TVA PROPOSES DEMO PROJECT FOR AREA

Project Involves Human Resource Development, Energy Use And
Conservation, And Utilization Of Recreational Potentials

The Tennessee Valley Authority is planning
a multipurpose resource development demonstration
project in northeast Mississippi on the shorelands of
the Yellow Creek embayment of Pickwick Landing
Reservoir near where the Tennessee-Tombigbee
Waterway joins the Tennessee River.

The project site is located in Tishomingo County,
northeast Mississippi, about 12 miles north of Iuka.
The site consists of some 240 acres of mainland with
about 4.5 miles of shoreland and a nearby 60-acre
island. Mississippi State Highways 25 and 365,
Tennessee State Highway 57, and U.S. Highway 72
are major highways providing regional access to the
site vicinity.

The Northeast Mississippi Demonstration Project
will be developed concurrent with the 2-unit, 2750-
MW Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant located on an
1160-acre site some 2 miles south. Preliminary con-
struction of the proposed nuclear plant began Feb-
ruary 13, 1978.

Consistent with TVA's basic philosophy of
unified resource development, the project includes
demonstrations in the areas of human resource
development, energy use and conservation, and
utilization of recreational potentials.

The project will involve the construction of a
small village complex, selected recreation facilities,
and access roads and trails. A limited amount of
housing and supportive facilities will be built to study
energy-related demonstrations at the neighborhood
scale. During the demonstration period, the housing
facilities will be available to TVA employees, includ-
ing recent graduates of area and regional training
centers working at major TVA construction projects
in the area. Other facilities within the village will be
used to provide selected continuing education,
training, and other human resource development
opportunities for TVA construction workers, village
residents, and other qualifying persons.

Human Resource Development

In the Tennessee Valley, a serious shortage of
skilled workers exists in several crafts of the heavy
construction industry. This is due primarily to the
rapid growth in demand for these skills and the

nights from 6:00 p.m. -
11:00 p.m. for adults, 21
years and over. In prepara-
tion for a varied and
interesting night each week,
all interested adults are
urged to be at the park on
Thursday night, 6:00 p.m.,
June 1, so plans can be
made. Some of the things
to be discussed are a Rook
league, a horseshoe tourney,

a croquet league and any
suggestions.

All persons interested in
tennis lessons must come by
the park and sign up before
noon, June 2. Classes are
free and begin on Monday
morning, June 5.

Day camp this year will
be for ages 6-10. Two ses-
sions lasting 3 weeks will
be held with the first ses-
sion beginning at 9:00 a.m.
on Tuesday, June 13. The
camp will be held on Tues-
days and Thursdays from
9:00 a.m. through noon. A
\$5.00 fee will be charged
to help cover the cost of
supplies.

One of the events planned
for August is a cross-coun-
try track meet. All those
interested must meet with
Becky as soon as possible.

The following are rules
for the park this summer:
(1) no tobacco chewing in-
side the community center;
(2) no alcoholic beverages

conduct anywhere at the
park.

inadequacy of training opportunities to supply a
pool of skilled workers, particularly from among
the underutilized such as rural and urban poor,
minority groups, and women. In the northeast
Mississippi area where TVA has begun preliminary
construction of the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant, the
recruitment and retention of construction workers,
especially skilled craftsmen, are expected to be even
more difficult because of the historically rural nature
of the area.

TVA is cooperating with other governmental
agencies and the affected labor unions to offer entry-
level training in heavy construction at area and
regional training centers. Many graduates of these
centers meeting TVA apprenticeship standards are
being employed by TVA on construction projects
and go into on-the-job advanced apprenticeship
programs.

In addition to continuing its assistance to exist-
ing area and regional training programs, TVA pro-
poses the Northeast Mississippi Demonstration
Project to develop skills and provide other training
opportunities designed to improve the recruitment
and retention potential of these persons at TVA
construction projects. The program will include
instruction, counseling, and other group-based
activities.

