FRIDAY AFTERNOON

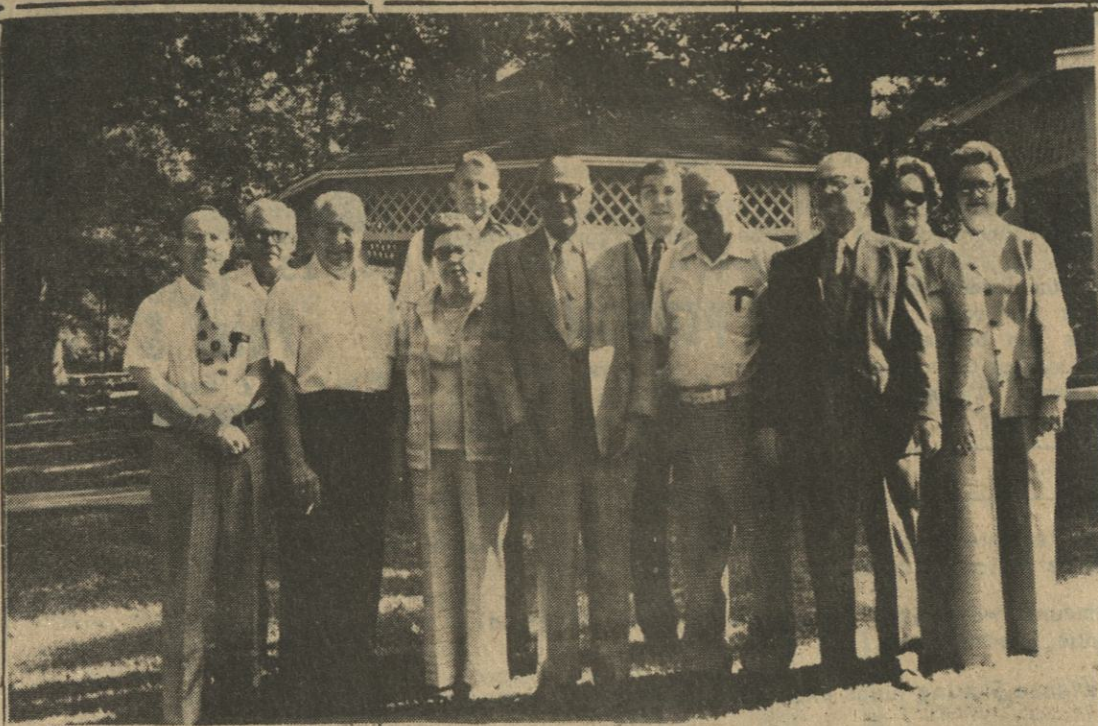

Iuka Man Dies From Gunshot Wound

Owen Phifer, 58, of Iuka, died Friday, November 11, at his home on Highway 72 East, of a gunshot wound.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Charles Broadway, an inquest was held at the scene, ruling the cause of death as accidental gunshot.

The shooting occurred around 5:30 Friday afternoon as Mr. Phifer was apparently cleaning his 12 gauge shotgun in a utility shed behind his home in Jones Subdivision. He had earlier told his wife that he was planning on going hunting Saturday morning and was going out to the shed to get his equipment ready. His wife, Mrs. Grace Phifer, who operates a beauty shop in their home, found her husband's body some ten minutes after he left the house. She had just finished fixing a neighbor's hair and had walked into the yard

to talk when she discovered the tragedy. Both ladies reported hearing no gunshotblast during the time.

Mr. Phifer was a crane operator for TVA, a Methodist, a World War II veteran and a Mason.

Funeral services were held Sunday, November 13, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Robert McCoy and the Rev. Grady Bailey officiating. Burial was in Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Grace Phifer, Iuka; two daughters, Mrs. Joanne Horton, Tusculumbia, Ala., and Mrs. Juanita Scott, Tusculumbia; one son, Jimmy Phifer, Clewiston, Fla.; four brothers, Oris Phifer, Murfreesboro, Tenn., Cecil, L.D. and M. B. Phifer, all of Iuka; and five grandchildren.

