The accident is still under investigation at this time.

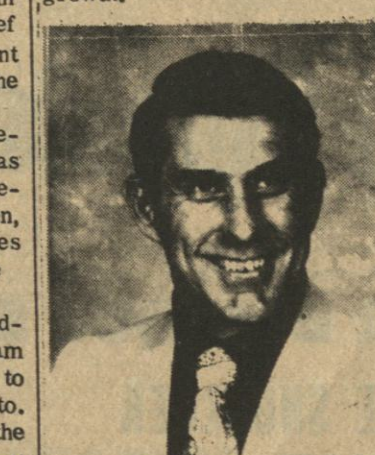

## \$172 Million Okd For Tenn-Tom Project

Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., said Wednesday he engineered Senate Appropriations Committee approval of \$172 million for construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

He said the committee also approved a \$15 million forestry incentives program, a \$10.7 million McIntire-Stennis cooperative forestry research program and nearly \$4 million in military construction funds for Mississippi projects during fiscal year 1978.

The committee was acting on recommendations made by the Public Works Appropriations Subcommittee, which is chaired by the Mississippian.

Stennis said the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project would be funded at the full capability of the U. S. Corps of Engineers for fiscal year 1978. The amount recommended by

## First Bloom

Charles Bostick, of Golden, beat the previous record for cotton blooms, as he brought in the first open bloom of the 1977 crop last Monday, June 27th.

By bringing in the first mature cotton bloom of the season, Bostick wins the traditional year's subscription to The Tishomingo County News.

Last year's first bloom winner, who has also been a prior first bloom show, was Benny Walker, of Iuka. The 1976 first bloom was on July 13.

This year's June 27 showing is the average - or earlier-time for Tishomingo County's signal of the growing season.

The Bostick's bloom this year came from the 370 acres he and his son, Joe, planted April 19. The Bosticks report that their crop is knee high and coming along fine in spite of the dry weather. They are hoping with a little luck and some rain to beat last year's record of 210 bales from 300 acres.

his committee was \$15 million above the original budget.

The lawmaker said the forestry incentive program had proven "highly valuable in helping small, non-commercial landowners develop timber resources." He said the McIntire-Stennis program would provide funds "to undertake research essential to developing new, more versatile timber and timber stand production."

He said other committee recommendations include \$8,459,000 for a fire ant eradication program, \$2,813,000 for a boll weevil eradication program, \$3.5 million for rural community fire protection grants, \$250 million for rural water grants and \$750 million for rural water loans.

Stennis said the largest single allocation for military construction was \$1,106,000 for an industrial waste treatment plant at Columbus Air Force Base.

Other military construction recommendations include \$119,000 for an addition at the Mississippi National Guard training site at Camp Shelby; \$281,000 for an addition at Camp McCain; \$937,000 for a new 200-man armory at Meridian; \$360,000 for a support equipment shop at the Air National Guard at Key Field in Meridian; \$150,000 for an aircraft arrest system for the Air National Guard in Gulfport; and

### MOBILE HOME FIRE HAZARDS

There are more than 3 million mobile homes in this country, and more are being built each year. These mobile homes present serious fire hazards.

If you live in a mobile home, follow certain safety habits to make it safer. Being able to get out of a burning home quickly is most important. Early warning detectors such as smoke detectors, placed outside each sleeping area, are side each sleeping area, and reliable fire extinguishers make this possible. However, a fire extinguisher is useful in controlling small fires, not controlling large ones.

After you are alerted, the next important step is having an exit. Keep all outside doors free for use as exits. If you don't have them, install push-out escape windows with screen and storm windows that will not slow down rapid ejection and escape, especially in bedrooms.

Watch for warm switch or outlet face places, the smell of burning plastic, or flickering of lights. Each of these may signal a fire hazard. If these trouble signs appear, seek expert advice immediately.

Unvented fuel-burning and unvented space-heaters can produce deadly quantities of carbon monoxide. So keep windows open to assure proper ventilation when using these devices.

If you are planning to buy a mobile home for the first time or trade one in, make sure it

meets certain safety standards. These standards have been established by several agencies and help insure your protection.

### ACCESSORIES MODERNIZE AND ENHANCE BATHROOMS

Because most families live in average homes with nice-but-ordinary bathrooms, it may get discouraging to see colorphotos of ultra-glamorous bathrooms. Sunken tubs, window-walls curtained in shimmering fabric, and marble basins with gold fixtures seem remote from the average home with limitations on both space and glamour touches.

