Smiley Brothers Place Third In State Land Judging

Russ, Mike and Kevin Smiley won third place in the State 4-H Land Judging Contest held at Kosciusko, Miss. March 28. Approximately 38 counties were represented in the contest.

The contest, sponsored by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, gathered 4-H youth from over the state to match their competitive skills with one another.

Land judging is one of many 4-H contests that enables youth to supplement their education by allowing them to become involved in practical learning experiences, reported Billy Rainey, Extension 4-H Youth Agent. Rainey said, "The main objective of the contest is to determine the best use of a specified section of land. Vegetative and mechanical

practices are then applied to maintain soil conservation and fertility."

To judge land, a contestant must determine soil texture, permeability, depth of soil, slope and surface runoff. Then the land is placed in one of three categories - row crop, pasture or forest land, depending on soil capabilities. After the land is categorized, specific practices are applied to maintain a high level of production.

The Smiley boys have participated in the contest for three consecutive years. According to Rainey, the team has shown great progress. Next year's contest is already being looked at with anticipation of capturing "first place" honors. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. John Smiley, of

Route 1, Tishomingo, MS. All three boys are members of the Tishomingo 4-H Club, supervised by Mrs. Ruth Dawson and Mr. Frankie Howie, 4-H advisors.

Public Meeting On Pollution To Be Held At Courthouse

The first draft of a state-wide plan to reduce non-point pollution from agricultural sources will be presented at a public meeting in Tishomingo County at the Tishomingo County Fair Building on May 2 at 7:30 p.m., reported County Agent, Percie B. Stricklen. "The plan that will be presented here was prepared as required by Public law 92-500 enacted by the U. S. Congress in 1972," Stricklen added. "Referred to as the 208 Water Quality Management Plan, this plan pertains to pollution from agricultural land such as crop land, pasture land, idle and gullied land, small streams and dirt and gravel county roads. Such areas are called non-point sources of water pollution."

"The purpose of this meeting is to give local leaders and the general public in our area an opportunity to review the plan and comment on it," he added. "Comments from the meeting will be recorded and considered at a later date when final drafts of the plan are being formulated and submitted to Gov. Finch."

Each state has been asked to develop a plan to reach goals set forth in the bill. The plan that will be presented proposes an entirely voluntary program of stopping pollution. No regulations are proposed. Each land user will be offered suggestions or best improvement practices to conserve soil and clean up his water. However, it is likely that if the state is not able to make acceptable progress on a voluntary

basis, the Environmental Protection Agency may implement a regulated program, Stricklen said. The Mississippi Soil and Water Conservation Commission was designated by Gov. Cliff Finch as the agency to develop this plan and will be in charge of presenting it at the meeting.

Program will include: summary of the 208 plan, a visual presentation on the 208 Program, how best management practices fit into a conservation plan, and a question and answer session.

"This plan could have far-reaching effects on landowners in Tishomingo County. I urge every landowner in the county to attend the meeting so they may learn first-hand what is being proposed," Stricklen said.

