Increase Noted In Collections

Four municipalities in Tishomingo County showed an increase in sales collections during the month of September as compared to those figures of August, recently released in the monthly issue of "Mississippi Municipalities". Those showing increases in tax collections were: Belmont, Golden, Paden and Tishomingo.

Burnsville and Iuka were the only towns in the county showing a decrease in the amount of taxes. Burnsville collected \$2,698.79 in August and \$2,394.50 in September. Iuka collected \$16,516.83 in August and \$15,215.92 in September.

\$6,773.68 was the figure Belmont tallied in with in September, showing a substantial increase over August figures of \$5,674.51.

In Golden collections totaled \$581.33 in September, as compared to \$388.96 in August. Paden also showed a slight increase in September with \$165.29 collected, compared to the \$118.40 figure for August.

The Town of Tishomingo had a \$1,000 increase in sales tax collections for September over August. The August figure was \$1509.65, and September was \$2503.46.

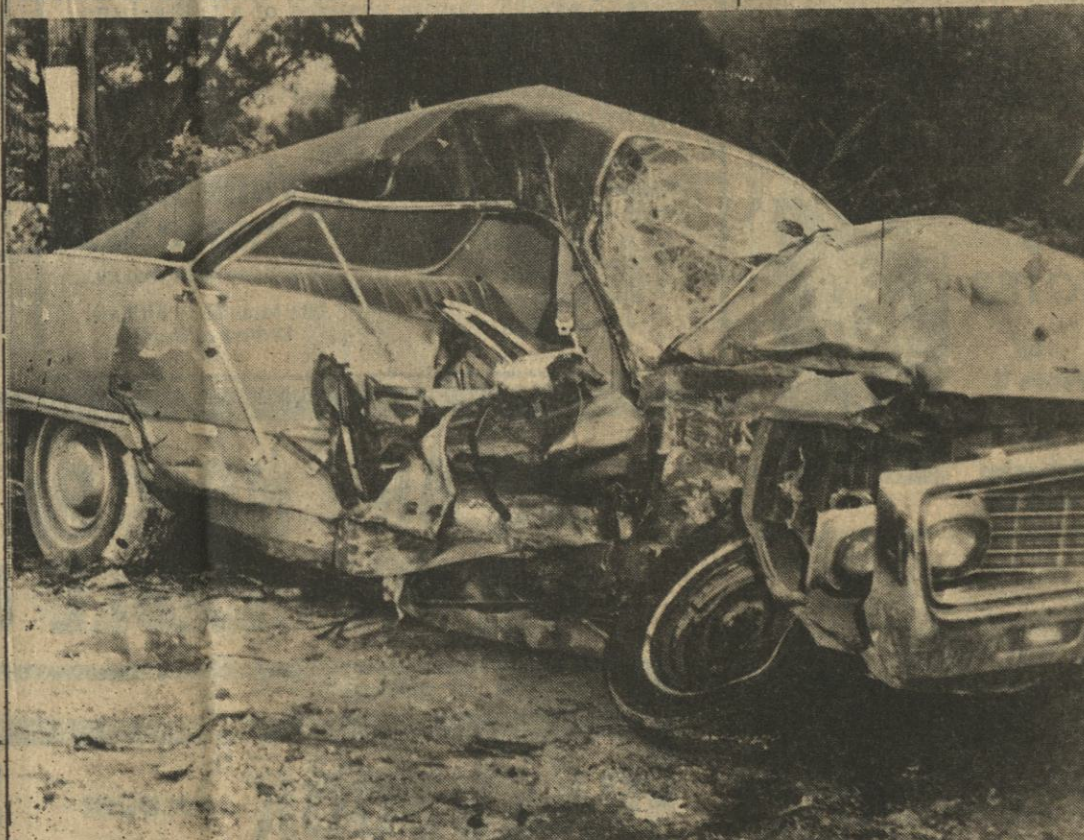
Young Iuka Girl Killed, Father Injured

Unemployment Figures For Tishomingo Co. Released

Unemployment in Tishomingo County remained at 5.0 percent for the second month according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Corinth Area of the Mississippi State Employment Service. This represented a 1.5 percent decrease from the estimate of one year ago. The civilian labor force for the county, estimated to be 8,650 at mid-September compares with 8,790 for August and 8,490 for September 1976. The number of individuals employed in Tishomingo County decreased some 140 individuals from last month while an increase of 280 was seen in comparison with last year's estimate. Manufacturing employment according to Smith, at 3,060 is relatively the same as it was last month and one year ago, while nonmanufacturing employment at 2,220 showed slight increases for the same periods.

Smith went on to say that the civilian labor force for the four-county area totaled 41,380 persons at mid-September, reflecting a decrease of 460 from the August estimate but registered a substantial increase of 1,630 from the estimate of the same period one year ago. Unemployment in the Area continued its downward trend to 5.6 percent of the civilian labor force, or 2,330 individuals. Employment in the area also declined by some 300 individuals but rose substantially over the September 1976 estimate by 2,220 individuals. A review of establishment based employment indicates increases in both manufacturing and nonmanufacturing employment from the August estimate and the September 1976 estimate.

