Fall Round-Up Revival

Dr. Felix Suthphim, President, Wood Junior College at Mathiston, Miss., will be the guest minister. He married the former Elene Brooks and they have one son, Bill. Claude Curtis, Jr. Retires From FBI

A man who spent 16 years in New York City as one of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's chief chasers of Soviet agents, and seven years as a pursuer of white collar criminals in Memphis, has retired. Mild-mannered, gray-haired Claude A. Curtis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Curtis, of Iuka, 56, looks more like a businessman than a top FBI spy-chaser.

"Those were exciting days," Curtis said of his years chasing spies. He leaned back in a chair in the Memphis FBI office on the eighth floor of the Federal Office Building and puffed on a pipe as he recalled his career that began in 1948.

Born in Iuka, Miss., Curtis didn't plan to be an FBI agent. He wanted to be an undertaker. Only later did he decide to become a special agent.

"I had gotten back to Iuka after spending five and a half years in the Air Force and went to work with the McPeters Funeral Home in Corinth. I did my work as an apprentice embalmer and attended the College of Mortuary Science in St. Louis," he said.

While in St. Louis, Curtis met and married Sammie Claire Emmons, of Mexico, Mo., who was in nurse's training. They now have four daughters.

"Well," said Curtis, "I had got myself married, was back in Iuka, had passed the state examination for embalmers, had a child on the way and was trying to figure out what I wanted to do. During that period Sam Allen, who was recruiting from the Memphis FBI, came through and talked to some of us. I went with the FBI along with eight others."

At first there wasn't much excitement and precious few spies to be caught.

Curtis said he went to work in Washington as a clerk and went to night school studying accounting at Strayer's College of Accounting. Four years later he finished night school "studying and trying to help raise a family, too."

After graduation he became an FBI special employee in Los Angeles, but still, he wasn't really an FBI man.

That soon changed. In November, 1953, he went to an FBI class for agents and graduated in 1954. He was assigned as an agent to work under Clarence Kelley in Houston. Kelly is now FBI director. Curtis was in Houston for less than a year when he was assigned to New York, where he spent 16 years working on Soviet espionage cases.

"I enjoyed every minute of it," he said.

Much of his time he spent keeping Soviet agents under surveillance, "but I don't think they were aware of what I was doing." Curtis said he did such things as take his wife and children with him when he was watching an agent "in a restaurant or on a subway. They would be looking for a lone FBI

agent and wouldn't pay any attention to or suspect a family group."

He helped the government make its case against Soviet agent Rudolph Abel, the KGB Colonel who Curtis said was "one of the biggest Soviet spies this country ever had."

"He was a real gentleman and did his job well," Curtis said of Abel. Abel was eventually exchanged for U-2 spy pilot Gary Powers, who had been shot down by the Russians and captured.

Money, Curtis said, not philosophical ideas, is what attracts most Americans who get involved in working for Russia or selling secrets to them.

"Usually the person is vulnerable, has a drinking problem or something, and once they are compromised they're used."

Eventually, when the Americans get in too deep, "they start worrying and come and tell us what they have done," he said.

After getting out of the spy-catching business, Curtis spent seven years in Memphis with the FBI where he worked with recently retired FBI supervisor John Shelburne on white-collar crimes and bank robberies.

"It never ceases to hit me that if these people (thieves) spent as much time on making an honest living as they do on stealing, they would be millionaires. But stealing today has become a way of life for many."

Curtis said he plans to rest a month, take a family vacation and then "get back in harness" in September. He said he is joining two former FBI associates, Gene Petrakis and John Shelburne, in their new Petrakis-Shelburne Associates, private investigative firm. It is the only firm in Memphis associated with private investigation firms composed of other retired FBI agents in all 50 states.

Elderly Nutrition Site To Open

Roland McAlexander, Project Director, Nutrition and Social Services for the Elderly, announced the opening of an Elderly Nutrition Site at the Iuka Community Center which will operate Monday through Friday at noon, beginning Sept. 12, 1977. These meals are prepared by Morrison Food Services, Inc. out of Northeast Mississippi Junior College and delivered to the site. Dana Roberts, site manager, will be in charge of the serving, management, operation and social services. Volunteers will be needed to help in the site. Outreach workers, transportation service and escort service will be needed. Other government agencies will help in health and welfare counseling, social security information, and nutrition education. Volunteers are asked to call Mrs. Roberts at 423-9801 for information.