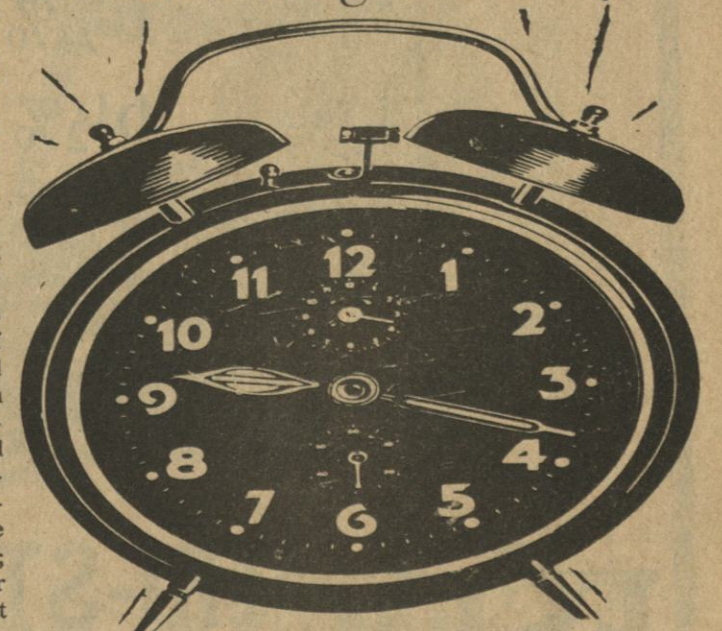

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

Beef Definitions Proposed

usda has proposed adding several definitions to the U. S. carcass beef standards to make uniform interpretation easier.

USDA's Food Safety and Quality Service, which administers the voluntary meat grading service, says definitions are needed to clarify the meaning of the terms: carcass, side, quarter, wholesale cut, primal cut and subprimal cut. These terms are currently used in the standards but are not defined.

When beef is federally graded, two grade marks are applied; one for quality (Prime, Choice, Good, etc) and one for yield (Yield Grade No. 1, No. 2, etc). Grading rules prohibit removing either of these grade marks from a federally graded carcass, side or quarter. Both marks may be removed, but not just one. However, when federally graded beef is marketed as retail cuts, subprimal cuts or wholesale cuts substantially trimmed of external fat, the yield grade mark may be removed and the beef may be officially identified for its quality grade only.

The proposed definitions are: Carcass--the two sides of the same slaughtered animal with or without the kidneys and after removal of the other viscera and the hide, head, feet and tail. Side--each of the two parts which results from splitting a carcass lengthwise through its approximate median

plane. Quarter--each of two portions which results from ribbing a side between the 12th and 13th ribs.

Also, wholesale cut--any of the following subdivisions of a quarter: round, full loin (or short loin and sirloin), rib, chuck loin and sirloin, rib, chuck (square-cut chuck or arm chuck), brisket, short plate, flank and foreshank. Except for the full loin and arm chuck, a combination of two or more of the subdivisions shall not be considered a wholesale cut.

Primal cut--any one of the major wholesale cuts: round, full loin (or short loin and sirloin), rib and square-cut chuck. Briskets, short plates, flanks and foreshanks are not primal cuts.

Subprimal cut--a portion of a primal or other wholesale cut such as those listed in the Institutional Meat Purchase Specifications for Fresh Beef and similar cuts normally produced by beef fabricators. Examples of subprimal cuts include the arm section of a square-cut chuck, a rump and shank-off round, a boneless brisket and a bone-in or boneless strip loin. A subprimal cut does not result from the trimmings only of fat nor from the removal of only a minor amount of lean and or bone from a primal or other wholesale cut.

QUICK CHICKEN PIE

1 c. canned bone chicken

1 c. creamed chicken soup
1 c. refrigerator biscuits
Place chicken and soup in casserole; stir to mix.
Place biscuits on top.
Bake in 400 degree oven 15 to 20 minutes until biscuits are done and chicken is heated through.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

CONTROL BROADLEAF WEEDS

You need to control broad-leaf weeds in pastures before they rob your crops of much-needed moisture and fertilizer. You can kill these pests easier by spraying them early in the season before they reach a height of two inches.

The recommended herbicides and rates are one pound of 2,4-d or one to two pints of 2,4-d plus Banvel D mixtures per acre. If you have legumes in your pastures, do not spray until the annual legumes have gone to seed. If white clover is present, use one-half pound of 2,4-D per acre. Do not use Banvel on perennial legumes and clovers because it will kill them.

GARDENING

Cultivate your garden as often as necessary to keep weeds under control. Cultivation will kill small weeds that can steal water and nutrients from your garden crops if allowed to grow. Proper cultivation will also loosen the soil and let more moisture in. If a crust forms on the soil, you should break it with shallow cultivation. Deep cultivation can injure crop roots and bring fresh seed to the surface.

water your transplants

If you transplanted trees to your lawn or fruit orchard last winter, provide them with plenty of water during hot, dry weather this summer. Lack of water is the biggest cause of tree deaths during the first grow-

ing season after transplanting.