Amy Elizabeth Skinner, 6 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Scotty Skinner, of Iuka, died Monday, November 7, at North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo as a result of injuries sustained in a two-car accident Friday, November 4.

Amy was a first grade pupil of Mrs. Becky Jones at the Iuka Elementary School, a member of Brownie Troop No. 48, and attended Iuka United Methodist Church. She was enroute to Booneville with her father when the accident occurred, 3 miles from Hill's Chapel, 8 miles east of Booneville, in front of Cecil Smith's Grocery on Hwy. 30.

According to Highway Patrolman Roger Barnett, about 4:15 p.m. Mr. Skinner was west bound in a 1970 Ford Van when the 1970 Chrysler New Yorker, driven by Mrs. Oneita Crow, of Booneville, spun into the path of Mr. Skinner's vehicle. Patrolman Barnett stated, "It was pouring down rain and evidently Mrs. Crow lost control of her automobile."

Upon impact, the Van plunged down an 8-10 foot embankment and continued traveling an estimated 20 feet further. Reportedly, Amy's father was thrown free of the wreckage and incurred multiple bruises, lacerations, and a minor concussion. At press time Mr. Skinner remains in the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo.

According to Dave Horn, ambulance driver, and Randy Tate, E.M.T., with the Mississippi Corp. Ambulance Service in Booneville, Mrs. Oneita Crow, the lone occupant in the Chrysler, was dead on arrival at the Northeast Medical Center in Booneville. She was an employee of the Marathon Cheese Company in Booneville and it was believed that she was on her way home from work.

Funeral services for Amy Skinner were held Tuesday, November 8, at 2:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Belmont, with interment in the Belmont Cemetery. Officiating at the service were Rev. R. E. Whiteside, Rev. Charles Potts, and Rev. Grady Bailey.

Survivors include her parents, Scotty and Sandra Skinner; two sisters, Anne Marie and Julie Skinner, all of Iuka; maternal grandmother, Mrs. Eulila South, of Belmont; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Sue Skinner, Belmont; great-grandmother, Mrs. Austin Shook, Jackson, Miss.

In lieu of flowers, the family request memorials be sent in Amy's name to Iuka Elementary School for playground equipment.

BUYING CHICKEN & TURKEY

Most chickens are now sold fresh - chilled in the ready-to-cook form and cut in half for broiling or in serving pieces for frying or stewing.

Among chickens, those marked "broiler," "fryer" or "frying" are good for either broiling or frying. The largest birds in this class may also be roasted whole with good results. These are young chickens usually 9 to 12 weeks old. They are tender-meated with soft, pliable smooth-textured skin and flexible breastbone.