"We will begin the operation

with forty meals each day and as attendance increases build up to a maximum of fifty meals," McAlexander said.

Eligible to participate in this program requires age sixty and older who do not eat adequately because: (1) they cannot afford to do so; (2) they lack the knowledge and/or skill to select and prepare nourishing and well balanced meals; (3) they have limited mobility which may impair their capacity to shop and cook for themselves; (4) they have a feeling of rejection and loneliness which obliterate the incentive necessary to prepare and eat a meal alone.

The spouse of eligible are also invited to attend.

You are urged to take advantage of this nutrition and social service program. This is funded through Title VII of the Older Americans and sponsored by the Northeast Mississippi Elderly Services, Inc.

During the past two weeks, the Iuka T.V. Cable Company has been hit hard with several T.V. reception outages resulting from acts of malicious mischief, vandalism, and other damage to equipment owned by the cable company. According to an official of the firm, their service area was first hit with an outage on Friday, August 26, and has been plagued with several others since that time. An investigation into the disturbance found signs indicating the power cables had been cut, causing the reception interruptions.

In an effort to curtail these acts, the Iuka T.V. Cable Co., Inc. is offering a cash reward in the sum of \$1000.00 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons responsible for such outages and damages to equipment. Complete details of the reward can be found inside this issue of The News.

The Cable Company apologizes for the inconvenience caused to customers during this time.

Loan Approved

The Farmers Home Administration has approved a loan of \$55,000 to the Midway Pleasant Hill Water Association at a rate of 40 years at 5 percent.

These funds will be used to extend the existing rural water system to serve 48 new customers, making a total of 316 users. About 8 miles of water line will be installed.

Grant Awarded

Tishomingo County has been awarded a \$300,000 grant for construction at the Yellow Creek Port. Congressman Jamie Whitten announced Tuesday.

The Appalachian Regional Commission grant, which will be matched by \$159,000 in local funds and \$602,000 from the Farmers Home Administration, will be used to provide a 500 GPM well and pump, a storage tank, treatment plant, and 22,000 square feet of water line.

Highway Patrolman, Curtis Butler, the accident occurred around 10:15 Saturday night, when a 1972 Buick, driven by Mrs. L. H. Rushing, of Tishomingo, collided with a 1972 Olds station wagon, driven by Gary Slayton, 23, of Route 1, Belmont.

Mrs. Rushing, going east on Highway 30, apparently pulled into the path of the Slayton auto, traveling south on Highway 25. Both vehicles traveled some 90 feet after impact.

Passengers in the Slayton car were Slayton's wife, Debra, 21, and their young daughter, Melanie, 3. They were taken to Tishomingo County Hospital by auto and later released after examinations.

Traveling with Mrs. Rushing was Linda Barnes, 15, also of Tishomingo. Mrs. Rushing was carried to the Tishomingo County Hospital by the Belmont ambulance and later transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis where she is listed in critical condition in the Intensive Care Unit. Ms. Barnes was carried to the T.V. by the Iuka Ambulance and was admitted to the facility.

VITAMIN SUPPLEMENTS

The appeal of vitamin and mineral supplements, organic or synthetic, is based largely on the argument that a person might have a deficiency that doctors cannot detect. This sales pitch leads to much self-prescription. Advertisements for supplements suggest that if you are concerned about your health, you will take vitamin pills. They maintain that you cannot possibly select nutritious food, and that the only way you can be sure you get an adequate amount is to take supplements.

It is possible to take excessive amounts of vitamins, especially vitamins A and D which are stored in the body. Symptoms of toxicity from too much vitamin A or D are strikingly similar to the deficiency symptoms.

If you decide to use vitamin pills without consulting a physician, remember that some contain nutrients out of proportion to the body's needs. Others contain nutrients that the body can make or that are generously supplied in foods.

Food can provide the nutrients needed for the functioning of a healthy body. Select milk and dairy products, meat, eggs, fish and fowl, enriched and whole grain cereals and breads, and fruits and vegetables to provide needed minerals, vitamins, protein, car-

bohydrates and fat.

