## Bail Denied

A Golden man charged with capital murder was denied bond during his preliminary hearing on Wednesday, June 8, in a Justice Court hearing.

Tishomingo County Fifth District Justice Court Judge, J. W. Slayton, declined to set bond for Mel Pounders, of Golden.

Pounders was charged with the capital murder in the death of Laura Roland on Friday, June 3, according to Sheriff Chester Dawson.

Pounders has been bound over to await action from the Tishomingo County Grand Jury in September.

## Financial Assistance For Forest

The Forest Resource Development Program was enacted to provide financial assistance for certain forestry improvement practices. Its purpose is primarily to increase timber production. The program first became effective on July 1, 1974. It is administered by the Mississippi Forestry Commission. The eligible forestry practices are heavy site preparation; 75% of cost up to \$45 per acre. Also, planting seedlings or direct seeding; 75% of actual cost including cost of seedlings or seed up to \$30 per acre. Some other practices for which cost-share can be received are fire-breaks and release of desirable seedlings and trees.

## Miss. R & D Says County May Have Trouble Controlling Growth

According to Mississippi Research and Development Center specialist, Bob Deville, Tishomingo County's major problem during the next five years will be controlling the area's development.

Tishomingo County's five-year economic blueprint plan shows Tishomingo County as one of the most potentially dynamic counties in the state and will unquestionably develop due to the number of large construction projects underway in the county.

Planning for the county's future is a question of "Once the bulldozers are gone, what's left?" said Deville. He warned

if the county did not begin planning for its future, it will be the victim of "hog dog stands, shoddy trailer parks" and other sprawl characteristics. Deville explained the Research and Development Center has formulated the draft economic blueprint report to specify problem areas in Mississippi counties and to present possible solutions for those difficulties.

The blueprint states the county could add 650 new manufacturing jobs over the next five years, with the jobs developed from new industry, county originated manufacturing and industrial expansion.

Tishomingo County's per capita income, which is \$3,245, is \$500 below the state's per capita figure.

Denville noted 29 percent of the county's income is from manufacturing. However, more than one-half of the manufacturing jobs are in low-wage industries, he said.

The blueprint recommended the construction of the proposed Highway 350, a controversial project which many Tishomingo Countians oppose because they believe the road, connecting the port to Corinth, would cause growth potential to bypass areas of the county.

Denville said Yellow Creek Port offers Tishomingo County "tremendous potential." However, the port's current transportation access situation is "poor at best." The port is "tottering on the brink of going somewhere, but can't" due to lack of access roads, he said.

It also suggested the county install a water system adequate for industrial needs in the Yellow Creek area.

The report urged the county to purchase options on land east of Burnsville and near the Tishomingo railroad for industrial site development.

It told the county leadership to continue ongoing efforts at labor surveys, to determine what types of skilled labor employers need and to incorporate those skills into vocational-technical education curriculum.

The report also suggested further development of water systems in Burnsville, Tishomingo and Iuka. It urged upgrading in sewer systems throughout the county and installation of sewage collection programs in Golden and Paden.

Housing will be an acute problem, Deville said. He asked the county residents to encourage use of both public and private funds to build the 400 new housing units needed for incoming county residents and the 1,250 additional houses to replace dilapidated homes.

The report also suggested construction of new city hall buildings in Belmont, Tishomingo and Iuka. It criticized the county's school systems. "Our information is that they are not very good," Deville said.

He asked the county leaders to take a comprehensive look at all available funds which might be used to construct school facilities. He also suggested the county construct school buildings which could be used for other purposes when the surge and decline population phenomenon occurs as large construction projects are completed.

The county also needs a recreational department to coordinate facilities and activities as its recreational sites, the report said.

The county has great potential as a recreational center, Deville said. However, the roads in J. P. Coleman State Park and Tishomingo State Park are deteriorating. At Coleman, there is no marina, and the Coast Guard has condemned the pier near the park restaurant.