The training program will demonstrate a com-
prehensive approach to developing human resources
more fully and place emphasis on the rural and urban
poor, minority groups, and women who are under-
utilized due to lack of skills, mobility, and/or social-
ization. This human resource development program
will be designed to serve as a transition period be-
tween entry-level training and full apprenticeship.
Participants will commit themselves to improving
their job skill capabilities and acquiring other social
skills that will aid them in coping with on-the-job
situations and interpersonal relationships during a
period when their lifestyle is expected to undergo
significant change.

To carry out this demonstration program effec-
tively, certain onsite shops and other training facili-
ties available at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant con-
struction site will be utilized during off hours. Use of
these facilities, the need for efficient scheduling, and
a carefully managed training environment require
that participants be located nearby and housed as a
group. The proposed project will provide the facili-
ties not currently available in the Yellow Creek area.

Utilization Of Recreational Potentials

At the end of the demonstration period, the
facilities will be turned over to the State of Missis-
sippi as an addition to their park system for further
development by the State into a regional, water-

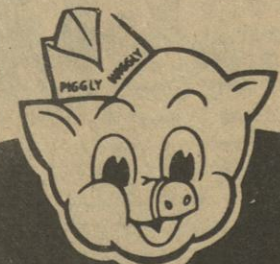

COLD WATER WASHING: new light by keeping light
 Energy consciousness is everywhere in Tishomingo County homes including the laundry room. To help reduce fuel costs, consider washing in cold water. Effective results in cold water depend on the amount of soil, the type of fabric and the color.

Launder bright or dark colors that bleed and lightly soiled delicates in cold water. Heavily soiled white or colorfast cottons and synthetics might not fare as well. A change in laundry habits - adding more detergent, presoaking, pretreating, using longer agitation and/or smaller loads - may be necessary to obtain a clean wash.

Generally, detergents do not perform as well in cold water (40 degrees F - 70 degrees F.) as they do at higher temperatures. When using powdered detergents in cold water, the detergent should be thoroughly dissolved before adding clothes. For best results, sprinkle detergent in the washwater as the machine is filling, agitate to dissolve and then add clothes.

Some washers automatically program a cold rinse for permanent press and synthetics. Most other fabrics may be rinsed in warm water, but cold water is just as satisfactory and will save energy.

CLEAN FIXTURES SHED MORE LIGHT:

Look at your home in a

fore beginning to wash, check to see if light switches are turned off. Remove bulbs from sockets when cool. All removable parts - globes, shades, metal grills - can be washed in a sink or tub filled with warm sudsy water. Rinse and dry pieces; put them aside.

Wipe the fixture with a sudsy sponge. A stepladder may be needed to reach high - hanging fixtures. Rinse the fixture with a clean sponge; wipe dry. Avoid letting water run into the sockets. After the fixture and parts are dry, polish metal or metal parts; replace. Finally, sponge off the bulbs. Rinse, dry and return to sockets.

POTATOES BAKED IN ELECTRIC FRY PAN:

Few homemakers get the full benefit from electric fry pans. Try using one for baking potatoes. It's easy and inexpensive - takes less electricity than an oven and there's no need to wrap in foil. Here's how to do it:

Place the desired number of scrubbed, slit, baking potatoes of uniform size on a rack in a preheated (420 degrees) fry pan and place the lid on the pan with the vent closed. Bake from 45 to 60 minutes, depending on size of potatoes. For crispy skins open the vent the last 15 minutes. Remove potatoes, press from bottom to open slit. Serve with butter, margarine, or sour cream seasoned to taste.

Iuka Team Wins Gun Championship

Iuka's Shooting Education BB Gun Team won the Mississippi BB Gun Championship held at Tishomingo State Park Saturday, May 6. The Iuka team edged the Meridian Hot Shots by a score of 2214 2/3 to 2127 2/3. Third place went to Charleson with a score of 2070, followed by New Albany with a score of 2014 2/3. The teams' scores consisted of a written test covering the gun safety program and shooting from the prone, kneeling, sitting and standing positions.