EVERYONE NEEDS MILK

Everyone needs milk and other dairy products each day. Without eating some dairy foods daily, it's nearly impossible to get adequate amounts of calcium and riboflavin.

Many believe milk is a food for babies and children. This is not true. Children and teenagers need more milk because they are in a period of rapid growth. However, young adults, the not-so-young and senior citizens also need milk.

The body is in a state of constant change. The nutrients found in milk -- especially calcium, riboflavin and protein -- repair the cells and carry out other body functions. These functions include the regular beating of the heart and the formation of blood clots for healing.

Children should have 2 to 3 cups of milk each day; teenagers and pregnant women, four or more cups; and adults, two or more cups daily.

COLONIAL SPICE CAKE

(1 cake)
3/4 cup butter, softened
1 1/2 cups firmly packed
brown sugar
3 eggs
3 cups enriched flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1 cup apple cider or apple juice
3/4 cup milk
Vanilla Frosting
Cream together butter and sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time. Stir together dry ingredients. Combine cider and milk. Thoroughly blend flour into creamed mixture alternately with cider mixture, beginning and ending with flour. Pour into 3 greased and waxed paper lined 8 inch round cake pans. Bake in preheated 350 degree F. oven 35 to 30 minutes, or until done. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pans. Cool completely before frosting with Vanilla Frosting.

VANILLA FROSTING

1 cup butter, softened
4 cups confectioners' sugar
1/3 cup dark corn syrup
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
Beat together butter, sugar, corn syrup and vanilla until smooth. If necessary add more sugar until proper spreading consistency is reached.

SPOT TREATMENT OF WEEDS

The Mississippi Division of Plant Industry has granted a state label for the herbicide Roundup for spot treatment for weeds in soybeans, corn and sorghum. Extension Agronomist Dr. Wayne Houston says Roundup is restricted to spot treatment with hand sprayers or other conventional spot treatment applicators. The state label does not include use of Roundup through a recirculating sprayer. An applicator must have a copy of the state label to legally use Roundup. Contact your Extension office for details.

FORAGE TESTING

Knowing the nutritional value of your hay and silage will help you plan a better winter feed program. The Forage Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University will analyze hay or silage samples. Up to five samples per producer can be analyzed yearly without charge.

This service basically puts a feed tag on homegrown hay and silage. Forage analysis shows digestibility, crude protein and fiber content. This information is necessary to balance a cattle ration.

Your County Extension Office has equipment and information on taking forage samples.

TIMBER HARVEST

Proper supervision of timber harvesting is often neglected by landowners. Selling timber is the most important management practice in forest life.

To prevent profit loss and tree damage, landowners should stay close to the harvesting operation. Mark trees for cutting and know the market price of timber. Advertise timber for sale and have a written contract with the harvester.

SELECT GOOD HERD BULL

Selecting a good herd bull is one of the most important jobs in a cattle production operation. The herd bull is the most important animal in the herd from reproductive, genetic and economic standpoints. To get the best bull for your herd, select animals that have weaning weight, yearling weight and other performance information available. Use this information to select herd bulls with greater genetic potential.

4-H CLUB

4-H'ERS TUNE UP TO SAVE FUEL

You don't have to be a fully qualified mechanic to realize that "sick" engines waste fuel. That's one reason young people in the national 4-H petroleum power program are zeroing in on inefficient engines. They know that proper care and operation of tractors and small engines pays off in better performance, fewer repairs and conserved energy.

4-H members 9-19 learn by doing as they maintain and adjust engines and improve their safe and efficient operating skills. Under the supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service, 4-H'ers also develop an understanding and appreciation for the problems of production, conservation and handling of fuels and lubricants. In a variety of projects and activities, they work with tractors and the smaller units that power lawn mowers, snowmobiles, boats, trail and mini-bikes.

In addition to gaining practical experience, 4-H members can qualify for county level. One program member from each participating state is awarded an expense paid trip to the 56th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 27 - Dec. 1. And six national winners are presented with \$1,000 scholarships. All winners are selected by the Extension Service. The foundation also sponsors tractor operators contests and small engine activities at the two U.S. 4-H Engineering Events. This year's Western Event will be held Sept. 22-24 at Ak-Sar-Ben, Omaha, Neb., and the Eastern Event Sept. 26-28 in connection with the State Fair of Virginia in Richmond.