PEANUTS

Fall is peanut-digging time down South and this fall is peanut-serving season in Washington. It's also good peanut-eating time for anyone.

Peanuts are rich in protein and are a concentrated source of energy. Included in meals or eaten as snacks, they provide protein, calories, niacin, phosphorus and other important nutrients.

Foods and food products containing peanuts are numerous. Dr. George Washington Carver was able to list 200 uses for peanuts. The great scientist found in peanuts attributes not fully appreciated before. He is believed to be the first to make peanut oil, now used extensively for cooking, salad oils and in baked goods.

Peanuts are enjoyed worldwide. In China, peanuts provide crunch in a variety of beef and chicken dishes. In Nigeria they are used in soups and stews. In countries favoring curry dishes, peanuts are an essential accomplishment. In America, the peanut butter sandwich is a favorite of all ages. Per ounce, peanut butter has as much protein as meat.

Peanuts, however, are a source of plant protein and lack some of the amino acids found in animal protein. A glass of milk or a small amount of some other animal protein eaten with the peanut butter can correct the deficiency to make a highly nutritious combination.

Try making your own peanut butter; you may be surprised how easy it is. You need fresh roasted nuts, bland oil and salt. Start with 1 and 1/2 pounds of unshelled nuts or one pound of shelled kernels.

Use a meat grinder to blend

to crush peanuts. Allow 1/3 to 1/2 tablespoon of oil to 1 cup of peanuts. If nuts are unsalted, use 1/3 to 1/2 teaspoon salt per cup. Mix well. Stir before using, because the oil tends to separate.

PURCHASING ONIONS

When purchasing onions, look for hard or firm ones which are dry and have small necks. They should be covered with papery outer scales and be reasonably free from green sunburn spots and other blemishes.

Avoid onions with wet or very soft necks. This is usually an indication of immature onions or those affected by decay. Also avoid onions with thick, hollow, woody centers in the neck, or those with fresh sprouts. The latter indicates improper storage.

Cold storage is not essential for onions, but dry storage is desirable. Onions shouldn't be stored with potatoes because they will take on moisture from the potatoes and decay rapidly.

APPLE-GLAZED SWEET POTATOES

1/2 cup apple jelly
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
6 small, whole, sweet potatoes, cooked or canned

Melt apple jelly in a fry pan over low heat. Stir in cinnamon and salt. Add sweet potatoes. Cook over low heat, turning sweet potatoes several times until they are well coated and most of jelly is absorbed -- about 6 minutes. Makes 6 servings, 1/2 cup each.

FRUITS AND NUTS

Winter Control of Insects and Diseases of Peaches:

San Jose Scale - This tiny sucking insect feeds on the sap of limbs, twigs, and in severe infestations, the fruit. The full-grown scale is about the size of a pin head. The insect is protected by a waxy covering, is oval to round, ash-gray, and has a raised nipple-shaped spot in the center. The insect is legless, orange-colored, and never moves after attaching itself to a tree to feed. Severe infestations weaken a tree so that it eventually dies. Less severe infestations reduce tree vigor and yields.

Control: Dormant sprays of lubricating oil emulsions containing 3 percent actual oil or emulsifiable oils at the strength recommended by the manufacturer adequately control this pest.

Brown Rot - The fungus overwinters in twig cankers and on mummified fruits that lie on the ground or hang on the trees. You usually find the cankers on twigs that supported dis-

winter. Where infestation is light, one application is sufficient.

White Peach Scale - The females are brownish-white and circular and do not have the nippleshaped area in the center that is characteristic of the San Jose scale. Males are found in clusters and are pure white and elongated. Damage is similar to that caused by the San Jose Scale.

Control: Applications during the dormant period of a 3 percent lubricating oil emulsion or an emulsifiable oil at the strength recommended by the manufacturer will give satisfactory control of this pest. Two applications, two weeks apart, may be required to control heavy infestations.