The report also said all areas of the county need a capital improvements plan, zoning ordinances and mobile home regulations. Golden and Paden need land development controls.

The report finally urged county officials to consider property reassessment and reappraisal. "Mississippi will bury its head in the sand and fool around until the courts do it for us, and we won't like that a bit," Deville warned.

## Family Outing Ends In Tragedy

A weekend outing on Pickwick Lake ended in tragedy for a Memphis, Tennessee family on Saturday afternoon, June 11.

According to officials, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Andrews and their young sons were severely burned when their pleasure boat caught on fire after refueling at the Eastport Boat Dock. According to reports, they were cruising on Pickwick Lake when they docked at Eastport for fuel.

When Mr. Andrews attempted to back the craft out into the lake, it burst into flames. Witnesses said Mrs. Andrews attempted to board the boat several times after escaping the fiery scene

to rescue her son, who had unknowingly entered the water to safety. The mother was badly burned in the attempt.

Boats in the area came to the rescue and pulled the Andrews speed boat from the pier in an effort to keep the flames from spreading among other docked boats. The rescuers circled the boat continuously creating waves and causing the fiery hull of the boat to sink.

The Andrews family was carried to Tishomingo County Hospital by the ambulance service, treated for burns and later transferred to a Memphis hospital.

## Labor Hiring On Waterway

Mayor John H. Biggs, of Iuka, received the following telegram on Tuesday, June 14, 1977, from Col. Blalock, Dist. Engineer, USAENGA, Mobile.

SUBJECT: LOCAL LABOR PREFERENCE AND MINORITY HIRING ON THE TENNESSEE TOBACCO WATERWAY PROJECT

In the interest of insuring maximum employment opportunities for local residents in the construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, the Corps of Engineers has made the following policy decisions:

A. Minority hiring goals set forth in the Tennessee-Tombigbee Affirmative Action Plan (special bid conditions) will continue to receive emphasis.

B. Hiring preference will

also be given to persons residing in counties wholly or partially within 50 miles of the waterway project, plus Hickman and Giles Counties, Tennessee. To qualify for this local labor preference, an individual must reside in the area, without limit as to time, and cannot have either been hired outside the area or been moved to the area at a contractor's expense.

C. In the event of a conflict between minority hiring goals and the local labor preference aspects of the corps' plan, minority hiring goals will have precedence.

This telegram will be followed in the near future with a letter and map depicting specifically those counties included in the local labor preference area. Minority hiring goals remain unchanged.

#### LEMON EGGNOG PIE

- 3/4 cup cold milk\*

Pour milk and cream into bowl. Add pie filling mix, vanilla and nutmeg. Slowly beat with hand beater or at lowest speed of electric mixer for 1 minute. Pour 1-1/4 cups immediately into pie shell. Chill. Blend 1 cup of the topping into remaining pudding mixture. Spread over filling. Chill at least 1 hour. Garnish with remaining whipped topping and halved strawberries, if desired.

**FROZEN DESSERTS**  
During June Dairy Month, serve festive frozen dairy food desserts. With very little ef-

fort, you can transform ice cream and other frozen desserts into special party fare. Make an ice cream cake from

a sponge of angelfood cake. Split the cake into three layers. Spread slightly softened ice cream between the layers, or hollow out the cake and fill it with softened ice cream. Then frost the cake with sweetened, flavored whipped cream and freeze until firm.

An ice cream roll is a tasty treat. Prepare a cake as for a jelly roll and cover with softened ice cream instead of jelly. Roll and sprinkle with confectioner's sugar and frost with whipped cream. Freeze until firm.

Prepare a colorful dessert of ice cream balls in pastel colors. Select several flavors of ice cream - strawberry or cherry, green mint or pistachio, yellow or French vanilla, red or black raspberry. Scoop ice cream into balls and place on a tray covered with waxed paper. Return to freezer until firm. For a festive occasion, roll ice cream balls in tinted coconut before refreezing. Just before serving, arrange alternating colors in a chilled punch bowl or other large glass container. Dribble chocolate sauce or another sauce over the ice cream. Serve immediately.