Amount of Chicken to Buy	Amount per Serving

Each pound of uncooked stewing chicken will yield about 1 cup cut-up, cooked meat. You will need more when making sliced chicken sandwiches, a salad plate or cold plate than when fixing a casserole. For big chicken eaters, be sure to add a little more, too.

Most turkeys are eviscerated and frozen whole, at the peak of their freshness, in moisture-vapor-resistant plastic bags. "Fryer or roaster" turkeys in the weight range of 4 to 5 pounds, ready-to-cook, are suitable for frying or broiling as well as roasting. "Fryer or roaster" turkeys weighing 5 to 8 pounds are usually roasted. These very young turkeys have delicate flavor. Other young turkeys have tender flesh with a more fully developed flavor. They may be labeled "young hen," "young tom" or "young turkey," and range in weight

from 6 to 24 pounds, ready-to-cook. Some half or quarter turkey roasts cut from these heavier young birds are on the market.

Turkeys between young and old may be labeled "yearling." If the word "young" or "yearling" is not used on the label with "hen," "tom" or "turkey," then you may assume the bird is old, and suitable for stewing to make meat for salads.

Boneless turkey rolled roasts and plain boneless turkey are becoming more popular in modern markets.

EAST BEEF STRAGANOFF

(Serves 8)
2 lbs. ground beef
2 onions
4 bouillon cubes
Tomato paste
Flour
1/2 lb. mushrooms (fresh or canned equivalent)
1/2 pint sour cream

Brown ground meat lightly in large skillet. Add onions, diced finely, and brown lightly. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons flour over mixture and stir in. Add 1 cup water, 4 bouillon cubes, 4 tablespoons tomato paste. Cover and let simmer. Just before serving, add mushrooms, fried lightly and stir in sour cream.

Serve with rice and a tossed salad - and hot French bread if you like it.

FALL COTTON JOBS

With cotton harvest almost complete, growers should carry out fall land preparation carefully. Subsoiling and/or chisel plowing depending on soil type, usually gives best results when done in the fall. Doing this job when conditions are drier results in more shattering of hardpans.

Sandy soils should be subsoiled deep enough to shatter hardpans and be left flat until spring. You should chisel plow and row up heavier soils as soon as possible after harvest.

If lime, phosphate or potash is needed, apply before disturbing the soil. The tillage practices which follow will help distribute the materials through the soil profile and increase their effectiveness.

Some fields should be treated with a fall application of a pre-plant herbicide. You should identify these fields now while weed infestation is present and while you have a better idea of the potential weed problem for next year. Restrict use of preplant herbicides to the heavier soils this fall, and thoroughly mix them with the soil.

HUNTER SAFETY

The sport of hunting is an ancient and honorable activity. It is a wholesome recreation -- physically stimulating and full of thrills and excitement. The fun in hunting comes as much from enjoyment of nature and the satisfaction of handling guns skillfully as it does from filling a bag.

More than 14 million Americans buy hunting licenses every year. Some areas are crowded with hunters during the open seasons. With more hunters afield, the chance of accident is greater. Studies of the causes of hunting accidents

show that almost all can be avoided by a little care, a little knowledge and a little more preparation.

Handling a gun properly is the real key to hunting safety. A majority of all gun accidents can be avoided if the simple safety principles of holding and pointing a gun are observed. Three primary rules will eliminate most of these tragedies.

TREAT ANY GUN AS IF IT WERE LOADED

"I didn't know it was loaded" is never an acceptable excuse. The safe gun-handler checks to make sure by opening the action himself and never takes the word of anyone.

ALWAYS POINT THE MUZZLE IN A SAFE DIRECTION

The true gun expert is easy to spot by the way he handles a gun. He never allows the muzzle to point at any person. He will also insist that everyone else follow the same rule.