ASC Farm News

On August 31, 1977, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) raised the national loan rate for feed grains (Barley, Corn, Oats, Rye and Sorghum). The increases are effective immediately.

Below are the new loan rates, those previously announced for the 1977 crop and the 1976 rates. All figures are stated per bushel except the sorghum figures in parentheses which are stated per hundredweight.

Barley, new rate \$1.63, previous rate \$1.50, 1976 rate \$1.22; Corn, new rate 2.00, previous rate 1.75, 1976 rate 1.50; Oats, new rate 1.03, previous rate 1.00; 1976 rate .72; Rye, new rate 1.70; previous rate 1.50; 1976 rate 1.20; Sorghum, new rate 1.90 (3.39), previous rate 1.70 (3.04), 1976 rate 1.43 (2.55).

According to acting Secretary of Agriculture John C. White, today's action was taken in response to the "severe cost-price squeeze that is now adversely affecting many farmers." The raises are identical to those stipulated in the proposed 1977 farm bill currently before the Congress.

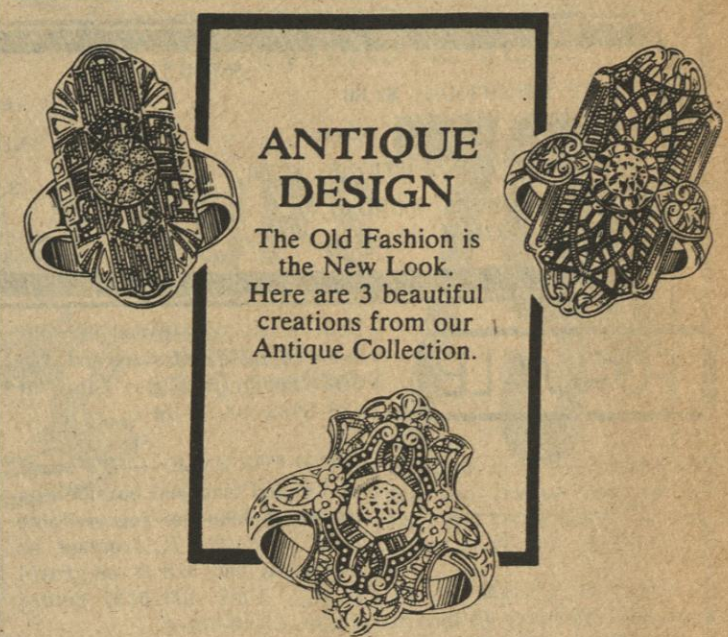

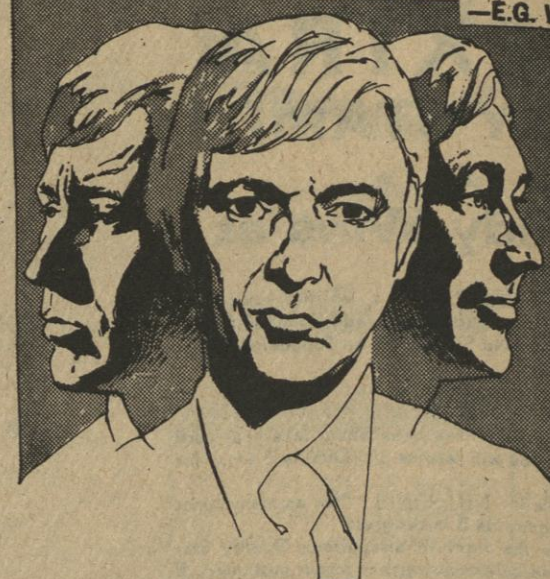

Construction Wages For Nuclear Plant Estimated By TVA

Estimated total wages to be paid to construction workers during the construction period at TVA's proposed Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant will be about \$368 million, TVA says in a draft environmental statement on the project. The total is based on the estimated annual average 1975 wage.