Ice cream pie is an easy dessert to make. Fill a home-made or purchased crumb crust with softened ice cream. Swirl crushed fruit, chocolate syrup or nuts sundae topping into the ice cream. Freeze until firm. Serve ice cream parfaits. Place alternate layers of ice cream and crushed fruit or a sundae topping in tall slender glasses. Top with whipped

cream, fruit or both.

Sherbets combine well with fruit in cooling appetizers or desserts. Try these combinations: raspberry sherbet with raspberries or sliced peaches, lemon sherbet with strawberries or raspberries, lime sherbet with crushed pineapple, pineapple sherbet with strawberries or orange sherbet with sliced bananas or crushed pineapple.

Serve ice cream sundaes and let each person make his own. Provide one or more flavors of ice cream and an assortment of sundae toppings, whipped cream, maraschino cherries and chopped nuts.

#### LEMON BAKE CHICKEN

- 4 tablespoons corn oil
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon Accent flavor enhancer
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon lemon pepper seasoning
- 1/8 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts

In bowl mix together corn oil, lemon juice, onion, flavor enhancer, salt, lemon pepper seasoning and hot pepper sauce. Place chicken in baking pan. Pour the corn oil mixture over the chicken. Bake in 350 degree oven, covered, about 1 hour, basting occasionally. Uncover and bake 15 minutes longer or until fork can be inserted with ease. The gravy or sauce may be served over rice. Makes 4 servings.



### COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

Crop conditions are looking better throughout Tishomingo County. At this writing (Friday) most of the county is in need of rain. However, we have been fortunate to receive showers along that have been sufficient to bring crops up to a stand in most fields.

Cotton looks the best it has in years at this time of year. Squares are appearing rapidly and it looks like we will have blooms by or before July 1. I am sure most of you can remember that our dads had a goal of having cotton bloom by the fourth of July each year.

The Cotton Insect Scouts for Tishomingo County, Steve Cain and Kim Green, report very few insects in the cotton fields, except for thrip on younger cotton. The scouts are finding a high population of beneficial insects in the cotton fields which is good.

Cotton acreage planted in the county is at an all time low,

around 3,000 acres. A few years back we were planting about 7,000 acres.

Soybean acreage has increased to approximately 14,000 acres. At this time it looks like the big problem with soybeans will be weed and grass control in the fields. Pre-emerge is not giving control due to dry weather. A good job of applying post-emerge chemicals will control weeds in most fields. Good cultivation is still a good method of controlling grass and weeds.

Feeder pig prices have been good the past several months. However, the prices were a little lower at the New Albany Area Feeder Pig Sale last Thursday.

We may see more cattle than normal going to market early, if dry weather continues throughout the area. We are not in any serious problems with our pastures in Tishomingo County from dry weather, but some

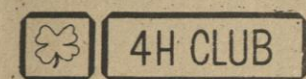
sections in the state are.

Commercial vegetable crops, pepper and cucumbers, are beginning to grow. Pepper fields have skippy stands due to dry weather at setting time. Cucumbers harvesting began Friday and will continue until the last of July. Cucumber yields will be low unless more rain comes.

Fire Blight on apples and pears is real heavy. It began showing up right after blooms begin to shed. There is no control for this disease. Specialist recommend cutting the dead twigs out of the trees during the summer and either burning or burying the dead twigs.

I have heard many complaints from gardeners about poor stands this year. There seems to be a combination of reasons for the poor stands such as dry weather, packing rains, weak and diseased seed and diseased soil.

We are enjoying the new offices in the basement of the Courthouse and invite everyone to come by and visit your County Extension workers.

#### TIS' THE SEASON

The season for water sports is upon us. Do you have all of your equipment together and in good working order for that first big outing to the lake? If you do, it may take the difference between happiness and tragedy.

