Civil Defense Facilities Now In Courthouse

Residents of Tishomingo County have recently been provided with a new Civil Defense Emergency Operating Center, located in the basement of the Tishomingo County Courthouse. This newly constructed center measures approximately four thousand square feet and contains the Civil Defense office, executive office, equipment room, communications room, conference room, men's bunking room, women's bunking room, kitchen unit, operations room, and an EOC equipment room. Currently the Cooperative Extension Service is housed in six of the rooms, and the Mississippi Forestry Commission occupies one room. The center was funded by the county, with 50 percent of the cost refunded to the county by the Federal Government.

Civil Defense, directed for Tishomingo County by Hubert Anglin, has the purpose of preparing the residents for natural disasters, manmade disasters and nuclear fallout.

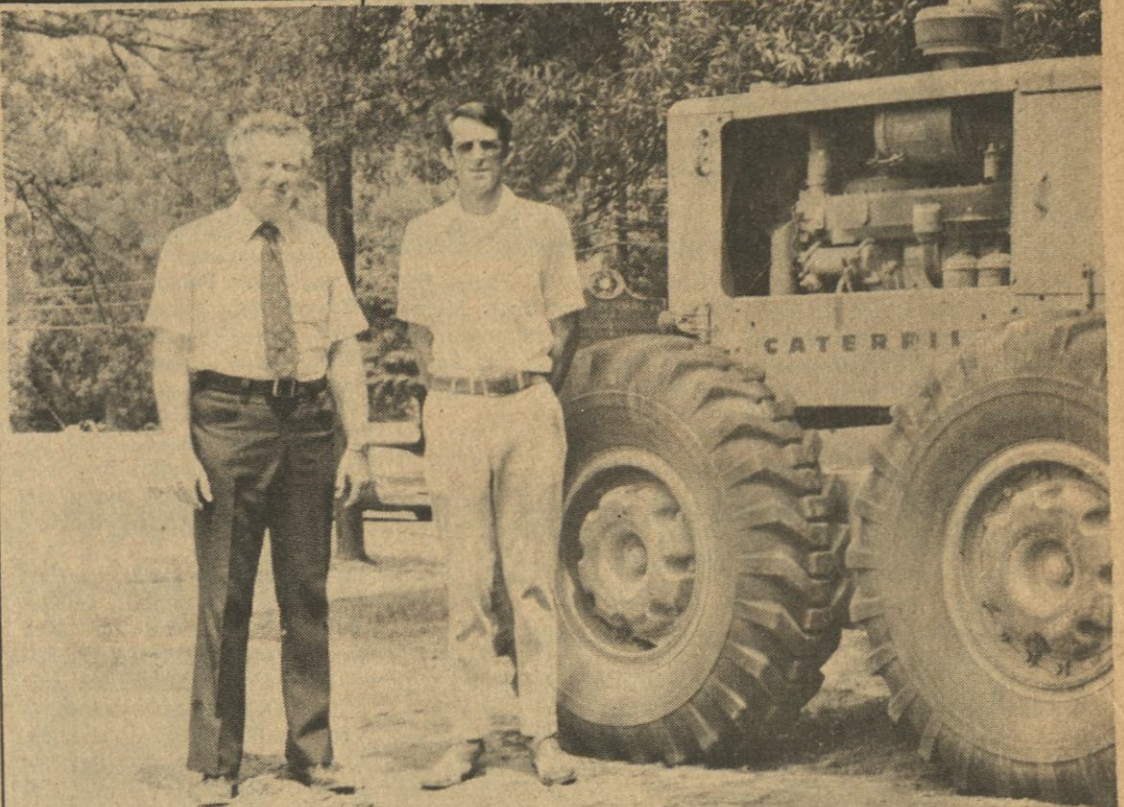
Businesses are urged to be on the alert for this crime, and when approached with a money order, to be safe, call the local post office and have the order checked out.

Well Cleaning Fatal To Man

Noonan F. Aldridge, 49, of Iuka, was pronounced dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital Sunday after apparently suffocating in a well in which he was working at the Lee Hogeland home in the Providence Community. Hospital records gave death due to possible asphyxiation.

According to a family spokesman, Mr. Aldridge and three other men were attempting to clean out the Hogeland well when the tragedy occurred. Frank Aldridge, son of the victim, stated that his father had used 1 1/2 stick of explosive around 2:00 Saturday in the 32 foot well, trying to clear it. On Sunday he entered the well around 11:15 and apparently suffocated after only five minutes inside.

