HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

POTS AND PANS AREN'T PLAYTHINGS

Abused pots and pans have caused many disappointments in food preparation. Good utensils are essential for good results. The finest electric or gas range, equipped with all the latest features, may not perform well if you are using utensils with warped bottoms, dented sides, scratched and scoured surfaces, loose handles or badly fitting lids.

For the best cooking results, check your utensils on these important points:

- Straight sides. They help distribute heat evenly and make stirring easier.
- A flat bottom for even heating. This also keeps shortenings and liquids from collecting at low points.
- Rounded joints between sides and bottom for easy cleaning.
- A well-fitting cover to help hold in moisture, flavor and nutrients.
- A heat resistant, tightly-fitting handle on a well-balanced utensil which isn't likely to slip or tip even when the hands are wet.
- Heavy material which won't easily dent, crack or warp in normal use.

A guide for those choosing new cooking utensils: The most popular types are aluminum (either cast or thick-rolled); stainless steel (probably provided with either an aluminum or copper bottom for better heat conduction); enamelware; cast iron; glass and glass-ceramic and copper.

Some of the top-of-the-range utensils to consider:

chicken fryers for use with foods which are first browned then cooked with the cover on, coffeemakers, saucepans and saucepots, dutch ovens, frypans or skillets, and tea kettles. Select sizes which match burner sizes.

Ovenware includes round and square baking pans in a variety of sizes, tube cake pans, casseroles, cookie sheets, custard cups, bean pots, loaf pans, muffin and cupcake pans, pie pans or plates, roaster and broiler pans.

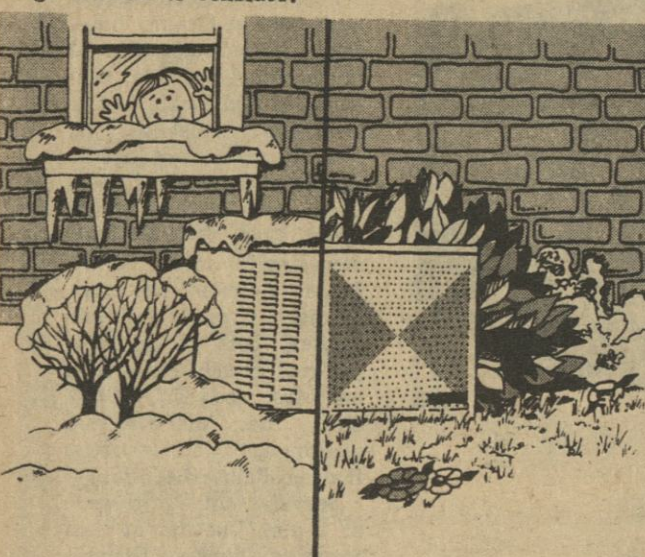
Many utensils are now available with nonstick finishes, and there are several different nonstick finishes.

Become familiar with the different utensils and materials so your choices will suit the way you like to cook.

EVERLASTING SALAD

- 1 med. cabbage
- 4 to 6 carrots
- 6 med. onions
- 4 red or green sweet peppers or 2 bell peppers and 2 long green chili peppers
- 1 tsp. celery seed
- 1 tsp. white mustard seed
- 1/4 c. salt
- 2 c. sugar
- 2 c. white vinegar

Grind all vegetables in food chopper or blender. Add salt; let stand 2 hours. Drain well; add celery and mustard seeds, sugar and vinegar. Put in jars; do not cook. May be kept in refrigerator for at least six weeks.

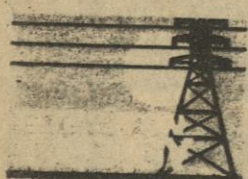

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

WHITE FLY CONTROL ON ORNAMENTALS

From the numerous reports of failures of control of these, I am suspicious of resistance to the old recommended insecticides. This has not been confirmed by laboratory testing, but it is why I am recommending alternate treatments as shown in the last paragraph of this article.

White flies are small mothlike insects covered with white, waxy powder. They are 4-winged flies with immature stages resembling miniature scale insects. They are flat and oval, light yellowish or greenish, and often provided with a fringe of wax threads. Immature stages sometimes appear semi-transparent.

This pest feeds only on leaves, nearly always feeding on the underside of the leaf. It takes sap from the plant and excretes large amounts of honeydew. Sometimes sooty mold develops on the honeydew, giving the leaves a blackish appearance.

