Construction Uncontested

The Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant construction will be uncontested, according to Tennessee Valley Authority Yellow Creek Nuclear Coordinator Ed Hall.

No petitions to intervene in the proposed construction were filed during the pre-hearing conference of Nuclear Regulatory Commission personnel, TVA representatives and Mississippi and Alabama officials. Lack of opposition to the project during the conference cleared the way for construction of the \$1.9 billion nuclear power plant, which will generate 2,800,000 kilowatts of electricity.

Hall said, during the 90 days following the draft presentation, the statement will be sent to area and state officials and other interested parties of comment.

NRC will study the comments for use in the final environmental impact statement, Hall said. This statement will be completed in time to be submitted as part of the public hearing record.

The project is scheduled to receive its limited work authorization permit in January 1978. With this permit, site excavation and construction of shops

and the plant village can begin. However, workmen cannot begin actual plant construction.

The plant construction permit will probably be issued three to four months after the limited work authorization permit is given, Hall said.

The first set of public hearings scheduled after the plant construction begins are the operating licensing hearings set for 1983. The plant is scheduled to begin operation in spring, 1985.

SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH

May is Senior Citizens Month, so devote a little time to their safety. Accidents are a big problem for older adults. Is your home as safe as it could be for a senior citizen? Maybe you don't have a senior citizen living in your home, but how about visitors or look even further ahead until you and your husband join this group.

What do you need to be most concerned about? Falls cause more accidents among older people than any other cause, so, begin making your home fall-proof.

Follow these rules:

- * Provide light switches to prevent groping.
- * Light stairways and provide handrails on both sides.
- * Provide grab bars in the bathroom near shower, tub and toilet.
- * Adjust heights of beds and chairs to make getting in and out of easier.
- * Supply storage they can reach (between hip and eye level).
- * Remove slipping and tripping hazards.
- * Have a place for everything and everything in its place.
- * Encourage the wearing of well-fitted shoes and clothing, not the kind that trail or dangle.
- * Call attention to any change in furniture arrangement.

* Wipe up spills and pick up objects immediately.

CONSIDER EXPOSURE WHEN SELECTING COLORS AND DRAPERIES

The location and exposure of a room is important in the selection of a color for rooms and for draperies.

Rooms with south and west exposure or in a warm part of the house may be more pleasant when cool, quiet tints of blue, blue-green, blue-violets and neutral colors are the principal color scheme. A feeling of warmth and gaiety can be achieved by using warm colors in rooms with a north or east exposure.

Solid color draperies the same color as walls seem to enlarge the background while darker colors seem to decrease the size of the room.

Many draperies and drapery fabrics can be bought with insulated linings. Separate insulated linings may also be bought for draperies not already insulated.

"CAMPSITE COOKING" SUPER SCRAMBLE

- 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1 3/4-pound package smoke-flavored sausage, sliced
- 1 (5.5-oz.) package hash brown potatoes with onions
- 2 tablespoons each red and green

pepper flakes
1 teaspoon salt
1 3/4 cups water
4 eggs

At cooking time: Heat oil over camper stove in largest skillet. Add sausage, potatoes, peppers, and salt to hot pan;

stir until well coated. Add water and cook uncovered over medium heat until liquid is absorbed and bottom is golden brown; turn potatoes. Make 4 wells in browned potatoes and slip one egg into each of the wells. Cook until eggs are set as you like. Serves 4.

BEEF REFERENDUM

Dates have been set for Mississippi's and the nation's cattlemen to register and vote in the national Beef Referendum. To be eligible to vote, cattlemen must register at their County ASCS Offices June 6-17. Dates for cattlemen to return to the ASCS Office to vote are July 5-15. Each cattleman will have one vote regardless of the size of his operation.

The referendum will allow cattlemen to vote on establishing a national uniform collection plan to fund beef research, promotion, consumer information programs and foreign market development. The program is similar to those instituted by egg, cotton, milk and citrus growers.

If approved, each cattleman involved in beef production will pay 30 cents for each \$100 that he added to the value of the animal. The deduction will be made automatically by the buyer. However, this is strictly a voluntary program and any producer who does not wish to participate in it may get an immediate refund.