The Cooperative Extension Service, in cooperation with the Mississippi Boat and Water Safety Commission, wants to prepare you for safe water sports. A new course, Advanced Boat and Water Safety, has been developed to teach more advanced skills to young people who have completed the beginning Boat and Water Safety Program.

Do you know what kind of personal flotation device and how many such devices the law requires you to have in your boat? What kind of equipment does the law require for boat trailers? Are you prepared to administer first aid to a victim of snake bite or of a carelessly thrown fishing hook? Would you know what to do for someone suffering from shock or hypothermia? Could you save yourself if you were unexpectedly thrown into the water?

If the answer to any of the previous questions is "no," enroll in an Advanced Boat and Water Safety program. You

will learn the answer to those questions and many more as you study about survival, weather, trailering, first aid, personal flotation devices and knots.

If you plan a summer of fun in the sun and in the water, contact your county 4-H youth agent and ask about the Advanced Boat and Water Safety Program. You'll be glad you did!

## spotlight on science

The strings attached to the FDA's announced relaxation of the proposed ban on saccharin may be longer than we think, many experts agree. In fact, the FDA ruling may prove potentially harmful to diabetics, overweight people and others who want to reduce their intake of sugar.

FDA's decision to permit the sale of saccharin as an over-the-counter drug is seen by many as a sign in the storm of consumer protest that arose when the agency announced in March that it planned a complete ban on the only non-caloric sweetener left on the market.

Legal and scientific experts say, however, there is a rather substantial Catch-22 in the FDA proposal that could result in a

complete ban within a year. The proposal gives manufacturers 180 days after the final FDA regulation is issued to prove that saccharin is "effective" in medical uses such as the management of diabetes or in weight control programs. Otherwise, even this limited use of saccharin would be prohibited.

The catch arises out of what constitutes scientific "proof." There is an almost unanimous body of opinion from a wide variety of medical and health organizations that saccharin is important for diabetics who must control blood sugar levels and for obese, severely overweight people who are trying to limit their caloric intake. The difficulty is that there is little scientific evidence to support these opinions. Doctor

know saccharin is useful but they can't prove it.

For example, it has been calculated that a person drinking only one soft drink and three cups of coffee a day sweetened with sugar instead of saccharin could gain nearly 22 extra pounds in a year's time. Precisely what effect such a weight gain would have on tens of millions of already overweight Americans is unknown, but the American Heart Association, for one, is concerned.

In a recent statement, the Association said that sugar substitutes are helpful in dealing with obesity which is likely to cause elevated blood fat levels, high blood pressure and diabetes — each of which is a serious risk factor for coronary heart disease which is the leading cause of death in this country.

Of course, studies comparing the mortality of saccharin and non-saccharin users can be devised, but it would be virtually impossible for these studies would take years — not the 180 day period allowed by FDA.

This is where the Catch-22 comes in. In order to prove the effectiveness of saccharin, it may be necessary to take it completely off the market and then wait while thousands of diabetics and overweight Americans die needlessly from diabetes and heart attacks because they were forced to resort to sugar.

And just in case you're expecting another non-caloric sweetener to come on the market before saccharin is banned, don't hold your breath. Of all the possible substitutes that have been discussed endlessly in the newspapers and on television over the past month, none could possibly become commercially available in less than two years and most — even if they win FDA approval — will take three to five years or longer to reach your table.

For the foreseeable future, it's saccharin or nothing. And unless Congress steps in to override FDA's action, it's likely to be nothing. (PWS)

