### Alderman Election Tuesday

On Tuesday April 11, the City of Iuka will hold an election for Alderman to fulfill the vacancy created by the recent death of E.N. Allen, Sr.

Seven people have qualified for the post, they are as follows: Mamie Clark Culver, Bill Gamble, Millard Bent, Bryce F. Kitchens, J.C. Marlar, Cecil Phifer, and Richard Woodruff.

Iuka has approximately 1,000 qualified voters and some 600 are expected to vote Tuesday. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast, then there will be a run-off election one week later, which will be April 18, between the two top candidates.

The poles will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 6:00 p.m. All registered voters are urged to come to the City Hall Tuesday and exercise your rights---VOTE.

### Weekend Busy For Firemen

The Iuka Fire Department responded to numerous calls this weekend resulting from brush and grease fires throughout the city.

According to Floyd Whitaker, Iuka Fire Chief, Saturday was a busy day with two structure fires and two brush fires. The first call was to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Daniel on Wilmoth street. An uncontrollable grease fire in the kitchen did extensive damage to the room.

A short time later the department responded to a brush fire near the Iuka Elementary School followed by a spreading brush blaze located between the Tishomingo County Jail and highway 72. High winds caused the fire to get out of control, requiring both of Iuka's pumper trucks and the Tishomingo Fire Department on the scene.

Also on Saturday afternoon the Kream Kastle located on highway 25 north of Iuka suffered a grease fire with light damage to the interior.

Chief Whitaker praised the volunteers who helped in Saturday's fires for keeping the damage to a minimum. A personal thank you from the Iuka Fire Department is extended to those who helped.

iron- important to diet

The body needs iron in relatively small, but vital amounts. It combines with

protein to make hemoglobin, the red substance of blood that carries oxygen from the lungs to body cells and removes carbon dioxide from the cells. Iron also helps cells obtain energy from foods.

Only a few foods contain much iron. Liver is a particularly good source. Lean meats, heart, kidney, shellfish, dry beans, dry peas, dark green vegetables, dried fruit, egg yolks and

molasses are good sources. Whole-grain and enriched bread and cereals contain smaller amounts of iron, but when eaten frequently, become important sources.

USDA reports iron levels in the nation's food supply in 1977 and 1976 as the highest on record. The current level is more than sufficient to provide each individual with recommended amounts of iron if food were distributed according to nutritional need. Yet, the iron content of average diets is not adequate for many children under 6 years and females ages 9-54, particularly those of childbearing age, according to nutritional status surveys and dietary consumption studies. Frequent use of iron-rich foods is especially encouraged for these people.

The national diet now provides 18.6 mg. of iron per capita per day, 22 percent higher than the amount available in 1909-13 and 38 percent above the low level of 13.5mg. in 1935, when incomes were low and the consumption of many foods was down. Since the mid-1930s, two main factors have accounted for the increase in this nutrient: the enrichment and fortification of grain products with iron and a substantial increase in meat consumption.

In 1977, the grain products group provided 28 percent of the iron. The iron level is now about one-fifth higher than if there had been no enrichment of flour and cereal products. Enrichment adds 3.3 mg. of iron per capita per day, an amount equivalent to that supplied by 3 ounces of relatively lean cooked beef.

The meat, poultry and fish group now provides the largest share of total iron-31 percent. Today, beef accounts for 16 percent of the iron; pork, about 6 percent.

Edible offals, which include liver, are excellent sources of iron and are used to manufacture luncheon meats. However, consumption of offals is small (10 to 11 pounds per capita per year). Nevertheless, these foods provide more than 2 percent of the total iron in the current food supply. Poultry, a lesser source of iron that the edible offals or red meats, provided a smaller share of iron than offals at the beginning of the century. But, with consumption of poultry having

more than tripled since 1909-13, its share of iron has increased from 2 percent to more than 4 percent.

Vegetables (including potatoes), fruits, fried beans, peas, nuts and soya products contribute about 25 percent of the iron.

The other foods groups eggs, dairy products, sugars and sweeteners - currently account for 14 percent.

Twenty-Minute Hamburger Casserole

## WORLD CATFISH FESTIVAL

The third annual World Catfish Festival will be held on the Humphreys County Courthouse Lawn in Belzoni April 8. Activities for this year's festival will include a performance by the Opera Memphis, a flea market of arts and crafts, free bus tours of catfish farms and music throughout the day. A catfish eating contest will also be held.

Humphreys County was declared "Catfish Capital of the World" by Gov. Cliff Finch in 1976. The 6,500 acres of catfish ponds in the county produced an income of \$16 million in 1977.

