PARENTS PLEA FOR CITY BUSING

A committee representing parents, who oppose an School Board decision to eliminate school bus service to certain neighborhoods, will ask city's aldermen to temporarily restore the service.

Shelton estimated the funds would keep the buses in service for three months, giving the residents, the aldermen and the school board time to iron out the bus problem.

Whitten Honored at Burnsville

Congressman Jamie Whitten, who is expected to rise to the chairmanship of the full appropriations committee in the next congress, said that agriculture "remains the basis for our prosperity, our economic well-being, and our standard of living."

Whitten said that his subcommittee would continue to provide the impetus for rural programs, which go to towns of 20,000 or less.

Finch Recommends Approval Of Grant

Governor Cliff Finch this week recommended approval of a \$24,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration and the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Development Authority to Yellow Creek Port Authority for clearing, grading, and general site improvements of the Yellow Creek Industrial

grant will help stimulate the local economy. Governor Finch said each application will be reviewed by EDA "individually on its own merit" and, once approved, will be matched by the A & I Board.

Please Help This Child

Little Phillip McClain, son of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Jones, of Burnsville, is twelve years old and a victim of cerebral palsy. He is to be admitted to St. Barnabus Hospital in Bronx, New York, for surgery by the Department of Neurological Surgery, on September 29, 1977.

Phillip has undergone surgery nine times in the treatment of cerebral palsy. He stayed in the Hospital School in Jackson, Miss. for 69 months. Phillip is crippled, rigid from the waist down, and unable to walk without crutches. He has a good mind but unfortunately has poor eyesight.

Phillip is to undergo a new surgical procedure at St. Barnabus Hospital. A device is to be implanted at the base of his brain. Results of previous operations using this device have shown that cerebral palsy victims are able to accomplish many things they were not able to do before.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones have three other children. They lost another child three years ago after the child had undergone open heart surgery.

The parents of Phillip are asking for public contributions to help them pay hospital costs and physician's fees during his stay at St. Barnabus Hospital. All or a portion of hospital costs may be required at the time of admission. Costs include room rates, operating and recovery room fees, anesthesia and stimulants.

Belmont Youth Dies After Drowning

Gary Steve Ozbirn, 17, a senior at Belmont High School, died around 9:15 Sunday evening, August 21, from a swimming accident, which occurred at J. P. Coleman State Park earlier that day.

According to witnesses, Ozbirn was swimming with a friend and his friend's father, James Witt, also of Belmont, around 5:30, when he disappeared in the water of the old swimming area near the boat launching ramp. Charles Kay, of Iuka, reported that he pulled his boat into the swimming area when he heard calls for help. He immediately entered the water and searched for the boy. Kay and a Tupelo youth, both clad in diving equipment, pulled Ozbirn from the water after he had been submerged approximately 13 minutes.

Dr. Kelly Segars, of Iuka, who was at Coleman at the time, administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation on the youth until an ambulance arrived. The life saving procedures were continued until he was put on a respirator at the Tishomingo County Hospital. A heartbeat and blood pressure was restored at the hospital. He was then transported to Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala. where he died after living more than three hours following the incident.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Calvary Baptist Church in Belmont with burial in the Belmont Memory Gardens. Deaton Funeral Home was in charge. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Ozbirn, Belmont.

Elections held recently in Tishomingo County have seated five new members to the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association Board of Directors effective immediately. Mack L. Wadkins won over Rex L. Tuckier 358 to 266 for the Area at Large seat in Saturday's run-off election. Gene Worshean also won the run-off with a 343 to 286 vote over Millard Kent in the Third District.

Loan Approved

Federal funds totalling \$302,000 have been approved for the Short Coleman Park Water Association, Inc.'s water system, Congressman Jamie L. Whitten announced.

The Farmers Home Administration funds -- a \$159,000 loan and a \$143,000 grant -- will be used to pay part of the cost of installing a well, an elevated tank, a treatment plan and distribution lines, according to the First District Congressman.

These improvements will strengthen the existing system and extend service to five additional users, bringing the total number of users to 611. The terms of the loan are 40 years at 5 percent.

Plans Underway For Tish. County Fair

The King & Queen of the Fair Contest will be held on Monday, September 5, at the Tishomingo County Fair Building. There will be three divisions of the Fair Contest. **REMOVING STAINS FROM
 UPHOLSTERY AND CARPETS**

Remove stains before they have a chance to set. The longer the stains are left on fabrics, the harder they are to remove. Some stains should be left for professionals, but you can remove others.

Blot up as much as possible of any moist stain. Treat with safe or mild agents in order not to cause more damage. Determine the fiber and use all safety precautions according to directions on product label. Use as little water, detergent, solvent, or bleach as possible on non-washable materials. Be sure to rinse out all agents used and stop the action of acids and alkalis with a neutralizer.

More and more cleaners contain a variety of chemicals, many of which are dangerous if improperly used. Some are poisonous and/or flammable. Read and follow all instructions carefully.

TYPE OF STAINS

Beverages - Soak in cold water, wash in warm water, rinse. If stain remains, soak wool or colored items for half an hour in 2 tablespoons hydrogen peroxide to 1 gallon water. Soak white linen, rayon, and cotton 15 minutes in 1

tablespoon liquid chlorine bleach to 1 quart water. It may help to dip a clean cloth in denatured alcohol and apply it.