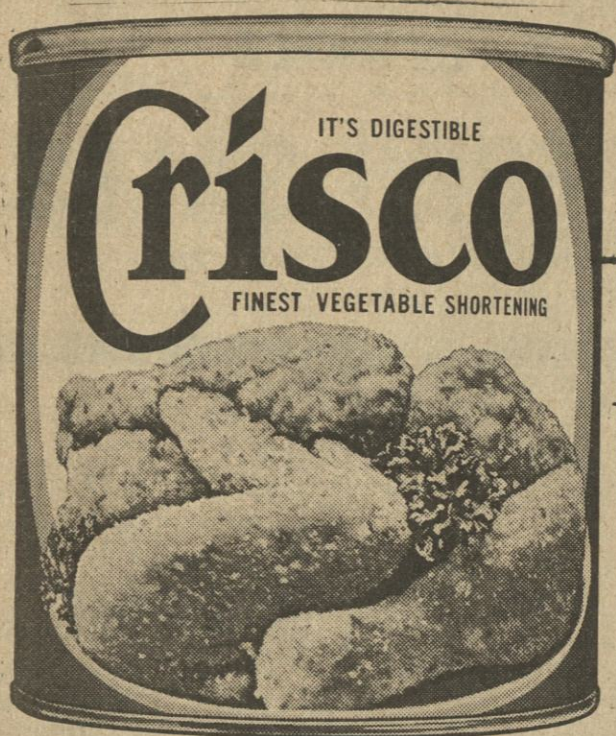

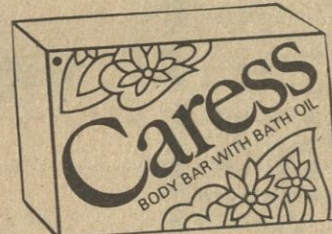

## GARDENING IN THE SOUTH

**ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS**  
by Patricia Collins

Annuals and perennials -- those seasonal and multi-seasonal flowers -- are irresistible when planting season rolls around and our gardens and patios need a colorful uplift. With just a little effort and planning you can have a spectacular floral display of beautiful flowers for most of the year!

When planning your annual/perennial garden, consider three things -- soil, light and moisture. Then you can choose your plants by how well they adapt to the particular condition present in your area.

**PREPARING THE SOIL.** So often, in the excitement to get the garden started, soil preparation is forgotten. Have your soil tested by your local county extension agent for the soil Ph and for fertilizer recommendations. For a successful and hearty garden,

cultivate the beds well, adding sand and/or organic matter if it is needed. Many annuals prefer alkaline soil. Because of the acidic soil found in many southern areas, lime must be added. For quick results use hydrated lime, otherwise dolomite is best for long-term results.

If your soil lacks phosphorus, then add superphosphate. This is essential for flower production.

Before you plant, add some granular slowly soluble fertilizer which gives long lasting results. Later you can add some liquid, water-soluble fertilizer to get your new plants off to a good start.

**TIPS ON PLANTING.** It is much more convenient to buy seedlings which are ready to transplant, but you are limited in selection of types, color and variety available. By growing your own from seeds you have

a large selection to choose from. There is also the satisfaction of growing your own.

Before you transplant, be sure the plants are "hardened off." This means they should be placed in a transitional area, perhaps a porch, before planted outside. Taking the plants directly from the protective environment of a greenhouse to the extreme heat and light outside is often detrimental.

Plant at the same depth of soil the plants were in while in the seedling trays. If they are root-bound, loosen the roots before planting.

**CHOOSING THE PLANTS.** After you have determined what type of environment you are working with, you are ready to select the plants best suited to your garden. There are so many choices!

The best plants are often varieties which are disease-resistant. Also, pick varieties which are self-branching. These are good because they do not have to be pinched to form bushy compact plants. The "Sprinter" and "Sooner" Geraniums are self-branching types which bloom early.

Slower growing or dwarf varieties have a neat appearance and do not need to be staked. "Floral Carpet" Snaps produce an attractive

blanket of color, and dwarf French Marigolds are also nice compact plants.

You may want to consider using some tender perennials. These are plants which we treat like annuals. Coleus is one of the most popular of this group. The solid yellow/green "Chartreuse" and the "Carefree" series are popular.

Cupheas are tender perennials which prove their excellence for the long southern summer by blooming profusely from the small seedling stage until hard frost. The most popular Cupheas are Cigar Plant (Cuphea ignea) and False Heather (Cuphea hyssopifolia).