The young Aldridge said that his father sent up one five gallon bucket of mud after entering and was joking about the small dipper he was using when Orville Bonds joined the group on top. Mr. Bonds, just naturally, looked into the well and immediately spotted that something was wrong below. After several attempts were made to pull Mr. Aldridge from the well, Frank said he entered the well, tied a rope around his father

and brought him to the surface. He reported that to his knowledge, there was no toxic gas present in the well. He also felt that his father was dead when he reached him.

Funeral services for Aldridge were held at 4 p.m. Monday, July 18, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in Rutledge-Salem Cemetery.

Survivors include five sons, William F., Austin H., Daniel E., Walter L., and Charles W. Aldridge, all of Iuka; two daughters, Miss Pamela Sue Aldridge and Mrs. Louise Barnes, both of Iuka; his mother, Mrs. Gladys Steelman, Chicago; four brothers, Odes Aldridge and Arles Aldridge, both of Chicago, Nolan and Calvin Aldridge, both of Marks; two sisters, Mrs. Eldreda Steelman, Michigan, and Miss Harriet Aldridge, Chicago; and four grandchildren.

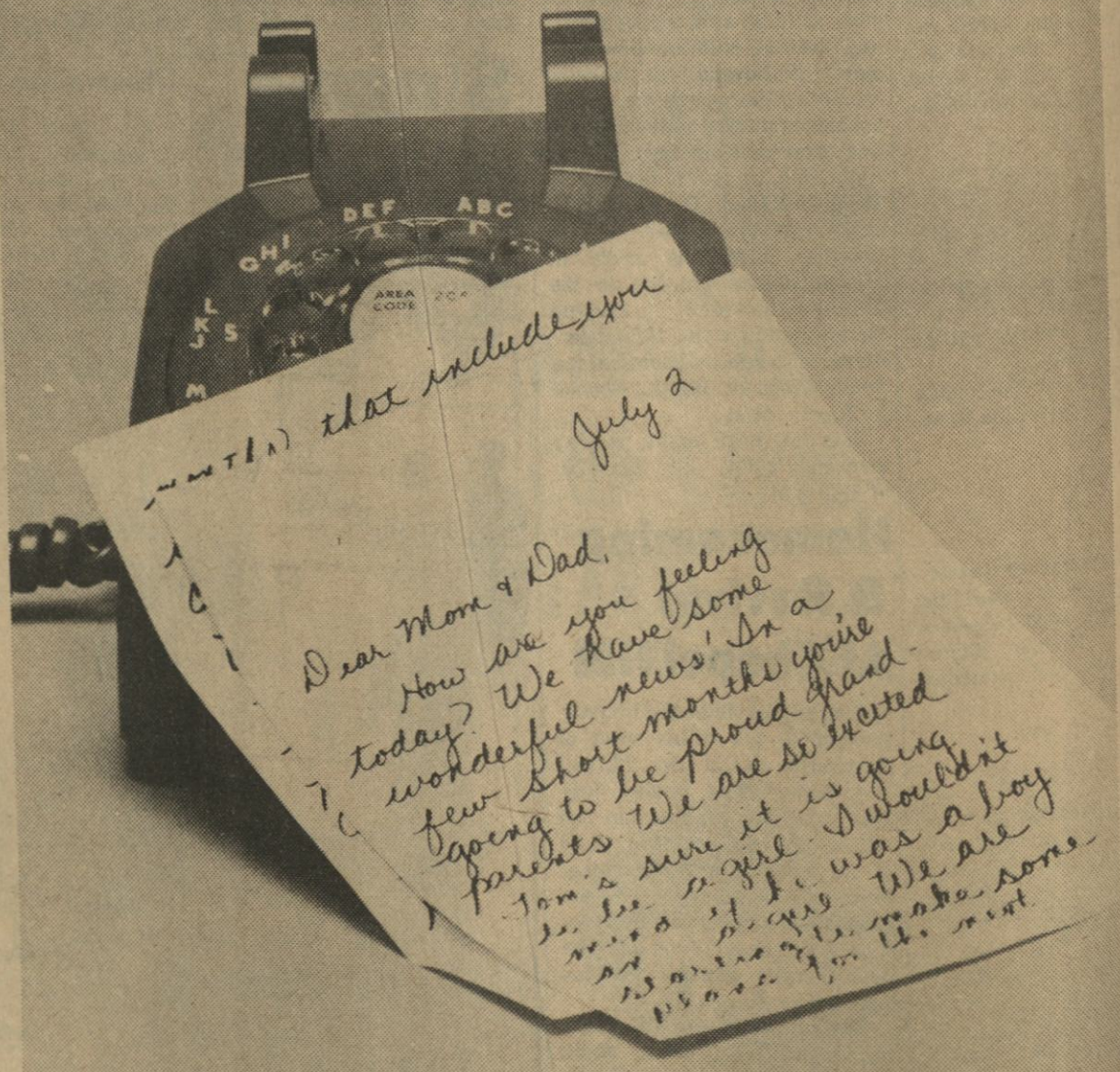

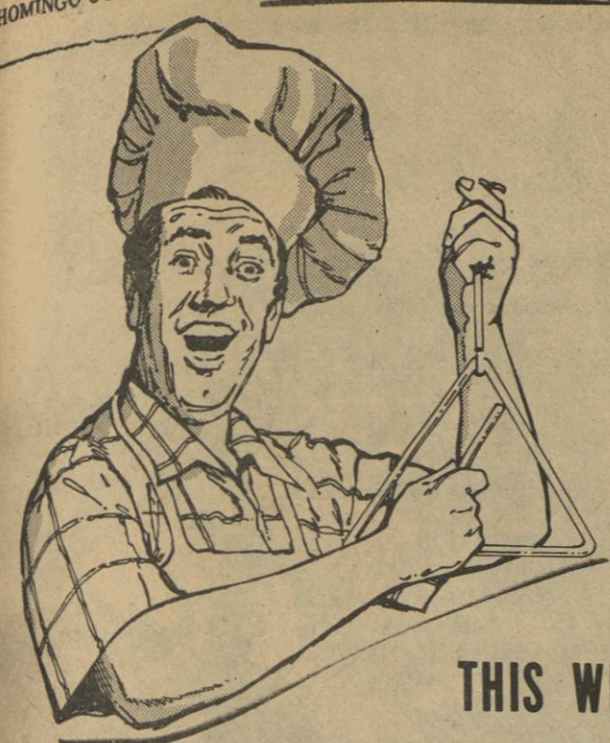

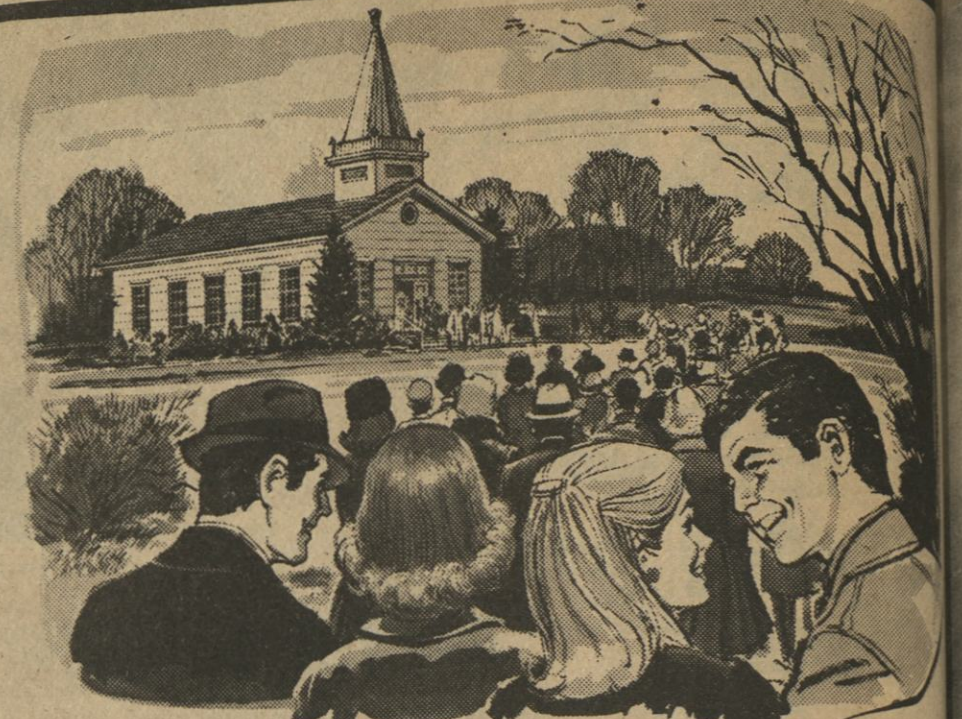

ASC Farm News

ASCS OFFICIAL EXPLAINS NEED FOR ACREAGE REPORTS

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has asked farmers to report 1977 wheat and feed grain acreages. Acting ASCS Administrator Victor A. Senechal, explained the reason for this request and the significance of the report. Under proposed farm legislation, reported by Senate and House Agriculture Committees, and effective for 1978 and succeeding crop years, the Secretary would have authority to require a set-aside of

