Highway 72 Accident Claims Life Of Alabama Resident

One Alabama man was killed and two other people injured in a two car smash-up on Hwy. 72 East of Iuka Friday night, July 8, around 9:30.

Forty-nine year old Jack Farley, of 124 Farley Avenue, Gardendale, Ala., was killed when the station wagon he was driving collided with another vehicle in a curve just passed the National Guard Armory east of town.

According to Iuka policeman, Robert Skinner, investigator, a blue Charger, driven by David Blackard, 20, of Iuka, was traveling east when it apparently

struck the driver side of the Farley auto traveling west. After impact, the Blackard vehicle continued moving some 50 yards further down the highway and ran off an embankment on the left side. When officers arrived at the scene, it was thought that the accident was a hit-and-run until the Blackard car was discovered some distance from the point of impact by searchers.

Mr. Farley, who was in the Naval Reserve, was enroute to Millington Naval Base at the time of the crash. He was

pronounced dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital.

David Blackard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Blackard, and the only passenger in his car, Tim Milligan, 15, son of Charlotte Milligan and Jackie Milligan, were taken to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala. Blackard, suffering from head and face injuries, was released on Sunday. At press time, Milligan was reported as improving by a family spokesman. He sustained a broken jaw bone and facial injuries.

Hospital Accredited By Joint Commission

Tishomingo County Hospital has been accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) according to R. E. Lambert, Administrator.

This accreditation, which covers from March 18, 1977 to March 18, 1979, is a result of an on-site survey made by field representatives of the Joint Commission's Hospital Accreditation Program (HAP). Accreditation indicates that this facility has chosen to operate according to standards set by MCAH and that the facility has, in the main, met these standards.

The standards, published as the Accreditation Manual for Hospitals, set forth optimal achievable goals of excellence against which a facility can

measure itself and be measured by the Joint Commission's survey.

Tishomingo County Hospital is one of approximately 4,800 general hospitals throughout the United States that have earned this recognition. There are approximately 7,150 hospitals in the U.S.

The Joint Commission's accreditation surveys are voluntary. It is not legally necessary for a hospital to be accredited, but health care facilities have sought accreditation because it represents a benchmark of quality that is higher than governmental licensure alone. The chief aim of the Hospital Accreditation Program, one of four such programs under the JCAH umbrella, is to help hospitals in their pursuit of excellence and there-

by provide a higher quality of care to patients. The program also seeks to recognize, and to identify for the public, those facilities which meet its standards.

The Joint Commission began in 1918 under the auspices of the American College of Surgeons. It was incorporated in 1951 with the support of its present member organizations: the American College of Surgeons, the American College of Physicians, the American Hospital Association, and the American Medical Association. JCAH is a Chicago-based, non-governmental, not-for-profit organization. In addition to hospitals, it has programs for the accreditation of long term care facilities, psychiatric facilities, and facilities for the mentally retarded.

Environmental Hearing Set For Yellow Creek

A public information hearing which will offer area citizens the opportunity to comment on the proposed Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant's environmental impact will be held next month in Iuka.

The hearing, which is not the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) public hearing on the Yellow Creek construction set for later this year, will center on the nuclear plant's effect on water quality in the Pickwick Reservoir area. Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) has applied for a nat-

ional pollutant discharge elimination system permit for the nuclear power plant.

The permit application states there will be six proposed discharges from the plant construction and operation into Yellow Creek embayment and the Tennessee River near Pickwick Reservoir.

In the application, TVA has listed the limitations on the amounts of pollutants which would be released in the discharges. The limitations are in accordance with those set by federal water pollution laws.

Participants at the meeting, held by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), NRC and the Mississippi and Alabama

state governments, will discuss both the TVA application and the findings of EPA's draft environmental impact statement on water quality.

The proposed \$1.9 billion nuclear power plant will generate 2,800,000 kilowatts of electricity when it begins operation in 1985.

