Miss Cadden, of Amory, is an Outdoor Recreation major and will be working on various projects, including recreational assessment, surveying outdoor recreation facilities and working with local groups in Tishomingo, Prentiss and Alcorn Counties to develop outdoor recreation programs.

Edwin Hunley, YCWA Executive Director, said that information developed by Miss

Cadden will assist the Authority in determining the type of outdoor recreation projects which are needed and will be popular in this area. TVA and YCW A are considering several options to be included in the redevelopment of the Goat Island Recreational Area. "For example, we need to know if primitive camping facilities are needed more than picnic sites. Should we include a swimming beach and maybe a small nature trail instead of a fishing pier? We welcome comments from the community."

Insurance Commissioner To Speak At Iuka Rotary Club



George Dale, state insurance commissioner, will be speaking at noon, on Wednesday, Feb. 1, to the luka Rotary Club.

Commissioner Dale will discuss the Mississippi Insurance Department and the services which are available to the public through his office. Also included in his speech will be a discussion of the legislative activities of the department in the 1978 session in the passage of a state fire code, improving the drunk driving laws, and amending the statutes regulating bailbondsmen.

A native of Gulfport, Dale was raised on a farm in Jeff Davis County where he graduated from Prentiss High School as a three-sport letterman and student body president. He attended Pearl River Junior College from 1958-60, and was active in sports and campus activities, including his election as president of the Baptist Student Union.

Dale continued his education at Millsaps College in 1960, and in 1932 he graduated from Mississippi College. Receiving his Masters Degree in 1966 from Mississippi College, the new Commissioner has con-

tinued his education toward a doctorate degree in administration from the University of Southern Mississippi and Auburn University. The new Insurance Commis-

sioner served as teacher, coach, administrator and principal at Moss Point from 1962-

In 1972, Dale was named Administrative Assistant to Gov. Bill Waller and served in that capacity for three years.

Dale's entrance into elective politics came in 1975 when he won election as Commissioner of Insurance.

Commissioner Dale has been selected by the White House Office of Consumer Affairs to serve on the four-member Insurance Consumer Action Panel for reviewing and assisting in the settlement of property and casualty insurance

complaints. He is also a member of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners serving on the Life, Health and Accident Committee and Subcommittees on Life Insurance, Guaranty Fund, and Credit In-

Throughout his career, Dale has been active in church and civic affairs. In 1966 he was selected Moss Point Teacher of the Year. In 1975 he was recognized as Clinton's Outstanding Young Man of the Year. Dale is also a member of the Jaycee Outstanding Young Men of American and was selected as "One of the Three Outstanding Young Men in Mississippi for 1975" by the Mississippi Jaycees.

Dale has been an active member of the Moss Point City Planning Board, the Westinghouse Youth Program, and a member of the following organizations: Mississippi Education Association; Clinton Jaycees, Board of Directors;

Mississippi College Alumni Association, Vice President; Secretary to Board of Directors at YMCA of Jackson.

He is also involved on the

Board of Directors of the Mississippi College Booster Club; Mississippi Junior College Inter Alumni Association, a former member of the Mississippi Association of Coaches and member of the Clinton Lions Club. The Insurance Commis-

sioner is a Deacon of Northside Baptist Church in Clinton, Chairman of the Finance Committee at Northside Baptist, and a member of the Board of Trustees, Mississippi Baptist Seminary.

Dale is married to former Yvette Bosarge of Moss Point, and the couple resides in Clinton with their four children.





John Newbery (1713-1767) made children's books an important part of publishing. John was born in England. He did not have much schooling but he loved to read and soon had a wide knowledge of literature. Newbery became a publisher of newspapers and magazines. He was described as a redfaced, good-natured little man who was always in a hurry. Newbery's firstchildren's book was designed to make learning more fun. It taught the alphabet in song. Newbery published one of the first collections of nursery rhymes, Mother Goose's Melody.

His name still lives on in the Newbery Award. The Newbery Medal is given each year to the book judged the most distinguished contribution to American Literature for children. The selection is made by a committee of children's librarians. The following books have been awarded the Newbery Medal and are available at the library: Smokey, The Cow Horse Hitty, Young Fu Of Upper Yantze, Call It Courage, Rabbit Hill, Strawberry Girl, Rifles For Watie, Bronze Bow, Shadow Of A Bull, Up A Road Slowly.




