Judge L. T. Senter Sparks For School Board



Circuit Judge L. T. Senter, Jr., of Aberdeen, has announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of Circuit Judge for the First Circuit Court District of Mississippi. The First Circuit Court District includes Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss and Tishomingo counties.

Judge Senter was elected to the office of Circuit Judge in 1968, and for the past eight years has been the Senior Circuit Judge of the District. He is a graduate of the University of Southern Mississippi and the University of Mississippi Law School. He is also a graduate of the National College of State Trial Judges at the University of Nevada and has done post-graduate work at that institution.

Judge Senter is married to the former Elizabeth Dickson, of Aberdeen, and they have three children; Jay, age 18, Elizabeth Lee, age 15; and Dick, age 13. He is a deacon of the First Presbyterian Church of Aberdeen, and served for sixteen years as County Chairman of the March of Dimes. He was selected as Aberdeen's Most Outstanding Citizen in 1972, and is a past President of the Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce.

Judge Senter is a member of the Mississippi State Bar Association; the American Bar Association and the American Judicature Society. He has been a guest lecturer at the University of Mississippi Law School and an instructor in many legal and judicial seminars throughout the State of Mississippi. He is a co-author of the recently published book on model jury instructions which will be used in all state trial courts and is a past chairman of the Circuit Judges Conference of the State of Mississippi.

In making his announcement, Judge Senter said: "As your Circuit Judge for the past ten years, I have worked hard to give you a firm, but fair, Circuit Court. I am well aware of the fact that the Circuit Court belongs to the people and I greatly appreciate the tremendous support the citizens of our District have given the Court. We have the reputation for having one of the finest and most efficient Court Districts in the entire State of Mississippi, and I want to continue to put my training and experience to work for the citizens of this District as your Circuit Judge. Overdue Energy Bills

If you have an overdue energy bill and your household income falls within Community Service Agency poverty guidelines you may be eligible to receive up to \$250 in Emergency Energy Assistance funds through the Governor's Office of Human Resources.

The deadline for authorizing funds is May 20, 1978. If you think your household qualifies, bring a copy of your overdue energy bill along with verification of the past three months income to your local county welfare department before May 20.

These energy funds are available to pay past due energy bills such as gas and electricity, and do not include telephone, water, sewer and other non-energy related bills.

16-YEAR-OLD DROWNS AT TISH. STATE PARK

A day of fun ended in tragedy for a 16-year-old Falkner girl, Saturday, May 13, at the Tishomingo State Park. Mary Lucille Gray, a sophomore at Falkner High School, drowned during a class canoe outing on Bear Creek.

The accident occurred when the canoe Miss Gray and four other students were in overturned around 3:15 p.m. All five were wearing life jackets at the time. The victim, who could not swim, apparently panicked during the spill and drowned.

It appeared her strings on the life jacket had become untied causing her not to be able to get out of the water. Miss Gray's body was found downstream as swift water held her face down against a tree. Four young men, who were also passengers in the canoe, swam to shore not realizing Miss Gray was in trouble. The creek was some 100 feet wide at the point of the accident.

Jim Baker, of the University of Southern Mississippi, a Red Cross safety official, who was with another canoe

trip group, saw Miss Gray against the tree. Although he tried to revive her, Baker indicated Miss Gray had drowned before he found her.

Park Manager, Steve North, said park rules limited a canoe to two passengers only. He said some 40 people, including the Falkner class and a University of Southern Mississippi canoeing class for the handicapped, all checked out canoes around 1:30 Saturday. Miss Gray apparently boarded one of the crafts with two other students during the confusion. Two other

individuals got into Miss Gray's canoe after another canoe was swamped in the creek. The weight of the five apparently caused the canoe to overturn.

Mr. North further stated that all canoe trips are cancelled until further notice.

Miss Gray was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Elmer Gray, of Falkner, Ms. She leaves three sisters, Linda Gray, Frances Gray and Mrs. Annie Lois Wooley, all of Ripley; a brother, Tommy Gray, of Corinth; and her grandmothers, Mrs. Emily Tapp and Mrs. Vera Gray, both of Falkner.