cropland as a condition of eligibility for program benefits, if the supply situation for a program crop warrants it. "In the event a set-aside is deemed necessary for any program crop in 1978, the proposed bills provide that the amount of set-aside may be based upon either 1978 or 1977 plantings," Senechal said. "Because of these alternatives, it is important that farmers who are interested in participating in future programs voluntarily report their acreages, so that the Secretary of Agriculture would have both options available if a set-aside decision is made," he explained. However, farmers are urged not to plant additional program crop acreage this year solely in anticipation of additional benefits which may be gained under proposed legislation in 1978 and subsequent years. Under both farm bills 1977 crop acreages would have no effect on the 1978 program acreages eligible for target price guarantees and disaster program protection. The ASCS official pointed out that the acreage report is not a precedent because in prior years crop acreages have been reported which had no effect on program participation. Farmers have been reporting acreages of upland cotton, peanuts, rice, and tobacco. "We're encouraging a voluntary response to also obtain acreages involving wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley." The deadline for reporting crop acreages in Tishomingo County is August 1, 1977. Farmers who have harvested their crops can still report the acreage as long as there is evidence of the crop in the form of residue. "If there were a set-aside based on 1977 plantings for one of the crops in 1978 and we had no report," Senechal said, "we would have no crop acreage on which to base the set-aside, and this could hamper the farmer's ability to participate in a program." Farmers should contact the County ASCS Office during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. The office is closed from 12:00 noon until 1:00 p.m. for lunch. Or call 423-5036, if you have questions about reporting.

FREEZING FISH

Summer is the time to relax, enjoy, and go fishing. In fact, there is probably nothing quite as nice as sitting on a shady bank watching the ripples of the water and hoping that you will catch a big fish.

Sometimes, although not often, you may catch too many fish for your family and friends to eat. Then you freeze them, so that after fishing season is over, you can enjoy the memories of the shady bank and the good taste of fish.

Freezing fish is really quite easy if you remember some simple rules. First, freeze only high quality fish. Don't let the fish get warm and start to spoil before freezing. Freezing will not improve the flavor. Next, keep the fish clean. Freezing will not sterilize food; it only retards spoilage. Be sure to carefully wrap fish in recommended packaging materials. Try to package fish in quantities that you can use for a meal.

Label your packages with the date, kind of fish and the number. Freeze the fish quickly and store them at 0 degrees F., or lower so the fish will retain their flavor.

Fish should not be stored longer than 6 to 9 months. For additional information, ask your local Extension Home Economist for Publication 836, "Freezing Meat, Poultry, and Fish."