The ever-blooming Lantanas are also popular for their mass of color.

Late-blooming Sages (Salvia) are attractive additions to the summer garden, especially for those who enjoy observing hummingbirds. Try Mexican Bush Sage (Salvia leucantha), with its striking purple and white flower spikes; the fragrant-leaf Pineapple Sage (Salvia elegans) with loose spikes of red flowers and Blue Sage (Salvia guaranitica) with medium blue flowers.

**WHEN YOU'VE PLANTED.** After planting, mulching is helpful in controlling weeds and preventing water loss. Handweeding and cultivation is highly recommended for a weed-free garden, even with good gardening practices and use of chemicals. A good practice is to incorporate weeding with the three-to-four-week applications of granular fertilizer. Pre-emergent herbicides may also be used with success. Be sure to follow label directions.

Pinching helps annuals. Chrysanthemums and late-blooming Salvias are examples of ones which need successive pinching to insure bushier plants with more flowers.

Many plants also benefit from a more severe pruning or shearing about midsummer, just after the first flush of flowers begins to fade. Verbenas, Salvia, Splendens, Nicotianas, Cosmos and Basil may be treated in this manner in order to have a striking second bloom.

Deadheading, removing old flower heads, prevents seed formation, thus promoting more flowers.

Although most of us water when it is convenient, we should also consider the plants. Since water on foliage at night promotes fungal disease, it is better to water early in the day rather than late evening. Some plant foliage may burn if water is on the leaves during the midday sun.

**HAVE FUN.** When growing annuals and tender perennials, remember that you are growing them for enjoyment. Pleasing color and attractive plants are only part of the pleasure. Using plants with aromatic foliage and flowers or those which attract birds or butterflies will increase your enjoyment immeasurably. It is also fun to look for unusual or different plants which everyone will envy! (PRN)

May, 1977 collections were also up from receipts of May a year ago when the total was 11.9 million dollars.

"For the period May, 1976 through May, 1977, collections were 138.73 million dollars," said Howell. "Receipts for the corresponding 12-month period were 132.33 million dollars."

Disbursements for the May collections include payments to the Highway Department, highway bond sinking fund, and other agencies specified by law.

### PROGRAM TO BE ACCREDITED

Northeast Mississippi Junior College is the first educational institution in Mississippi to receive accreditation of its program in medical assisting from the Committee on Allied Health Education and Accreditation of the American Medical Association, in collaboration with the Curriculum Review Board of the American Association of Medical Assistants.

There are now 119 medical assisting programs in 110 post secondary educational institutions in 29 states. Two of these are programs for medical assistants in pediatrics, and were approved by a Joint Review Board composed of representatives of the American Academy of Pediatrics, AMA and AAMA.

The accredited programs provide a basic knowledge of administrative and clinical procedures. Subjects studied include anatomy, physiology, medical terminology, medical law and ethics, human relations and insurance and bookkeeping. Medical assistants aid physicians in private practice or in clinical or other medical settings. They are the direct link between the physicians and their patients and provide a variety of services from office management to laboratory

work. Qualified physicians serve as advisors at all three levels of the association.

#### BUYING A USED CAR

There are a lot of happy car owners driving around who've never bought a new car. They figure that after a car's been used a year or two, the original owner will have taken care of all the little, nagging problems, as well as absorbing the heavy depreciation usual on new cars.

Buying a used car can be a very satisfying experience and it can save you a lot of money. But, you can also get badly burned buying a used car. It can end in frustration, loss of money, and a threat to safety.

