HOSPITAL COSTS REDUCED BY CO-PURCHASING

A new kind of corporation was chartered in Mississippi this Fall by a group of hospital administrators. Its purpose? To offer patients better care at lower cost.

Founded as a cooperative effort in Northeast Mississippi, Shared Hospital Services of Mississippi, Inc. (SHSM), is the first group of its kind in the state.

Composed of 18 member hospitals, our own Tishomingo County Hospital included, this private, not-for-profit corporation was organized to affect better cost containment through group purchasing and other shared services.

With a combined total of 1911 beds, SHSM's capacity represents 1/5 of the hospitals in Mississippi.

"The first emphasis," says Project Director Allen Foster, "is on group purchasing because that's where you really save. Once we have capital to build from, we can go into development of shared services."

A similar Oklahoma group, which has been operating five years, expects to realize a half million dollar savings for the year.

"The point that hospital administrators are concerned with is that cost containment directly affects a patient's bill," Foster explains.

From shared purchases, SHSM can move toward sharing consultative and staff time. In addition to purchasing, the organization's purpose is to perform data processing, warehousing, billing and collecting, industrial engineering, food, clinical, laboratory, communication, record center, and personnel services on a central basis.

SHSM is made up of a 36-member board including one administrator and one lay member from each participating hospital, with an eight-member executive committee. Chairing the board is Dan S. Wilford (Tupelo) while Robert

Proffitt (Columbus) serves as vice-chairman. Other executive committee members include Maurice Hill (Ripley); Jerry Lee (Oxford); Glendon Spigner (Fulton); Harold Whitaker (Eupora); Arthur Kelly (Starkville); and Robert Fulghum (Aberdeen).

Member hospitals include Aberdeen-Monroe County Hospital (Aberdeen); Gilmore Memorial (Amory); Hillcrest (Calhoun); Golden Triangle Medical Center (Columbus); Kemper County Hospital (DeKalb); Webster General (Eu-

pura); Noxubee General (Macon); Union County General (New Albany); Oktibbeha County (Starkville); Northeast Mississippi (Booneville); Itawamba County (Fulton); Marshall County (Holly Springs); Tishomingo County (Iuka); Okolona Community (Okolona); Oxford-Lafayette County (Oxford); Pontotoc Community (Pontotoc); Tippah County (Ripley); and North Mississippi Medical Center (Tupelo).

The plant at Burnsville, Mississippi was built by the first and second district supervisors of Tishomingo County in 1970. The plant employs approximately 450 people.

NOTES

Do you belong to an Extension Homemaker Club? If you don't, you're missing out on good Home Economics information and a lot of fun too. If there is not a club in your neighborhood or community, get your group together. Call the Tishomingo County Extension Home Economist at 423-3616 or come by my office in the Tishomingo County Courthouse for assistance in organizing. Being a member of an Extension Homemaker Club will help you to become a better individual and a better homemaker.

ONE BOWL YEAST BREAD
6 to 8 cups flour
2 packages dry yeast
1/4 cup shortening (use lard when possible)
2/3 cup dry milk
2 teaspoons salt
4 tbs. instant potato flakes (if you like) or 3 tbs. powdered potatoes
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups very hot tap water
Combine 2 cups flour, dry yeast, shortening, dry milk, instant potatoes, salt and sugar. Stir well. Add tap water to ingredients in bowl all at once.

Beat with electric mixer at medium speed for 2 minutes. Scrape bowl occasionally. Add 1 cup more flour. Beat with electric mixer at high speed for 1 minute or until thick and elastic. Scrape bowl occasionally. Stir in remaining flour gradually with wooden spoon. Use just enough flour to make a soft dough which leaves sides of bowl. Turn out onto floured board. Round up onto ball. Knead 5 to 10 minutes or until dough is smooth and elastic. Return to greased bowl and cover with waxed paper, then a towel. Let rest in a warm place, to rise double in size. Loaf bread - about 1 hour. (Dough should be 1 to 1 1/2 inches above top of pan in center.) Coffee cake and rolls should rise 30 to 45 minutes.

Punch down - knead a few times. Shape into desired form. Let rise again double in size. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes for loaves; 30 minutes for rolls and coffee cake. Remove from pans immediately, cool in racks. Brush with margarine or butter or frost and decorate as desired. Yield: 2 loaves bread or 2 coffee cakes, or 2 1/2 dozen rolls.

ASC Farm News

ASC'S FARM NEWS

Tishomingo County ASC Committeemen, Eddie A. Gresham, Ray Davis, and Avon South, along with Henry L. Knox,

County Executive Director, and Percie B. Stricklen, County Agent, with ASC officials from other counties within this area attended a meeting in Oxford, Miss., on December 13th, in connection with the new farm program. State ASC Committee Chairman, Charles Riddell, State ASC Director, D. L. Triggs, Jr., and other State ASCS Officials were on hand to explain the details of this program to local committeemen. D. L. Triggs, Jr., State ASC Director, stated that "the farm program as provided for by the Agriculture Act of 1977, is a good program." He went on to say "that the target price program, which will be in effect for the 1978 crop year, will provide a reasonable level of protection to farmers in the event of market failure but will not be high enough to discourage consumption of cotton, feed grains, and other crops." He urged county ASC Committee to see that adequate information is furnished to farmers in their respected counties in order that every farmer will understand the program and how it applies to his particular farming operation. The new farm program contains many provisions which are similar to the program which expired at the end of the 1977 crop year. The target price concept of the new program is similar in that payments will be made to farmers under the new program on cotton, feed grains, wheat, etc., if the market price drops below the guaranteed level. There is also the provision for disaster payments in the event the farmer suffers a crop failure due to a natural disaster. The big change in this regard is that beginning in 1978 old acreage allotments are being dropped for most crops. Farm program payments will be based on acreage actually planted for harvest. The new law continues the authority of the Secretary of Agriculture to declare a cropland set-aside. He has announced a 20 percent set-aside for 1978 crop wheat and 10 percent set-aside for 1978 crop feed grain. These are the amounts which must be taken out of production and placed in noncrop use in order to be eligible loans, target price guarantees, and disaster coverage.

The Secretary has also announced that for 1978, cotton farmers must reduce planting in order to get full protection. However, there will be no set-aside on cotton for 1978. There are many details in connection with the new farm program which farmers need to know in order to understand how the program applies to their individual farming operation. Accordingly, farmers in Tishomingo County are encouraged to come by the ASCS Office at Iuka, Miss., or call for additional information. The phone number is 423-5036.
