Ms. Tumlin Named Teacher Of The Year In Mississippi



A McComb English teacher who -- after 18 years -- is "still excited about being a teacher" is Mississippi's "Teacher of the Year" for

She's Mary Emma Tumlin, 40, a Tishomingo County native, according to Dr. Charles Holladay, state superintendent of education. Dr. Holladay said a committee of educators selected the state winner.

Ms. Tumlin decided she liked school when she went to the first grade, and she's been either learning or teaching ever since. She holds degrees from Wood Junior College in Mathiston, Millsaps in Jackson, and Ole Miss, where she got a master's. She also earned additional certification from Mississippi College in Clin-

Ms. Tumlin's life shows the impact of parents on a child's education. "My parents taught me the value of learning. They encouraged me, showed interest, and were always present at every school function in which I participated. "To be a classroom teacher is a joy, a challenge, and a rewarding experience. I believe in teacher-student relationships based on mutual respect," she said.

CRANBERRY NUT BREAD 1/3 cup (1 stick) whipped mar-

1-1/4 cups sugar 2 eggs 3 cups flour 1 T. baking powder 1 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. soda

1/3 cup orange juice 1-1/2 c, cranberries, coarsely chopped

1 c. chopped nuts 1 T. grated orange rind

Cream margarine and sugar; blend in eggs. Soft together flour and baking soda. Add alternately with water and orange juice, mixing well after each addition. Fold in cranberries, nuts and orange rind. Pour into a greased 8 x 5 inch loaf pan and bake at 350 degrees 1 hour and 10 minutes.



SOYBEAN STORAGE

The following information was furnished by Dr. Wayne Jordan, Mississippi Extension Soybean Specialist.

Rainy weather and wet fields has slowed soybean harvest in Mississippi during the past couple of weeks, but perhaps it has helped make a more orderly movement of the crop from field to elevator and from elevator to barge, railcar, etc.

Through last week we were probably 70 to 75 percent harvested statewide, which was ahead of average. Some areas obviously were ahead or behind that stage of harvest.

The price movement last week was encouraging and hopefully, will not be shortlived. It has been discouraging to learn of so many producers who were having to sell on the low cash market because of no storage or no forward contacts.

Singificant Increases

On-farm storage has increased significantly in Mississippi this year. Even though the amount of new storage is not known, one only has to drive down the road to see many shiny new bins.

The favorable interest rates and liberalized payback of government loans has been a help to the sovbean farmer who needed storage.

Managing soybeans in storage is important to prevent losses due to heating and molding. Going into storage with clean, dry (below 13 percent moisture) beans is one way to minimize problems from the

Moisture Levels

Normal harvesting moisture levels up to about 16 percent can be handled by drying with natural air, while higher moisture beans may require some heat. For storage over a long period, it is advisable to bring moisture down to 11-12 per-


Aeration is necessary, regardless of seed moisture at time of storage, in order to reduce the temperature and maintain it at about 50 degrees

Once the moisture and tem-

perature are brought to the proper level, it is desirable to aerate periodically during times of low humidity and cool temperatures. That will help prevent buildup of moisture in pockets in the center of the bin or along the walls.

Presence of large quantities of trash makes aeration even more important.

There is much more to storing soybeans than just putting them in the bin. If you are a beginner this year, it will be a good idea to watch your beans closely and consult with some experienced person on tips for good storage management.



4-H PHOTOGRAPHY

It has been said that "one picture is worth a thousand words". That statement certainly holds true when it comes to assembling record books and other 4-H activities. Clear, sharp "before" and "after" photographs of 4-H projects can add more interest and impact than a comparable number of written pages.

Using camera skills to visualize 4-H experiences and accomplishments is important to young people in the 4-H photography program sponsored by Eastman Kodak Co. Rural and urban 4-H'ers from 9 to 19 years old participate in a variety of learn-by-doing photography activities.

Does anyone remember when we didn't celebrate Thanks-

History gives us an interesting beginning.

With Indians as guests of honor, tables, loaded with game and fish, wild fruits, cornbread, and vegetables, the Pilgrims celebrated their first American harvest festival in October, 1621. This feast lasted three days. There was enough roast turkey to feed the company a week, as there were large numbers of the now famous "Thanksgiving Bird" in

the neighborhood of Plymouth. We read of feasts, fasts, and Thanksgiving Days being observed each year after this, but it was not until ten years later in 1630 that we find such a celebration as we now have. Then we read that the Colonists gathered in the old meeting houses and worshipped, singing songs, reading Psalms, and praying. Their services lasted from 8:30 until noon or after. Following the sermon they gathered for the feast.

During the Revolutionary War, the Continental Congress set December 18, 1777, to be

President Washington, during his first year of office, issued a proclamation setting November 26, 1789, aside for "National Thanksgiving" for a form of Government that had made for safety and happiness.

For years the custom was exclusively a New Englandinstitution, but later it spread to the west and south.

The luka Public Library will be closed tomorrow, November 24, for Thanksgiving.

In the United States and Canada, a day is set aside each year as Thanksgiving Day. On this day people tive thanks with feasting and prayer for the blessings they have received during the year. The first Thanksgiving Days were harvest festivals, or days for thanking God for plentiful crops. The American Thanksgiving Day probably grew out of the harvest-home celebrations of England. The first Thanksgiving was celebrated less than a year after the Plymouth colonists had settled

For many years there was no regular national Thanksgiving Day in the United States. By 1830, New York had an official state Thanksgiving Day. Virginia was the first southern state to adopt the custom. This was in 1855.

Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, the editor of Godey's Lady's Book, worked many years to promote the idea of a national Thanksgiving Day. President Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday in November, 1863, as a holiday. Each year afterward the president of the United States has formally proclaimed

a Thursday late in the month of November as Thanksgiving Day. Congress finally ruled that after 1941 the fourth Thursday of November would be observed as Thanksgiving Day and would be a legal fed-