Here are some tips that offer the prospective buyer the best available protection. It includes this advice:

- \* Never buy a car under any conditions that keep you from carefully inspecting it.
- \* Take a used car for sale by a private owner or dealer to a trusted mechanic or a diagnostic inspection station before you finally buy it. The experts all agree it's worth the cost.
- \* Never buy a car if you are not permitted to test drive it or if the person in charge refuses to write down and sign all promises to make brake and clutch adjustments, tune-ups, or parts replacement.
- \* Watch out for a cheap paint job to hide body rust; hoses sprayed with black paint to look new; a steam-cleaned engine with freshly painted valve covers and air cleaner; painted tires; an erratically worn front tire exchanged for the spare tire to mask a front-end problem.
- \* Accelerate to see if white or bluish smoke shoots out the exhaust pipe -- it may indicate the engine needs a costly overhaul.
- \* Push the corners of the car to see if they bounce -- if so, the shocks are worn. If one corner is lower than another, it may have a broken leaf or weak springs.
- \* Make sure a jack is included and check to see that the lights all work, the battery is not cracked, the dipstick

shows clean oil, and the carpeting is not badly worn -- that indicates heavy use.

\* Never be in a hurry to buy, even if it hurts to play cool. A new booklet on buying a used car is available free from the General Services Division-Distribution, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 400 S.W., Washington, D. C. 20590. Write for it.

#### FIRE & SMOKE DETECTORS

While the installation of smoke detectors in your home can give you an early warning of a fire and smoke, you should, when purchasing units, make sure they carry the "UL" or "Factory Mutual" approval seal. Be sure to check the registration of any door-to-door sales company promoting the

devices and the validity of the tests and statistics cited in their sales pitch. Remember, anything worth buying is worth thinking about for 24 hours. The best source of help in deciding on the number of units you need and the placements of those units is your local fire chief. It is your fire department's business to know where fires generally start and where the smoke will first be found.

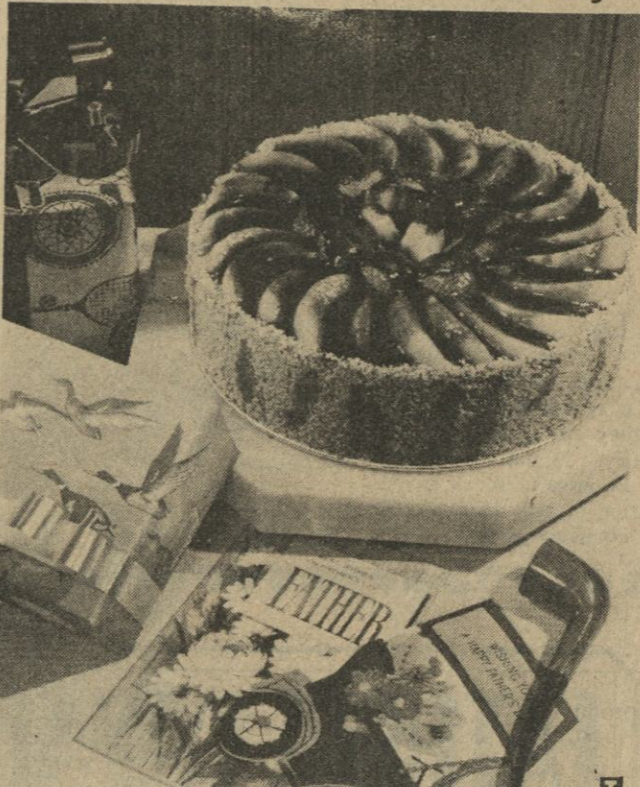
- 1 cup strawberry halves

Combine graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar and melted butter; press against sides and bottom of a 9-inch spring form pan. Bake at 325° F. for 5 minutes. Cool.

Press the cottage cheese through a fine sieve. Add half the remaining sugar, the flour, salt, egg yolks, sour cream, lemon rind

and juice. Whip until thoroughly blended. Beat the egg whites until stiff, gradually adding the remaining sugar. Fold into the cheese mixture. Spread mixture in prepared pan and bake at 325° F. for 1 1/2 hours or until cake tests done. Cool in pan.

The parking lot will accommodate 3,500 cars.

## FmHA Activities In Tish. Co. And State

The Farmers Home Administration has approved over \$1 billion in loans and grants in Mississippi in the past 4 1/2 years. This was announced by J. F. Barbour, III, State Director of the federal rural credit agency Barbour said the 4 1/2 year period coincided with his term as State Director.