The proposed plant site is on the east shore of the Yellow Creek embayment of Pickwick Lake about 15 miles east of Corinth. TVA must complete its own environmental review and obtain regulatory approval before work can begin on the two-unit nuclear power plant.

TVA hopes to begin preliminary site preparation late this year or early in 1978, and has a projected peak construction force of about 2,800 TVA and contractor employees. The projected employment is 1,000 one year after construction begins, 2,150 after two years, and 2,700 - 2,800 during the third and fourth years. The number of workers will then begin to decrease after the peak periods. The income of the permanent plant staff of about 200 is expected to be about \$2.8 million annually.

In the environmental statement, TVA says it will take necessary steps to reduce any significant impacts from the increased demands on local services due to the influx of employees. One way TVA intends to reduce the number of workers moving into the area is through recruitment of qualified local employees.

TVA's draft environmental statement on the Yellow Creek project is available for public inspection at the Northeast Regional Library at Corinth. Copies may be obtained from the TVA Information Office, 400 Commerce Avenue, Knoxville, Tenn. 37902.

John Hendrix, the TVA project coordinator for Yellow Creek, who lives in Iuka, is available to help Government officials and interested citizens seeking information about the proposed plant.

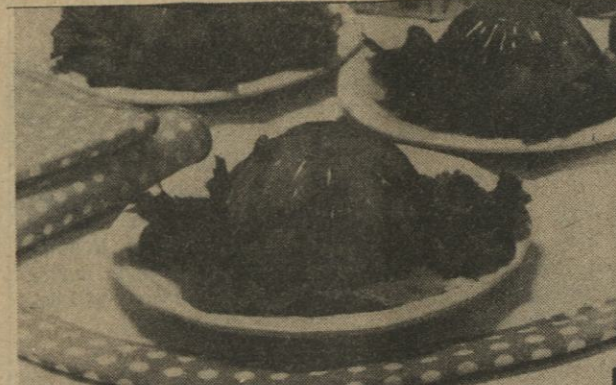

and cloves. Add oil, egg yolks, water and vanilla. Beat about 2 minutes at medium speed, or until satiny smooth. In a small bowl stir the remaining 1/4 cup flour, 2 cups apples, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and nuts together until apples are coated. Fold apple mixture into egg yolk mixture with cream of tartar until stiff but not dry or just until whites no longer slip when bowl is tilted. Gently fold yolk mixture into egg whites just until blended. Turn into prepared pan. Bake in preheated 350°F. oven 1 hour and 10 to 15 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Invert pan and cool for 5 minutes. Loosen edges with spatula and turn out cake onto cake plate or serving platter to complete cooling.

Your cooling thermostat spends energy

The energy it takes to cool your home on hot summer days is a very valuable commodity. And your cooling thermostat decides when and how much energy is to be used.

To cut down energy waste it's important to handle the thermostat carefully.

It's best to set the thermostat no lower than 78 degrees and leave it there throughout the cooling season if possible. Why 78?

Because at this temperature you can be reasonably comfortable without unnecessary electricity use. For every degree below 78 you'll pay three to five percent extra to cool your home. For every degree above you'll save three to five percent.

If you go on vacation this summer or leave home for more than a day, be sure to turn your air conditioner off completely so it won't be cooling an empty house. And remember if you return to a hot house, you can't get "instant cool" by setting the thermostat much lower. The house will cool just as fast if you set it at the normal 78 degrees.

Sportsmen Fund State Programs

For Conservation
MISSISSIPPI STATE - American sportsmen are serious about promoting wildlife conservation, says Ross Shelton, wildlife specialist, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

"No segment of our society has contributed more to manage and conserve our fish and wildlife resources than these hunters and fishermen," reported Shelton.

Last year, 43.5 million sportsmen paid more than \$270 million for state hunting and fishing licenses, reported the specialist. In addition, they paid \$75 million in excise taxes on ammunition, sporting arms and fishing supplies.

"These two sources provide almost all the funding for state fish and wildlife enhancement programs, including nongame and endangered species programs," Shelton explained.

Last year, in Mississippi, 16,397,367 hunters spent about \$143 million for state licenses, tags, permits and stamps. During this same time period, 27,080,305 fishermen spent more than \$127 million for these items.