BE SURE OF YOUR TARGET -- AND BEYOND

The good hunter carefully identifies his target before he fires. He never shoots at a sound, a patch of color or at any object until he has had a full view of his game. He will pass up an outstanding trophy rather than take the slightest risk of being wrong.

Unload guns before placing in a car and before attempting to climb a fence. When climbing, after it is unloaded, place the gun on the other side of the fence with the muzzle pointed away from the descent point.

Guns and ammunition are always stored when not in use. Storing means keeping the gun in a rack, box or other place where it cannot be knocked around or used as a toy by small children. The ammunition

is stored in a different place. The gun is unloaded before it is brought into the house and is stored that way.

Both guns and ammunition should be locked in storage when not in use -- but in separate places. The principle of safe storage is simply that it should never be possible for the gun to fire accidentally or for the wrong person to get gun and ammunition at the same time.

Every square foot of property in the United States belongs to someone. The hunter

should always remember that he is the guest of the landowner on whose property he hunts. He should obtain the owner's permission before he begins to hunt and respect his decision if permission is refused. The sportsman-hunter will always take great care not to break down fences, trample crops and injure stock. He will be careful to leave all gates as he found them and refrain from shooting near any houses or other buildings. His behavior will determine whether or not he is welcome to return.

The hunter's courtesy should be extended to other hunters as well; courtesy is a part of safety.

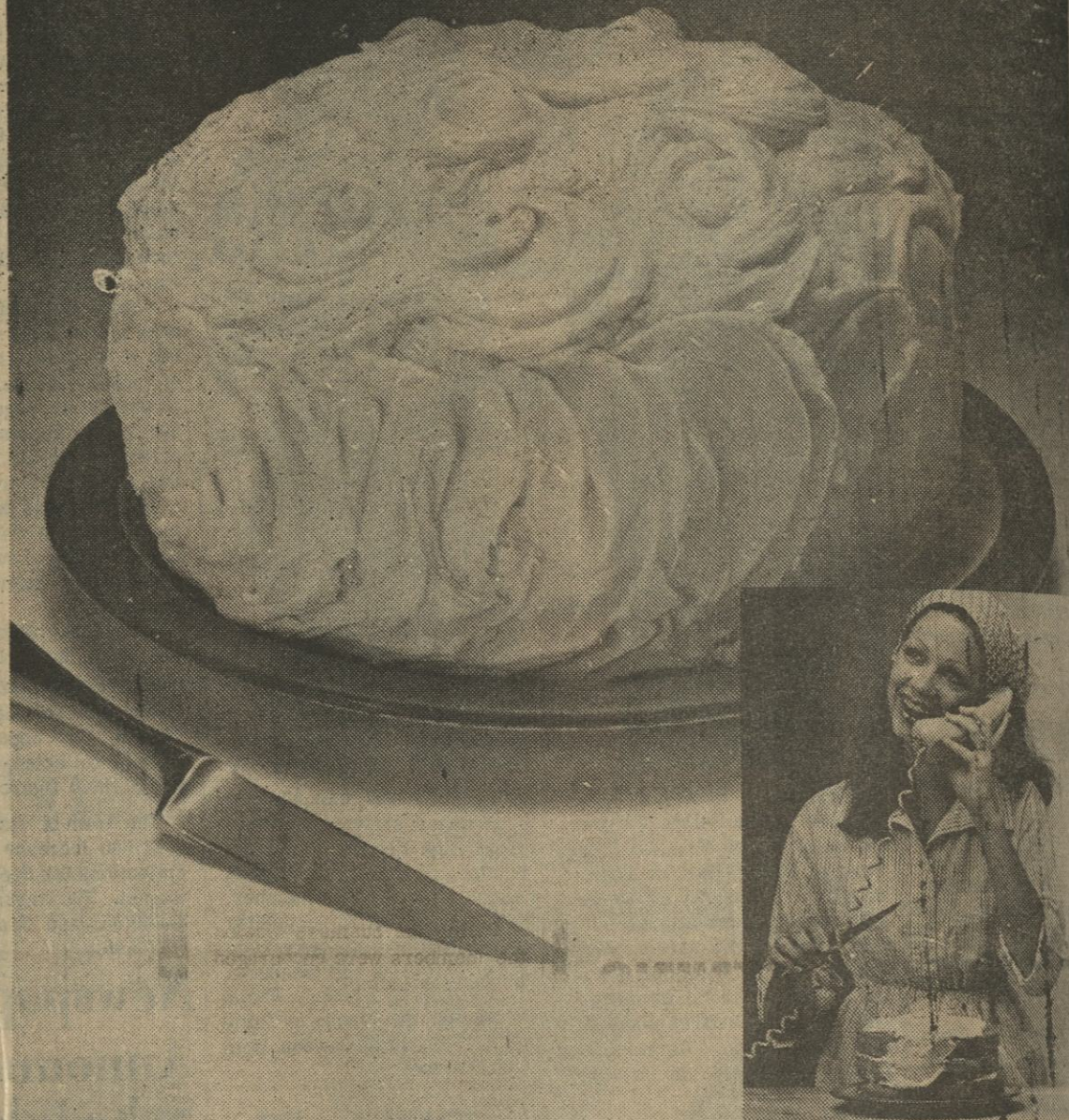
The use of alcohol while hunting can create many dangerous situations. Drinking and hunting just don't go together. Every hunter should heed this warning in consideration of his companions and himself.