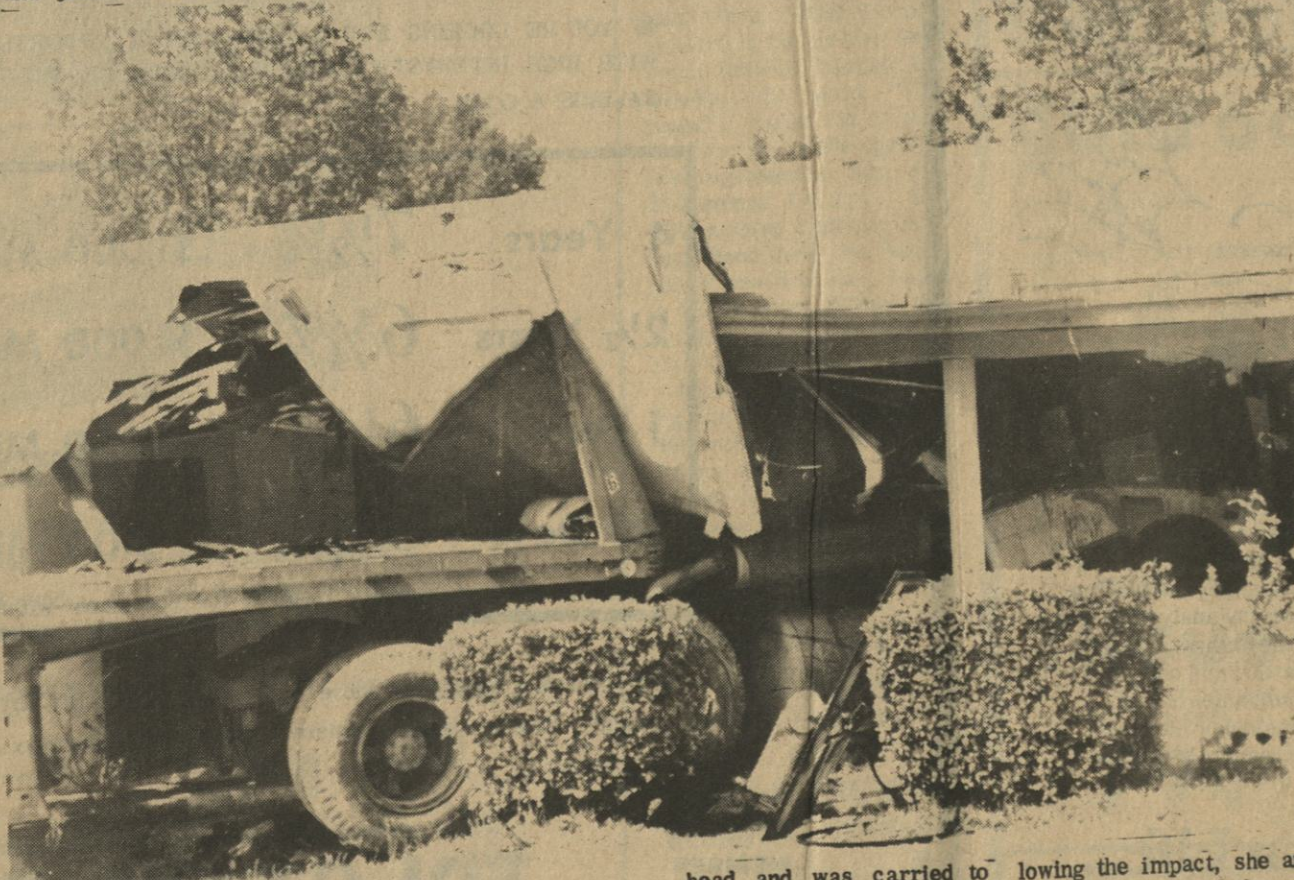

HOME SMASHED — A flatbed tractor trailer rig rammed into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Nunley on Highway 72 East of Iuka, Monday afternoon, May 15. The accident happened around 3:15 when the 18-wheeler, traveling east, went out of control when an auto stopped in front of it