## GARDEN FERTILIZER

Fertilizer is one of the most valuable tools a home gardener has. However, using too much fertilizer or putting it in the wrong place can kill or injure plants. One of the most important things to remember when fertilizing your garden is to keep granular fertilizer away from seeds and the roots of newly set vegetable transplants.

For more information on fertilization and other gardening practices, ask your County Extension agent for a copy of the 1978 gardening tabloid.

## GARDEN SPRAY PROGRAM

A good spray program is an important part of home gardening. You may need a spray program to control insects, plant diseases or both. Insects can be controlled effectively with a dust, but for the best disease control you will need a garden sprayer.

If you need help planning a spray program for your home garden, contact your county extension office.

## MARKET YOUR TIMBER

When it's time to harvest your timber, don't just sell it; market it. Marketing timber involves seeking bids rather than selling for the first offer. Timber owners should seek bids over at least a 75-mile radius. With today's good transportation systems and permanent sawmills, it's

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common for sawtimber to be hauled at least 50 miles. Large volume sales or high quality timber may be hauled 100 miles or more.

Seeking bids on your timber generally brings a higher price than timber sold outright.

## ASC Farm News

1978 FEED GRAIN AND UPLAND COTTON VOLUNTARY DIVERSION

Significant program changes were announced in Washington on March 29, 1978. Producers on farms that grew barley, corn, grain sorghum or upland cotton in 1977 now have the option for voluntary diversion for payment in 1978 for any or all of these crops equal to 10 percent of the 1978 acreage intended acreage for harvest. Program requirements for required set-aside remain unchanged. That is voluntary set-aside for wheat is 20 percent and feed grain 10 percent, are still in effect. The payment will be \$.20 for corn, \$.12 for barley and grain sorghum, and \$.02 for cotton times the farm established yield and times the actual acreage for harvest. (The voluntary diversion will be 10 percent of this acreage.) One-half (1/2) of the payment will be made at the time of sign-up based on intended acreage. The 1978 acreage for harvest of the crop with voluntary diversion shall be limited to the 1977 planted acreage. The total acreage of NCA crops, required set-aside, voluntary diversion, and any grazing and hay acreage for wheat payment CANNOT exceed the farm normal crop acreage (NCA). Failure to comply with the voluntary diversion for a crop will preclude a voluntary diversion for that crop but will not effect other program benefits.

## PROGRAM SIGN-UP

Even Tishomingo County farmers who are undecided about planting a crop included in the set-aside program of the 1978 Farm Bill should sign up in the set-aside program, stated Henry L. Knox, Director of Tishomingo

Counth ASCS Office.

There is no penalty if set-aside participants decide not to plant a program crop after signing up, but farmers who sign up qualify themselves for program benefits, Knox said. The sign-up period ends May 1, 1978.