The meeting is set for 7 p.m. August 10 in Tishomingo County Courthouse, Iuka.

FOOD PRESERVATION HOME STUDY COURSE

The Food Preservation Home Study Course is designed especially for employed homemakers. At home you can learn all about Food Preservation with the help of a New Food Preservation Home Study Course offered by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. The course includes instructions on Canning, Freezing, Making Jams, Jellies and Pickles. This course is part of Pocket Watch, a statewide Home Economics Program, to teach you how to watch your money. FOOD FOR CAMPERS

With vacation time here, many people are busy organizing their camping gear. While many campers will be camping along the road in state parks, others will be backpacking into the mountains.

Regardless of the type of camping you select, careful planning of food supplies is a must. Follow the Basic 4 Food Guide when planning food needs. Each day you should include four servings of fruits or vegetables, four servings of breads or cereals, two servings of meats, and milk and milk products according to your age group. If you are planning to be more active during your vacation than normal, also include nutritious snacks.

Since storage is quite limited in many trailers, keep this in mind when selecting food. Try selecting canned and dried foods that require little storage space.

Many fruits and vegetables are canned and require no refrigeration until opened. Dried fruits provide a nutritious snack food that takes up little space.

Many meats come in the canned form and are especially good for campers. This solves one of the greatest problems for campers -- refrigeration. Less refrigeration space is adequate when the only storage necessities are for leftovers. Bread and cereal requirements can be met in a variety of ways. They come in an almost endless form and require little room or special attention. Remember to keep them covered and in a cool spot.

Milk and milk products are very important and require special mention. The milk requirement can be met in various ways. The forms of milk you may choose from include fluid whole, evaporated, skim, dry and buttermilk. Cheeses are another selection which include cottage, cream, and cheddar-type. There are also ice cream and fermented milk products such as yogurt. If space and refrigeration facilities are limited, the better choice would be evaporated or dry milk. If you are using dry milk and reconstituting it, make

sure your water supply is wholesome.

People who choose a more rugged form of camping such as backpacking will need to take into consideration their severely limited space. Select the dried form of the product whenever possible. Dried fruits and meats can be eaten without reconstituting them. Nuts are a good choice because they take little room and are very nutritious. Unless you are sure of a wholesome water supply for reconstituting dry milk, select a canned milk product.

PEACH PIE (COBBLER)

1 stick margarine
1 1/2 cup sugar
3/4 cup flour
3/4 cup milk
1 large can peaches

Melt butter in baking dish. Mix well sugar, flour and milk. When mixed, pour over the melted butter. Place peaches (sliced) over batter, then pour peach syrup over this. Bake in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes. This is delicious served while warm with ice cream.

PEACH AND PLUM BORER CONTROL

There is still time this season to control borers. Moths are active most of the summer, and egg laying takes place all summer long. Treatment on early maturing varieties may be needed after harvest if there is not enough time as specified on the label from the last application to harvest. Control of borers is important because several seasons of damage will eventually kill the tree.

Treat the trunk and lower scaffold branches with a coarse low pressure spray that will give complete coverage. Newly hatched borers will be killed before they have penetrated the tree. Use one of the approved materials, and apply according to label directions.

Chlorpyrifos (Lorsban) 4E at the rate of 2 tablespoons in 1 gallon of water can be applied once during the season. Allow 14 days from application until harvest, and do not spray the fruit.

Endosulfan (Thiodan) 25 percent EC at 1 tablespoon per gallon or endosulfan (Thiodan) 50 percent WP at 2 tablespoons per gallon can be applied twice during the season, but allow 30 days from the last application to harvest.

Additional applications after harvest can be made on Aug. 1, Sept. 1, and Oct. 1.

When using a chemical pesti-

cide, follow label directions.