to make a left-hand turn. The truck ran off the right side of the road, came back across the highway and crashed into the dining room of the Nunley home. Fred Morgan Nash, 50, driver of the rig and owner of Nash Enterprises, out of Birmingham, Ala., suffered severe lacerations to his

head and was carried to Tishomingo County Hospital by ambulance and was transferred by airplane to a Birmingham hospital Tuesday. The only occupants of the house, Mrs. Rena Nunley, and her granddaughter, Charlotte, were in the living room at the time and escaped with no injuries. Mrs. Nunley said that fol-

lowing the impact, she and Charlotte made their way out the front door and saw the truck driver climb from the wreckage and run to a nearby shop at the right of the house where Mr. Nunley was working. She said smoke filled the front part of the house, causing her and apparently the driver to fear the truck would explode.

NOTES

Tishomingo Countians who want to use their leisure time at home to learn about food preservation can do so with the help of a new Food Preservation Home Study Course offered by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

According to Tishomingo County Home Economist, Nellie R. Horton, the free course has instructions on canning and freezing fruits and vegetables and making jellies, jams, preserves, pickles and relishes. Individuals may obtain free copies by calling Nellie R. Horton at 423-3616 or write her at P. O. Box H, Iuka, Miss. 38852.

"An attractive feature of this course is that individuals can study the information as they wish, and when they're ready to put it to use," says the home economist. "There aren't any tests or deadlines, but par-

ticipants may check to see how much they've learned by working a food preservation crossword puzzle included in the study course.

"One of the first lessons explains how to prepare a home food preservation on buying, using and caring for freezing and canning equipment. Instructions on freezing and canning fruits are included, as are directions for preserving all kinds of vegetables -- everything from asparagus to zucchini."

According to Miss Horton, jelly recipes include preparation with the long boil method, liquid pectin or powdered pectin. Pickle and relish recipes range from traditional dill pickles to a simple horseradish relish, she said.

SIDEDRESS NITROGEN:

Cotton and corn respond well to sidedress applications of nitrogen. Since a crop uses most of the nitrogen during fruiting, it is best to sidedress cotton before first square and corn before it is 12 to 15 inches tall. Most corn will need sidedressing in May and cotton in late May or June.

Splitting the nitrogen cuts down on the risks of losses from leaching and denitrification. Carryover nitrogen is a little above normal because of last year's dry weather. Cotton producers should cut the nitrogen rate by 30 percent where cotton grows rank stalks.

LIME SOYBEAN LAND:

Much of the state's soybean land is in critical need of lime. Farmers can apply lime right up to planting. Soft lime is more readily available than hard rock lime. However, with the problem farmers are having getting lime, any high grade liming material should be applied any time farmers can get over the land without injuring the crop.

HARVESTING RYEGRASS HAY:

Ryegrass can make high quality hay. However, most of the ryegrass hay harvested in the state is low quality because it is harvested too late. To produce good ryegrass hay, you should begin harvesting when seed heads appear. Ryegrass should not be harvested after the seed dough

stage. Early harvesting may mean slightly less yields, but the total digestible nutrients per acre will be greater.

FARMWEEK:

Mississippi's changing cattle industry will be featured on the May 22 edition of the "Farmweek" program.

An in-depth panel discussion will explore areas of concern to both the cattle producer and consumer. Major issues will include higher prices for producers as a result of changes in cattle numbers and possible consumer reactions to the higher beef prices at the supermarket. Panelists will include Pete Armstrong, president, Mississippi Cattlemen's Association; Jerry Lyons, Jones County cattleman and president of the Mississippi Cattle Industry Board; and R. O. Buckley, Extension livestock specialist.

Farmweek is presented twice a week, Monday night at 7:30 and Tuesday morning at 7:30, on the Mississippi Educational Television Network.

NEW FARM INSURANCE PLAN OUTLINED:

Plans for a consolidated, all-risk farm insurance program were announced

recently by the Secretary of Agriculture. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will help market the new insurance program.