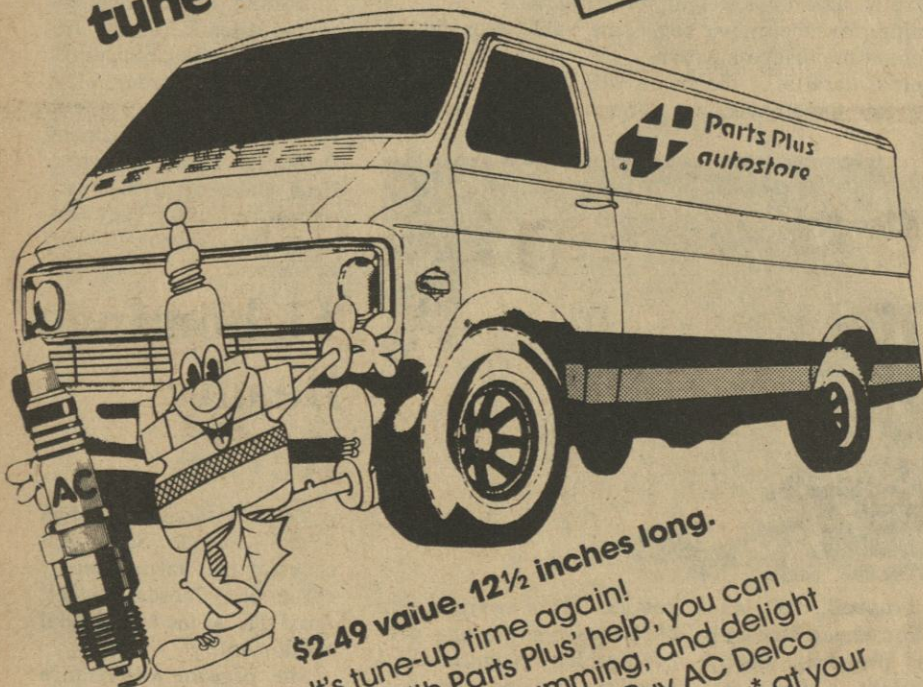

CORPSMEMBERS receive specialized training in such fields as GED, WELDING, CLERICAL AND SECRETARIAL, CARPENTRY AND PAINTING, HEALTH OCCUPATION, PLUMBING AND ELECTRICAL, FOOD SERVICE, MASONRY, BUILDING AND GROUNDS MAINTENANCE, HEAVY EQUIPMENT OPERATOR, AUTOMOBILE MECHANIC, and many more. Qualified teachers prepare Corpsmembers to find and hold a good job. JOB CROP trains young people to be good citizens by teaching them a job skill

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HOW MUCH DOES A CORP-MEMBER EARN?

In addition to free clothing, room and board, and medical care, Corpsmembers receive a living allowance of \$30 a month. They may earn additional raises up to \$20 a month more. If they complete their training or stay long enough to qualify, they will receive additional money for each month they are in JOB CORPS.

## Top Teens Marriage Minded

Today's outstanding teens have an alternative to alternative lifestyle--marriage.

This is one of the major themes in a national survey of 23,900 high school juniors and seniors listed in "Who's Who Among American High School Students." There is a trend away from living together without the benefit of clergy or paper. Home and motherhood are popular substitutes.

While they don't condemn the practice, more than half (52%) the teens polled would not live with a member of the opposite sex under any circumstances but blessed matrimony.

Eight out of ten youthful respondents favor a traditional marriage contract, 82% plan to have two or more children and two-thirds think a woman can be totally fulfilled when her sole career is keeping house and raising children.

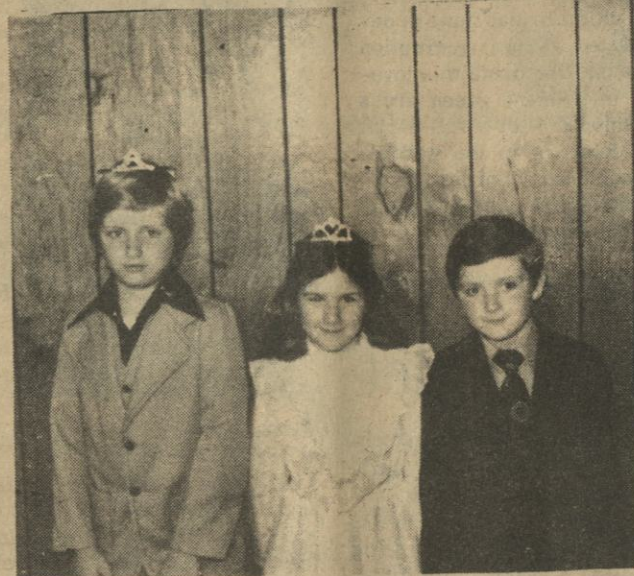
Whether it's this traditional tie that binds or a newly strict moral code, the vast majority (70%) of these teens have not participated in sexual intercourse and more than half (56%) don't intend to dabble in premarital sex.

The double standard is alive and well with these kids too. Some 64% of the guys will expect their wives to be virgins when they marry

Choosing a marriage partner is as important to these young people as the institution itself. Asked to list the qualities they would look for in a spouse on a scale of 1 to 7, the majority (in this case 40%) cite similarity of feelings as the most important criteria. Sexual attraction is number five following intelligence and the ability of the partner to accept the other's values.

A woman's place is definitely in the home when it comes to breadwinning. Role switching has little appeal, especially for the guys. Twenty percent of the fellows would never stay home to push a broom or diaper babies while their wives were out making the family living. Some 62% of the teens say they would only consider changing places if the occasion demanded it.

If all this has feminists quaking in their liberated boots, never fear. Fifty-seven percent of these kids still favor passage of the Equal Rights Amendment, although this figure is a sharp drop from 1974, when three-quarters were pro-ERA.

The woman's movement has had some enlightening effects on this group, too. Almost half (49%) say it has changed their ideas about a woman's role in society and 35% of the girls feel the movement has changed their mind about pursuing a career.