The Iuka team will now represent Mississippi at the International Competition at Dubuque, Iowa, June 30 - July 2. The Iuka team consisted of David and Rod Swanson, Greg Quinn, Robin Strawbridge, and John-John Trudeau with Leslie Cornelius the alternate. John-John Trudeau also won an award for scoring the second highest score for the match. Trudeau scored a total of 465 points compared to a score of 472 for first place Kevin Warren, of Meridian.

CONTROL HOUSEHOLD INSECTS:
SILVERFISH: Silverfish

are small, wingless, silver-colored insects. They are about a half-inch long when fully grown and have slender appendages at each end of their body. You find silverfish in stored papers and books or crawling in bath tubs and other smooth containers that prevent their escape.

Use a 3% malathion, 2% chlordane, 1% dichlorvos, 1% ronnel or 0.5% diazinon household spray to control silverfish. Spray walls, especially near fireplace, a round book case, furnace, storage room, and in attics.

Effective also is 0.125% chlordecone (Kepone) bait at the rate of 2 or 3 table-spoons to each infested room. Place bait in suitable containers, behind or under fixtures, and in other areas not accessible to children or pets.

SPIDERS: Occasionally you need to control spiders in your home. You can use a spray or a dust to treat webs and corners frequently by spiders. You can use household sprays containing 2% chlordane, 0.5% dichlorvos, 2% malathion, 0.5% diazinon, or 1% ronnel. If

you prefer a dust, use 5% chlordane dust. Do not contaminate food, water, dishes, or utensils.

ROACHES: Roaches make any good housekeeper's face turn red. They are troublesome. They destroy food and clothing, and they may carry disease germs to your food from the filthy places where they develop and hide.

Five kinds of roaches infest homes: the large American or brown roach, the oriental black roach, the brown-banded roach, the small water bug or German roach, and the smoky brown roach.

Screens over the doors and windows will help keep roaches from invading houses from the outside. Sanitation or good housekeeping will aid in control.

Roaches hide during the day in sheltered, dark places, usually under sinks, or drain board, behind wall cabinets, and in other similar places. Their flattened bodies enable them to go through very narrow cracks. Sprays or dusts should be directed into these hiding places. The roaches come out at night looking for food.

As they look for food, they come in contact with the dust or spray and are poisoned by it. They are attracted to and feed on baits.

A spray of 1 or 2% ronnel (Korlan), or 2% malathion, or 0.5% diazinon or 0.5% chlorpyrifos (Dursban), or 1.1% propoxur (Baygon) will control roaches, especially the small water bugs. Baygon roach bait is also effective. Use it as recommended for silverfish. Where roaches are not resistant, 2% chlordane is effective.

Be sure to remove dishes and food from closets and cabinets before you spray. You can replace them as soon as the spray has dried.

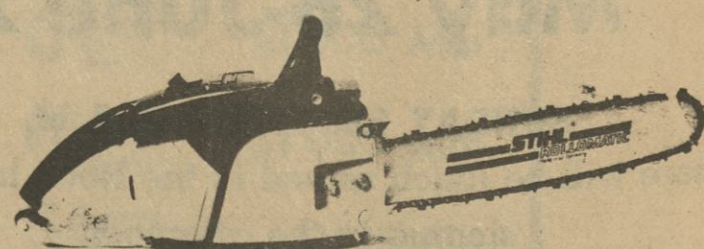

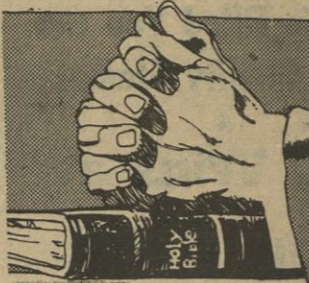

A DIFFERENCE IN DIRECTION!

A man was seeking to teach his neighbor about Christ. He had established that sin was a violation of God's law (1 Jn. 3:4) and that the results of sin would be eternal separation from God (Rom. 6:23). But as he was urging the man to obey the gospel he was hit with this question, "Well, aren't you a sinner too?" The Christian immediately said, "Oh, yes, I'm a sinner too."