Agriculture played the major role in FmHA activities during this period. Over 21,000 farm loans for \$512 million were approved, including 7,600 disaster loans. Farmers eligible for disaster assistance suffered a production loss because of adverse weather con-

ditions.

Other major loan and grant areas for FmHA were Rural Housing, 17,000 loans for nearly \$295 million; Community Programs, \$132 million for water, sewer, and other facilities, and Business and Industry, \$61 million.

Barbour also praised the local FmHA office saying, "David Rushing and Doris Rhodes have been conducting an excellent program and we are pleased with the efforts they have been making to serve the people of Tishomingo County." Our local office has 500 borrowers whose total debt to the FmHA

exceeds 10 million dollars. This includes 10 water systems which serve over 3,000 families.

In fiscal year 1976 the Tishomingo County Office provided over 1 1/2 million dollars in financial assistance to the people of Tishomingo County.

The local advisory committee is made up of Justin Belue, Jim Carson and Estelle Holcomb.

## ASC Farm News

TISHOMINGO COUNTY FARMERS TO REPORT CROP ACREAGE

Tishomingo County Farmers are asked to report the planted acreage of cotton, corn, peanuts, wheat, and grain sorghum to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). According to Henry Knox, Acting County Executive Director, proposed farm legislation could call for the implementation of set-aside for 1978 crops. "The acreage required to be set aside as a condition of eligibility for program bene-

fits may be based on a percentage of the acreage planted for harvest in 1977," Knox said. Under proposed legislation, the reported acreage will not be used for purposes of establishing allotments. By obtaining the acreages, the Secretary of Agriculture will have a full range of options if the 1978 set-aside is necessary, Knox explained. "Crop acreage and the crop use must be reported on a field-by-field basis," he said. Tishomingo County farmers will have until August 1, 1977, to report cotton, corn, peanuts, and grain sorghum. Crops seeded last fall should be reported before harvest if possible. Farmers who have planted acreage in 1977 crop wheat, corn, grain sorghum or barley, and fail to report such acreage, may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978, Knox said. He pointed out that random spot checks will be made to assure accurate reporting. The ASCS acreage report requirement is effective immediately.

FINAL DATE TO REGISTER IN 1977 BEEF REFERENDUM

The final date to register in the 1977 Beef Referendum is June 19, 1977. In order to vote in early July, all cattle producers must register at the Tishomingo County ASCS Office by June 17, 1977. Contact the county office for additional details.

## Export Crops Produced On Vast Acreage

MISSISSIPPI STATE - How much land does it take to produce our foreign crop exports?

According to Bob T. Chapin, coordinator, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service Land Use Center, the latest United States Department of Agriculture estimates are that 1977 United States' exports of soybeans, cotton and rice are expected to require 32 million acres to produce.

"This acreage is about the size of the state of Mississippi," he adds. "Mississippi's cropland for harvest amounts to about six million acres, so it takes many states working together to produce export crops from 32 million acres," explains Chapin.

"For example, the Peoples Republic of China is expected to purchase 47,600 running bales of cotton during the 1977-1978 marketing year. This cotton, valued at \$16 million, will take 36,615 acres to produce," he points out. "This is equivalent to an area slightly larger than the Ross Barnett Reservoir," he adds.

In terms of the 32 million acres required for export production, 26 million acres are required to produce 550 million bushels of export beans at 21 bushels per acre; 4.6 million acres to produce 5.1 million bales of cotton at 1.1 bales per acre; and 1.6 million acres to produce 69.2 million hundredweight of export rice at 4,200 pounds per acre.

will do two things: Get that desperate feeling under control by conquering your worries. And reduce your intake of food. P.S. (from Dr. Peale) I know what I am talking about in regard to the latter, for I took off 35 pounds. And what's more -- kept it off. So can you. Get your doctor to help you. He's experienced and can give you moral support.