In all, it looks as if this

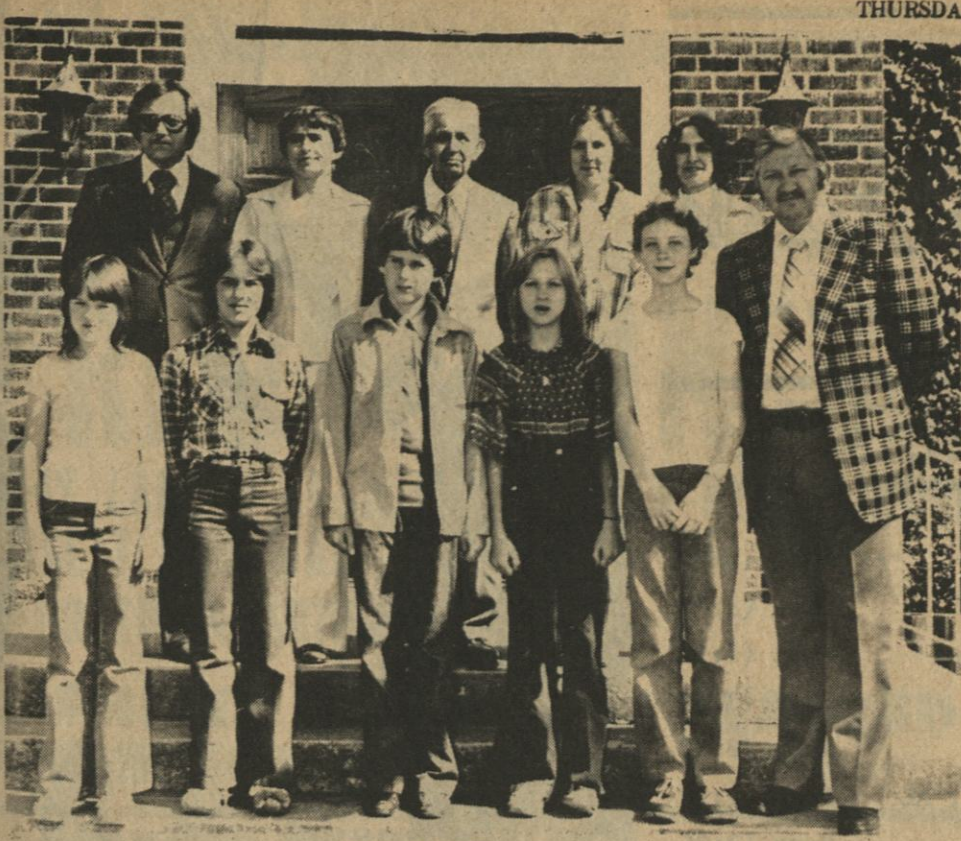

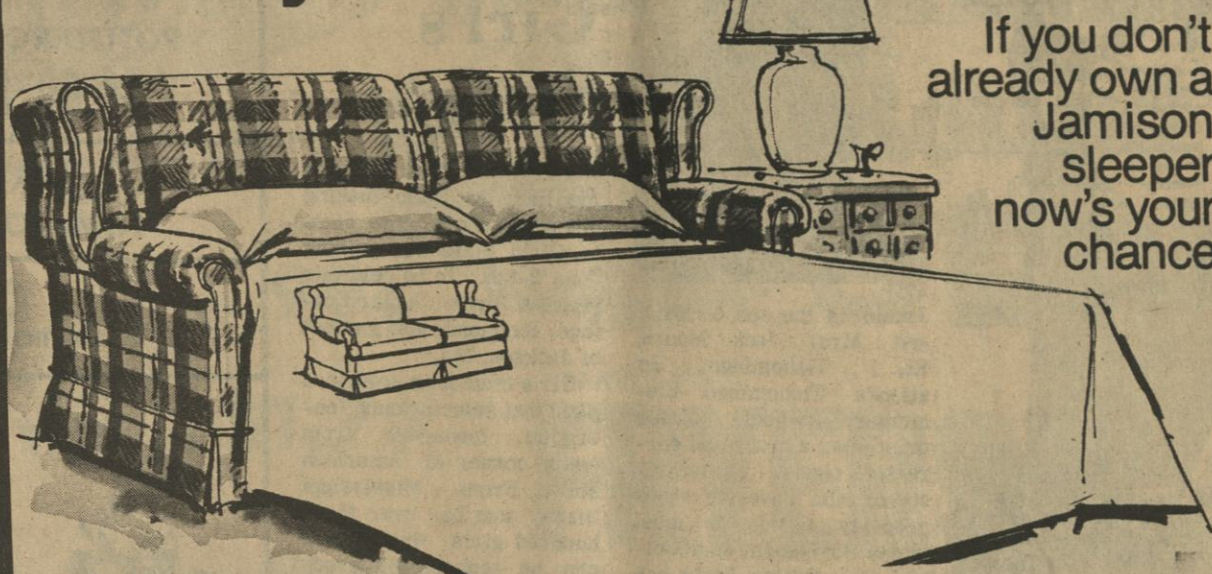

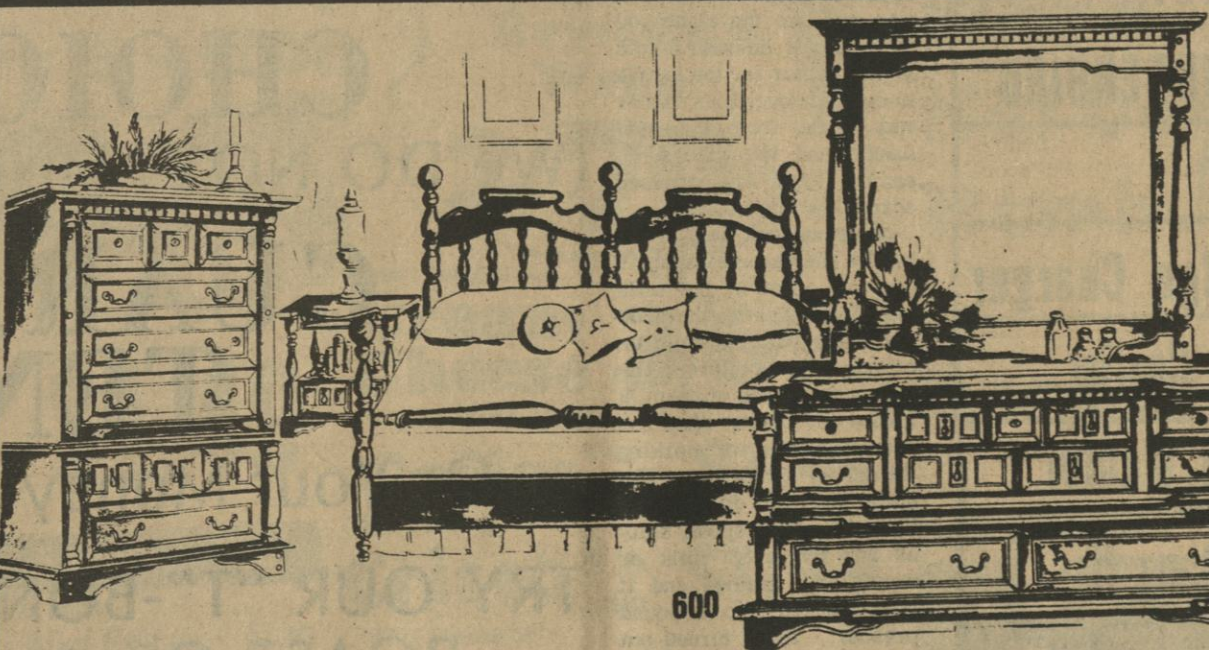

Something Old  
Sometime ago I told you about "Cracklin-bread" and the making of Kraut. How many of you remember helping churn the milk so we could have good-fresh butter?

The earthenware churn (by the way, if you happen to have a sure enough old one) is a valuable piece of pottery - not only to you, to many Antique collectors).

As I remember, our churns were three or four gallon ones, we always had two or more cows giving milk. The churn containing sweet milk was placed by the fire place, so the warmth from the fire would clabber milk. When the milk clabbered, a long handle dasher was put into the clabbered milk then a lid with a hole in the center for the handle to come through (this dasher was made from a broom handle and two pieces of smooth wood criss-crossed across the bottom).

Someone took hold of the handle and began slashing it up and down in the milk (usually Grandma, who made her home with her children or one of the children) The cream on the top of the milk turned to butter after several minutes of working the dasher up and down. The butter was then dipped from the milk with a spoon, salted and the extra milk or water was drained and it was pressed into a pound presser, then turned out into a beautiful glass, butter-bowl. (They are very very collectible and costly.) Now the butter was ready for eating. What had been first sweet-milk, then clabbered milk was now delicious butter-milk. (You may have

to explain to the children of today how good buttermilk gets into the paper boxes at the grocery stores).

Maybe, you have other earthen jars, jugs, and bowls stored away in the old smoke-house. They use to be used for storing molasses vinegar, sauerkraut, cracklings, pickles, and even peach preserves. I remember papa (a farmer) had darling one or more gallon jugs to carry water into the field or wherever, he was working. If any of the children happened to be with him (I preferred the out-door work rather than the house work). We would be sent to the spring near the work to get the jug refilled when it became empty. This was fun for usually the trickling stream flowing from the spring had minnows jumping around in the still places and allowed trying to catch one (which was almost an impossibility). Did you ever try this?

P.S. I still wonder how the exact size of corn-cobbed as the stopper, was found, that fit the jug exactly never letting it drip at all.
