parolee, of Golden, is being held in Tishomingo County Jail following armed seizure of the jail facilities late last Wednesday night, December 7. Johnny McRae, of Belmont is also being held after apparently being forced to contribute to the crime.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Deputy Harry Bowman gave the following account of the Dec. 7th jail overthrow.

Around 11:30 Wednesday night, County Jailor Tebus Holland and his family were disturbed by someone knocking at the back door of the jail. Thinking it could possibly be a drunk, he radioed the luka PD for assistance. When Mr. Holland opened the door, Payne, armed with a gun, and McRae, unarmed, entered the jail. In the confusion, a shot was fired brazing the jailor. When luka Policeman Woodrow Davis and nightwatchman David Sanders arrived on the scene, Davis entered the rear door of the jail and was confronted by Payne. The policeman took Payne's gun away and fired at him as he attempted to run away. He escaped to his car, leaving McRae behind. The man had allegedly told Davis that he entered the jail looking for Marion Osborne, a suspect in the December 1 shooting of a

Toys For Needy Children

Included in the new equipment are two 30 cu. yd. compactor trucks with 120 containers for rural garbage pickup only, and land fill equipment for the new site to be used by both city and rural trucks. According to Max Ray Whitehead, President of the Board of Supervisors, the containers are being placed throughout Tishomingo County for the use of rural residents who do not have city waste pick-up. These large green collection units are placed on state aid and state highway department roads, because of the extreme weight of the garbage trucks.





"This garbage pick-up program is for the benefit of the people, and we urge everyone to begin using them now," Whitehead said. "We only ask that garbage be deposited into the containers and be securely tied in a bag. If the collection unit is full, place your bag beside the container." Only basic waste should be left, as heavy objects such as concrete could damage the compactor trucks -- please - no dead animals. The cooperation of the people is needed in making this program a success.

The county's new land-fill is located off Highway 25 South of Midway. Traveling south, turn right just past the B. L. Mercer home. It is open 5 days a week, 7 until 4, with two attendants on duty. Due to the opening of this new landfill, the luka City dump is now

CHRISTMAS HAM

If you buy a ham or receive ine as a Christmas gift, you nay have questions about what o do with it. Correct storage s essential for preserving uality and assuring food safe-

A cured ham requires refrieration unless stated otherrise on the label. Countrytyle cured ham with a high alt content can be kept safey in a cool, dark, dry place, r it can be refrigerated. Know ne kind of ham you have and ead the label carefully for torage directions.

Cured pork stored in the eezer retains quality for only short time. Salt added in the uring process hastens ranciity; therefore, cured pork hould not be stored in the reezer for more than 1 to 2

Canned hams should be reigerated unless directions on ie label specify that refrieration is unnecessary. Bere buying an unrefrigerated anned ham, read the label to 3 sure of the correct storage

SWINE MANAGEMENT TIPS

Litter size is the most important single factor affecting your profit in feeder pig production. The total cost of carrying a sow in the breeding herd remains nearly constant whether she produces two pigs or ten. Her value in the herd is determined almost entirely by the number of pigs she weans. Below are some

tips to improve litter size. 1. Use crossbred gilts. Crossbred gilts and sows will mean more pigs farrowed, more pigs living to weaning, and a greater growth rate. Select gilts from large litters and from breeds that are known for good mothering ability and large litters.

2. Don't breed gilts too young. Wait until they are near 8 months old and weighing about 250 pounds.

3. Breed sows twice, 12 to 24 hours apart and preferably the second day of heat.

4. Vaccinate all breeding stock twice a year for Lepto-

5. Don't let gilts and sows

get too fat at breeding time and during gestation. Feed bred gilts about 5 to 6 pounds daily of a 15 percent complete ration. Feed bred sows 4 pounds. Keep

them in a good-doing condition. 6. Feed boar well during the breeding season and handle him gently. Where possible bring sows to boar for breeding.