WATERING SHRUBS & TREES

Continue to give frequent soakings to newly transplanted trees and shrubs in July and August. Do not sprinkle shrubs or trees with small amounts of water since this tends to make the roots cluster near the soil surface and endanger plants during periods of prolonged droughts. It is best to soak the soil thoroughly once a week. This summer it is especially crucial to landscape plants which showed signs of winter injury from the extreme cold of the winter of 1976-77. Such plants had moderate to extensive root damage and are suffering from the drought in many parts of the state.

To aid in water conservation use a thick layer of organic mulch around trees and shrubs. A 3 to 5 inch layer of pine straw, leaves, rotted sawdust, manure or pine bark will help retain soil moisture and reduce needs for water.

4-H PARTICIPATION IN COMMODITY MARKETING
Why does tableware cost what it does? How can I understand how food is priced? Can I market my grain with less risk? What factors cause such wide fluctuations in broiler prices?

Do you have such questions about the commodities you produce or the products you consume?

If so, you will be interested in one or more phases of the 4-H Commodity Marketing Program. Through a study of some commodity systems, you can learn basic principles which apply to all markets. Both young men and women can participate in the program as individuals or as groups. Both rural and urban youths can participate because commodity marketing affects some area of interest of everyone.

Commodity Marketing offers 4-H'ers an inside view of the marketplace: The law of supply and demand. The way price is determined. Role of grades and standards, where to get market information, the role of the government in regulation and inspection of commodities. The role and function of a commodity exchange. The difference between cash and futures markets. What it means to hedge and to speculate. A commodity marketing project can be added to livestock, crops, foods, clothing, forestry, consumer education, career study, and related projects. Or, a corn marketing project, for example, can be done as separate project. The purpose of this program is to help 4-H boys and girls: To develop leadership talents and to work toward achieving the broad objectives of character and effective citizenship.

To learn the basic principles of marketing and distribution and utilization and how these principles apply to commodities sold in cash markets and traded in futures markets on major commodity exchanges.

To participate in activities related to marketing, distribution, and utilization which explain the use of futures as a management tool.

To relate information and knowledge of marketing functions, including distribution and utilization, to on-going 4-H projects.

To explore career opportunities in the total marketing and agri-business complex.

However you participate, there are numerous activities possible in this program because it includes all the phases of marketing and distribution and the use of commodity

futures markets.

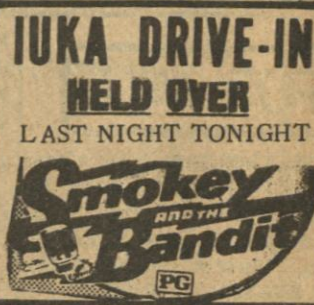

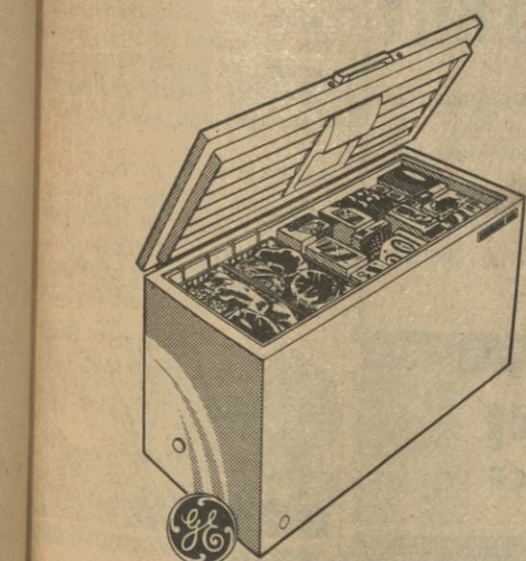

were wishing for - or were we?

Besides the heartbreak of old settlers along this route that had to find new places to live and will have to spend the rest of their lives lonely for their native spot where they "put down their roots" when young - we read such news as this -

- There is a rising sentiment that Northeast Mississippi is not receiving a fair share of waterway construction jobs! The local people were counting on employment at home with such a large project traversing and changing our Tishomingo County. Don't you think they deserve it?
