Other commendations included: \$1 million for construction of the Belzoni Bridge over the Yazoo River and \$100,000 for planning the Yazoo River navigation project; \$150,000 for a study of the Mississippi Sound; \$42,000 for a study of the Pascagoula Harbor; \$120,000 for a study of the Pascagoula River Basin; and \$70,000 for a study of the Pearl River Basin.

The committee also recommendes: \$38 million for the Mississippi River levee system; \$45 million for the Mississippi River channel improvement program; \$22,196,000 for all construction and planning projects in the Yazoo Basin; planning funds totaling \$100,000 for Nonconnah Creek, Horn Lake Creek and tributaries, including Copen Creek, Nonconnah Creek itself was approved for \$200,000 to initiate Phase I planning.

The committee also approved \$17,608,000 for the Tennessee try at New Albany. Valley Authority's Bear Creek water control system and \$20.9 million for the TVA national fertilizer development program to develop a means of getting ammonia from coal.

Stennis said a total of \$323.7 million was recommended for the Appalachian Regional Commission, which includes a number of counties in northeast Mississippi.

MOBILE HOME FIRE HAZARDS

There are more than 3 million mobile homes in this country, and more are being built each year. These mobile homes present serious fire hazards.

If you live in a mobile home, follow certain safety habits to make it safer. Being able to get out of a burning home quickly is most important. Early warning detectors such as smoke detectors, placed outside each sleeping area, are side each sleeping area, and reliable fire extinguishers make this possible. However, a fire extinguisher is useful in controlling small fires, not controlling large ones.

After you are alerted, the next important step is having an exit. Keep all outside doors free for use as exits. If you don't have them, install pushout escape windows with screen and storm windows that will not slow down rapid ejection and escape, especially in bedrooms.

Watch for warm switch or outlet face places, the smell of burning plastic, or flickering of lights. Each of these may signal a fire hazard. If these trouble signs appear, seek expert advice immediately.

Unvented fuel-burning and unvented space-heaters can produce deadly quantities of carbon monoxide. So keep windows open to assure proper ventilation when using these de-

NEMATODES

Nematodes are slender, worklike animals that live in soil, water, and plant tissues. They are too small to see with your naked eye. You need a microscope to see them.

In general, nematodes reproduce when the female lays eggs inside or outside the plant. Some nematodes, such as the rootknot nematode, can lay several hundred eggs. The eggs have a tough shell which protects the nematode during the winter. When host crops are planted, the eggs hatch. The young nematodes grow into adults and lay more eggs to build up the number of nematodes. Each year there are many more eggs and many more nematodes.

How are Nematodes Spread? Nematodes, because of their small size, cannot move more than a few feet each year. Consequently they are spread from one area to another in infested soil clinging to cultivation equipment, in soil moved by water and on roots of transplants.

How Do Nematodes Damage Plants?

Nematodes damage plants by puncturing plants tissues, mostly roots, with a needle-sharped stylet, secreting digestive juices into plant cells and sucking the pre-digested contents into their bodies. Bacteria and fungi can enter the roots through wounds made by nematodes and cause severe rotting of plant

What are Symptoms of Nematode Damage?

Nematode injury to roots reduces uptake of water and nutrients from the soil. Typical above-ground symptoms are a general stunting, yellowing, loss of vigor, general decline and even death if infestations are severe. The most common symptom in home gardens is root-knot galling, caused by secretion of digestive juices into the plant cells by the root-

anot nematode. Although the root-knotnematode is more prevalent in Mississippi home garden, other nematode types can cause plant damage just as severe. Some of the less obvious symptoms they cause are stubby roots, tiny lesions, excessively branched roots, or complete loss of secondary roots.

Although you can find nematodes in all types of garden soils their greatest damage in Mississippi is to plant growing in light or shady soils.

When is the Best Time to Determine a Nematode Problem?

The best time to determine if you have a nematode problem is during the summer and early fall when nematodes are most active. Examine the roots of growing plants for signs of nematode damage just before ever, made significant gains in and after harvest. Dig the roots, don't pull them from the soil when looking for symptoms. IS DAIRY MONT

This June marks the fortyfirst celebration of Dairy Month -- time set aside to honor the dairy industry. The role of the dairy industry should not be minimized; it creates many jobs and opportunities for fellow Mississippians.

The industry generates an estimated \$200,000,000 of economic activity each year in our state. The Mississippi Employment Security Commission estimates that about 90 firms are engaged in the processing, manufacturing and distribution of milk and milk products in Mississippi. These firms account for more than 2,000 employees with an annual payroll of more than \$18,000,000.

The cash receipts received by Mississippi farmers from the marketing of milk and milk products amounted to a record \$83,197,000. When the value of milk used on farm is included, the total farm value amounts to \$89,139,000.

Mississippi farmers marketed 834 million pounds of milk last year. About 96 percent of the milk marketed was Grade A or fluid milk. The average received by Mississippi farmers was \$10.34 per hundred weight.