While it may seem almost impossible to change the appearance of a small bathroom, almost any bathroom can be made to reflect the period chosen for the home and without structural changes.


For example, a distinctly Colonial look can be achieved by replacing the existing light fixture with one of the carriage lamp variety, adding wooden towel rings and bars, providing towels in an American eagle or small check pattern, and placing glass apothecary jars filled with soap and bath salts on shelf.

For a Victorian effect, try an ornately framed mirror, an ice cream parlor light fixture with white-glass globe, towels in lush tones of cranberry and moss green, and wall-to-wall carpeting in one of these rich shades. Carpeting adds a note of luxury to any bathroom.

### LIME SUMMER SALAD

1 pkg. lime flavored gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
3/4 cup cold water  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing  
1 medium cucumber, peeled and grated  
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt  
2 tbsps. minced onion  
1 cup creamed cottage cheese

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in cold water and lemon juice. Chill until partially set. Add mayonnaise, grated cucumber, seasoned salt, onion and cottage cheese. Blend well. Pour into 5-cup mold which has been oiled or dipped into cold water and chill until set. Unmold on greens. Makes 6 servings.

### NEMATODES

Nematodes are slender, wormlike animals that live in soil, water, and plant tissues. They are too small to see with your naked eye. You need a microscope to see them.

In general, nematodes reproduce when the female lays eggs inside or outside the plant. Some nematodes, such as the root-knot nematode, can lay several hundred eggs. The eggs have a tough shell which protects the nematode during the winter. When host crops are planted, the eggs hatch. The young nematodes grow into adults and lay more eggs to build up the number of nematodes. Each year there are many more eggs and many more nematodes.

### How are Nematodes Spread?

Nematodes, because of their small size, cannot move more than a few feet each year. Consequently they are spread from one area to another in infested soil clinging to cultivation equipment, in soil moved by water and on roots of transplants.

### How Do Nematodes Damage Plants?

Nematodes damage plants by puncturing plant tissues, mostly roots, with a needle-sharped stylet, secreting digestive juices into plant cells and sucking the pre-digested contents into their bodies. Bacteria and fungi can enter the roots through wounds made by nematodes and cause severe rotting of plant roots.

### What are Symptoms of Nematode Damage?

Nematode injury to roots reduces uptake of water and nutrients from the soil. Typical above-ground symptoms are a general stunting, yellowing, loss of vigor, general decline and even death if infestations are severe. The most common symptom in home gardens is root-knot galling, caused by secretion of digestive juices into the plant cells by the root-knot nematode.

Although the root-knot nematode is more prevalent in Mississippi home garden, other nematode types can cause plant damage just as severe. Some of the less obvious symptoms they cause are stubby roots, tiny lesions, excessively branched roots, or complete loss of secondary roots.

Although you can find nematodes in all types of garden soils their greatest damage in Mississippi is to plant growing in light or shady soils.

### When is the Best Time to Determine a Nematode Problem?

The best time to determine if you have a nematode problem is during the summer and early fall when nematodes are most active. Examine the roots of growing plants for signs of nematode damage just before and after harvest. Dig the roots, don't pull them from the soil when looking for symptoms. It may be necessary to wash soil from roots to see more definite symptoms. Compare suspected roots with healthy roots.

# JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH

This June marks the forty-first celebration of Dairy Month -- time set aside to honor the dairy industry. The role of the dairy industry should not be minimized; it creates many jobs and opportunities for fellow Mississippians.

The industry generates an estimated \$200,000,000 of economic activity each year in our state. The Mississippi Employment Security Commission estimates that about 90 firms are engaged in the processing, manufacturing and distribution of milk and milk products in Mississippi. These firms account for more than 2,000 employees with an annual payroll of more than \$18,000,000.

The cash receipts received by Mississippi farmers from the marketing of milk and milk products amounted to a record \$83,197,000. When the value of milk used on farm is included, the total farm value amounts to \$89,139,000.

Mississippi farmers marketed 834 million pounds of milk last year. About 96 percent of the milk marketed was Grade A or fluid milk. The average received by Mississippi farmers was \$10.34 per hundred weight.

Too, the dairy industry provides milk and milk products for only about 2 percent of our disposable personal income. Fluid milk and cream make up about half of our dairy purchases.

