

Tuesday's run-off election in the City of Iuka placed four new officials on the city's fiveman alderman board after a close battle between the 10 hopefuls.

A total of 679 voters filed through city hall to decide the outcome of the important race. James L. (Shim) Dean was the only member of the previous board who was re-elected to another term in office.

NOTES

IMITATION ORANGE DRINK Campers and others lacking refrigeration may find it convenient to use an imitation orange drink available in dry powder. The orange drink mix is usually found in reclosable jars and may be mixed for one serving or in larger quantity.

The dry mix costs slightly less than a frozen concentrate. If you have a refrigerator and freezer, however, it's smart to know the difference between the real orange juice frozen concentrates and the imitations.

An imitation orange drink may offer no more economy and convenience than a real orange juice concentrate, and there may be big differences in taste and nutrients. When rated by a taste panel, real orange juice was found more acceptable than imitation drinks. The reconstituted frozen drink, however, outranked orange beverages made with dry powders in taste preferences.

All imitation dry mixes do not mix easily. Some take additional pouring to become fully dissolved.

Sodium and potassium contents also differ between real orange juice and imitation drinks. These differences may be important if a physician has recommended a special diet. Fresh oranges and processed orange juice contain more potassium than many imitation


drinks. Therefore, if a physician recommends oranges and orange juice because of their potassium content, then it is advisable to avoid the imita-

Sodium content in the imitation orange drinks may be higher than in the real juice. Some tests have revealed a range between 4.5 to 35 milligrams of sodium in four ounces of the reconstituted powder, whereas fresh orange juice or juice from frozen concentrate provides about 21/4 milligrams of sodium. The sodium content may be important if a physician recommends a low sodium diet.

Fresh oranges and frozen juice concentrate are high in vitamin C. The vitamin content of imitation drinks may be achieved with fortified vitamins or may be lacking totally. A careful study of the label is the only way to know the con-

STRAWBERRY PIE

Make pie shell and let cool. Pick and clean 1 qt. berries. Put in refrigerator and cool. In a sauce pan combine 1 c. sugar, 1 c. water, 3 Tbsp. strawberry jello, 2 tbsp. cornstarch. Cook until thick. Let cool. Mix with berries. Pour into cooled pie shell. Chill before serving. May be served with whipped cream.



Commercial hog feed labels bear the name of any medication they contain and withdrawal time. Also, veterinarians are required to tell pork producers the withdrawal time on any drugs purchased.

SOIL TEST NOW Farmers, home gardeners

and homeowners are reminded that services of the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University are available all year. Now is a good time to test soil in fields used for temporary summer grazing and field peas. For fall seeded crops, growers should take soil samples in July and August. This will allow time to apply the recommended fertilizer before September and October planting

All County Extension Service offices have information and materials for collecting and mailing soil samples.

COTTON JOBS

Most cotton producers are busiest in May when there are more critical jobs to be done. Cotton planting should be completed by May 15-20 if possible. Early control of thrips and cutworms should be carried out as needed. And, grass which escaped from earlier weed control efforts should be removed so that a height differential between the size of cotton and weeds can be established.

Today's cotton farmer, more than ever, must plan on what to do when, and what he can substitute for production materials.

> LET ANNUAL LEGUMES GO TO SEED

Annual legumes such as crimson clover, arrowleaf, wild winter peas and vetch should be allowed to produce seed if farmers want a stand next year. Remove cattle long enough to allow good seed production. Sub-clover can be continuously grazed since it has the ability to produce seed even while being grazed. Ball clover may produce a seed crop without the cattle being removed. However, if the seed heads are grazed, remove cattle for about two weeks to allow good seed pro-
