inmates family to come to Parchman and spend three days with them. This is a good plan, because it keeps the prisoner's spirits going.

We ate lunch at the new cafeteria. We were served by the vice were very nice.

We went to camp twentytwo and we got to go inside to talk to some of the prisoners. It was very interesting. Camp twenty-two is one of the new camps and it is very modern. After we left camp twenty-two, we saw the band. They did a song by K. C. and the Sunshine Band, one by Stevie Wonder, Freddy Fender, Glen Campbell, and a country and western song. The band is pretty good and we all enjoyed listening to them.

Mrs. McBride also took us to old camp eight. The officials at Parchman have started making a museum out of this camp. While we were there, we saw a film showing the canine-9 unit sniffing out dope. We also saw some weapons that had been found on the prisoners at various times. We also saw some things the prisoners had made from ceremics and some pictures they have painted. We also went to camp 25,

which is the reception unit. This is where prisoners are first brought to get finger printed and to have their picture made. While we were in camp 25, four young men spoke to us about drugs and prison life. The first speaker was James Black, who was put in for helping in an armed robbery. James is 32 vears old and is in for 20 years. He is also married and has a seven year old daughter. James has made his stay in prison much easier by becoming spiritually involved. Our next speaker was Dirk Johnson, who is 21. Dirk started on drugs when he was in the 9th grade. When he was 17, he got busted for possession of two joints. He got a 300 dollar fine and a suspended sentence. Last summer he got picked up for the sale of heroin and was sentenced to 10 years in prison. Next we heard from Mike Ivy, who is 25 years old and is doing 15 years, also for the sale of heroin. Our last speaker was Terry Butler, who was sentenced to 5 years and a \$5,000 fine, also for drugs. We all enjoyed the talks these young men gave and would like to thank them for taking the time to share their personal experiences with us.

After leaving Dirk, Terry, James and Mike we went next door to the women's camp. This camp is quite different from the others. There are only about 70 women in Parchman, so they have a nicer camp. They have their own rooms and bathrooms. whereas the men are situated with 50 in one section with open toilets, Mrs. McBride also told

Lastly, we went to maximum security, which contains death row and the gas chamber. There are 25 men on death row and they are given a 30 minute break every day. They are given the choice of exercise on the yard or a shower.


The gas chamber is in a little section by itself. The chamber itself is inside an outer room that has two rooms opening off of it. The chamber is shaped like a castle and it has five windows. The chair is the only thing in it and it has straps for the prisoner's arms and legs. The gas chamber at Parchman was built in 1955. Before that the executions were given by a portable electric chair that was transported from prison to pri-

All in all the trip was very interesting and the tour was fulfilling. Mrs. McBride is an excellent guide and I would like to thank her for doing such a wonderful job. I would also like to thank Mrs. Bowen, Mrs. Jackson and Mrs. McMannis.

Well, this is the end of school. Graduation is only a week away. All the seniors are out of school now and I know they are anxiously awaiting Tuesday, May 17, when they will officially be out of high school. Alot of them will be missed and I am sure that everyone wishes them good luck and happiness.

Horticulturist Gives Advice To Gardeners

MISSISSIPPI STATE - One of the most common mistakes is working soil before it is ready, says Jim Perry, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service horticulturist.

Be certain the soil is dry enough and that it is warm enough for good seed germination, says the specialist.

Do-it-yourself landscapers should be careful to plant pine and dogwood trees in sites where drainage is good. Never plant them where they will suffer from water-logged soil, advises Perry.

Winter-killed wood should be pruned away from trees and shrubs. Cut damaged material back to a live growth bud on each stem, instructs the Extension specialist.

If your garden space is tiny, try a color scheme of all white flowers and green leaves, he suggests. This will make the garden look larger. For color accents, try a few pots of flowering annuals.

The Extension horticulturist recommends that gardeners treat Sweet William as a biennial rather than as the perennial it is. Sow seeds in the spring, says Perry. Plants also can be grown from cuttings or by layering.

If blooms are picked from Shasta Daisy plants, a second crop of flowers may be produced in the autumn, Perry reminds gardeners.