The total number of dairy herds has been decreasing. Grade A herds in the state as of December of last year totaled 1,139. Herds producing for manufacturing purposes dropped to about 300.

Total milk production in the state has declined, as has the number of milk cows. Last year, milk produced amounted to 862 million pounds while the number of milk cows averaged 116,000.

Dairy farmers have, however, made significant gains in milk produced per cow. A record of 7,431 pounds was established last year.

The dairy farmer must have many talents. He must milk his cows at least twice a day of the year -- including Satur-

day, Sundays, Christmas, and New Years.

Tishomingo County has six Grade A dairies in operation at the present time. In 1960 there were 16 Grade A dairies in operation in the county. Farmers that are presently engaged in Grade A Dairy production are: James Brown, Arthur Floyd, Tulon McKee, T. C. Pounders, Kenneth McRae, and Orville McNutt.

June Dairy Month is an appropriate salute for the dairy industry in Mississippi and Tishomingo County.

## 4-H CLUB

### 4-H'ERS SHARPEN CONSUMER SKILLS

Spending dollars wisely is the goal of boys and girls enrolled in the 4-H consumer education program conducted by the Co-operative Extension Service. 4-H members from 8 to 19 years of age learn to distinguish wants from basic needs, prepare budgets and set short- and long-range spending goals.

Practical consumer education activities help 4-H'ers become more discriminating shoppers. They begin to look critically at advertisements and commercials, examine hangtags and care leaflets, study warranties and time-payment contracts, and compare features and prices of products from different manufacturers.

As they become aware of consumer rights and responsibilities, young people find they are entitled to truthfully-advertised products that meet certain health and safety standards. But as informed consumers, they should follow instructions on product use and not abuse credit, exchange or refund privileges.

Young people make consumer decisions every day. They not only select items for personal use, but they also strongly influence family decisions on household purchases.

Mrs. Ruth McDougal and Lois Norton will host the meeting.

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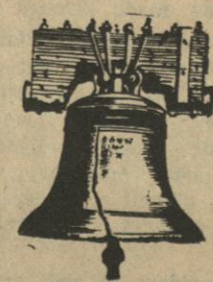

## Outlook For Cotton Crop Now Appears Optimistic

MISSISSIPPI STATE — Mississippi's cotton crop is off to the best start in years, reported Dr. George Mullendore, cotton specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. "Hot, dry weather is cotton weather, and most of the state received exactly that," said the agronomist. "With a drier than normal fall, winter and spring, cotton growers were able to deep break more soils than during the past several years. "This same weather pattern also allowed growers to apply lime and needed plant nutrients more effectively than in recent years," added Dr. Mullendore. With favorable weather during April and May, cotton was planted more on time than normal, grew off better and has developed one of the best root systems in recent history. More precise use of herbicides contributed to this situation. The good root system has allowed cotton to hold up well during the recent drought. Although some cotton suffered during the drought, most has developed extremely well. "Indicating the early start of the 1977 cotton crop, June 11, the Mississippi Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reported that 37 per cent of crop was squaring, compared to only 3 per cent in 1976 and 11 per cent for lay time average," said Dr. Mullendore. "Growers have the good early start they have been asking for for several years. However, what kind of crop we make lies ahead. "Insects are the biggest concern at present. With the early crop development, growers know that insect levels high enough to cause damage must be controlled. Growers should consider plant development, not time of year, in their management scheme," instructs the specialist. "At this point we are cautiously optimistic that the 1977 cotton crop will see a return to normal yields for Mississippi growers," concluded Dr. Mullendore.

**Something Old**  
Perhaps you are tired of hearing about my great-grandfather - Issac Gilbert Barrett, but to me he represents the pioneers who came on to old Tishomingo County. The things my mother told me about him and "Granny Barrett" are still like fairy tales to me. One of the stories I remember and have used in entertaining little boys, whom I was teaching when they had been fighting or feeling very badly because some other little boy had gotten the best of them in a childhood scramble (and we all know those little scrambles meant nothing, for in a few minutes all malice was gone and they were playing together again) was this: Grandfather was a typical Irishman from Scotland, or as the dictionary says, "A native having to do with a part of the population of Northern Ireland descended from Scotch settlers being of both Scotch and Irish descent and in the preferred and current form known as a Scotsman." The story I remember that I told these little boys as told to me by my mother) was that Grandfather being whom he was couldn't help having a very holly temperamental nature and quick to action in taking care of himself and that he entertained them with many fighting exploits but my favorite was that in one of such occasions "he bit a man's ear off" - this was so unreal to the pupils of my day - they didn't know whether to laugh and cheer or cry. Anyway, after this tale they forgot their own little difference and went on to playing together. The