Brown Rot - The fungus overwinters in twig cankers and on mummified fruits that lie on the ground or hang on the trees. You usually find the cankers on twigs that supported dis-

eased fruit during the previous season. Small twigs that bore diseased fruit will die as though killed by cold.

Control: Generally sanitation may alleviate this rot problem. Removing all mummies from the trees during the dormant season may reduce the disease considerably. Bury the mummies one foot deep and remove and burn diseased twigs.

STRAWBERRIES: Plant new strawberry patches by early November. Set the plants one foot apart on 3 to 3 1/2 foot beds. For North Mississippi, plant Sunrise, Cardinal, Comet, Dixieland, Pochontas and Blakemore varieties.

Plan Now to Plant New Fruit Trees This Fall and Winter:

Buy healthy, stocky, vigorous trees. A weak, spindly, stunted tree is expensive regardless of price, because it will grow slowly and will usually develop poorly.

Order trees early and specify a delivery date. Have the soil ready for planting the same day the trees arrive from the nursery. If this is not possible, heel in the bare-root trees. Break open the bundle of trees and distribute them evenly in a shallow trench. Fill the trench with soil to cover the roots. Bare-root trees can be safely held in this manner for a short period of time. Do not allow the roots to dry.

1. Dig hole large enough for natural spread of roots. Loosen soil in bottom of hole. Plant tree at same depth it grew before transplanting.
2. Keep tree roots moist while out of the ground.
3. Stake to anchor tree. Anchor tree with wires threaded through section of garden hose to prevent damaging bark.
4. Wrap trunk to lessen evaporation and protect from sun. Wrap lower one-half of trunk with burlap or tree wrap paper.
5. Prune one-third of branches so roots will be able to feed remaining top. Cut branches next to stem or trunk; do not destroy natural form of tree.
6. Replace subsoil in hole with good top soil high in humus. Mulch newly planted tree.
7. Water often with good soaking. Mound soil to hold water.

PECANS: Since insects and disease organisms overwinter in old leaves, limbs, and twigs, collect the trash and burn it to provide some control of these pests.

FIGS: Young fig trees should be completely covered with pine straw to reduce winter injury.

DISCUSSES PLAN — At a recent meeting, the Mayor of Iuka, G. W. Cutshall (seated); W. A. Stuart, representative of the Soil Conservation Service; Karl Miller, soil scientist; and W. R. Wimbish, chairman of

the Tishomingo County Soil Conservation District Commission, discussed the special soil report that was developed by the Soil Conservation Service and the City of Iuka as a Northeast Mississippi RC&D project measure.

Use Of Special Soil Report

As population expands, all uses of land and soil become more competitive. Most land use decisions made for city planning and development involve both people and money and usually are irreversible, so the importance of a good sound land policy based on soil information.

Mayor G. W. Cutshall and the Board of Aldermen have recently received a special soil interpretative report from W. A. Stuart, representative of the Soil Conservation Service, and W. R. Wimbish, Chairman of Tishomingo County Soil Conservation, designed especially to furnish information on basic soil properties in Iuka.

This report which covers approximately 3,300 acres of land in the City of Iuka has nine sections, each of which has valuable information for a specific urban use. For example, real estate developers, financing organizations, design engineers, building contractors, and other groups are vitally concerned about the possibility of soils flooding. This is one of the soil properties discussed in detail in one of the nine sections in this report. Each of the other sections discuss in detail soil properties and soil behavior that affect their development for urban uses.

Information that can be obtained from this soil report can be used to a good advantage by most people who are considering doing something with the soil such as planting grasses, ornamental plants and trees, buying or building homes and other type buildings, locating and establishing solid waste disposal areas, locating and establishing parks and playgrounds, locating and design of industrial buildings, and many other uses.

This special soils report was developed by the Soil Conservation Service and the City of Iuka as a Northeast Mississippi RC & D project measure.
