TVA PROPOSES DEMO PROJECT FOR AREA

Project Involves Human Resource Development, Energy Use And Conservation, And Utilization Of Recreational Potentials

The Tennessee Valley Authority is planning a multipurpose resource development demonstration project in northeast Mississippi on the shorelands of the Yellow Creek embayment of Pickwick Landing Reservoir near where the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway joins the Tennessee River.

The project site is located in Tishomingo County, northeast Mississippi, about 12 miles north of Iuka. The site consists of some 240 acres of mainland with about 4.5 miles of shoreland and a nearby 60-acre island. Mississippi State Highways 25 and 365, Tennessee State Highway 57, and U.S. Highway 72 are major highways providing regional access to the site vicinity.

The Northeast Mississippi Demonstration Project will be developed concurrent with the 2-unit; 2750-MW Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant located on an 1160-acre site some 2 miles south. Preliminary construction of the proposed nuclear plant began February 13, 1978.

Consistent with TVA's basic philosophy of unified resource development, the project includes demonstrations in the areas of human resource development, energy use and conservation, and utilization of recreational potentials.

The project will involve the construction of a small village complex, selected recreation facilities, and access roads and trails. A limited amount of housing and supportive facilities will be built to study energy-related demonstrations at the neighborhood scale. During the demonstration period, the housing facilities will be available to TVA employees, including recent graduates of area and regional training centers working at major TVA construction projects in the area. Other facilities within the village will be used to provide selected continuing education, training, and other human resource development opportunities for TVA construction work residents, and other qualifying persons.

Human Resource Development

In the Tennessee Valley, a serious shortage of skilled workers exists in several crafts of the heavy construction industry. This is due primarily to the rapid growth in demand for these skills and the

Summer Program At Belmont Park

The Belmont Park officially opens Saturday, May 27, at noon. The following is "Get-Acquainted Week" and everyone is urged to come by the park. The Director of Activities at the park this summer will be Mrs. Becky Nichols, of Red Bay, Ala. She is a 1978 graduate of the University of North Alabama with a B.S. in health, physical education and recreation.

A tentative summer schedule is as follows: May 27, park opening 12 noon; May 29 - June 3, "Get Acquainted Week"; June 5, tennis lessons begin (age groups posted at park); June 13, day camp I begins (9:00 a.m. to noon. Tues, and Thurs); June 17, horseshoe tourney for 21 years and over; June 23-24, frisbee contest; June 29, day camp I ends; July 11, day camp II begins; July 20-22, volleyball tourney; July 27, day camp II énds; July 27-28, skateboard tourney; August 1-6, tennis tourney; August cross-country track meet.

Again this year, the park is reserved on Thursday nights from 6:00 p.m. 11:00 p.m. for adults, 21 years and over. In preparation for a varied and interesting night each week,

all interested adults are urged to be at the park on Thursday night, 6:00 p.m., June 1, so plans can be made. Some of the things to be discussed are a Rook league, & horseshoe tourney,

a croquet league and any suggestions. All persons interested in

tennis lessons must come by the park and sign up before noon, June 2. Classes are free and begin on Monday morning, June 5.

Day camp this year will be for ages 6-10. Two sessions lasting 3 weeks will be held with the first session beginning at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, June 13. The camp will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:00 a.m. through noon. A \$5.00 fee will be charged to help cover the cost of supplies.

One of the events planned for August is a cross-country track meet. All'those interested must meet with Becky as soon as possible.

The following are rules for the park this summer: (1) no tobacco chewing inside the community center; (2) no alcoholic beverages allowed anywhere at the park; (3) No gambling at any time anywhere at the park; (4) no smoking inside the community center; and (5) no fighting or disorderly conduct anywhere at the

. Anyone violating these rules will be suspended from park use for 1 day. The second violation will result

in a 3 day suspension. Becky invites everyone to come by the park and get involved in the many varied and interesting activities planned for this summer, the county-wide fish fry and

inadequacy of training opportunities to supply a pool of skilled workers, particularly from among the underutilized such as rural and urban poor, minority groups, and women. In the northeast Mississippi area where TVA has begun preliminary construction of the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant, the recruitment and retention of construction workers, especially skilled craftsmen, are expected to be even more difficult because of the historically rural nature

TVA is cooperating with other governmental agencies and the affected labor unions to offer entrylevel training in heavy construction at area and regional training centers. Many graduates of these centers meeting TVA apprenticeship standards are being employed by TVA on construction projects and go into on-the-job advanced apprenticeship programs.