Enjoy hunting -- it's a great outdoor recreation. But remember be SAFE AND STAY ALIVE.

HANDLING COTTON LOANS

Cotton harvesting is about 85% complete in Tishomingo County. Producers are now faced with the problem of marketing. You might want to consider the following information:

Commodity Credit loans may, at the farmers election, be included in income for the year in which the proceeds of the loan are actually received, instead of the year the commodity is finally sold. Farmers need not obtain permission from the Internal Revenue Service to adopt this method of reporting Commodity Credit loans, even though you may have reported these loans received in prior years as taxable income in the year the crop was

sold.

Once you have reported on this basis, however, you must report all such succeeding loans as income in the year the loan is received, unless you obtain the permission of the Internal Revenue Service to change to a different method. You make the election by including (in part 1 of Schedule F) the amount of the loan as income in the year you receive it. You should attach a statement to your return indicating that the election is made and showing the amount of the loan, the year the loan was received, the commodity on which the loan was received, and the quantity of the commodity.

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. On Thursday it is open 12 to 5 p.m.

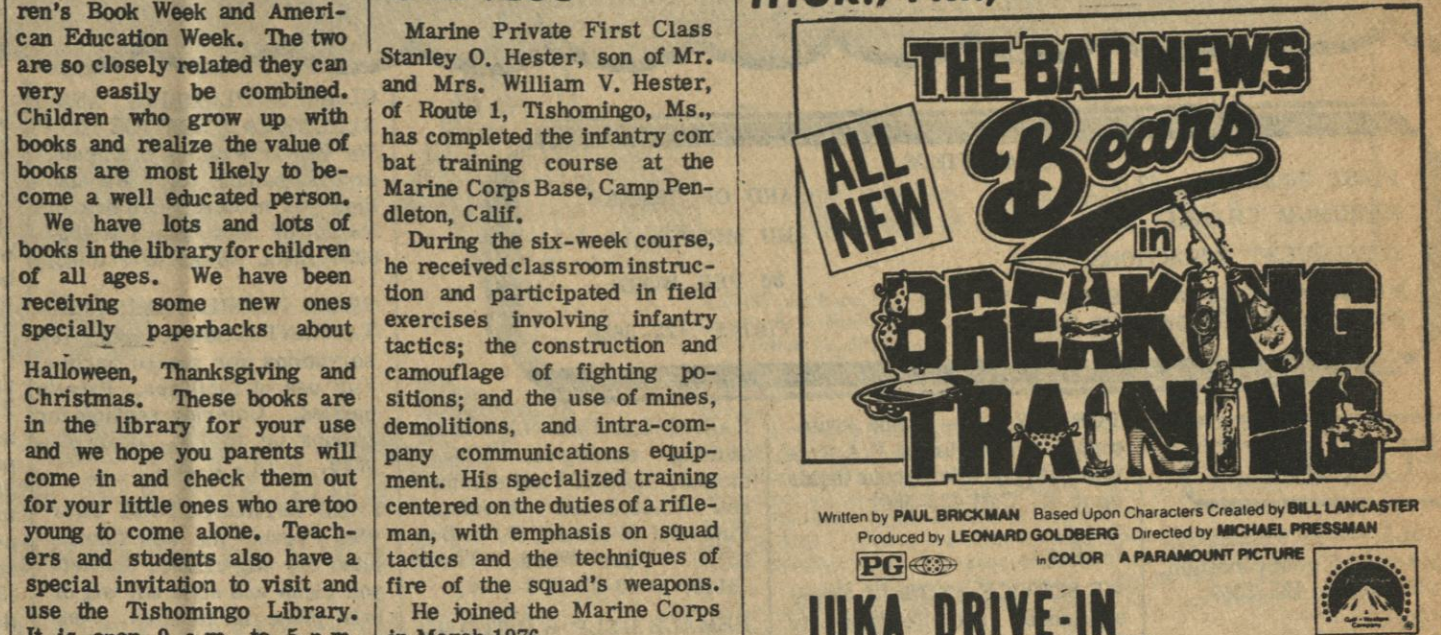
Men In Service

Do you have an old book that has been in your family as long as you can remember? I have a closet full of old books. Just junk - but I can't bear to throw them away or burn them.

My good friend Mrs. Howell loaned me one last week that is so interesting - the name of it is "Nature's Remedies" - Early History of Botanic Drugs - by Joseph E. Meyer, Hammond, Indiana.

Quoting it says, "The purpose of this book is briefly to unfold the story of man's use for his medicinal needs of the natural products of forest and field, in the form of botanical or vegetable drugs and medicines."