"Under the program, each producer could choose from three levels of insurance coverage -- 50, 70, and 90 percent of his normal crop production," Henry Knox, an agency official said. The farmer would pay about half the actual cost of insurance for the minimum 50 percent protection. If he chooses 70 percent protection, he would pay for most of the cost of the additional 20 percent protection, and would pay all the cost for the final 20 percent of protection at the 90-percent level. These three levels might vary for different crops, Knox said.

"By using federal funds mainly to share premium costs for the first level of protection, with producers paying most of the premiums for higher levels of protection, a level of protection to farmers than present disaster programs, at no additional cost to the government. "By utilizing the existing ASCS delivery system to sell the insurance, along with private insurance agents, we will be able to provide the type of service most familiar to farmers," Knox said.

The Farm Production Protection Act would consolidate four present disaster assistance programs into one, to insure crops against natural disasters and some other uncontrollable risks. The 1977 farm bill provides protection against economic disaster through loan and target price provisions. "The new insurance program complements that action by providing adequate protection for the farmer who has a bad crop or no crop at all," the ASCS official said.

The first crop that could be covered would be 1980 winter crops planted in the fall of 1979, if the plan receives speedy congressional consideration. Knox said the insurance plan is part of a comprehensive food and agriculture policy.

Now assigned at Peterson, the airman serves with a unit of the Aerospace Defense Command.