In addition to continuing its assistance to existing area and regional training programs, TVA proposes the Northeast Mississippi Demonstration Project to develop skills and provide other training opportunities designed to improve the recruitment and retention potential of these persons at TVA construction projects. The program will include instruction, counseling, and other group-based activities.

The training program will demonstrate a comprehensive approach to developing human resources more fully and place emphasis on the rural and urban poor, minority groups, and women who are underutilized due to lack of skills, mobility, and/or socialization. This human resource development program will be designed to serve as a transition period between entry-level training and full apprenticeship. Participants will commit themselves to improving their job skill capabilities and acquiring other social skills that will aid them in coping with on-the-job situations and interpersonal relationships during a period when their lifestyle is expected to undergo significant change.

To carry out this demonstration program effectively, certain onsite shops and other training facilities available at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant construction site will be utilized during off hours. Use of these facilities, the need for efficient scheduling, and a carefully managed training environment require that participants be located nearby and housed as a group. The proposed project will provide the facilities not currently available in the Yellow Creek area.

Utilization Of Recreational Potentials

At the end of the demonstration period, the facilities will be turned over to the State of Mississippi as an addition to their park system for, further development by the State into a regional, water-

For best results, sprinkle detergent in the washwater as the maching is filling, agitate to dissolve and then add clothes.

Some washers automatically program a cold rinse for permanent press and synthetics. Most other fabrics may be rinsed in warm water, but cold water is just as satisfactory and will save energy.

CONTROL HOUSEHOLD

SILVERFISH: Silverfish

are small, wingless, silvercolored insects. They are about a half-inch long when fully grown and have slender appendages at each end of their body. You find silverfish in stored papers and books or crawling in bath tubs and other smooth containers that prevent their

Use a 3% malathion, 2% chlordane, 1% dichlorvos, 1% ronnel or 0.5% diazinon household spray to control silverfish. Spray walls, especially near fireplace, around book case, furnace, storage room, and in attics.

Effective also is 0.125% chlordecone (Kepone) bait at the rate of 2 or 3 tablespoons to each infested room. Place bait in suitable containers, behind or under fixtures, and in other areas not accessible to children or

SPIDERS: Occasionally you need to control spiders in your home. You can use a spray or a dust to treat webs and corners frequented by spiders. You can use household sprays containing 2% chlordane, 0.5% dichlorvos, 2% malathion, 0.5% diazinon, or 1% ronnel. If

chlordane dust. Do not contaminate food, water, dishes. or utensils.

ROACHES: Roaches make any good housekeeper's face turn red. They are troublesome. They destroy food and clothing, and they may carry disease germs to your food from the filthy places where they develop and hide.

Five kinds of roaches infest homes: the large American or brown roach, the oriental black roach, the brown-banded roach, the small water bug or German roach, and the smoky brown roach.

Screens over the doors and windows will help keep roaches from invading houses from the outside. Sanitation or good housekeeping will aid in control.

Roaches hide during the day in sheltered, dark places, usually under sinks or drain board, behind wall cabinets, and in other similar places. Their flattened bodies enable them to go through very narrow cracks. Sprays or dusts should be directed into these hiding places. The roaches come out at night looking for food.

As they look for food, they come in contact with the dust or spray and are poisoned by it. They are attracted to and feed on baits.

A spray of 1 or 2% ronnel (Korlan), or 2% malathion, or 0.5% diazinon or 0.5% chlorpyrifos (Dursban), or 1.1% propoxur (Baygon) will control roaches, especially the small water bugs. Baygon roach bait is also effective. Use it as recommended for silverfish. Where roaches are not resistant, 2% chlordane is effective.

Be sure to remove dishes and food from closets and cabinets before you spray, You can replace them as soon as the spray has

X-RAYS

Why x-rays? X-rays are of the body what blueprints are of the house. They give a detailed outline of the structures (bones) of the body.