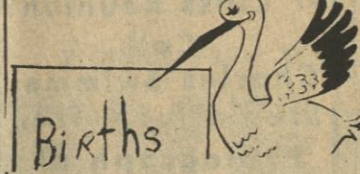
saddest thing told to me was how he lost his eldest son in the Civil War. My great-grandmother, whom I have mentioned before as having lived to be 95 years old and living 36 years, 1 month and 11 days longer than her husband, Issac Gilbert Barrett, and whom I remember, always grieved for this son that was carried off to war at the age of 16 and she said "all because grandfather couldn't go, because of the crippled hand." No record was made of his going but a known native of Tishomingo County (Wash Bingham) lived to come back and told the family Junius was killed in a trench next to him in Yalobusha County, Miss. As no record was made of his going, he was too young to have to go, no record was ever found that he served his beloved South and died for it. This pioneer family has many descendants in Tishomingo County with some scattered even to Monroe County, especially over in Alabama.

**A REPORT TO THE PEOPLE**  
Congressman Jamie L. Whitten said a House/Senate conference committee approved \$8 million in funds for the Natchez Trace Parkway, Section 1-D in Tennessee.  
Whitten said that with this agreement on funds for Parkway construction in Tennessee, it now means that the states of Alabama and Tennessee join with Mississippi in continuing construction of the Trace. "This should guarantee early completion of the Parkway, which extends from Nashville, Tenn., to Natchez, Miss."

The First District Congressman said \$29.5 million was contained in an earlier Appropriations Supplemental Bill for the remainder of Fiscal Year '77 and for Fiscal Year '78 which begins October 1.  
Ranking member of the Appropriations Committee and a member of the Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, Whitten was named a conferee to the joint conference on the Interior Appropriations Bill.  
Whitten also said that progress was being made on the Goodman Road project in DeSoto and Marshall Counties. Following notification by Mississippi Highway Commissioner Bobby Richardson that plans are being made to develop the DeSoto County section of Goodman Road, Whitten met with Appalachian Regional Commission officials to discuss the Marshall County section. Whitten met with outgoing ARC Federal Chairman Donald W. Whitehead and his successor, Bob Scott, about ARC funds for Goodman Road. Marshall and DeSoto County officials are attempting to get Goodman Road established as an East-West thoroughfare in north Mississippi. "Goodman Road is a vital link in the continuing development of northwest Mississippi," Whitten added.

## Money Down A Pothole

A recent study of Mississippi road conditions by The Road Information Program (TRIP) of Washington, D. C., revealed that state drivers are pouring \$118 million annually down a pothole.

That is the amount of money lost by Mississippi drivers in the form of more gas, tires and maintenance due to worn out roads. Put another way, the drivers of Mississippi could save \$118 million a year if the roads were in better shape.

The Arabian oil crisis has pushed prices of gasoline to the point where less gasoline is being used. That means reduced revenues for the state's highway programs. Thus, funds for building and maintaining roads are lower than anticipated. At the same time, inflation has raised the cost of everything, roads included. When unforeseen problems such as Yazoo Clay are added, it is easy to see why projected funds are not sufficient to keep the roads in adequate condition.

It would cost Mississippi about \$140 million a year for the next 10 years to put its roads in good shape for years

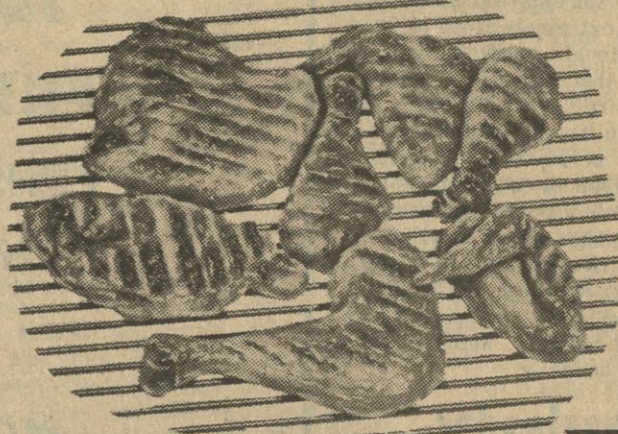

## Hanging Plants

**MISSISSIPPI STATE** — Many attractive plants are suitable for growing in a hanging basket, but those with drooping growth are the most desirable, says Jim Perry, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service horticulture specialist.

