### 1 Directory For Each Household

To conserve paper and reduce costs, South Central Bell has revised its procedure for distributing telephone directories, according to Bill Hardin, the company's local manager.

The new plan calls for distributing one directory per household, instead of one for every two phones in the past. The new policy does not apply to business customers.

"The 'one directory per household' plan will mean a significant saving of paper for the luka directory," Hardin said. "The plan will also

## Records Show 3,370 Enrolled

in schools throughout Tishomingo County has reached the 3.370 figure and is still climbing as late enrollees continue to register.

The breakdown begins with Iuka Special Municipal Separate School showing a figure of 1.169 students in school. There are 555 registered in grades 1-6 at the luka Elementary School and 614 registered in grades 7-12 at the high school.

The Tishomingo County School System reports a total of 2,201 students enrolled following the first two weeks of the term.

According to Alvia Blakney, Superintendent of Education, Tishomingo County, the breakdown for the county schools is as follows: Belmont Elementary, 408; Belmont High School, 413; Burnsville Elementary, 387; Burnsville High School, 352; Tishomingo Elementary, 282; and Tishomingo High School 329. Late enrollments have altered these figures.

Application of the revised formula has been made retroactive to May 6, 1977, except where loan and grant funds have been delivered to the borrower. Financing or projects previously approved but not yet funded will be adjusted to the new formula, Cassell said.

In addition to the Sept. 30. 1977 deadline for obligation of funds, the drought emergency program imposes an April 30. 1978 deadline for completion of projects. Communities of up to 10,000 population may be included in the service areas of water systems receiving FmHA loans and grants. Loans are made for a term of up to 40 years, at an interest rate of 5 percent.



COTTON DEFOLIATION

Chemical cotton defoliation is necessary for machine harvesting when yields are high and plants have green, succulent foliage. Chemical defoliation is important in producing high quality cotton fiber. However, if used improperly, defoliants or desiccants can reduce yields and quality.

Chemical defoliation may not be needed if fields have matured early, natural defoliation are ideal. Wet-natured poorlyhas begun, and remaining leaves are tough. If wet weather becomes a problem during boll opening, consider chemical defoliation. Defoliating too early will result in immature seed, which will contribute to low quality seed for planting next spring. It also reduces seed value to oil mills.

WINTER GRAZING

One way to eliminate or reduce hay requirements this winter is to make good use of winter grazing. Ryegrass and small grains seeded on a prepared seedbed should be planted by September 21. The benegrazing. However, this benefit is normally not obtained if seeding is after October 1. Seed 30 pounds of ryegrass plus 90 pounds of wheat or other small grain per acre. If seeding ryegrass alone, use 40 pounds of seed.

Winter grazing should be planted only on well-drained soils. Sandy loam and silt soils with good internal drainage and a slope of four to eight percent drained soils are not suited for winter grazing.

PREVENT FIRE LOSSES Fires occurring during operation of harvesting equipment pose a threat to farmers. These losses can be prevented by equipping combines, pickers, trucks and other harvesting equipment with a recommended fire extinguisher and training the operator to use it.

Fires on most harvesting equipment and farm trucks involve stalks, straw, gas and oil. This means two classes of fires are possible: (1) class A fires -- ordinary combustible materials such as straw

-- involving flammable liquids

or gas and oil. It is advisable to install a multi-purpose extinguisher rated at 2A - 10 B:C on your equipment. It offers protection for oil and gas fires and gives moderate help against class A fires.

Check extinguishers periodically to make sure they are fully charged. These practices may save your crop or equipment from fire damage.

BUDWORMS, ARMYWORMS, DROUGHT EFFECTING CROPS?

It has come to the attention of the Tishomingo County ASCS Office that corn fields are being heavily damaged by the budworms, armyworms, and/or drought in practically the entire county. As soon as you know your crop has been damaged, please contact this office. For the budworm and armyworm damage, the application for disaster will need to be filed immediately in order that we can make inspection of the damage. For drought, application may be made after crop is harvested. Payments are made on underproduction of corn at \$.57 per bushel. However, on corn, the

TISHOMINGO COUNTY NEWS-THE VIDETTE-BELMON farm may produce or the potential production be less than 58.19 percent before being eligible for payment. Field inspection of the disaster is necessary as soon as disaster application is filed by the producer and before evidence of the disaster and crop is destroyed.