Apply five gallons of water each week around the base of newly planted trees during the summer will usually give them enough moisture. This easy, inexpensive step can make the difference between a healthy, vigorous tree and a wilted eyesore.

external hog parasites

External parasites can cause a loss of profits in a hog production operation, and hog lice are among the most common of these pests. These small, bluish-gray, blood-sucking insects can kill hogs if not controlled.

You should treat your hogs with a recommended insecticide if you find lice around ears and the underside of legs. You should also dust or spray bedding, hog houses and pens at the same time to avoid re-infestation. Contact your county Extension agent for recommended insecticides for controlling lice.

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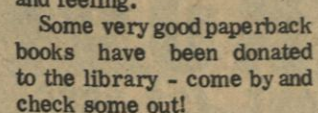

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up the matter of issuance of the Industrial Development Revenue Bonds, Series 1978, of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in the principal amount not to exceed Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000). After a discussion of the subject, Alderman James E. Burns offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, TO ENTER UPON AN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT AND TO ISSUE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BONDS OF SAID TOWN IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,500,000) FOR SUCH PURPOSE, AND DIRECTING THE PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi (the "Governing Body"), acting for and on behalf of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi (the "Issuer"), does hereby find, determine and adjudicate as follows:

1. The Issuer is a municipality as defined in Chapter 147, General Laws of Mississippi, Regular Session 1960, as amended, appearing as Title 57, Chapter 3 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"); and
2. ASC Farm News

SIGNUP PERIOD FOR COTTON, FEED GRAIN, AND WHEAT PROGRAMS EXTENDED UNTIL MAY 15

Tishomingo County Farmers wishing to participate in the cotton, feed grain and or wheat programs will have an additional two weeks to sign up, Ray Davis an official of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, announced.

Mr. Davis said that Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland was extending the signup period for the programs from May 1 through May 15 because of changes announced March 29 in the programs. On that date Secretary Bergland authorized additional diversion of cropland under the cotton and feed grain programs and permitted wheat program participants to graze out their wheat or harvest hay on a percentage of their planted acreage.

UPLAND COTTON DIVERS-

ION PAYMENTS AUTHORIZED

Henry Knox, an official of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), said upland cotton producers who sign up for the 1978 cotton program and voluntarily divert an acreage of cropland equal to 10 percent of their 1978 planted acreage, will receive a payment.

"The payment will be two cents per pound times the farm's established yield times the cotton acreage planted for harvest," Knox said. Producers will receive one-half the payment at signup.

The 1978 cotton planted acreage, plus the diverted cotton acreage, must not exceed the 1977 acreage planted to cotton. "The total crops included in the 1978 normal crop acreage (CA),

the required feed grain and wheat set-aside, voluntary diversions, and any wheat grazing and hay acreage for payment cannot exceed the farm's NCA."

Cotton diversion payments were authorized to assure a reduction in 1978 cotton plantings. With diversion, agriculture officials expect about 12 million acres to be planted to upland cotton, nationally.

According to Knox, failure to comply with the voluntary diversion provisions of the cotton program will eliminate payments but will not effect other program benefits. More information on the cotton program may be obtained by contacting the local ASCS office at 105 Eastport Street, luka, Ms. Phone 423-5036.

THE CRISIS OF BEREAVEMENT

Since the pale of death pierces every mortal, it is necessary for all of us to learn how to handle bereavement. I have watched with great admiration and respect the courage that has borne many a saint through hours of sorrow. Here is some practical advice I have seen others use in dealing with grief:

1. Express your emotions. Since Jesus wept, it should not be considered a Christian virtue to be unmoved by the loss of a loved one. There is a difference between suppressing one's emotions and losing one's self-control. The Bible does not say, "Sorrow not," but it says, "Sorrow not as others who have not hope." (I Thess. 4:13.)
2. Seek the aid of your friends. Their presence is an encouragement. When Paul neared Rome the brethren came to meet him and he "thanked God and took courage." (Acts 28:15.)
3. Compel yourself to be with people. Your inclination may be to retreat into the refuge of privacy, but there is a greater need than one realizes to associate with others. David did. (II Sam. 12:19-23.)
4. Express your feelings in words. Talking about it will help you to accept it. If this is done at the outset of bereavement, one will sooner be able to stabilize his life.
5. Avail yourself of spiritual resources. Even though you may not have realized the importance of the scriptures and their comfort, now these can help in building your faith. The power of prayer and the peace of God are very precious possessions.
6. Don't brood over what might have been. Both Mary and Martha said, "If thou hadst been here, by brother had not died." (John 11:21-32.)

7. Actively pursue worthwhile tasks. Once the initial shock has been dealt with, get busy at other things. Resolve like Paul to "reach forth unto the things which are before." (Phil. 3:13.)

8. Make careful and thoughtful decisions. Many an individual jumps hastily into deciding the full scope of the future rather waiting until he has regained a proper perspective of life. Don't get in a hurry. Make prayerful decisions.

9. Increase your trust in God. Those who have come through their sorrows with a deeper faith can verify that God who rules over all truly does make all things work together for good. (Rom. 8:28.)

After the crisis of grief, you can serve more fully and sympathize more completely with men of like passions. With Paul you, too, can thank God for the comfort received knowing that it has now given you the ability to comfort others who are in any trouble. (II Cor. 1:4.)

Additional Food Stamps

Certain households may be eligible for additional food stamps as a result of a recent court decision in Aiken v. Obledo regarding emergency issuance of food stamps. For several years, food stamp offices have been allowed to issue food stamps on an emergency basis---without first requiring full proof of need for stamps---to households with little or no income (usually less than \$90 per month). However, before food stamp offices would issue these stamps, they did have to either contact a person who was not a member of the household in order to get some confirmation of the household's need for stamps or have the household itself provide proof of its need. And no household was allowed to receive these emergency stamps more than once every six months or to require confirmation of the household's need before the

emergency stamps could be issued.

So, a household which applied for or asked about food stamps since August 1974, may be eligible for additional benefits or a reduction in current purchase price if the household fits into either of the following groups:

(1) The household received food stamps at no cost but did not begin receiving the stamps in the same month it applied.

(2) Even though the household had little or no income (this would most likely mean income of less than \$90 per month), it contacted a food stamp office but did not apply, or applied but did not follow up on the application, because it was felt there would be difficulty or delay in obtaining proof of its need to receive stamps

immediately. (Some, although not all, of the persons in these two groups will qualify for these additional benefits.)

A household which feels it fits into either of these groups should contact the nearest welfare department or contact the FNS Regional Office at the following address: Southeast Region, Food and Nutrition Service,

A household does not have to be currently eligible for food stamps in order to get the month's worth of benefits if lost in the past.