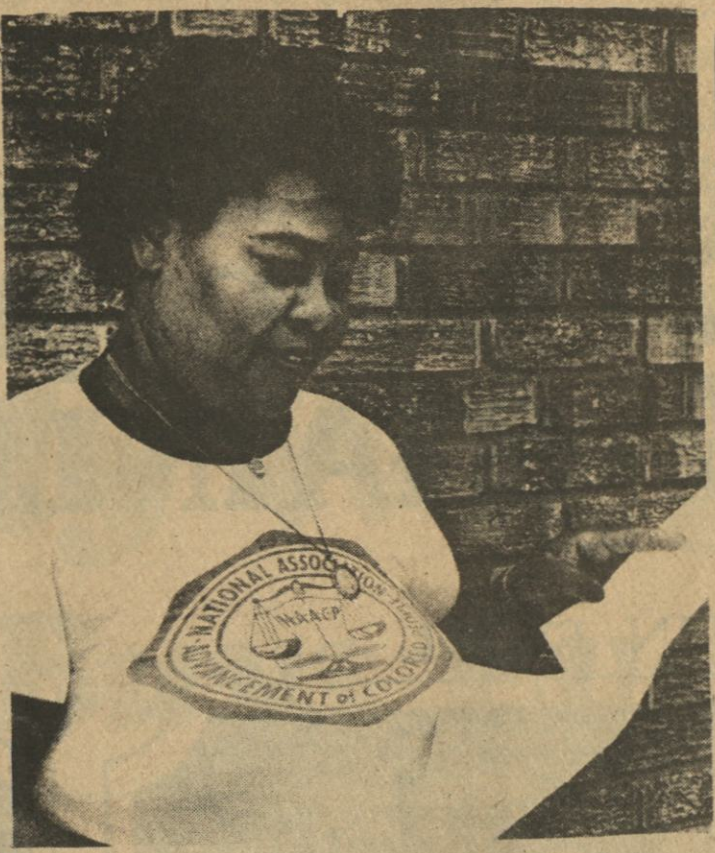
POTS AND PANS AREN'T PLAYTHINGS

Pots and pans that have been abused have caused many disappointments when food is being prepared. Good utensils are essential for good results in any food preparation.

The finest electric or gas range, equipped with all the latest features, may not perform well if you are using utensils with warped bottoms, dented sides, scratched and scoured surfaces, loose handles or badly fitting lids. You can easily and quickly batter your utensils into this state, if you abuse them.

For the best cooking results, also check the utensils on these important points:

- Straight sides. They help distribute heat evenly and make stirring easier.
- A flat bottom for even heating. This also keeps shorten-

2 tbsps. sugar
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1/4 cup shortening

1/4 cup warm water
3/4 cup buttermilk

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening until fairly fine. Dissolve yeast in warm water; add to the buttermilk and mix well. Stir yeast mixture into dry ingredients. Turn out dough on a floured board, and knead until smooth and blis-

cut with biscuit cutter. Spread with melted butter (if desired) and fold double. Place on ungreased baking sheet, and let rise one hour. Bake in 400 degree oven (moderately hot) for 12 to 15 minutes until golden brown. Yields 2 dozen rolls.

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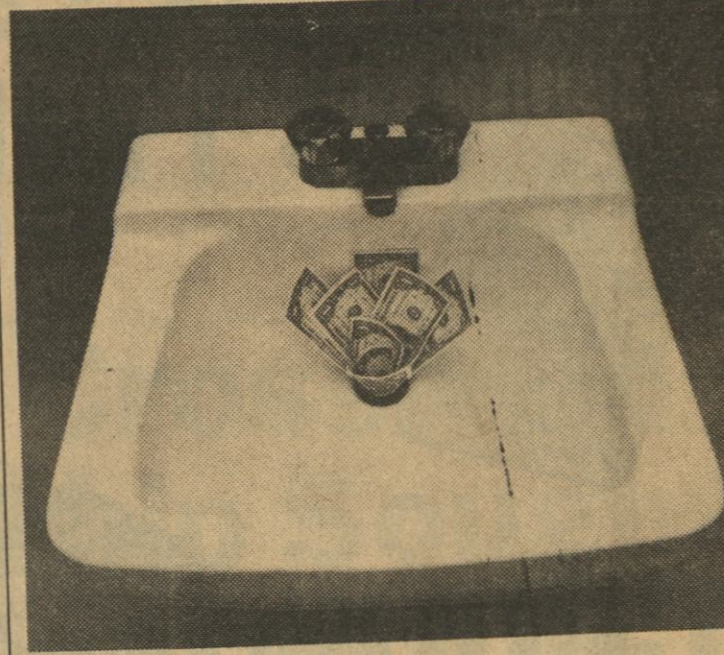
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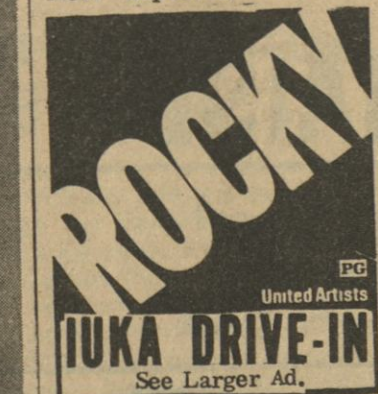