7. Provide a cool place for boars and sows during hot wea-

8. Keep a good salt-mineral mix before bred gilts and sows at all times.

9. Have a dry, draft-free, and clean area for sows to far-

10. Be on hand at farrowing time to wipe pigs off for drying, disinfecting navel cord, and seeing that pigs start nursing.

Why not set a goal for increasing litter size? If your litters are averagng 10 pigs, you're on the way to a profitable and successful venture in the feeder pig business.

Continued improvement in demand and price is forecast

for feeder calves and yearlings during coming months, predicts R. O. Buckley, Mississippi Extension Livestock Specialist.

1 (9") graham cracker crust "The reduction phase of the cattle business is winding down, and we're beginning to see a leveling off in cattle numbers," he notes. "In 1978, we should see somewhat improved prices for cattle at the farm level."

He cautions, however, "I don't really expect the top to blow off prices within the next year." He said economists are forecasting feeder steer prices in the low 40's for the rest of 1977, the low to mid-40's until mid-1978, then perhaps in the mid-40's for the balance of 1978.

"I certainly expect prices to be much improved in 1979 for feeder and fat cattle," Buckley says. "And 1980 should be a good year, as we get well into the buildup phase of cattle production. After reaching that point, the next three or four years should be good ones for cattlemen."

Liquidation of beef cows has been the most dramatic in history during the past few years, he notes. Cattle numbers, as of January 1, 1978, are expected to be down to the 1971 level of 50.5 to 51 million head. A peak of 56.7 million was recorded in 1975. Historically, with the exception of 1934, cattle numbers peak at 10year intervals. The last four have been 1975, 1965, 1955, and 1945.

"With those points in mind and with the cattle cycle now on the upswing, the cow-calf man will be in the driver's seat," Buckley says. "Now is certainly not the time to get out of the cattle business. If the cycle runs true to form, the price will turn down again by about 1985, so cattlemen should be aware of that and begin now to shape up their operations."

annual meeting of the Mississippi Baptist Convention in Jackson.



Are you interested in collectibles. Do you have 'keep sakes" stored? Any that you think are not of interest to anyone, except you? Maybe you have and don't know it!

Often neglected in the area of paper collectibles is the materials published to interest young children in Sunday School.

Did you know - the Sunday School as it evolved in the United States is a Protestant institution? The idea came here from England where Robert Raikes is credited with establishing the first Sunday

School in Gloucester, England in 1780. His pupils were underprivileged children who worked in factories all week and were denied any kind of schooling. Reading as well as religion

The Nineteenth Century saw the rapid development of the Sunday School in the United States. It became the fullwork for religious instruction

To interest children in learning their Biblical truths, a wealth of material was distributed to them, much of it from the 1800's was beautifully lithographed. These lesson cards were sent home with the children each week)and still are) with the hope that the children would reread them and absorb their ideas.

Sometimes lesson cards were very small. One series was "Bereans Lesson Pictures." These were minilessons complete with a few questions and answers on the back of a very colorful picture. The cost was only 12¢ for a full year.

Do you - or does Grandmother have a few treasured Sunday School cards? I have a card much smaller than those given today - 3" x 4", very colorful, the title being "A Song of Thanksgiving" and dated November 24th, 1944. Memory Verse - "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving and into his courts with praise -

Psalm 100:4."

The story presented tells of baskets piled high with every kind of fruit, ready to be taken to the temple for the thanks offering service. Reuben's father was one of the musicians that would lead the procession, "May I go with you," Reuben asked? Of course you may," his father answered." "Before many years you too will play for the temple services,"

A trumpet sounded. The musicians began to play; the voices of the people rose in joyful song. Reuben joined the song. The procession entered the gates and came into the courts as the people sang: "Enter into his gates with Thanksgiving,

And into his courts with praise."

The people presented their gifts as songs of praise and love filled the temple courts. "I am thankful and happy," thought Reuben, "for the Lord is good."