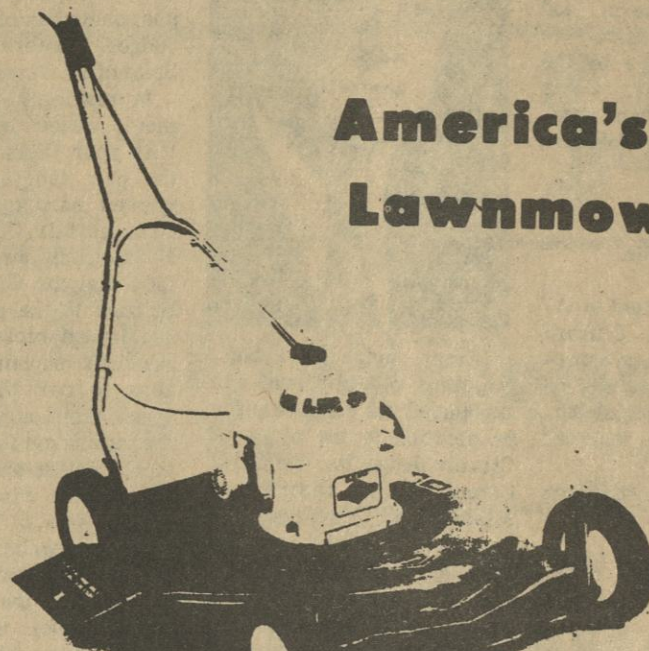

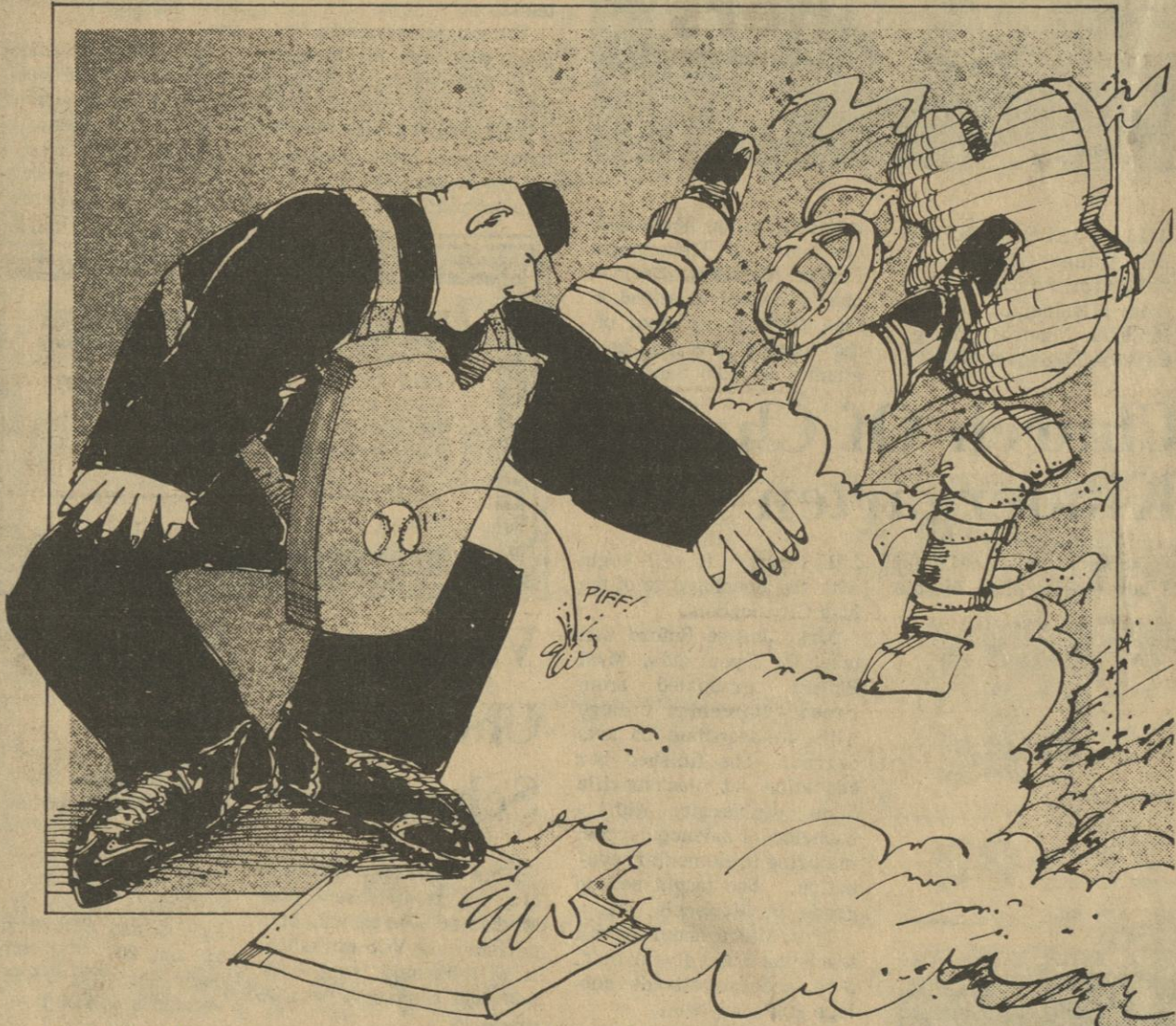

Joan McBrayer To Wed Delwyn Ponder On June 30th

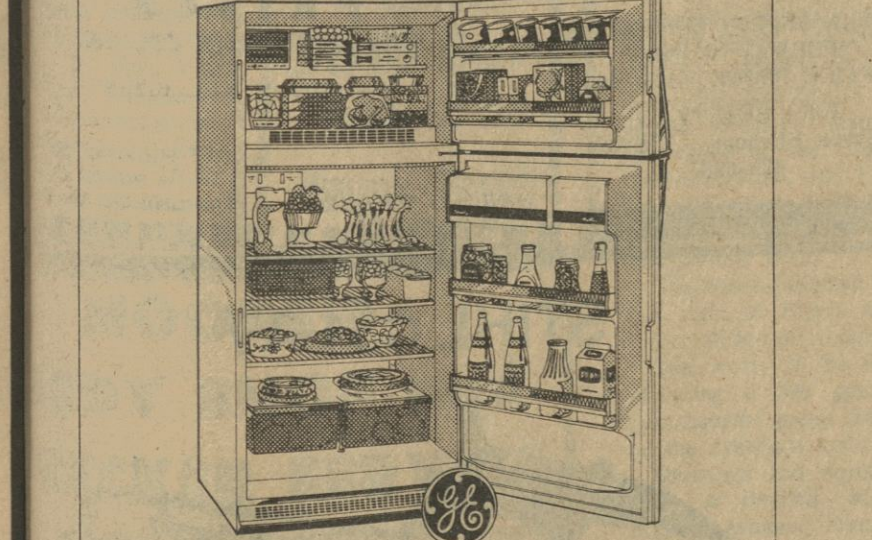

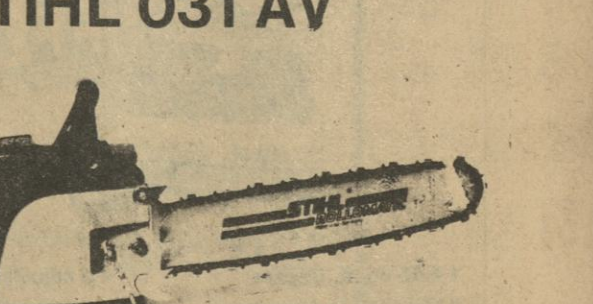

AN OPEN LETTER TO
MY FRIENDS IN THE
LABOR MOVEMENT:

I have always been a friend
of the people who labor to
earn their living. I have
always worked for better
pay and decent working
conditions for all laboring
people in my district and
throughout the State of
Mississippi. With that back-
ground I feel that I can
speak to laboring people as
a brother.

True friends can speak
honestly and frankly to each
other. Labor has always
been my friend and I have
always been a friend to la-
bor.

I note that labor in the
First Congressional Dis-
trict has endorsed Mr. Ger-
ald Chatham who is oppos-
ing the re-election of Con-
gressman Jamie Whitten. I
am very disappointed and
deeply regret such action.

For nearly 100 years con-
gressmen and other govern-
mental leaders have advo-
cated the building of the
Tenn-Tom Canal. No action
was taken on this bil-
lion dollar project until
Northeast Mississippi was
added to Congressman Jam-
ie Whitten's district. To-
day it is a reality.

I have worked very close-
ly to TVA in the location
of the nuclear power plant
in Mississippi. I can as-
sure you that without the
hard work and dedicated ef-