Since 1923, through licensing and excise taxes, hunters and fishermen have contributed more than \$4.6 billion to state fish and wildlife agencies for their important work.

Iuka Drive-In

Specialist Gives Advice For First Hunting Season

MISSISSIPPI STATE - With dove season now open in the northern zone, many hunters are enjoying "popping a few caps" during this first hunting season after summer.

"Dove hunting is more of a social sport than many other types of hunting," says Ross Shelton, wildlife specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

"Dove hunting requires little camouflage, and hunters don't have to maintain the silence necessary for success that other hunting requires," continues Shelton. "Usually Mississippi hunters use dogs such as Labrador retrievers to retrieve birds, reduce crippling loss and add a dimension to the sport."

Managing an area to attract doves is quite easy when compared to the money and time spent to manage

other game species, according to the specialist. A food crop can easily draw doves, if it is properly planted in an acceptable location and early enough for seed to mature before or by early September. Doves prefer to feed in clean, open areas which are relatively free of vegetation that may limit their view or hinder their taking flight quickly when alarmed, he explains.

Food crops are generally better utilized if planted within one mile or less of a pond or other water source.

A dove food crop of five acres or more should attract and retain adequate dove numbers throughout the season. Areas of browntop millet, newly planted wheat, sorghum and natural stands of goatgrass provide good hunting. Less abandonment occurs when shooting is stopped about one hour

before sunset to allow doves time to feed and water before roosting. It is also best not to hunt in an area more than twice a week.

When hunting, station hunters 100 to 150 yards apart for safety. Don't shoot at low-flying birds or when you are not sure what is beyond the target. Always display landowner respect by refraining from littering and picking up expended shotgun shells, stresses the specialist. Secure permission to hunt before entering the premises and, as a courtesy, share part of your bag with the landowner.

Also follow basic firearm safety rules. Treat every gun as though it were loaded. Be careful when retrieving a gun from a vehicle, and unload it before replacing. In groups of hunters carrying loaded guns, watch muzzle direction closely.

After harvesting, pluck doves immediately and store in an ice chest in the field. Normally, hot weather causes the birds to spoil rapidly.

In 1964, Presley purchased the yacht Potomac, the sea-going White House of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and presented it to Danny Thomas for the hospital to use in fund-raising.