The flies attack a large variety of plants but primarily the ligustrums such as the Chinese privet, Chinaberry trees and cape jasmine are frequently at-

tacked, being favorite host plants.

CONTROL:

Granular 2% disulfoton (Di-Syston).

Sprinkle around base of plants. Mix into soil and water plants thoroughly. Repeat treatment in 4 to 5 weeks if needed.

Dust 1% lindane, 5% malathion.

Spray - To Mix 1 Gallon: 25% diazinon E. C., 2 teaspoons; 23.4% dimethoate (Cygon) E. C., 2 teaspoons; 20% lindane E. C., 1 1/2 teaspoons; 57% malathion E. C., 2 teaspoons; Summer oil emulsion, 3 tablespoons; 15.6% acephate (Orthene), 1 1/2 tablespoons; 40% nicotine sulphate (Black Leaf 40)*, 3 teaspoons.

* Use one ounce of soap flakes per gallon of water. Do not use a detergent.

Several applications will be needed at 4 or 5 day intervals to clean up the infestation. After this, inspect at regular intervals and begin spraying again as soon as insects are observed. Diazinon may injure hibiscus or gardenia. If you are having trouble controlling this insect, use Orthene alternately with one other insecticide.

MAY 15, 1978 FINAL DATE TO SIGN-UP:

The final date to sign-up in the cotton, wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley set-aside program is May 15, 1978. May 15, 1978 is also the deadline to sign-up in the cotton, corn, grain sorghum and barley voluntary diversion program. By participating in the set-aside program you will be covered for the following program benefits: (1) Commodity Loans, (2) Deficiency Payments, and (3) Disaster Payments. Many of our Tishomingo County farmers have already planted their 1978 crop of corn. However, you may still want to look closer at the set-aside program. We urge you to stop by the county office and discuss the options you need to consider for your farm in 1978. The rainfall we had this past weekend has stopped field work. Therefore, this will be a good opportunity to break down your farming operations for 1978. If you have any questions about the set-aside or diversion program,

please call 423-5036 or better yet, stop by the county office on or before May 15, 1978.

REPORTING 1977 CROPS AND LAND USE:

Our records indicate that many Tishomingo County farmers have not reported their crops planted in 1977. May 15, 1978, is the deadline to report your farm operation for crop year 1977. By not reporting your farm will receive a normal crop acreage (NCA) of zero (0). This NCA for 1977 is the base year for the 1977 farm bill. You may call 423-5036 to report your 1977 farm operation, or you may stop by the county office. Remember, the final date to report your 1977 planted acreage is May 15, 1978.

FINAL DATE TO REPORT 1977 PLANTED WHEAT ACREAGE:

The final date to report 1977 wheat planted acreage is May 15, 1978. Two (2) producers have already reported acreage planted in

More Beef Per Acre

The amount of beef produced per acre can be increased tremendously by providing temporary summer grazing, according to Leon Perry, Special Watershed Agent, Cooperative Extension Service.

Mr. Perry states that while the average acre of forage land in Mississippi produces only 81 pounds of beef, many producers are getting 400 pounds of beef per acre. The principle reason for this difference

is the lack of proper management, including forage production and utilization. The three most widely used summer forage crops are the Sorghum-sudan hybrids, Millets and Sudangrasses. Their advantages include: rapid growth, high forage yields and medium to high quality.

The most common use of summer annuals is grazing for dairy and beef cows, creep for calves and hay production. One acre of summer annual forage should provide sufficient supplemental grazing for one dairy or beef cow, creep grazing for 10 to 15 calves or two grown steers.

For best results three plantings should be made. Make the first planting in early May, the second in late May, and the third in late June. If you plant the whole area at the same time there will be too much forage for the cattle to graze uniformly and part will be wasted.

Summer annuals can be broadcast, planted in narrow rows or sod-seeded into unimproved pasture sod. Each method has certain advantages, depending on the

"National Family Week 7-14"

... and where has decency gone? Don't you really think it's about time someone raised a voice to protest what is happening to us in this country? Nathaniel Hawthorne wrote in his journal an idea for a story concerning a gas main underneath a city, which had a secret leak and gradually filled the whole city with its subtle poison. This may well serve as a parable as to what is happening today. An immoral sewer of foul gas and destruction is seeping out into our society; a pagan, immoral, indecent force is wrecking American morals.