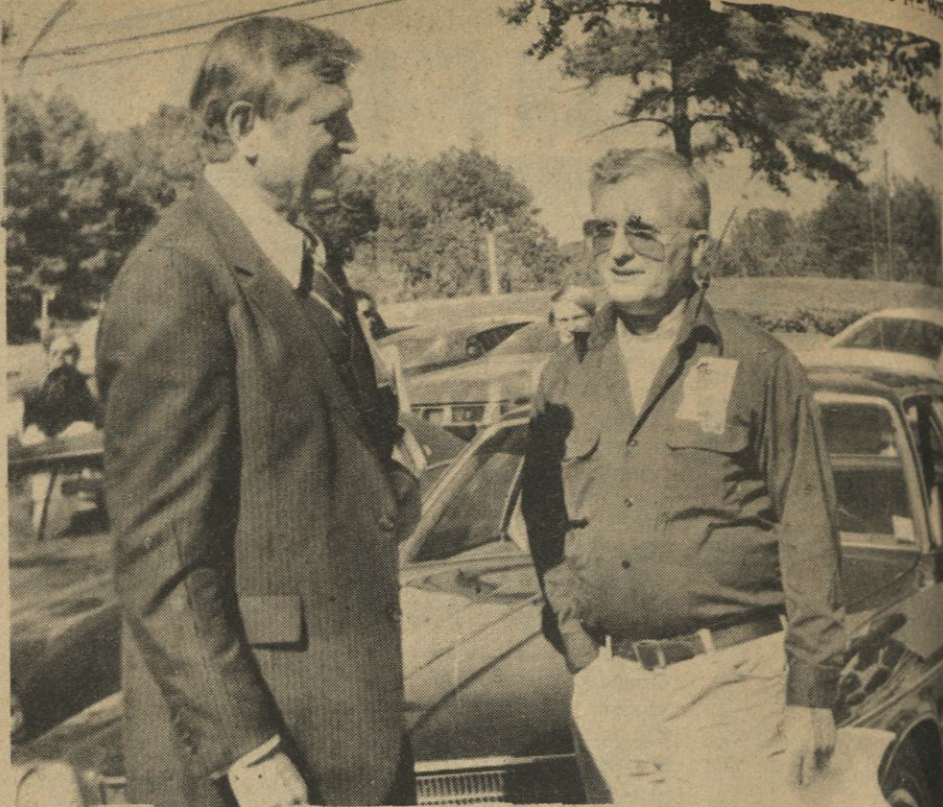

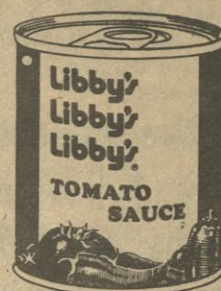

Red Cross Schedules CPR, Swimming And First Aid

The Tishomingo County Chapter of the Red Cross will hold classes in CPR training at the Iuka Library on June 19 and 20 and on June 26 and 27. There are spaces available for several more persons. Anyone wishing to sign up can call 423-5282 weekdays or 423-6002 nights and week-

ends. Classes will be filled on a first-come basis and additional classes can be scheduled later if necessary. Those already signed up need not call again. A CPR Class is scheduled at Tishomingo for May 22 and 23. This class is already filled, but later classes can be arranged for those interested. These classes will be taught by a trained volunteer, free-of-charge. Over \$400 in equipment is necessary to teach CPR and Tishomingo County must depend on neighboring chapters to lend us their equipment until we can obtain our own. By June 1, the chapter will have several trained instructors. These volunteers should be able to set up classes for special groups, such as industrial employees or clubs, at a time convenient for the groups.

The Red Cross is providing swimming instruction for students throughout the county in cooperation with the Extension Service and the Mississippi Park Service. Agent Billy Rainey is making arrangements with the Park Service for use of pools and also arranging transportation for interested students. The Red Cross is also providing the opportunity for three county students to take Water Safety Instructor Training. The Belmont Lions Club very generously volunteered to pay the expenses of two of the students, Nancy Groover and Marilyn Brosious, in order that they might attend

the course. The County Chapter is sponsoring the other student, Chuck Kay. These students will be trained to teach classes in swimming and lifesaving.

The Burnsville Standard First Aid class will begin in two weeks. This is a 20 hour course which will be followed by a course in CPR. Instructors are also planning the same course for Tishomingo and should begin that class within the month. These classes are being arranged with the Rescue Squads and Volunteer Firemen in each town. Others may join by contacting the Rescue Squad members. An eight hour first aid course is planned for employees at Ripley Industries in the immediate future. Belmont has just finished the 20 hour course and CPR training with 19 graduates.

We need volunteers for future programs now being planned. Join your Red Cross. The membership fee is only \$1.00 and can be sent to: Tishomingo County Chapter, American National Red Cross, Iuka, Miss. 38852. All members are eligible to vote at the annual meeting, which will be held on June 15, at the Vo-Tech Center at Tishomingo at 7:00 p.m.

An old game - do you remember playing "Mumblety Peg"?

Any number of children or older persons, having no qualifications can play. Mumblety Peg requires no equipment other than a two-blade pocket knife, usually a "Case or Barlow". In fact "Barlow" was the knife that everyone wanted.

The two blades had to be hinged at the same end of the handle. The large blade was halfway opened making a 90 degree angle to the handle. The small blade was fully opened. The playing surface most often was an area of packed dirt, but occasionally it was a wood table top or pine board. To play, the tip of the large blade was set slightly on the playing surface and the end of the handle rested on the tip of one finger with the knife balanced, so that the small blade pointed forward much as a spear. When the player felt the balance was satisfactory, a quick snap upward with the supporting finger would lift the knife in an end-over end arc to land on the playing surface. The position of the knife after landing determined the point or score for the player.

There were four landing positions which counted points; to come to rest in balance on the point of the large blade and the end of the handle; to rest stuck on the long blade with no

other point of contact; to rest balanced on the tips of the two blades; to rest stuck full on the point of the extended short blades with no other point of contact. (Sissie) Yankees, or Democrats might sometimes

claim game if the knife came to rest on the back side with the long blade directed straight upward, but no dedicated Mumblety Peg player accepts this version.