In selecting plants for a hanging basket, you may want to consider dwarf, erect types for the center of the basket, with larger, trailing types of plants placed around the sides. These will spill their stems over the sides and best display their foliage and flowers, says the horticulturist.

Practically any plant grown in summer flower beds is a candidate, according to Perry, but these are especially good: ivy, geranium (petatum), ordinary garden geranium, ageratum, sweet alysum (lobularia), vinca major variegata (a trailing type of periwinkle), lobelia, petunia, heliotrope, nasturtium, phlox drummond (annual phlox), verbena and Boston fern.

Baskets made of plastic are the most popular. Fill with good soil, place plants in them and keep them moist, instructs Perry. One method of watering is to dip the basket into a container of water and allow the excess to drain out.

Fertilize with a complete fertilizer, he suggests, such as 8-8-8. This should not be used in heavy applications, he cautions. It can also be used on pot plants and other ornamentals for quick response. Be careful, and don't use too much, says Perry.

### What's R-value?

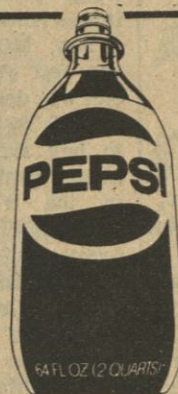

It is important to keep your Social Security record in your correct name so that your work can be recorded accurately. ## Alabama Firm Apparent Low Bidder For Waterway Contract

Larry Terry Contractor, Inc. of Decatur, Ala. is the apparent low bidder for test excavation work on two portions of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway.

The Terry bid was one of 15 submitted for the Corps of Engineers contract in Tishomingo County, Miss. The bids ranged from an apparent low of \$1,974,500 to a high of \$5,922,960. The governmental estimate was \$4,360,000. Contractors from six states submitted bids.

included in the work is the excavation of more than two million cubic yards of material; placing some 1,900 square yards of riprap; seeding more than 6,000 square feet of area; and spreading 600 tons of bedding material. The contractor also must clear the work area, provide an access crossing for Yellow Creek, construct 12,400 square yards of turf berms and maintain records of observation wells and piezometers in the test area.

Time provisions in the con-

tract call for completion of all work within 540 calendar days after issuance of the notice to proceed.

Test excavations specified in the work are along the proposed path of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway channel. Purpose of the work is to divert water from the construction areas making it more economical for overall project development. This method has been used effectively in building other projects.

The work is about two miles north and slightly over five miles south of Burnsville, Miss. The temporary crossing of Yellow Creek to provide access to one of the sites is about two miles north of Burnsville. Excavated material from both sites will be placed at predetermined locations and all areas seeded and landscaped in accordance with the environmental plan for the project.

## Ginning Higher

Mississippi cotton farmers paid about \$1.67 more for ginn-

ing and wrapping a bale of cotton than they did last year, reports Marcus P. Talbot, Jr., Officer in Charge of the Memphis Classing Office. Ginnings costs in the state were about \$3.39 below the national average. In Mississippi the average charge was \$29.48 per bale compared with the United States average cost of \$32.87. Average ginning costs across the belt varied from \$37.29 per bale in Texas to \$25.94 in Alabama.

Warehousing costs were also up slightly from the 1975-76 season. Charges for receiving cotton at Mississippi warehouses averaged \$1.39 per bale and monthly storage rates were about \$1.12. The belt-wide average was \$1.54 per bale for receiving and 99 cents per month storage. Compression costs were a little above the national average also.

Mississippi farmers harvested virtually all of the 1976 crop mechanically. Ninety-eight percent was machine picked and about two percent machine stripped.

Cotton production in Missis-

issippi totaled 1,113,920 running bales last year. Across the belt, to obtain a 480 pound net weight bale, 1,354 pounds of hand picked or 1,483 pounds of machine picked seed cotton were needed.

Collection and preliminary computation of this information were made by the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA.