Too, the dairy industry provides milk and milk products for only about 2 percent of our disposable personal income. Fluid milk and cream make up about half of our dairy purchases.

The total number of dairy herds has been decreasing. Grade A herds in the state as of December of last year totaled 1,139. Herds producing for manufacturing purposes dropped to about 300.

Total milk production in the state has declined, as has the number of milk cows. Last year, milk produced amounted to 862 million pounds while the number of milk cows averaged 116,000.

Tishomingo County has six Grade A dairies in operation at the present time. In 1960 there were 16 Grade A dairies in operation in the county. Farmers that are presently engaged in Grade A Dairy production are: James Browning, Aurther Floyd, Tulon Mc-Kee, T. C. Pounders, Kenneth McRae, and Orville McNutt.





Perhaps you are tired of hearing about my great-grandfather - Issac Gilbert Barrett, but to me he represents the pioneers who came on to old Tishomingo County. The things my mother told me about him "Granny Barrett" are still like fairy tales to me. One of the stories I remember and have used in entertaining little boys, whom I was teaching when they had been fighting or feeling very badly because some other little boy had gotten the best of them in a childhood scramble (and we all know those little scrambles meant nothing, for in a few minutes all malice was gone and they were playing together again) was this: Grandfather was a typical Irishman from Scotland, or as the dictionary says, "A native having to do with a part of the population of Northern Ireland descended from Scotch settlers being of both Scotch and Irish descent and in the preferred and current form known as a Scotsman." The story I remember that I told these little boys as told to me by my mother) was that Grandfather being whom he was couldn't help having a very holly tempermental nature and quick to action in taking care of himself and that he entertained them with many fighting exploits but my favorite was that in one of such occasions "he bit a man's ear off" - this was so unreal to the pupils of my day they didn't know whether to laugh and cheer or cry. Anyway, after this tale they forgot their own little difference and went on to playing together. The

saddest thing told to me was how he lost his eldest son in the Civil War. My great-grandmother, whom I have mentioned before as having lived to be 95 years old and living 36 years, 1 month and 11 days longer than her husband, Issac Gilbert Barrett, and whom I remember. always grieved for this son that was carried off to war at the age of 16 and she said "all because grandfather couldn't go, because of the crippled hand." No record was made of his going but a known native of Tishomingo County (Wash Bingham) lived to come back and told the family Junius was killed in a trench next to him in Yalobusha County, Miss. As no record was made of his going, he was too young to have to go, no record was ever found that he served his beloved South and died for it. This pioneer family has many descendants in Tishomingo County with some scattered even to Monroe County, especially over in Ala-If this is your great-great-

grandfather or any kin and you know of any more history of this Tishomingo County pioneer,



That is the amount of money lost by Mississippi drivers in the form of more gas, tires and maintenance due to worn out roads. Put another way, the drivers of Mississippi could save \$118 million a year if the

roads were in better shape. The Arabian oil crisis has pushed prices of gasoline to the point where less gasoline is being used. That means reduced revenues for the state's highway programs. Thus, funds for building and maintaining roads are lower than anticipated. At the same time, inflation has raised the cost of everything, roads included. When unforeseen problems such s Yazoo Clay are added, it is easy to see why projected funds are not sufficient to keep the roads in adequate condition.

It would cost Mississippi about \$140 million a year for the next 10 years to put its roads in good shape for years





Hanging **Plants**

MISSISSIPPI STATE -Many attractive plants are suitable for growing in a hanging basket, but those with drooping growth are the most desirable, says Jim Perry, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service horticulture specialist.

In selecting plants for a hanging basket, you may want to consider dwarf, erect types for the center of the basket, with larger, trailing types of plants placed around the sides. These will spill their stems over the sides and best display their foliage and flowers, says the horticul-

Practically any plant grown in summer flower beds is a candidate, according to-Perry, but these are especially good: ivy, geranium (peltatum), ordinary garden geranium, ageratum, sweet alyssum (lobularia), vinca major variegata (a trailing type of periwinkle), lobelia, petunia, heliotrope, nasturtium, phlox drummond (annual phlox), verbena and Boston fern.

Baskets made of plastic are the most popular. Fill with good soil, place plants in them and keep them moist, instructs Perry. One method of watering is to dip the basket into a container of water and allow the excess to drain out.

Fertilize with a complete fertilizer, he suggests, such as 8-8-8. This should not be used in heavy applications, he cautions. It can also be used on pot plants and other ornamentals for quick response. Be careful, and don't use too much, says







"Fire Stock" is clothing from a building damaged by fire. These items have not necessarily been damaged, she

"Odd Lots" are leftover merchandise that is out-ofstyle, no longer being made or of different sizes (broken sizes), explains the specialist.

Knowing what these terms mean could save money, adds Miss Davis.