SMOKING AND GARDENING

Smoking can be hazardous to your garden's health. Tobacco mosaic virus causes puckered leaves and stunted bushy appearance of tomatoes and peppers.

The disease can be spread by individuals who use tobacco and then handle plants. If you use tobacco, always wash your hands with soap and water before working in the garden. Never smoke while working in the garden.

WEEDS IN CORN

Weeds and grass may break through preemergence herbicides in corn fields as the season progresses. Broadleaf weeds in corn can be controlled with 2,4-D applied at the rate of one pint per acre broadcast. After corn is 12 to 14 inches high, drop sprayer nozzle so they will spray the herbicide over weeds and not down into the corn plants.

If grass is a problem, a directed application of Lorox may be made after corn is 15 inches high. Apply Lorox with

surfactant at the rate of one-half to one pound per acre on a 14-inch band. Use lower rates on sandy loam soils; higher rates on heavy soils.

DON'T FEED MOLDY GRAIN

Feeding moldy grain can cause hog producers problems. Molded feed can cause abnormal cycles and conception rates in sows and gilts. Some molds can also cause a reduction in litter size and pig vitality at birth.

It's difficult to identify harmful and nonharmful mold on grain. If you have grain that contains mold or fungus, it's best to feed it to finishing hogs and not to breeding stock. Proper harvesting and storage of grain can help prevent mold and fungus from becoming a problem in the future.

4H CLUB

PLANT A 4-H MINI GARDEN

Lack of yard space won't keep urban and suburban 4-H members from enjoying nutritious homegrown vegetables from their own gardens this year.

With a little ingenuity, 4-H'ers 9-19 are planting mini-gardens on patios, balconies, windowsills, and sunny sides of garages or apartment buildings. Their gardening projects and activities are supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service and supported by Ortho Division, Chevron Chemical Co. 4-H'ers have discovered the key to successful mini-gardening is choosing a small number of vegetables and ones that take up little space (radishes and carrots are good examples). Dwarf and miniature varieties can be used when available. Vine crops like pole beans, peas and tomatoes are space savers because they can be trained to grow vertically on stakes.

Making a plan showing the size and shape of the mini-garden is also helpful. It can indicate where each vegetable is located in each row and can show dates of planting and expected harvesting.

Mini-gardening is a learn-by-doing experience that 4-H'ers can carry out on their

own, with other young people in their club or group, or as a project involving community members of all ages.

Raising vegetables, fruits, flowers or ornamentals - even producing a commercial crop or tending a well-manicured lawn - can be fun as well as educational for 4-H'ers on farms, in cities, suburbs and small towns. And an outstanding 4-H gardening project can bring recognition at all levels of participation.

Through National 4-H Council, Ortho provides a full schedule of awards to 4-H members: up to four medals of honor per county, one \$50 U.S. Savings Bond per state, 18 sectional trips to National 4-H Congress and eight \$1,000 scholarships at the national level. Winners are selected by the Extension Service and will be announced prior to the 56th National 4-H Congress in Chicago Nov. 27 - Dec. 1.

More information on the national 4-H gardening program is available from County Extension Agents.

referendum." If over half of
registered producers vote in
the referendum and two-thirds
of those voting approve the or-
der, the Secretary of Agricul-
ture will appoint a beef board,
composed of not more than 68
beef producers, from names
submitted by producer organi-
zations. The board would col-
lect assessments on sales of
cattle and use the funds for
beef research and information
programs. Registration may
be in person or by mail. Those
wishing to register by mail may
request the ASCS County Office
to mail registration cards. All
persons who produced beef dur-
ing calendar 1976 are eligible
to register. This includes feed-
lot operators as well as dairy-
men. Each production entity -
such as a family, partnership,
or corporation - is entitled to
one vote. A 4-H or FFA mem-
ber may register, provided he or
she produced beef independent of
the family operation. From
June 6 through 17, the ASCS
County Office will daily post a
list of producers registered to
vote in a conspicuous place.
A final list will be posted June
22. Anyone may challenge the
eligibility of any producer list-
ed. Henry L. Knox, ASC Tisho-
mingo County Executive Direc-
tor, will resolve challenges.