Blood - Sponge or soak in cool water for 30 minutes. If stain remains, work detergent or soap into the stain and rinse. Add a few drops of ammonia to water and rinse. Or soak in lukewarm water and enzyme presoak or detergent product. Apply a few drops of household peroxide.

Candle Wax - Remove surface wax with dull knife. Place towel under stain and sponge with grease solvent. Dry and rinse. If fabric is bleachable, use chlorine bleach.

Chewing gum - Harden gum with ice cubes and remove the gum with dull knife. Soak in grease solvent. Rinse.

Chocolate or Coffee - Sponge or soak in cool water for 30 minutes. Work detergent into stain; rinse. Or soak in warm water with enzyme laundry product. Rinse.

Lipstick - Blot grease solvent slowly through stained area until bleeding stops. Dry. Rinse with hot water.

Perspiration Spots - Hold spots over container of ammonia. Fumes will usually remove spots.

Deodorants - Soak with detergent and water. Sponge with

grease solvent. Chlorine bleach may remove stains.

Fruit and Berry - Sponge stain immediately with cool water. Detergent may be worked into stain. If stain remains, use the bleach which is safe for fabric. Or use an enzyme product. Also, try chlorine bleach or sodium perborate. Rinse. Treat with cold water.

Grass - Work detergent into stain; rinse. If safe for fabric, sponge with rubbing alcohol. If stain remains, use the bleach safe for fabric. Or soak using an enzyme-containing product. Wash with detergent. Bleach if necessary with sodium perborate.

Fingernail polish - Sponge with Acetone for most fabrics. Use Amyl Acetate on acetate, arnel, dnyel and verel.

Grease and Tar - Pour grease solvent through stained area. Rinse with warm water.

ZIPPY BARBECUED CHICKEN

- 1/3 c. cooking oil
- 1 large chicken, cut into serving pieces
- 1/3 c. catsup
- 1/3 c. vinegar
- 1 t. salt
- 1 T. hot sauce
- 1/3 c. barbecue sauce
- 1 small chopped onion

Pour oil into electric skillet. Place chicken in skillet, turning to coat all sides with oil. Simmer, covered on low temperature for 30 minutes. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over chicken. Cook covered for 30 minutes on low temperature turning 2 or 3 times.

IMPROVING COMMUNICATIONS THROUGH 4-H PUBLIC SPEAKING

Platform Presence and Personality:
 Be rested. Eat sparingly before speaking. If you are nervous, breathe deeply and slowly several times just before you are introduced. Relax your arms, legs and body as much as possible. Walk to the lecturn briskly. Smile. Look as though you are alive and glad to be there. Stand at the side of the lecturn in full view of the audience. Later, you can move behind it to refer to your notes. Stand quietly, easily erect. Gesture naturally or not at all.

Observe the Professionals:
 Improve your speaking ability by observing and receiving help from the professionals. In some areas, Toastmasters Clubs and other civic organizations help train 4-H'ers to speak in public. They also provide judging and critiques at speaking events.

Arrange a visit to the radio or television station. Ask station personnel to describe the characteristics of a "good radio or TV voice." Have them explain the mechanics of producing and directing a radio or television show. Explore ways ability and ease in public speaking can offer career opportunities.

Interest Your Audience:
 Remember your audience is interested most in matters that personally concern them. Human interest stories win attention. Use words that create clear pictures. Be specific... honest... natural... friendly.

Begin A Speech:
 Have a lively, friendly - and short - opening. Arouse the curiosity of your audience. Begin with a direct question, a relevant quotation, a startling fact. Show quickly that your topic concerns your audience.

Make Your Meaning Clear:
 Be sure you thoroughly understand your subject. Describe things people do not know in terms of things with which they are familiar. Clarify abstract statements with specific examples. Cover only one or two points. Restate your main idea but use different phrases.

End A Speech:
 Never talk about stopping. Stop. Always stop while your

audience wants more. Close with the idea you want remembered longest. One sound ending is to summarize the main points; another is to pay your audience a sincere compliment; third is to leave your audience laughing or smiling.

Secrets of Good Delivery:
 Practice speaking on a voice recorder if you can. Play it back to yourself. You'll be surprised to hear how many words you slur, or mumble or mispronounce. Know your speech. Do not read it but have a brief outline on hand. This will make you feel more confident.

Safety First
 Always put safety first when working in grain storage bins. Grain flowing to an unloader or a collapsing pocket of bridged grain in a storage bin can pull a person under the grain surface. To prevent this, shut off the unloader before stepping onto the grain surface. Also, secure a rope around your body just below the armpits before

SOYBEAN INSECTS
 Soybeans do not have a key insect pest, but occasional outbreaks of various insects may warrant insecticide application. August and September are critical months. Foliage damage is easy to recognize on older plants having small, tender pods. Producers should also watch for pod-feeding insects such as boll-worms and stinkbugs. Soybeans can tolerate up to a 35 percent foliage loss before pod set. However, during pod set and pod fill, a foliage loss of 25 to 25 percent may dictate treatment.




Mr. Perry stated that our area may not be considered ideal for growing Rhododendrons; however, with a little special attention to basic planting requirements, they perform quite well.