His friend then asked, "Well, what is the difference between you and me if we are both sinners?" The man thought for a minute because he wanted to give a correct answer. Then he said, "Let me explain it to you from my own life. Before I became a Christian I was running after sin. Now I'm running from it."

Paul was shocked by the attitude of sin among the Roman Christians. He asked, "How can we who die to sin still live in it?" (Rom. 6:2). John wrote, "I am writing this to you so that you may not sin. . . ." (1 Jn. 2:1). Our direction as a Christian is away from sin.

But thank God, when we do sin "we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (1 Jn. 2:1). The difference between my sin and that of one not a Christian is that Jesus is taking care of mine by his blood. John said, "the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin." (1 Jn. 1:7).

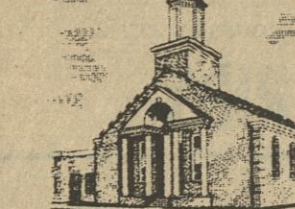

News From Jamie Whitten

I am back in Washington to meet with the staff of the Committee on Appropriations. Under the new rules, Appropriations Bills will come up one after another. Much of what we do is tied down by the Report, especially that which we have for our District and State.

I really enjoyed the last week. With few controversial bills up. I spent the time over our District, from Tennessee to DeSoto, Tate and Panola Counties, to a meeting at Oxford, to Pontotoc, Tupelo, Grenada, Tillatoba, Pope, Courtland, Strayhorn, Savage, to Cottonville, Arkabutla, Coldwater, Senatobia, Charleston, Batesville and Sardis. On other weekends, I have visited the Counties of Tishomingo, Itawamba, Prentiss, Benton, Quitman and Coahoma and I will be in the other Counties in the next two weeks. This I have always done at every opportunity.

It is always a treat to drive over North Mississippi and to see the great improvements in all our towns and cities and in rural areas -- housing, rural water systems, the change from small row cropping to grass, cattle and dairying with most people working in towns where factories continue to move because of the many advantages Mississippi offers, including the Right to Work. While working in town, people can now live where they please.

I know you will understand how I could tell the National Convention of the Rural Electric Cooperatives

a few weeks ago, with 12,000 present, that I appreciate the plaque and the honor they gave me by placing my name with some rather famous people but that I treasured more being Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee which brought housing, water systems, hard-surfaced roads and telephones to my home community of Cascilla and to thousands of similar villages, along with sewers, public buildings industrial parks and other improvements to towns and cities and, to cap it all, DeSoto County has more water service than any county in the country.

Believe me, it is a pleasure to travel over North Mississippi with the knowledge that our Committee initiated these improvements, along with soil conservation, terracing and reforestation. But to see it is wonderful. I know we have a great State and it shows.

When I came back here, for here is where my work is, my attention was called forcibly to the fact that anything you do can be misconstrued and will be by those with a purpose.

I believe in the right of all our people to vote and they do under the Constitution. I believe it is time for the whole country to be treated alike, however, and not have all the people of our section, where we vote more freely and get along better than any other part of the country, stirred up and kept under the thumb of the Attorney General while other sections are not.

It was good, as always, to visit friends new and old. The major problem, other than too much rain, continues to be inflation which has ruined many nations.

When we realize how much of our inflation comes from foreign aid, \$196,000, - 000,000, you can see why I have always opposed this overall program. With few exceptions, we give to the incumbent governments which sell to their people. To get our money back, we give them our goods and we end up with a few goods and more money -- and with fewer goods divided into more money, money gets cheaper and prices get higher and higher. With perhaps a few exceptions, we are faced with the absolute necessity to end such a program.

We need to do for our own country and it is here that I am fortunate. Twenty-one times we have had to restore soil conservation and this year will make 22 times -- and so it is with other development programs.

I'm proud to be a Mississippian and proud you have kept me in a position to help in our development.

park at a strategic location and will be one of the projected future recreation areas in the surrounding tri-state area. In the past 3.4 million visits were made to the park areas located within some 10 miles of the site and by the year 2020 this visitation is expected to reach 6.4 million.