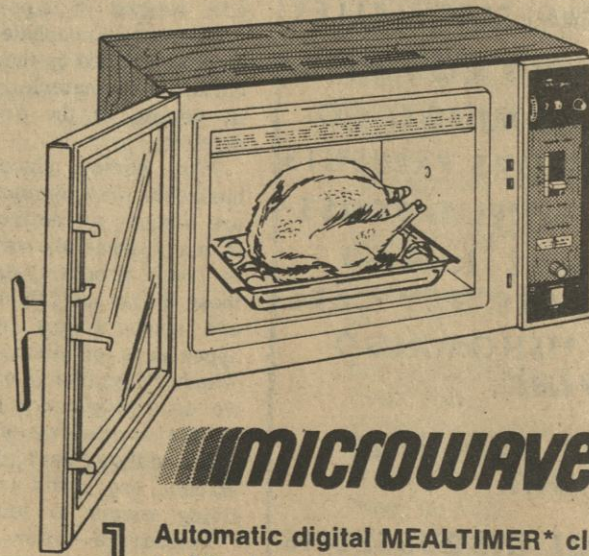

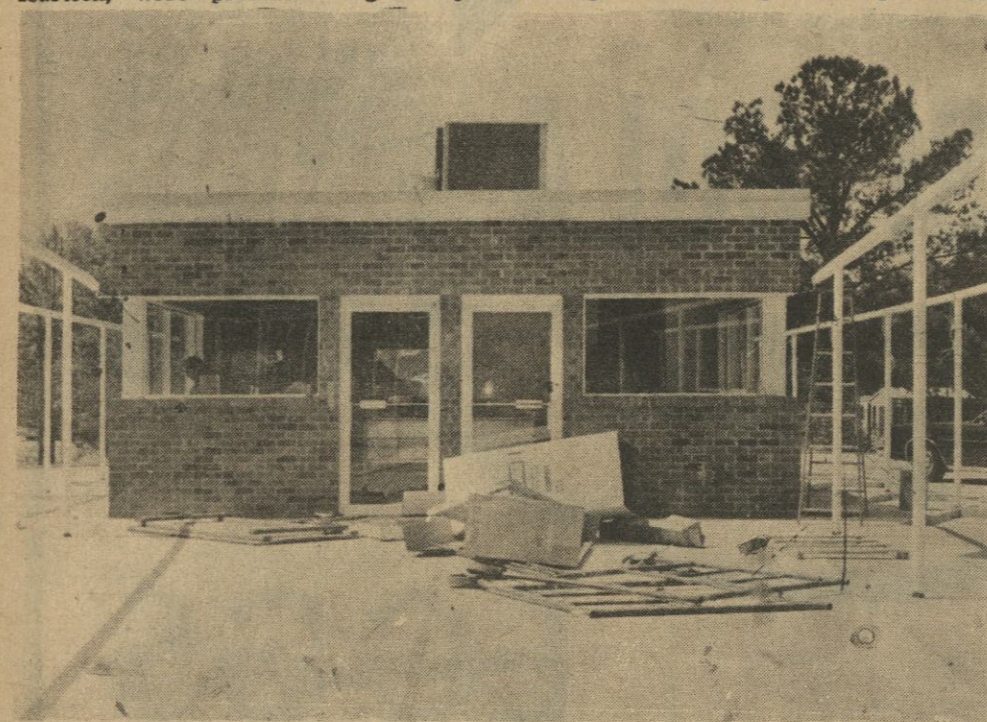

While the ambulance was in route from the hospital, Mr. Whitaker administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Mr. Kimberly was taken to the local hospital where he was in critical condition. The attending physician stated that had it not been for the emergency measures taken prior to the arrival of the ambulance, he would have died.

We think Mr. Whitaker's actions demonstrate not only his ability to quickly react to a situation, but also his concern for others. He could have stood idly by, and no one would have been the wiser; but instead he chose to get involved.

Because of Mr. Whitaker, Dr. Draper, and the nursing staff at the Tishomingo Hospital, Mr. Kimberly recovered from the heart attack and is now improving.