Where does one begin to try and describe our situation? Magazine articles, public addresses and books continue to point out what is happening to us. One article raised these questions. "Do we need a new code of behavior to solve our crisis of immorality?" "Has money become God?" "Is sexual morality completely gone?" "Have our churches failed?" A casual acquaintance with some of our thoughtful editorials and commentators seem to restate again and again the story of the rottenness and filthy poison that is seeping out from the sewers! Jenkins Lloyd Jones, long-time editor of the Tulsa Tribune states: "We are in an advanced state of moral decline; America is Sodom and Gomorrah, ripening for the kill." These words were written in 1968 . . . and since that time movies and TV are dirtier than ever; books and magazines are dirtier and many are prominently displayed on every book stand. Friends, our moral foundations are eroding fast; our capacity for righteous indignation seems all but gone. We accept without protest what our forefathers would have burned and destroyed. Things that once brought blushes to an American Legion stag party are now accepted in mixed company with little or no protest. The cesspool is overflowing; America is being debased and low rated in the eyes of the whole world.

Anyone who faces the facts, observes what is happening, should be ready to demand a return to decency. The problem seems so overwhelming, the situation so desperate, the crisis so critical that we are just apt to become paralyzed in the face of it all. Now, what can sensible, intelligent, concerned people do? First, we can open our mouth and speak out against that which is bringing decay to our beloved communities and nation. Also, we can set a higher standard in our own personal living, and we can dare to take a stand, however unpopular . . . but for the love of God, we must wake up and do what we can to clean up this mess we are in.

Certainly we have no exhaustive answers but simply offer a few suggestions:

We can realize the seriousness of the situation. Nations rise and fall because of what they do about God and morals. Civilizations have come and gone, not because of outward attack but because of internal disintegration due to the loss of moral and spiritual values. Nations as well as men have souls; and when a nation ceases to believe in itself and God; when its institutions are regarded with cynicism and its traditions are treated with flippancy . . . it will not long remain great. Little doubt that some will accuse this writer as an alarmist. That's fine . . . but remember this, America is in dire peril and this is both the message of the Holy Bible and History. The signs of decay are evident among us.

Another suggestion comes in symbolic words all too familiar . . . we need to walk the sawdust trail. That is a way of saying that we must revive the idea that there is such a thing as sin. Nations and people who have forgotten that there are some things that are right because God is God, and some things wrong and evil because the devil is the devil . . . do so to the detriment of the soul. It's time to bring self-discipline back in style! It's time we returned to decency, or a better statement would be to say, it is time we expressed our true selves . . . our true faith in God. Our question, "And where has decency gone?" Our personal integrity and character has been bruised and we have cowed down under the pressure of the public media called TV. We have gradually been brainwashed to believe that "this is the way life is." Therefore, you and I have allowed decency to be buried deep within us in a "conspiracy of silence." For this, we Christians need the forgiveness of God . . . and a new backbone. Many of our magazines, movies and TV shows promote immorality, homosexuality and perversion, violence, drunkenness, prostitution as an acceptable way of life. We must remind these people that they are enemies of God, and of the nation and must not be excused on the basis of freedom to publish and print anything just to make a dollar.

Youthful offenders learn much of their rebellious spirit from the tube. Parents need to set examples in matters pertaining to reverence and respect for authority. Without going into the impossible jobs of our teachers and law enforcement people . . . we can just say a prayer of thanks for them and ask God to help us learn again the meaning of the "Home". That "sawdust trail" begins at that place we call "home".

A third suggestion for our consideration is for each

of us to remember that there are some standards too sacred to forsake. Let's rethink the ten commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. Perhaps we have talked so much about the love of God that we have forgotten or neglected to speak of the "wrath of God." For whatever else you might call it . . . the natural consequence of denying Christ, by apathy or indifference is always the same . . . lostness. We need to know that there is an impending and inevitable judgement of God. This personal and corporate accountability will be for all under God. While we may not be able to control everything around us we can hold fast personally to a standard of decency. This is no popular cause which we advocate and the pressure may seem unbearable in some circles of life; but it may mean the difference for our lives and our society.

One final suggestion . . . the fifth chapter of Daniel tells the story of the "hand-writing on the wall." I will not elaborate other than to say that this scripture has served to remind nations from that time to this that unfaithfulness and immorality sets in motion those forces which call for the waning and falling of great nations. National Family Week . . . may it serve to remind us that much is at stake; the well-being of mankind and our nation; the future of our souls, our nation and world.