Project Plan

The proposed first phase development plan will be to develop 65 acres of developed land and 175 acres of natural woodland.

Decision to build additional facilities could be made when the first phase is operational; the second phase of development will accommodate 350 people. Should the project be expanded to include additional facilities presently envisioned for the park, it would accommodate some 650 people.

The central focus and major destination point of the village will be the activity center. Main building of the activity center will be food service, recreation and education facilities, medium density housing area. The medium density housing will have a close physical relationship to the administration, and food service facilities. Cabins will be located in more secluded areas of the park. A mobile/modular homesite area will be located from the activity center but will not be as close to the cabin area.

It is anticipated that electrical service to the park would be provided by the Tishomingo Electric Association, and the distribution system would be placed underground. The project would have a central water system, and it is presently being contracted with the Short-Coleman Park Association for water. Additional water storage would be provided by TVA if needed. Sanitary sewer collection and treatment facilities would be provided by TVA. Solid waste materials would be handled through onsite methods and through incineration service. TVA will provide security and law enforcement during the demonstration period. Services, such as postal and telephone services, will be provided by the appropriate agencies.

Access to the site is by a narrow, unimproved road connecting with the Red Sulphur Springs Road which is the major access road to the peninsula. This road is presently being improved by TVA in conjunction with construction activities at the Yellow River Plant site. Further upgrading, however, approximately two miles of road between the plant site and the proposed project would be provided by TVA to provide adequate access.

Project Management

To ensure that the residual project facilities conform to the requirements and needs of Mississippi, the project will be managed by the National Park Commission. As presently planned, the project will be accomplished, in part, through the private construction of the project and TVA will ensure that interested small business builders have an opportunity to review the project and submit proposals. TVA will provide facilities constructed and provide general operation and maintenance of the project during the demonstration period which is expected to last about eight years. Where feasible, service activities will be contracted for with private business.

During TVA's occupancy of the site, use of the park will be primarily to house and provide services for those persons taking part in the demonstration phase of the project. Where compatible with project operations, facilities, such as swimming ramps, picnic areas, and some service facilities will be open to the general public.

When TVA's need for the facilities is finished, the park will be transferred to the State for inclusion into its recreation system.

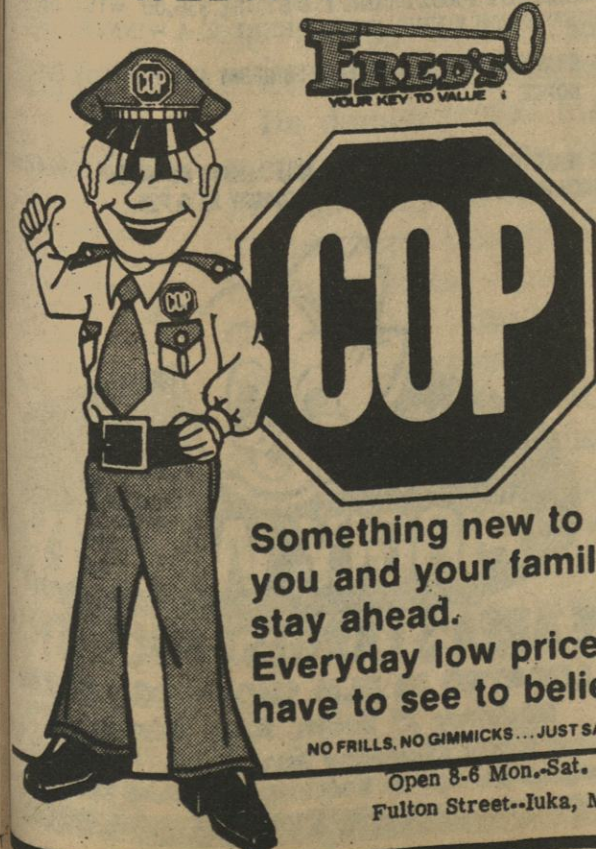