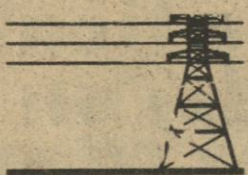

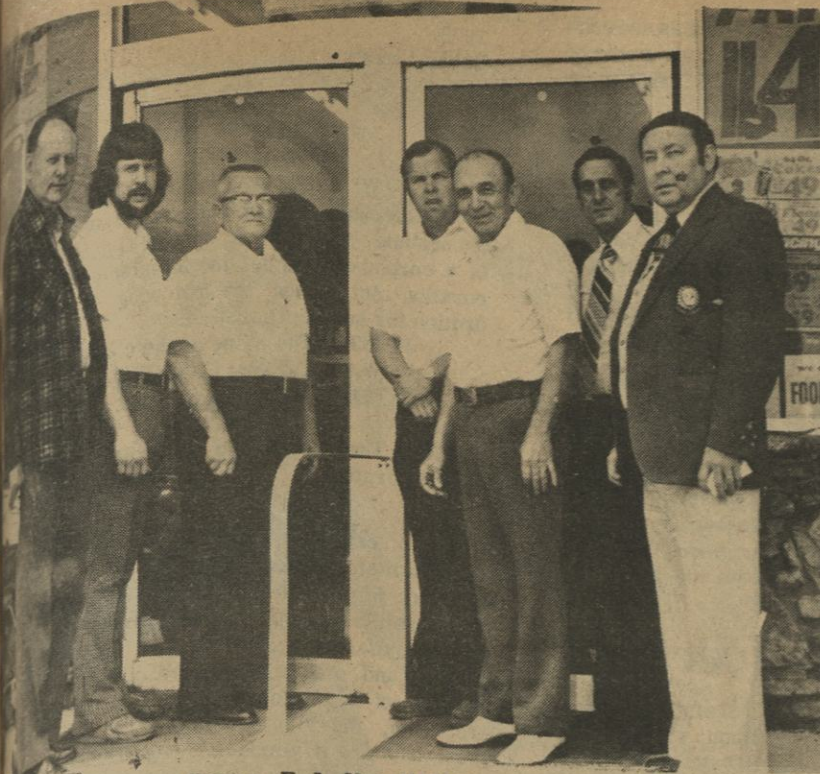

"Now that we have ob- tained rights-of-way in all three States, we are in a position to call on the Pres- ident for the budget recom- mendation to complete this historic Trace in short order.

"The first step toward accomplishing this is to get the message over to the eastern part of the United States that the Trace Fig- ures prominently in our her- itage and compares favor- ably with any other historic monument recommended and approved by the Con- gress.

"It has been said that the Trace actually antedates the Ap- pian Way of ancient Rome. Of course, this cannot be proved nor can it be dis-

proved but, quite definitely, the Bear Creek Mound in- dicates human occupation more than 10,000 years ago, as does Emerald Mound, the second largest temple mound in the United States. Along its route travelled the Indians long before the white man came to America. It was later made famous by the hundreds of Americans who carried their grain and other products by boat down the Mississippi to New Or- leans where they made their sale, dismantled and sold their boats, even as Abra- ham Lincoln did, and came back overland up the Trace to Nashville and on beyond to the northeast. For a time, the Trace held an un- savory reputation as a rob- bers' highway and a mur- derers' haven as outlaws in- fested its length to strike unwary travelers.

"Of historic significance, too, is that it was the over- land route to the Battle of New Orleans which made Andrew Jackson President

of the United States and con- tributed to his nickname of Old Hickory. It is this route too, which leads to the spot at the early Mississippi town of Washington, near Natchez where the former Vice Pre- sident, Aaron Burr, was brought to trial on a charge of treason in a preliminary hearing under the oak trees, one of which still lives and is known as the Aaron Burr Oak.

