CO-PURCHASING

A new kind of corporation was chartered in Mississippi this Fall by a group of hospital administrators. Its purpose? To offer patients better care at lower cost.

Founded as a cooperative effort in Northeast Mississippi, Shared Hospital Services of Mississippi, Inc. (SHSM), is the first group of its kind in the state.

Composed of 18 member hospitals, our own Tishomingo County Hospital included, this private, not-for-profit corporation was organized to affect better cost containment through group purchasing and other shared services.

With a combined total of 1911 beds, SHSM's capacity represents 1/5 of the hos-

pitals in Mississippi. "The first emphasis," says Project Director Allen Foster, "is on group purchasing because that's where you really save. Once we have capital to build from, we can go into development of shared services."

A similar Oklahoma group, which has been operating five years, expects to realize ahalf million dollar savings for the

"The point that hospital administrators are concerned with is that cost containment directly affects a patient's bill," Foster explains.

From shared purchases, SHSM can move toward sharing consultative and staff time. In addition to purchasing, the organization's purpose is to perform data processing, warehousing, billing and collecting, industrial engineering, food, clinical, laboratory, communication, record center, and personel services on a central basis.

SHSM is made up of a 36member board including one administrator and one lay member from each participating hospital, with an eightmember executive committee. Chairing the board is Dan S. Wilford (Tupelo) while Robert

ONE BOWL YEAST BREAD


- 6 to 8 cups flour
- 2 packages dry yeast 1/4 cup shortening (use lard when possible)
- 2/3 cup dry milk 2 teaspoons salt
- 4 ths. instant potato flakes (if you like) or 3 ths. powdered potatoes

1/2 cup sugar 2 cups very hot tap water Combine 2 cups flour, dry yeast, shortening, dry milk, instant potatoes, salt and sugar. Stir well. Add tap water to ingredients in bowl all at once. rolls.

Beat with electric mixer at medium speed for 2 minutes. Scrape bowl occasionally. Add 1 cup more flour. Beat with electric mixer at high speed for 1 minute or until thick and elastic. Scrape bowl occasionally. Stir in remaining flour gradually with wooden spoon. Use just enough flour to make a soft dough which leaves sides of bowl. Turn out onto floured board. Round up onto ball. Knead 5 to 10 minutes or until dough is smooth and elastic.

Return to greased bowl and cover with waxed paper, then a towel. Let rest in a warm place, to rise double in size. Loaf bread - about 1 hour. (Dough should be 1 to 1 1/2 inches above top of pan in center.) Coffee cake and rolls should rise 30 to 45 minutes.

Punch down - knead a few times. Shape into desired form. Let rise again double in size. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes for loaves; 30 minutes for rolls and coffee cake. Remove from pans immediately, cool in racks. Brush with margarine or butter or frost and decorate as desired. Yield: 2 loaves bread or 2 coffee cakes, or 2 1/2 dozen