If you are as old as I am you can all remember some of the household remedies of the days when mother or grandmother knew simple remedies prepared from botanical plants that had been used by generations before them and upon which they expected of necessity to place chief reliance for their every day health requirements. From the Indians these colonial settlers learned much of the qualities and powers of many new botanical drugs found in nature's own wonderful laboratories.

In colonial times the vegetable kingdom supplied man with practically all medicines.

It is interesting to note that the remedies of that period included: sarsaparilla, dandelion, snakeroot, horseradish, ginseng, peppermint, spearmint, wild ginger, mullein, catnip, dogwood, skunk cabbage, slippery elm, burdock, pumpkin seed, elderberry, sumach berries, goldenrod, prickly ash, mistletoe, and many more. I can remember my mother mentioning these even though I don't remember just what healing power each vegetable was supposed to have.

In this book I found and I quote, "Clergy of the practiced medicine in conjunction with their pastoral duties. Physicians were few and widely scattered. Self-medication and offering suggestions to neighbors, friends and relatives. As to the relief of ordinary ills still is rather common among all classes of society."

How many of you know what ginseng weed looks like and where it is found.

I remember at one time in the long long ago there was a great need and someone was buying ginseng roots and all the little boys and girls of Paden went over on the hill-sides and dug ginseng roots. In the event a petition to investigate prepared in accordance with the above instructions is filed, then the Commission will conduct an investigation of the abandonment proceeding. Comments filed with the Commission will be considered in all proceedings in developing conditions and in determining whether the Commission should conduct an investigation on its own motion in the event an investigation is filed. Additionally, if an investigation is conducted the parties filing comments may participate in the investigation as their interests may appear.