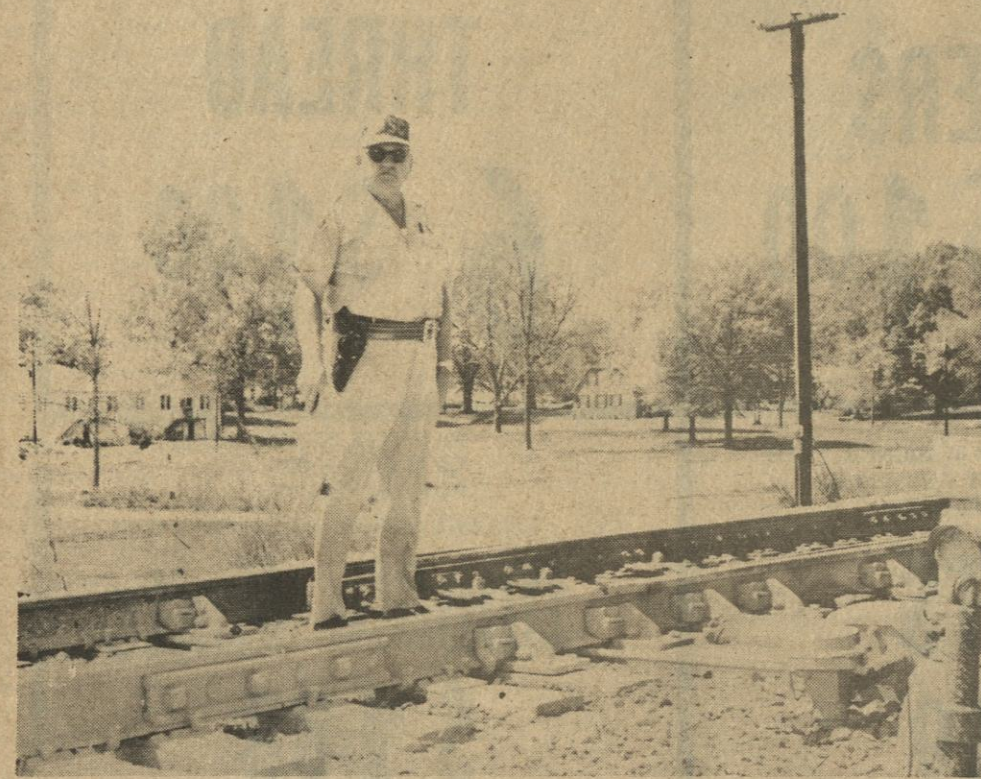

Railroads Inspected Around Iuka

Mississippi Public Ser- vice Commission Chairman D. W. Snyder stated that the law enforcement staff of the Northern District is near- ing completion of its de- tailed inspection of all the railroad yards and facili- ties in the Northern District after having devoted almost two weeks of intensified in- spections involving the total law enforcement staff, in- cluding the Commissioner and the Director of Trans- portation.

Snyder cited recent dis- astrous derailments in the Southeastern states that had prompted the Mississippi Public Service Commission to step up its rail facility inspection program in the Northern District.

Continuing, Snyder stated that it was alarming to the

Commission that there has been a fifty percent increase in report- ed railroad derailments for the first sixty days of 1978 over 1977. During the months of January and Feb- ruary, there were 45 report- ed derailments.

All Commission enforce- ment officers, along with the Director of Transpor- tation for the Commission, have recently received spe- cial training in the handling of hazardous materials, and in addition, have just com- pleted a refresher course at the Mississippi Law En- forcement Academy, ac- cording to Snyder.

The Commission enforce- ment officers inspecting the railroad facilities in each town will make a detailed report on all dangerous si-

tuations, and the report will be made available to the railroads involved and to the news media, along with a request to the railroads to correct the deficiencies.

Snyder pointed out that this undertaking by the Com- mission to correct rail- road deficiencies and prob- lems has not previously been undertaken in such de- pth. He concluded, stating that the Commission hopes that this action on the part of the Commission will be the beginning of reducing railroad disasters, even though rail traffic has in- creased to a record level in recent months. This program the Commission has undertaken will be an on-going program, and the results and effectiveness will be evaluated periodi- cally.

WADKINS SUPERMARKETS, INC.

We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of twenty-one years or more, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Mississippi Business Corporation Act, adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation:

b. To do all and everything necessary, suitable and proper for the accomplishment of any of the purposes or the attainment of any of the objects set forth, either alone or in association with other corporations, firms, or individuals, and to do every other act or acts, thing or things incident or ap- purtenant to or growing out of or connected with the aforesaid objects or purposes or any part or parts thereof, provided the same are not inconsistent with the Laws of the State of Mississippi.

c. It is hereby expressly provided that the herein- above enumerated purposes and powers shall in no way act to limit or restrict in any manner the cor- porate purposes and powers as conferred in Sections 79-3-5 and 79-3-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, An- notated.

FOURTH: The aggregate number of shares which the corporation shall have authority to issue is TWO THOUSAND (2,000) of the par value of TWO AND 50/100 DOLLARS (\$2.50).

FIFTH: The corporation will not commence busi- ness until consideration of the value of at least ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00) has been received for the issuance of shares.

Health Systems Agency

The Mississippi Health Systems Agency, Inc., (MHS) conducted its local "town hall" election to re-