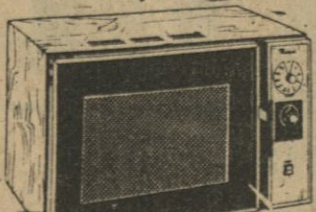

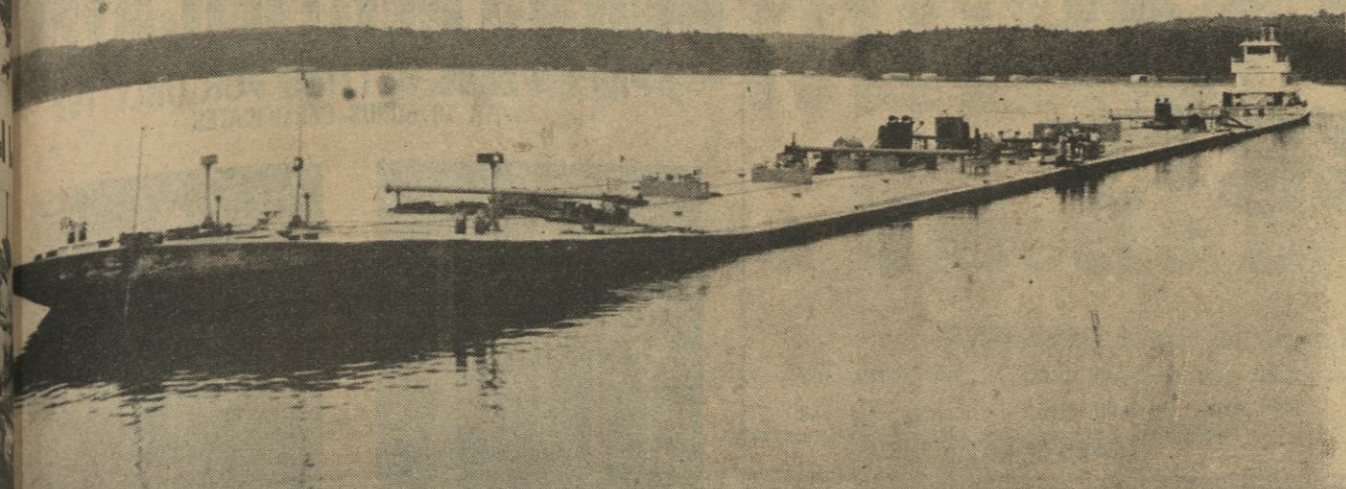

FIRST FUEL SHIPMENT ARRIVES AT YELLOW CREEK PORT

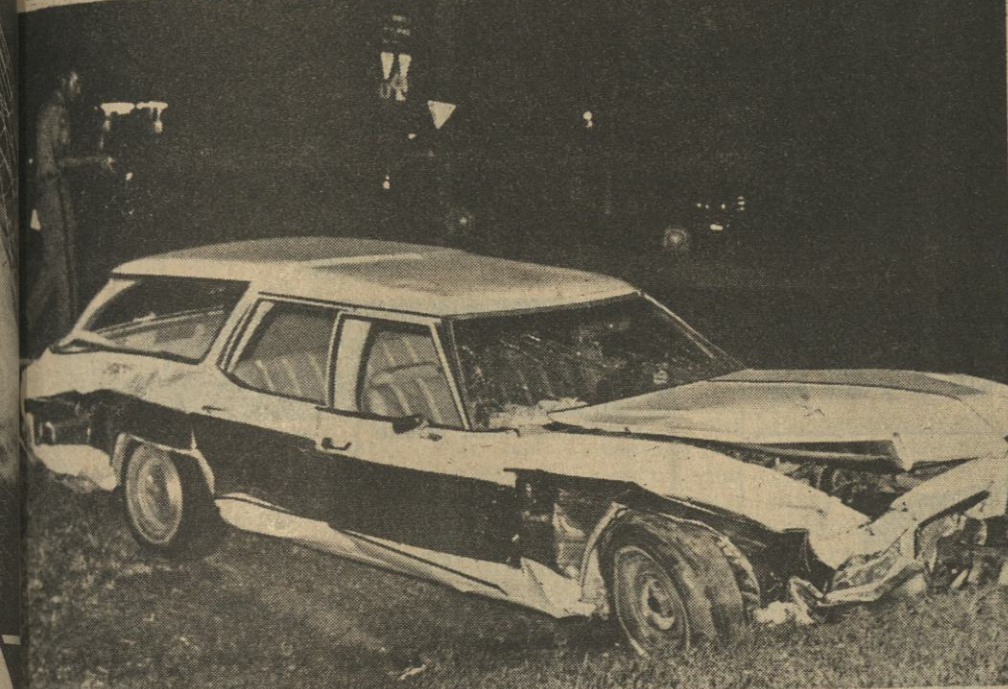

unload the barges into the storage tanks, each tank is capable of holding 80,000 barrels of fuel. (1 barrel equals 42 gallons). J.E. Jones, Vice President of Operations at Ergon said that "Ergon, Inc., of Jackson, Miss., is happy to open up the first industrial facility at the Yellow Creek Port. "We want in particular to let

the lake residents know that we intend to be good neighbors and that our facility is going to be environmentally pleasing and environmentally safe. "We have complied with all regulations for all necessary safeguards and are taking further steps to finish all the storage tanks and grounds in green color that will blend into the treelined background.

"Our people realize the beauty of the lake and we want to fish, swim and boat in it as well as anybody." The new Ergon facility has taken extra precautions to assure against any type of oil spills that may cause a danger to the lake area, he said. The U. S. Coast Guard has determined that the average oil spill is 4 barrels. At the new Ergon site a special loading platform has been built that is capable of holding 36 barrels of spilled oil.

The platform also is equipped with a device that will separate the oil from the lake water, returning the oil to the barge and the water back to the lake. There is also a system of check valves along the pipeline leading from the barges to the holding tanks to prevent any oil from being accidentally drained back into the lake. Around the two holding tanks is a specially constructed dyke area that is capable of containing the entire 160,000 barrels (6,720,000 gallons) of fuel.
